As your State Senator, I am honored by the opportunity to serve you and wanted to report from the New Hampshire Senate on important state issues affecting you, as residents of Marlborough.

While this is my first session as your State Senator, I do have some specific issues on which I wish to focus, including defining an adequate education; providing equal access to education for all children; presenting and passing a balanced budget, and raising the minimum wage. I feel I have a full understanding and appreciation of how policies adopted here in Concord affect our citizens locally.

In 2006, the Town of Marlborough received a total of \$1,292,526.00 in Education Grants, \$1,650.09 for Special Education; \$63,209.00 in Highway Block Grants; \$75,262.00 from the Meals & Rooms Tax distribution; \$38,385.00 from Revenue Sharing, and \$19,484 from Water Pollution Control Grants.

As a member of the Senate Capital Budget, Education, Executive Departments and Administration as well as Transportation and Interstate Cooperation Committees, I would be happy to hear from you on issues of concern.

SELECTMEN'S FOREWORD

As usual, 2006 saw a flurry of activity at the Marlborough Town Hall, including personnel changes, property assessments and water damage.

A few new faces: The selectmen's office was fortunate to find a new office assistant/welfare administrator in Marlborough resident Cindy Moleksy. Cindy took the position over from Pam Croteau early in 2006. Our new Police Chief, Chris Lyons, will complete his first year this March. Officer Steve LaMears was promoted to the rank of Detective in May of 2006.

Property Assessments: In 2006, we completed the State of New Hampshire review process for assessments. The State equalization ratio shows Marlborough to be assessed at 100% of market value and all criteria of the review have been met. This review process is a six-year cycle.

In November 2005, we were surprised by a water line break, which flooded both the 1st and 2nd floors of the Town Hall. The damage, valued at \$59,580.58, affected the Town Clerk's Office, Police Department, Welfare Office and staff bathroom. The Town's property damage insurance, less the \$1,000 deductible, covered all the repairs. The repair work was completed in 2006.

The audit of our Water Department continued in 2006. This study is being done with the assistance of Granite State Rural Water Association. The audit involves the review and study of all aspects of our water system--usage, quality, infrastructure, etc. The results of this audit will determine the next step the water department will take in regards to repair work and new well development. A part-time water operator position will be filled in 2007. The State requirements for testing and treatment, along with meter readings, have grown into a responsibility that has stretched Road Agent Harry Patnode's time very thin. Harry and the Marlborough road crew will continue to handle water system repairs, but we hope the bulk of the water system management, State requirements and future planning will fall onto the new water operator.

The Highway Department took delivery of a new dump truck in December 2006. The 2007 Freightliner, complete with plow and sander, replaced the 1984 International.

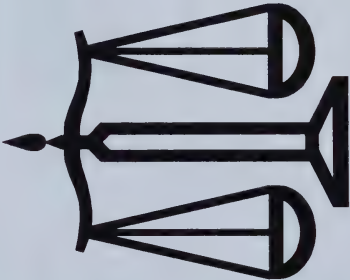

2007 TOWN WARRANT
Town of Marlborough
State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Marlborough, in the County of Cheshire, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified that the Annual Town Meeting and elections will be held at the Marlborough School Gymnasium in said Marlborough on Tuesday the thirteenth day of March 2007. The polling area for questions to be decided by official ballot will be in the gymnasium. The Polls will open from 1:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m. to act on the following subjects to be considered upon the official ballot:

Article 1: To choose by ballot all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
Further, the voters are notified that the Town business meeting will begin at 7:00 p.m. to act upon the following:

Article 2: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Million Five Hundred Seventeen Thousand Three Hundred Five Dollars (\$1,517,305.00) which represents the recommended operating budget for the year 2007. The sum does not include the warrant articles addressed.

Article 3: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$8,500.00) for the purpose of funding The Community Kitchen. Recommended by Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Thirty-Seven Dollars (\$2,537.00) for the purpose of funding Monadnock Family Services. Recommended by Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to enter into a three year lease agreement for Twenty-Three Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty-Six Dollars (\$23,756.00) for the purpose of replacing one Crown Victoria Police Cruiser and also enter into a four year lease agreement for Twenty-Seven Thousand Three Hundred

Seventeen Dollars (\$27,317.00) for the purpose of leasing a third cruiser, which will be a 4x4 SUV for the Police Department. To raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Four Thousand Seven Hundred Forty Nine Dollars (\$24,749.00) which includes the first year lease payment for the Crown Victoria of Seven Thousand Nine Hundred Nineteen Dollars (\$7,919.00) and the SUV of Six Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$6,830.00) and also up to Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for equipment and installation. Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000) to be raised by taxes and up to Twelve Thousand Seven Hundred Forty-nine Dollars (\$12,749.00) to be withdrawn from the Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund previously established for this purpose. Recommended by Board of Selectmen. (2/3 Majority ballot vote required).

