TOWN WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampstead, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Hampstead, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to keep Highways and Bridges in repair and what method they will adopt to expend the same.
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or appropriate to meet the expenses of the Public Library for the ensuing year.
5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day and what method they will adopt to expend the same.
6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town.
7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate for the care of Cemeteries the ensuing year

and what method they will adopt to expend the same.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be expended under the supervision of the Selectmen in continuing the permanent road at the lower end of the Town known as the East road.

9. To see if the Town will vote to put a furnace in the Town Hall and raise or appropriate money for the same.

10. To see if the Town will vote to buy a chemical Fire Extinguisher and raise or appropriate money for the same.

11. To hear the reports of Auditors and Committees and act thereon.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS OF HAMPSTEAD.

To the Honorable School Board of Hampstead:

In making my second annual report it is my desire to give the condition of the schools in the district and make some recommendations and suggestions for the betterment of the schools.

Our common schools are at present on a good working basis. The last year and a half have been occupied in filling up the gaps left by the lax system of preceding years. Lack of thorough complete work in all grades and all branches was the prevailing condition everywhere and in everything. No class had anything well, as a result it has been a difficult task for all concerned to round out the work of the individual pupils. The majority of the children are now fairly well graded, and if we are careful in future our schools will soon be on a good graded basis.

The greatest difficulty has been in the upper classes, where so many years' work had been done in a careless fashion. But by hard work on the part of everyone it seems probable that in June we shall have ten pupils ready to do secondary school work and be able to do it. At the present time the lower grade children are able to read very well which is point of high merit.

We have had several changes in the teaching force since September for reasons impossible to control. All of our schools with one exception, are difficult of access; this is a serious drawback in obtaining teachers and al-

ways will be. Teachers will work for less pay if transportation to and from their homes is easy and cheap. Another feature of our schools which tends to make the keeping of good teachers difficult is the fact that all of our schools consist of several grades. No capable teacher will continue in a school of six or eight grades if she can obtain one of fewer classes. Then the small salary is still another factor. No woman can live upon the pay paid in the district.

Your superintendent welcomes just honest criticism based upon first hand knowledge; but he deploras ignorant, narrow faultfinding, based upon children's tales or village gossip. No person has the right to criticise a teacher or school unless he has visited the school several times and seen for himself. This blind unreasoning fault-finding will never better conditions, but on the other hand will work evil to pupils and school.

The High school is an institution of great value to the community, but it has been and will continue to be an impossibility to obtain and keep a teacher, capable of building up an efficient school on the salary furnished by the fund, nor will the money supplied by the district retain a capable assistant. The present salary paid the assistant, a woman who has given eight years of her life in obtaining her education and incurred considerable expense, receives less net income than a house maid. During the past year considerable advance has been made towards a good practical High school, such a school as would be a credit and help to the town, the trustees are doing all that the funds at their disposal will permit, it now remains for the community to decide if it will do its part and continue the good work.

The question of books and supplies for the High school pupils is a statutory obligation upon the district. Every parent is, by law, entitled to this privilege. During the past year these bills have been paid from the

Elementary school book fund to the embarrassment of that department. I would suggest that the selectmen be requested to assess the sum of fifty dollars for this purpose for the coming year, and that the same sums be assessed for the elementary school statutory requirements as last year. There is need of a considerable number of minor repairs and it would be well to ask the district to raise two hundred dollars for this purpose.

In closing I wish to thank the Board for their loyal support and all others concerned for their aid.
