THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hopkinton, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said Hopkinton, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges in addition to the amount required by law, and appropriate the same.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Hopkinton free public library, and appropriate the same.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day, and appropriate the same.
- 6. To hear and act upon the reports of town officers, library trustees and committees.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to accept the conditions of the act of the legislature passed in 1905 and amend-

ments, to wit: An act to provide for state aid, and for the expenditure of other public money, in the permanent improvement of main highways throughout the state, and see what sum or sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the same.

- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,222 to secure state aid for Central Trunk Line Maintenance, under the provision of the Motor Vehicle Law.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to increase the pay of the members of the fire companies, while actually at fires, from 25 cents to 30 cents per hour.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that portion of the highway leading past the house of Edward Richardson, in the village of Contoocook, and on Cottage Street, so called, beginning at a point by line of Will N. Davis land and line of Charles Dalby to the division fence of land formerly owned by Maria Brown—(about 100 feet in length and 35 feet in width), agreeable to the petition of Will N. Davis and others.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to purchase, erect and maintain public scales at Hopkinton Village and appropriate money for the same.
- 12. To see if the town will accept one hundred dollars from Robert T. Gould, the income to be used for the care of the burial lot of Charles Gould in the Contoocook cemetery.
- 13. To see if the town will accept one hundred dollars from Mary Currier Gould, the income to be used for the care of the Deacon John Currier lot in the Stumpfield cemetery.

- 14. To see if the town will vote to allow two per cent. discount on all taxes paid on or before July 10, 1919.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks not earlier than April 1st, 1919.
- 16. To choose one trustee, for three years, to administer the affairs pertaining to the trust funds held by the town.
- 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Old Home Day.
- 18. To hear and transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SELECTMEN.

Your selectmen submit the following statement relative to the affairs of the town.

The present town report differs somewhat from previous ones of our town, conforming as near as we could make it to the form recommended by the state tax commission.

We are now required by law to issue a budget giving the estimated amount required to finance our town for the coming year. We have given this careful study and we think the amounts mentioned will be found no larger than absolutely necessary.

Assuming that the valuation of the town remains approximately the same as in 1918 and that the budget estimates are even fairly accurate, there should be no material change in the amount to be raised by property taxes in the ensuing year.

It will be noticed that we are called on to appropriate \$2,222 for trunk line maintenance, an increase of \$822 over the \$1,400 called for last year, the state to give \$2,778, making the joint fund \$5,000. This unprecedented amount is needed, in the opinion of the state highway department, to rebuild certain sections, resurface others and for oiling and the patrol work.

The amount called for under the trunk line construction, continuing application account, is \$2,022, an increase of \$129 over the \$1,893 appropriated last year. However, after making up our budget we were told by our division engineer that there was good prospect for federal aid on our trunk line construction. The tentative proposition is: that if the town will appropriate approximately \$3,000 to make the joint fund with the state \$5,000,

the federal government will put in dollar for dollar, making the trunk line construction fund this year \$10,000. This is over and above the balance of \$2,800.66 now on hand as accounted for in this report.

Your selectmen in 1917 rented the town stone crusher to the state highway department, to be used by the city of Laconia, they to pay the town 10 cents per ton for all stone crushed, the town to pay for all repairs. They claim the plant was found to be in poor condition and while they crushed 7,647.5 tons of stone, by account furnished us, \$532.31 was spent for repairs, leaving only \$232.44 balance paid to town. This may have been a good proposition for the town, it certainly was for the city of Laconia.

The school board has estimated an expenditure of \$12,000 for the fiscal year August, 1919, to August, 1920. This compares with \$10,470 for the fiscal year August, 1918, to August, 1919. Important school legislation is now pending and this estimate may be wide of the mark.

The changing of the fiscal year of the schools from that of the towns has made an endless amount of bother for all having to do with their accounts.

Owing to a misunderstanding in regard to appropriations your selectmen failed to raise quite enough money for the current year as a comparison of this year's balance sheet with that of 1918 will show.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD OF HOPKINTON:

I herewith submit my fifth annual report as superintendent of Hopkinton schools.