Article 6: In the event Article 5 above is not adopted, see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Seven Thousand Dollars (\$27,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing a new police cruiser. Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.00) to be raised by taxes and authorize the withdrawal of not more than Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000.00) from the Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund previously established for this purpose. Recommended by Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be added to the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established and to

designate the Selectmen as agents to expend. Recommended by Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be added to the Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established and to designate the Selectmen as agents to expend. Recommended by Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) to be added to the Town Reassessment Capital Reserve Fund previously established and to designate the Selectmen as agents to expend. Recommended by the Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of up to One Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$180,000.00) for the purpose of repairing the culvert at Gates Road, which crosses Robbins Brook. Recommended by the Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote to modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Marlborough, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$25,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least three (3) consecutive years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, the must have been married for at least five (5) consecutive years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$16,750 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$25,500; and own assets not in excess of \$55,000 excluding the value of the person's residence. Recommended by the Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to establish the terms of the Budget Advisory Committee as three (3) years each. The following

schedule will be used to transition these positions: 2008 the town will elect one two-year term and one three-year term; 2009 the town will elect one three-year term. Then one three-year term every year thereafter.

Article 13: Petition to change Title V, Taxation, Chapter 72, Persons and Property Liabile to Taxation, Property Taxes, Section 72:28 Standard and Optional Veteran's Tax Credit from present day tax exemption of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) to Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) in the year 2007 and beyond. (Petitioned Article)

Article 14: To see if the Town will go on record in support of effective actions by the President and the Congress to address the issue of climate change which is increasingly harmful to the environment and economy of New Hampshire and to the future of the people of Marlborough. These actions include: (1) Establishment of a national program requiring reductions of U.S. greenhouse gas emissions while protecting the U.S. economy. (2) Creation of a major national research initiative to foster rapid development of sustainable energy technologies thereby stimulating new jobs and investments.

In addition, the Town of Marlborough encourages New Hampshire citizens to work for emission reductions within their communities and we ask our Selectmen to consider the appointment of a voluntary energy committee to recommend local steps to save energy and reduce emissions. The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation, to the President of the United States, and to declared candidates for those offices. (Petitioned Article)

Article 15: To hear reports of Town Agents, Auditors, and Committees.

Article 16: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting, or take any action thereon.

The telephone number for the Office of the Town Clerk/Tax Collector is 876-4529, and either myself or Heidi are always available to answer any questions you may have. Our hours open to the public remain unchanged and are: Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, 9:00 am - 4:30 pm; Wednesday, 9:00 am- 12:00 noon; Friday, 9:00 am - 2:00 pm, and we are open Monday evenings, 7:00 - 9:00 pm.

In closing I would like to take this opportunity to thank Heidi Laffond, my deputy, for all her hard work throughout the year, as well as the Board of Selectmen, Police Chief Christopher Lyons and the department's Officers, Fire Chief John Manning, Admin. Assistant to the Board of Selectmen, Sandy LaPlante, Cindy Molecky, Batch and Paul at the RTC, Harry Patrode and his crew, as well as all other Town Departments, whose help is invaluable in providing the Citizens of Marlborough with the best service possible.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

The enclosed "Report Of The Trust Funds Of The Town Of Marlborough" provides a detailed view of the Funds' status as of December 31, 2006. They total \$1,910,983 on a market value basis and provide supplemental income to many of the Town's departments and organizations.

The Trust Funds are invested conservatively and for the long-term, reflecting an appropriate mix of stocks and bonds. The Trustees are seeking a reasonable return while trying to generate good annual income that can be used by the Town each year. We are neither looking for a home run nor are we expecting a shutout. The portfolio should provide reasonable returns while trying to protect against significant reversals. The market was strong in 2006 reaching a new high late in the year. Inflation was reasonable and is expected to be in 2007. Interest rates remained low and will probably stay so into the new year. It is expected that the economy will continue to grow slowly in 2007, unless one or more potential pitfalls, such as high oil prices, the consumer stops spending, terrorist attacks, etc., occurs.

The Trust Funds' portfolio increased about 5.7% in 2006 on a net basis. It is structured to provide further gains over the long haul.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

I began serving as your chief on March 2, 2006 and immediately began establishing close working relationships with the other Marlborough department heads, Marlborough School staff and surrounding police departments. I hope to get out more in 2007 and continue building strong relationships with town business owners.

