# THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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## TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To vote by Australian ballot for all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 2. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates-at-large, Alternate Delegates -at- Large, District Delegates, Alternate District Delegates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.

Art. 3. To see what action the town wishes to take in regards to assessors.

Art. 4. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To hear the report of the budget committee and act thereon.

Art. 6. To see what action the town will take in regard to the unexpended balances of appropriations of 1935.



Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for highway maintenance.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for snow removal.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor including Old Age Assistance.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the public library.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the fire department.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for street lighting.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise money for same.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid on class 5 roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$759.69.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise \$500.00 for a new bridge or culvert to replace present bridge on the River road north of the residence of C. E. Chickering.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500 to buy land and build a fire house in West Chesterfield.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to purchase a tractor and snow plow.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 to be spent on the Crowningshield road.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to install two street lights in Spofford:

1. On a pole at the top of the hill at the bend in the road near the barn owned by Mrs. Elsie Foster and occupied by Arvid Pearson.

2. On a pole near the entrance to H. F. Heighton's residence on High Street.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to install two street lights on the road to the town dump; one at or near the property recently purchased by George Plante and one nearer the residence of H. Chickering.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to dispose of one or both truck snow plows.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and the trustees of Trust Funds to adjust the records of the trust funds and make their return to be voted upon at the next annual meeting.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the Albert S. Chickering Trust Fund, the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and improvement of the Albert S. Chickering burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the Farr-Kingsley Trust Fund, the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and improvement of the Farr-Kingsley burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 to be added to the Elsie Albee-Fassett Trust Fund, the income to be used for the perpetual care and improvement of the Elsie Albee-Fassett burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Art. 27. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## TOWN MEETING, MARCH, 1935

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Proceedings of the annual town meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield called at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, March 12, 1935.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, James A. Wilson, at nine o'clock A. M., and balloting for Town Officers by the Australian Ballot System began, with Alice L. Spaulding serving as assistant Moderator and Ralph C. Chickering as assistant Town Clerk.

At ten o'clock the Warrant was read by the Town Clerk and the articles were then disposed of as follows:—

Article 1. Voted that the Selectmen act as Assessors for the ensuing year.

Article 2. Voted that the sum of \$3,100.00 be raised to defray town charges as recommended by the Selectmen.

Article 3. Voted that the unexpended balances of 1934 appropriations revert to the funds for which they were raised.

Article 4. Voted that the sum of \$2,000.00 for each side of town, making a total of \$6,000, be raised for highway maintenance for the ensuing year.

Article 5. Voted to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for snow removal as requested by the Selectmen.

Article 6. Voted to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the poor.

Article 7. Voted that the head Selectman's request for \$500.00 for Old Age Assistance be raised.



Article 8. Voted to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the libraries.

Article 9. Voted to defer this article until after Article 21 is disposed of.

Article 10. Voted to raise the sum of \$300.00 the same as last year for the support of the fire department.

Article 11. Voted to raise the sum of \$1,700.00 for street lighting.

Article 12. Voted on motion made by Mr. Friedsam and supported by Mr. Robinson to raise the sum of \$1,200.00 for the improvement of the Common and thereby vote yes to Articles 19 and 20. Work to be in charge of the Selectmen and only local labor to be employed.

Article 13. Voted to pass over the Article.

Article 14. Voted to raise the sum of \$108.00 for observing Old Home Day. Paul M. Penning was elected by voice vote to serve as Committee for same and he resigned. Ada W. Allen was then elected by voice vote and she refused to serve. Harry E. Winn was then elected by voice vote and he refused but the Moderator did not recognize his refusal.

Article 15. Voted to pass over the Article.

Article 16. Voted to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purchase of land from Harry A. Pierce providing that title, water supply, boundary lines and other details are agreeable to the Selectmen and the land is purchased in the sense of a public beach for the townspeople and the taxpayers.

Article 17. Voted to pass over the Article.

Article 18. Voted to accept State Aid for construction of Class V roads and to raise the sum of \$609.36 for the same.

Articles 19 and 20. Taken care of under action on Article 12.