The work this past year in some of our schools, has been badly interrupted by the influenza epidemic, and in consequence these schools are not quite up to the program requirements at this time of year. This is not a serious matter, however, as the work will be made up when the time lost is made up.

Two weeks before the opening of schools in September, the high school was without a principal and agricultural teacher, as the former teachers had resigned to go elsewhere. It was impossible to get a teacher for either of these positions at salaries previously paid, and it became necessary to combine the positions at a salary that would prove attractive, and at the same time save for the school the Agricultural Course, which many schools were obliged to abandon this year because of the scarcity of teachers. The high school started with an entirely new faculty with the exception of the Domestic Arts teacher, and even she resigned, to accept a better position, a few weeks later. At Christmas time occurred the death of the principal, and it became necessary to again fill that position. I need not say that the high school work has severely suffered this year, as always happens in school work when so many changes and interruptions occur. At the present time, I am pleased to report, that the work in this school is progressing very satisfactorily.

The grade schools began the year with all new teachers except three, and I have been pleased with the work

done by these new teachers as well as by that of the others.

The addition of the new chemical closets at the Hopkinton village school, demands especial mention as the right thing to have done, and deserves the hearty commendation of all concerned.

The war has shown the school many weaknesses in its work. None stand out more prominently than the failure of schools to properly realize and teach the supreme importance of good health and a good physical condition.

Education, as well as other things, will go through a reconstruction period as a result of the war. Already in our own state a bill is before the legislature that changes the whole educational system of the state. Among its prominent features is provision for better, cleaner, more sanitary and more healthful school buildings and surroundings. The health and physical condition of school children will rightly have a larger place in every school program hereafter.

To this end, organized play, physical culture, and perhaps a degree of military training will be necessary, and can easily be introduced in our schools. Medical inspection and a school nurse are good, if the town thinks it can afford them.

One of the first things that needs to be done to get in line with the good-health program, is to provide different accommodations for the pupils of the first two grades in Contoocook. I trust the town will make it possible for you to do this at once as it is generally recognized that the present room is undesirable.

School rooms without the boxed stove and accompanying provision for ventilation should be provided with them. We have four such rooms in use.

I would suggest, too, that one district school house a year be equipped with chemical closets to displace the

present arrangement, and that school rooms be cleaned at least twice a year.

I mention these things, as a few of many, that seem to me essential to a good health program.

The music program of the school has been interrupted this years because of inability to secure a teacher. It is expected that the regular music teacher will soon be released from war work and begin his work here again.

It will be necessary next year to replace many worn out books and purchase others that will be needed, as for two years past it has been necessary to go without some needed supplies from lack of funds. The chemical equipment for next year's work will require considerable additional material. The money appropriated for "Books and Supplies" the past two years, while nominally the same as in previous years, has had only about one-half the purchasing power as formerly, and is entirely inadequate for next year's needs if the present prices of books and supplies remain the same as now.

If the Educational Bill, which at this writing is before the legislature, passes, it will be necessary to increase and equalize the number of weeks' schooling in all of the schools below the high school. This will need an increased cost of about \$400 in teachers' salaries alone. Whether the bill passes or not, it seems to me that now, in the midst of the country-wide awakening to the great importance of educational matters in the world's reconstruction, is a good time to equalize the number of weeks' schooling in the several schools in town. To do this on a basis of thirty-five weeks, the present length of the village schools, will mean an increased cost of about \$260 in teachers' salaries alone.

The long-delayed repairs on the high school building, seem to me to be required this year. The plastering in several rooms is fast becoming dangerous.

The school activities in war work the past year have included all branches of it, and the school children, from first grade to and including the high school, have done their part well. The school garden work the past year has been a success, notwithstanding the early frost. The display of products at the Hopkinton Fair was a great credit to the school children of the town. The value of the agricultural products raised by the scholars of the town of Hopkinton this year was \$1,597.