The Marlborough Police Department is currently staffed by six members: full-time chief, full-time detective, full-time officer, part-time secretary and two school crossing guards.

Officer Steven LaMears was promoted to detective in May. Detective LaMears has successfully handled a domestic kidnapping which included assistance from the FBI and US Customs, five aggravated felonious sexual assaults, a traffic fatality and a couple of burglaries. Many of his cases have been complex and required long hours to solve. Detective LaMears investigative work is exemplary. I plan to send him to a couple of upcoming investigation courses to further enhance his skills.

Arlene St. Pierre continues to cross school children in the afternoons. She has been serving as crossing guard with us for over ten years and is the most senior staff member. Scott Hopkins joined the department during the fall to take over morning crossing duties. Both Arlene and Scott perform their duties well and work in the best and worst of weather conditions.

Rebecca Hokanson continues to serve as part-time secretary. I plan to increase her hours in the fall of 2007 and establish regular business hours. Rebecca is known for her transcribing skills.

Sgt. Eric Hood resigned in December to take a position in the private sector. We wish Eric well.

I want to welcome our newest member, Officer Steven Berry who started February 8, 2007. Steven has worked as a seasonal officer for the Kennebunkport Maine Police Department and the Worcester Massachusetts Police Department as an auxiliary officer. He will graduate from Fitchburg State University in May with a B.S. degree in criminal justice. Officer

Berry will attend the 143rd New Hampshire Police Academy starting April 9th and graduate June 29th. He will work part-time in our field training program until the academy starts.

I am a nationally certified first responder and joined the Marl-Harris Ambulance. I plan to have all three officers certified as first responders to better serve the community and assist Marl-Harris Ambulance.

Both Marlborough cruisers are equipped with defibrillators, oxygen and first responder kit bags. This allows officers to start rendering aid right away, since we are normally the first to arrive on scene. It also allows any Marl-Harris Ambulance members who arrive in their own vehicle to use our equipment.

Several residents have brought to my attention that our office phone number was omitted from the Verizon local phone book. New magnets with Emergency 911 and phone numbers to Cheshire County Communications and our office were designed to make it easy to call us, especially when under stressful conditions. Magnets will be available at town meeting and at the police station.

There is one thing that I've noticed across Marlborough that concerns me, there are several homes with no street numbers displayed on either the mailbox or house. It is critical to have your home numbered in the event there is an emergency. I suggest the use of 4 inch reflective numbers displayed on both sides of the mailbox that can be easily seen from the street/road. If you live in an apartment, please number or letter your apartment as well.

The Monadnock Lions club donated a portable fingerprinting station to print children for identification purposes. It also allows us to print occupants of homes and employees of businesses that have been burglarized for latent print elimination purposes. Thank you for such a thoughtful gift that will serve the Marlborough community for years to come.

Jeff Hokanson, Rebecca's husband recently donated 16.5 hours of labor to install new lighting fixtures and ceiling tiles in the police station. Because the light fixtures were energy efficient, Public Service of New Hampshire gave a \$315.00 rebate to the town. Thank you for donating your time and making the station more presentable Jeff.

The department received grant money from the New Hampshire Highway Safety Agency to enforce speed and DUI on NH Route 101 during the summer and fall months. We plan to seek the same grant money for the upcoming year. These grants allow one of our officers to concentrate to traffic enforcement while the duty officer is available to answer calls and patrol the town.

I am asking that we add a four wheel drive vehicle such as a Ford Explorer to our cruiser fleet in 2007. It will enable us to better respond to the needs of our community during snow and ice storms. The Explorer can travel in areas that the Crown Victoria can't maneuver, especially class VI roads.

Detective LaMears and I both attend the Marlborough School Safety Committee monthly meetings. We also read to the students when time permits which allows them to get to know us.

We will continue enforcing school zone speed limit, crosswalk and disobeying crossing guard violations. I feel this is extremely important to keep our school children and crossing guards safe. We will also target known problem areas, especially where accidents occur.

Sandra LaPlante is a pleasure to work with. She has been a big help answering questions and guiding me through my first year. Thank you for all that you do for me, the police department and town, Sandy.

I am proud to work with my department members. They are dedicated to serving the citizens of Marlborough with pride and integrity. Please feel free to stop by the station should you have any questions or concerns. I'm more than happy to explain the operations of your police department.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER

The role of the Health Officer is to enforce the New Hampshire public health rules and regulations and the local public health ordinances. The Health Officer serves as liaison between state officials and the community on issues concerning local public health.