Article 21. On motion made by Mr. Friedsam and supported by Mr. Robinson it was voted that the town raise the sum of \$2,500.00 to be expended by the Selectmen for the building of a stage in the rear of the Town Hall, break through the walls, provide a proper barrier and so arrange the construction as to provide a proper stage and to rearrange space over the present entrance door and toilet rooms so as to provide a gallery for the seating of approximately 150 people, plans to be drawn by a representative architect and bids presented by only local bidders who are to furnish bond in agreeable form to the Selectmen for the proper completion of the work.

Article 9. Voted to purchase 150 chairs of proper design to be placed in the mezzanine and to raise a sum not to exceed \$150 for same.

Article 22. Voted to install the three lights in Spofford Village as follows:—

(a) On a pole in front of Ernest Ball's house on School Street.

(b) On Joslin Road to Main Street, near road leading from the land of Mrs. John A. Schlichting.

(c) On pole in front of residence of the late Henry Rice.

Article 23. Voted to license milk dealers after having passed regular inspections.

Article 24. Voted to discontinue the small section of road in front of the residence of Henry C. Chickering left when the course of the state road was changed.

Article 25. Voted to accept the sum of \$100 to be known as the Farr-Caswell Trust Fund, the income to be paid the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care



and improvement of the Leon Farr and Carrie Caswell lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 26. Voted to accept the sum of \$100 to be known as the Nelson H. Ball Trust Fund for the perpetual care of the Nelson H. Ball lot in Spofford cemetery, interest on said \$100 to be expended on fertilizer and perpetual care.

Article 27. Voted that the article be amended to read George H. Joslin instead of George E. Joslin.

Voted to accept the sum of \$100 to be known as the George H. Joslin Trust Fund for the perpetual care of the George H. Joslin lot in Spofford cemetery. Interest on said \$100 to be expended for the perpetual care and fertilizer on said lot each year.

Article 28. Voted to accept the sum of \$500 to be held in trust, the income to be used for the purchase of books for the public library in said town and to be known as the David W. Beckley Fund.

Article 29. Voted to accept the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200), one hundred dollars to be placed with the Richard T. Cobb Trust Fund and one hundred dollars to be placed with the M. H. Spaulding Trust Fund.

Article 30. Voted to accept the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) to be known as the Maryann Thompson Trust Fund, the income to be used for the perpetual care and improvement of the Maryann Thompson burial lot in the Spofford Cemetery.

Article 31. Voted to accept the sum of \$100 to be known as the Charles W. Chamberlain Trust Fund, the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and improvement of the Joshua W. Chamberlain, Sr., and Josiah Chamberlain lot.

Article 32. Voted to accept the sum of \$100 to be known as the Amidon-Hannum Trust Fund, the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and improvement of the E. R. Amidon and the William P. Hannum burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 33. Voted to accept the sum of \$100 to be known as the Amidon-Stanley Trust Fund, the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and improvement of the Larkin W. Amidon and Mabel A. Stanley burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 34. Voted to accept the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) to be known as the George Ware Trust Fund for the perpetual care and improvement of the one half of Ware-Jackson lot. The income to be used for the care and improvement of the one half lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 35. Voted to accept the sum of \$100 to be known as the Nathan Puffer Trust Fund, the income to be used for the perpetual care and improvement of the Nathan Puffer burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 36. Voted to accept the fire siren now installed on the Square Deal Garage as a gift from Mr. Ralph Mulligan in memory of his father. The siren to be placed on the tower of the fire house.

Article 37. Voted by ballot to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act. Whole number of votes cast 70. "No" had 18 and "Yes" had 52.

Voted to designate six laymen to act with two state indicated nominees and that we take the Moderators' suggestion for a nominating committee of three who will withdraw for a few minutes and formulate six names to submit to the voters to act on the Budget Committee. The nominating committee as named by the Moderator consisted of Harry E. Winn, Ar-

thur H. Post and John R. Ryans. The six names which were submitted by the nominating committee were Moses H. Chickering, C. K. Lewis, Fred Humphrey, Maurice L. Amidon, John Mansley and Arthur H. Post.

Voted to elect by voice vote.

Voted that Moses H. Chickering and C. K. Lewis be elected to serve for three years.

Voted that Arthur H. Post and John Mansley be elected to serve for two years.

Voted that Fred Humphrey and Maurice L. Amidon be elected to serve for one year.

Article 38. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes in 1935.