Services provided during the year 2006:

Home Inspections for Adoption	1
Housing Inspections (tenant, landlord or Neighbor complaints)	6
Investigation of miscellaneous issues and/or complaints	8

A number of the cases above required numerous visits, interventions and/or mediation to resolve the issue.

A sanitation and safety survey of Marlborough School was performed in June. This was done at the request of the NH Board of Education per SAU 29. A follow-up inspection was done in August to insure that safety and sanitation deficiencies had been corrected. Report of findings was forwarded to the NH Office of School Approval.

The Health Officer is a member of the NH Public Health Network and a member of the Emergency Management team for Marlborough. Numerous meetings and planning sessions at the local and state level have been attended. The goal is to insure local preparedness in the event of a Pandemic caused by Avian Flu or another contagious or infectious disease or in the event of a biohazard emergency.

The Health Officer is available for assistance with public health related issues. I am looking forward to continue working with the residents of Marlborough in 2007 to promote health and safety in our town.

PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS & RESPONSE PLANNING

The Keene All Health Hazard Region (KAHHR) planning group is planning actions so that southwest New Hampshire will swiftly and effectively respond to and recover from a public health emergency. Public Health emergencies differ from more common disasters (i.e. ice storm, flood, fire) in both scope and duration. A public health emergency is defined as an event that affects the public's health; a highly contagious disease, for example, or a natural disaster, or bio-terrorism. A public health emergency could last days or months. It might affect only a specific town, or an entire country.

Every community member is equally vulnerable. We might expect work shortages due to illness or caring for a family member. Ill patients and worried citizens might overwhelm healthcare providers. The region might open an Acute Care Center (ACC) to manage overflow from medical facilities. The region might open Points of Distribution clinics (PODs) to quickly provide medications to citizens. In addition, we might impose isolation or quarantine orders. And we might need expanded morgue facilities to process higher-than-normal numbers of deaths.

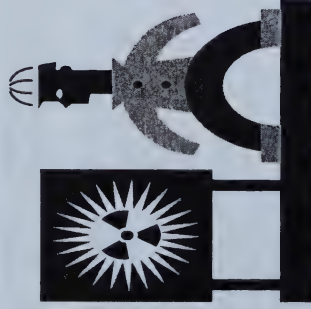
The dedicated KAHHR planning group considered each of these issues and customized a response to suit our region's needs. No single municipality has the resources to manage a health emergency by itself. The remedy is advance planning and combining resources from towns, medical, and social service organizations so that the region provides a powerful response.

The Cheshire Public Health Network coordinates the region's preparedness planning with advice from the planning team of representatives from: the Towns of Alstead, Chesterfield, Fitzwilliam, Gilsium, Harrisville, Hinsdale, Keene, Marlborough,

Marlow, Nelson, Richmond, Roxbury, Stoddard, Sullivan, Surry, Swanzey, Troy, Walpole, Westmoreland, and Winchester; Cheshire Medical Center; Home Health Care, Hospice & Health Community Services (HCS); local chapters of the American Red Cross and Monadnock United Way; Monadnock Family Service (MFS); Keene State College; SAUs; employees from the NH Departments of Health and Human Services, and Homeland Security/Emergency Management; and other agencies.

OPEN SPACE & CONSERVATION COMMISSION

To protect and insure the rural nature of Marlborough the town voted a million dollar bond for the purpose of protecting from development properties considered crucial to the town's rural nature. It also directed that a sub-committee of the conservation commission be formed to identify properties that characterize the rural identity of Marlborough and protect these from development.

The Open Space Committee, appointed by the Board of Selectmen, consists of Mike Krinsky, Chairman; Ben Rice; Charles MacVeagh; David Durocher; Ed Goodrich; Farshad Farshahi; and Nancy Hayden. The committee spent considerable time and energy creating and rating characteristics that make properties desirable for protection. These include size, protecting water, wetlands, plant and animal communities, unique features, and historic connections to the Town of Marlborough. With these the Open Space Committee entered into both direct and indirect discussions with property owners. As a result of these conversations and other concerns both Nancy Hayden and David Paine generously and farsightedly donated development easements on their lands. With these properties the protected land in Marlborough grew to 8%. Although this is exciting these is still a long way to go to reach the Town's protection goal.

The Committee invites any person interested in learning more of its work to attend regularly scheduled meetings – date and time available through the Town Hall or contact any member of the Open Space Committee. The Open Space Committee also encourages any person considering selling property in Marlborough to contact the committee before sale.

In other areas, the Conservation Commission continued to check the quality of water at Stone Pond and properties the Town is required monitor.

MONADNOCK ADVISORY COMMISSION

The Monadnock Advisory Commission was created by State Statute and is charged to advise and guide the Department of Resources and Economic Development on the management of State lands on Monadnock, Gap and Little Monadnock Mountains.

A new lease agreement was signed in 2006 by the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests and DRED's Division of Parks relative to lands on Monadnock. While the bulk of the document is similar to the previous agreement, some changes are specific to accomplish goals out-lined in the Monadnock Master Plan. The most significant change was that profits collected above costs at the Old Toll Road would be placed in an account held by SPNHF dedicated to expenses at other trailheads. Anticipated expenditures are for trailhead improvements, parking lots, portable toilets and trail projects as agreed to by DRED and SPNHF in consultation with the Monadnock Advisory Commission.

At the May 11th meeting, Jaffrey Selectman Frank Sterling requested consideration by the Division of Parks for assuming responsibility for the dam which impounds Pole Reservoir within Monadnock SP Headquarters. While expanding recreational opportunities by using the reservoir for such might sound attractive, Director of Parks & Recreation Allison McLean explained the difficulties involved. State acquisition of ownership of existing dams is controversial due to costs of routine maintenance and subsequent liability. Additionally NHDES dam maintenance account has gone unfunded by the state legislature.

Groundbreaking took place on November 22nd at Gilson Pond for the new family campground. Once completed it will replace the family campground at Park Headquarters, where only youth group camping will remain.

State law allows the Commission to accept donations. MAC is a primary funding source for search and rescue supplies and equipment. This year we received a generous donation specified for trail blazing and signage.

Monadnock State Park Manager Andrew Zboray reported annual day use attendance at 68,342 at headquarters, 10,025 at other trailheads. The fall foliage period '06 was near record levels that continued with fair weather right into December, a welcome complement to the much needed revenue stream. Camping levels remain constant.

REPORT OF THE HERITAGE COMMISSION

Our Mission: The Heritage Commission is dedicated to preserving and protecting those features of our community that are significant resources relative to our historic, cultural and aesthetic qualities, and to promoting the recognition and use of these resources for the benefit of present and future generations.

Completed projects and special activities in 2006:

The Heritage Commission completed four projects this past year as part of on-going efforts to preserve some of our “Cornerstones” and enhance important features of our town for residents and visitors to appreciate even more.

- At the Meeting House site on Frost Hill Rd., there is a new bronze plaque, which describes the restored Town Pound and includes a photograph etched in metal.
- The 200 ft. stone wall marking the south boundary of the site has now been completely restored, with the remaining 130 feet being rebuilt in 2006.
- At the stone arch railroad bridge on Webb Depot Rd., near Route 12, a large number of trees were removed from the flanks of the abutments, greatly improving the appearance of the bridge. This was also done as a preservation measure to eliminate the potential effect of tree roots on the bridge.
- The Maynard-Gates House (1767) located off Rt. 101 and next to the Marlborough Estates, was repainted on two sides, on the main side facing the Dublin Rd. and on the east gabled end.
- In October thirty (30) school children from Marlborough School’s 3rd Grade, with their teachers, Mrs. Robinson and Mrs. Homeyer and several parents, made a field trip to visit the Meeting House site, the old Cemetery and the Pound to learn about these important features of our town’s earliest history. This was the second year the 3rd Grade children have

visited this historic area of town as part of their study of local history.

Projects planned for 2007:

The Commission is planning to accomplish the following projects in 2007:

- To complete the exterior painting work at the Maynard-Gates House
- Completing the design and installing an interpretive panel at the Meeting House site to describe in text and with historic photos the story of the original center of our town being located in that area
- Repair of the stone wall between the cemetery and the Meeting House site
- In partnership with the Cemetery Commission, to install a wooden gate at the Meeting House Cemetery

We appreciate the continuing support of our townspeople and those who help us, as volunteers and others through their donations, as we work on projects that contribute to our mission for the benefit of our town.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING AND ZONING BOARDS

Last year had relatively few applications, but was still quite busy for both Boards since we held numerous public hearings for two different wireless service towers.

Among those actions taken by the Planning Board in 2006 were proposals for ordinance amendments to regulate motorsport facilities, hunting and shooting facilities, and wind turbine towers. Discussion was also started on updating the transportation section of the Master Plan.