Article 39. Voted that the Selectmen call a special meeting at a convenient and proper time before our next regular meeting to vote on discontinuing the caucus and revise the rules accordingly.

Voted to adjourn at 2:27 P. M.

The counting of the ballots cast for the election of Town Officers by the Australian Ballot system resulted as follows:—

Number of names on the check list, 463; number of ballots cast, 314.

For Town Clerk. Imogene L. Chickering had 254 votes.

For Selectmen. Henry C. Chickering had 134 votes; Paul M. Penning had 167 votes.

For Town Treasurer. Ada W. Allen had 162 votes; John Mansley had 128 votes.

For Tax Collector. Harry E. Winn had 275 votes.

For Spofford Road Agent. George W. Goodridge had 108 votes; Walter J. Post had 186 votes.

For Center Road Agent. Olin E. Butler had 127 votes; Roger C. Spaulding had 160 votes.



For West Chesterfield Road Agent. George E. Carruth had 32 votes; Lyle B. Chickering had 100 votes; Walter Dunbar had 73 votes; Clarence F. Springer had 87 votes.

For Center Fireward. Paul M. Penning had 171 votes; George S. White had 95 votes; Charles A. Post had 3 votes; Charles Post had 1 vote; C. A. Post had 1 vote.

For Spofford Fireward. Arvid W. Pearson had 166 votes; John P. Redding had 84 votes.

Trustee of Town Library. Harold Post had 141 votes; Wallace W. Record had 113 votes.

Auditors. Ralph C. Chickering had 163 votes; John H. Nurse had 91 votes; Wallace W. Record had 96 votes; John P. Redding had 102 votes.

For Trustees of Trust Funds. A. For two years—Ralph C. Chickering had 224 votes. B. for three years—Jessie M. B. Joslin had 115 votes; James A. Wilson had 140 votes.

For Sextons. A. Spofford Village Cemetery—Byron A. Davis had 115 votes; Floyd M. Fuller had 69 votes; George E. Joslin had 88 votes. B. Center Cemetery—Fred W. Holman had 132 votes; William E. Nurse had 114 votes. C. New Boston Cemetery—Paul E. Welcome had 224 votes; Louis D. Herriek had 1 vote. D. Pattridge and Atherton Hill Cemeteries—Fred E. Atherton had 245 votes.

For Spofford Constable. Nelson H. Ball had 63 votes; William D. Pierce had 201 votes.

For Center Constable. Henry C. Chickering had 76 votes; Charles H. Spaulding had 203 votes.

For West Chesterfield Constable. Harold E. Randall had 249 votes; Harold Ingalls had 4 votes; Newton E. Darling had 1 vote.

For Surveyors of Wood and Lumber. Chester M. Burnham had 190 votes; George W. Goodridge had 186 votes; Fred W. Holman had 164 votes.

For Fence Viewers. Fred W. Ball had 167 votes; R. F. Mulligan had 152 votes; John H. Nurse had 185 votes; John P. Redding had 1 vote; Olin Butler had 1 vote; Ada Allen had 1 vote; Harry Snow had 1 vote.

## SPECIAL MEETING, JANUARY 15, 1936

---

Proceedings of the Special Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, called at the Town Hall in said town on Wednesday, Jan. 15, 1936.

The meeting was called to order at 2:20 P. M., by the Moderator, James A. Wilson and the Warrant was read by the Clerk.

The Articles of the Warrant were then disposed of as follows:—

Article 1. Voted to abolish the caucus defined in Section 2 of the rules and regulations of the Australian Ballot Act.

Article 2. Voted to eliminate Sections 2, 3, 4 and 6 of the rules and regulations of the Australian Ballot Act.

Voted to amend Section 7 to read; "The Town Clerk shall prepare a ballot substantially in the form of that used at biennial elections for use at Town Meeting day, and shall cause to be placed on said ballot the names of all candidates who have filed for office in accordance with sections 5 and 8, all names to be alphabetically arranged for each office."

Voted to amend Section 8 to read; "In addition to all candidates filing for office in accordance with section 5, there shall be printed on the ballot the names of all candidates whose names are presented to the Town Clerk by 6:00 P. M. of the Saturday preceding town meeting, with a petition of twenty-five names of voters of the town."

No further business appearing it was voted to adjourn.

## HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

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### INFANT WELFARE

Under the State Board of Health, division of Maternity, Infancy and Child Hygiene, routine home calls were made to all new born infants, and children of pre-school age, under the supervision of Miss Elizabeth Carriel, State Public Health Nurse in Cheshire County. In addition to the routine work of the division, a Child Health conference was held at the Community House. At the conference 32 children were weighed and given a complete physical examination by an attending Physician. Of these Children examined 26 were found with defects while the remaining 6 were found without defects. At the same clinic 15 children were given the immunization treatment against diphtheria. The purpose of the clinic is to prevent illness, therefore children should be registered at an early age. Proper supervision of the young child is very important, so as to detect and correct if possible physical defects as early as possible in the child's life.

Five houses were posted for Measles. Four septic tanks were installed by Cottage Owners. Two drains were moved and septic tanks installed. Sewage at the Hotel near the Lake was some improved.

At the Town Meeting, March, 1935, it was voted to license Milk Dealers, also for inspection of Dairies that sold Milk in Town. Mr. Eckloff, a State Inspector from Concord, N. H., spent several days in Town with the Health Officer inspecting dairies. He recommended some improvements which should be attended to before licenses are issued next year. Thirty licenses were issued, nine of these were issued to buy and sell

milk for two dollars each as follows: C. J. Fossey, Harry Nosek, George E. Joslin, William R. Manch, John Beliveau, John Redding, Byron A. Davis, Henry C. Chickering, Windham County Co-operative Milk Producers, Inc., Brattleboro, Vermont.

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## REPORT OF FIREWARDS

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The West Chesterfield company responded to seven chimney fire calls and eight brush, grass and forest fires and the Center engine had eight chimney fires, one house fire and six brush, grass or forest fires.

There were no serious building fires in the past year. The school house fire that occurred Nov. 18 was discovered in time to prevent the loss of the center school. About one hundred dollars damage was done. A chimney fire at George Eager's occurred at 5:30 A. M. on Jan. 24 and some damage was incurred when the fire started in the partitions around the chimney.

All the grass and brush fires were minor with the exception of the Fisk fire which was fought for three days using both outfits and laying all hose.

We bought 150 feet of 1½" hose and 150 feet of booster hose for the center outfit. Also one soda-acid extinguisher.

We have placed before the Budget Committee the vital necessity of building a fire house in the west part of the town and have received their approval. We trust that the voters will give this the most serious consideration.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

Dear Sir:—I hereby submit my annual report as school nurse. Inspection in the Chesterfield schools showed the following defects:

- 120 pupils were inspected.
- 3 pupils showed defective vision—uncorrected.
- 4 pupils showed poor posture.
- 33 pupils were underweight.
- 52 pupils were in need of dental care.
- 8 pupils had enlarged glands in neck.
- 22 pupils were recommended to consult a physician about nose and throat condition.

Dental work was arranged for by appointment with Dr. G. Alex. Campbell of Keene, N. H. The charges were: Cleaning, 50c; extractions, 50c; fillings, 50c.

10 pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist. This work was paid for by the parents of the pupil having work done.

A tonsil clinic was held at the Keene Community Hospital July 24, 1935, 2 cases were treated.

One tonsil case was treated privately.

Four pupils had special eye examinations and defect corrected.

Eight pupils were given chest examination by Dr. R. B. Kerr at clinics held at the Keene Community Hospital.

I wish especially to draw the parents attention to the State law on vaccination, which is as follows:

Extract from Chapter 123. Public Laws of New Hampshire. Sect. 1. No child shall attend a public or private school in this state unless he has been vaccinated; or has had the small pox; or has submitted not less than three times to the process of vaccination; or holds a certificate of the local board of health that he is an unfit subject for vaccination. The local board of health shall issue such a certificate on the advice of a registered physician of the state and practicing in the town in which the child resides.

Sect. 3. Any person who violates any provision of Section 1 shall be fined \$10.00.

I would suggest that the parents of pupils entering school attend to vaccinations during the summer vacation months.

I wish to express the appreciation of the district to parents who furnished transportation to the dental clinic, also the Red Cross Chapters of Spofford and West Chesterfield.

I also wish to express my appreciation to superintendent, teachers, parents and pupils for their help and co-operation.