Subdivisions were approved for property at 73 Frost Hill Road, and a 7-lot subdivision on Maple Lane. Boundary line adjustments were approved for Asher Construction Map 7, Lot 33.5 and 33.6; and Jim Newell at 548 Jaffrey Rd.

After site plan reviews, the Planning Board granted permission for a shop renting metal detectors on Main St., and a Harley-Davidson dealership on Rt. 12.

The Zoning and Planning Boards conducted several joint hearings for special exceptions and site plan reviews. After much deliberation, permission was granted for a wireless service tower with a pine tree design at 400 Old Chesham Rd.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment approved variances for a setback reduction of 5 ft. at 38 Shaker Farm Rd. South, and a 40-ft front setback and wetlands setback for a Harley-Davidson dealership on Rt. 12. Permission was denied by the Zoning Board for a variance to allow the operation of a lodging facility

on a nonconforming lot at 38 Shaker Farm Rd. South; and also for a 150-ft. wireless service tower at 188 Laurel St. This latter decision is now under appeal.

The Zoning Board was also the defendant in a suit brought by a party who had a building permit denied by the Board of Selectmen for lack of road frontage. The case was appealed to Superior Court, which upheld the decisions of the Board of Selectmen and the Zoning Board.

This past year, we bid farewell to Planning Board member Ben Rice who is moving to Keene. Ben was a steady, well organized member who will be greatly missed. Ben was replaced by Dick Hill, a retired manager at Markem, who will be an excellent addition to the Board. This year, our Land-Use Board Clerk Dana Carley also resigned. She did a superb job during the last 3 ½ years. She has been replaced by Kathy Oliver, who is taking over this complicated job quite well.

Both Boards value the input and concerns of the public. To serve you, a Board representative will be available for consultation by appointment on Monday evenings from 7-9 p.m. Advance appointments may be made through the Selectmen's office at Town Hall (876-3751) or the Town Clerk (876-4529).

REPORT OF THE FIRE WARDS

The Marlborough Fire Department responded to 96 calls during 2006. This compares to 110 calls in 2005 and 107 calls in 2004. A breakdown of the 2006 calls is as follows:

The fire wards are continuing to look at the small trucks in our department. Our brush truck was replaced last year with a FIRE Grant. However, our reel truck, which is 30 years old, is currently out of service, and may not be repairable.

We again extend our sincere appreciation to the Fire Company, Ladies Auxiliary, Marlborough Harris Ambulance Squad, Police and Highway Departments, Selectmen and Community for their continued support and cooperation.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

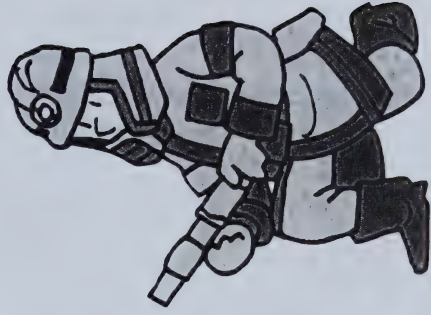
This year was a slow Forest Fire season. We responded to 2 small brush fires in our town, but we were called upon to aid neighboring towns. We issued 145 Burn Permits to kindle outdoor fires, and responded to several calls for advice on placement of burn piles, and materials to be kindled.

Please keep in mind that a permit is needed for outdoor burning. When there is a **sufficient snow cover**, burning is permissible **without** a permit as long as material being burned meets the requirements of NH laws, and Southwestern NH Fire Mutual Aid is notified (352-1291). Informational pamphlets are available to answer the most common questions and explain the laws that deal with outdoor burning. Please feel free to pick up a pamphlet at the Town Office, Transfer Station, or the Frost Free Library.

I would like to thank my Deputies: Mike Goodwin, John Manning, Matt Patnode, Steve Thomas for their time and cooperation. If you have any questions, feel free to call either myself, Mike Laffond 876-4224, Chief John Manning 876-3904, or Deputy Chief Steve Thomas 876-4052. REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at www.nhdfl.org.

Fire activity was very high during the first several weeks of the 2006 fire season, with red-flag conditions issued by the National Weather Service and extreme fire danger in many sections of the state. The largest forest fire during this period occurred in late April and burned 98 acres. The extremely dry conditions in spring resulted in over twice the amount of acreage burned that in all of 2005. Our statewide system of fire lookout towers in credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures in this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Fires in the wildland urban interface damages 6 structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department and the states' Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

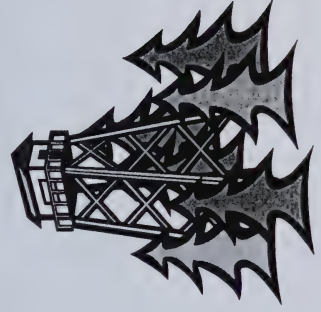

Each spring, this board continues working on several areas in need of attention including the ball fields, pavilion, town beach and the skate park.

At the ball fields our annual clean up day involved raking the fields, cutting and removal of brush, repairing dugouts, finishing attaching the yellow fence top protectors and preparing the ball fields for the baseball season.

We removed the old bleachers from the upper field area and installed a new set of aluminum bleachers that are being used not only for baseball, but can be moved for spectators during the soccer season as well.

During the early winter months of 2006 we installed a skating rink at the pavilion but due to mild temperatures, the ice would not form and our efforts to provide a winter activity for the community were not realized. Thanks again to the Fire Department for delivering the water necessary for this endeavor.

At the town beach we raked the beach and picnic area, removed brush and provided two new picnic tables for the public use. The new buoys were put up and we slightly increased the swimming area and provided safety for our town's children. We are still looking into ways of

renovating the parking area to address erosion and safety concerns. New signage concerning no smoking regulations and the required decal for parking were installed. Permits are required for use of the town beach and can be obtained at the town office.

Due to the increased vandalism associated with the skate park this Board and the Selectmen's office has decided to remove the skate park equipment from its current location. Plans are underway for the disassembly. The vandalism consisted of picnic tables from the pavilion removed, disassembled and used as props in the skate park. Graffiti and excessive litter are present at the skate park and the hope is with the removal of the park, this will stop. An outside basketball hoop was purchased and will be installed at the current skate park asphalt.

Each summer the Recreation Committee puts on a picnic lunch for the seniors of our town. Again we had the occasion professionally catered and was well received by the participants. In 2006 this committee decided to put a new twist on things with the seniors and sent them on a day trip with Wilson coach tours to northern Vermont for leaf peeping. This trip was also well received and will happen once again in 2007.

Report of the Frost Free Library 2006

The Frost Free Library continues to be a busy, busy place, thanks to our wonderful patrons, hardworking trustees and Friends of the Library, and our staff members!

This year we welcomed new Assistant Librarians Dave Eisenstadter and Jane Richards-Jones (and unofficial staff member Colin Butterfield Chase). Dave has since moved on from the Library to continue working on his writing projects, but Jane remains with us, giving the Library a staff of three very industrious readers and three very friendly faces.

The most visible changes at the Library in 2006 may be those to the building itself. Each year, the Frost Free Library is the recipient of interest from our Trust Funds, which have continued to grow through generous donations and bequests from the original gift in 1865 from Rufus Frost. With the interest from our Trust Funds, the Library has been able to complete many upgrades to the building without using taxpayer funds, including:

- adding shades throughout the building to help regulate sun and heat loss;
- putting in a new screen door for the summer months;
- giving a new coat of paint to the walls in the children's room and work area as well as the front foyer;
- a new outdoor sign (which you should see installed in Spring 2007);
- framing and hanging several prints from our collection of Keene State College Children's Literature Festival prints;
- and re-vamping our Mabelle Page Meeting Room with new flooring and furniture.

For each of these projects the Library used local workmen and businesses, and if you have not yet seen the results – or signed up to use the meeting room for your gathering – you must stop by and see.

Our program offerings continued to grow, with the addition of a series of yoga programs hosted by Mary Frost, a series of MusikGarten music programs for young children led by Vicki Moore, a Writer's Workshop led by Dave Eisenstadter, and a very successful summer of concerts on the green and our

pirate-themed Summer Reading Program. We continued to offer our “oldie but goodie” programs, such as our weekly toddler and pre-school story time and several more programs in our “Taste of Marlborough” series featuring Bob Ferranti and his wine and Alan Crofut of Unbridled Chocolates.

It is always interesting to review some of the high points of 2006 through the numbers:

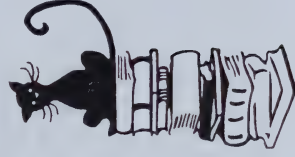
- The Library welcomed **116 new patrons**

- Patrons took out **11,124 materials** and requested **618 materials** through our Inter-Library Loan services. This represents a 15% increase and a 42% increase from 2005, respectively
- **992 people** used the Library's computers in 2006

Traditionally, The Community Kitchen experiences a tremendous increase in both the number of families served and the number of meals distributed in November and December, due to Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays, cold weather and fuel bills. It is anticipated that at the end of the year over 44,089 pantry boxes will have been distributed in total.

The amount of reimbursement we have requested is based on the actual number for the first three quarters of the year and an estimate of the fourth quarter added together.

**Minutes of the Town Meeting
Of the Town of Marlborough New Hampshire
Year 2006**

Moderator John Fletcher declared the voting polls of the Marlborough Town Meeting open at 1:00 PM on Tuesday, March 14, 2006. He presented the empty ballot box to the election workers and Citizens present and announced that voting could begin. The polls are scheduled to close no earlier than 9:00 PM.

The Moderator convened the deliberative session of the meeting at 7:04 PM. He requested that all present stand for The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag, led by Moderator Fletcher.

The Moderator requested that Selectmen's Chairman Lawrence Robinson introduce those seated at the head table. Mr. Robinson introduced himself, Selectmen Gina Paight, Selectman John Northcott and Town Clerk/Tax Collector Ellen Orkins.

The Moderator asked if there were any objection of those present to hear any reports or information necessary to conduct tonight's meeting from Sandra LaPlante, Administrative Assistant; Christopher Lyons, Chief of Police; and Stephanie Chase, Town Librarian; as they are not residents of the Town of Marlborough. The voice vote was in the affirmative to allow input from Mrs. LaPlante, Chief Lyons and Librarian Chase.

The Moderator announced that the Parliamentary Rules of the State of New Hampshire would be the accepted procedure for the conduct of the meeting.

Mr. Michael Krinsky updated those in attendance about the progress of the Open Space Committee over the last year.

The Moderator next moved to the Warrant Articles stating that the meeting was currently operating under Warrant Article I and would be doing so until the closing of the polls at 9:00 PM:

Article 1: To choose by ballot all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Further, the voters are notified that the Town business meeting will begin at 7:00 PM to act upon the following:

Article 2: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Million Four Hundred Seventy Five Thousand Eight Hundred Forty Six Dollars (\$1,475,846)** which represents the recommended operating budget for the year 2006. The sum does not include the warrant articles addressed.

Moved: Lawrence Robinson Seconded: John Northcott.

Lawrence Robinson spoke to the article, and explained that the aforementioned amount is a difference of \$8,892.00 from the amount of \$1,466,954.00 that was shown at the time the budget was posted. This difference is a result of an increase of \$792.00 in the mileage line for the Town Clerk/Tax Collectors, due to a change in banking procedures and an increase of \$8,100.00 in the Building Maintenance line, due to roof repairs needed on the roof of the Town Hall.

Selectman Robinson explained the remainder of the proposed budget.

The Moderator asked those in attendance if there were any questions from the floor. Finding none the Moderator moved the article for a vote.

Voice vote passed in the affirmative.

Selectmen Robinson took a moment to tell those in attendance about a number of grants that were awarded to the Town of Marlborough through the hard work of Town Employees in seeking out these grants, thus alleviating much of the tax burden to Tax Payers for these items:

The sum of Thirty Six Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty (\$36,950.00) to come from the general fund balance (surplus) and up to Sixty-three Thousand Fifty Dollars (\$63,050.00) to come from the Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund. Whereas George E. Bush and Richard B. Cheney, President and Vice President of the United States have:

1. Misled the nation about Iraq's weapons of mass destruction;
2. Misled the nation about ties between Iran and Al Qaeda;
3. Used these falsehoods to lead our nation into war unsupported by international law;
4. Not told the truth about American policy with respect to the use of torture; and
5. Have directed the government to engage in domestic spying, in direct contravention of U.S. law:

Therefore the voters of the Town of Marlborough ask that our representative to the House of Representatives, Charles Bass, file articles of impeachment to remove them from office.

Results of Voting on Proposed 2006 Town Ordinance Amendments:

1. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board to amend the Flood Plain section of the Town Ordinance as necessary to comply with the requirements of the National Flood Insurance Program as posted in the Town Hall on January 10, 2006.

Explanation: These revisions are necessary to ensure that Marlborough is in compliance with the requirements of the National Flood Insurance Program, which provides financial support to property owners in case of floods.

The Planning Board recommends passage of this amendment.

Yes: 185 No: 15

2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 as proposed by the Planning Board to expand the Scenic Rural District (R-4) from its

current boundaries south of Shaker Farm Road and east of Jaffrey Road to new boundaries encompassing all lots east of Troy Road and south of Underwood Road as posted in the Town Hall on January 30, 2006. This zone expansion would take effect on March 15, 2007.

Explanation: This change is designed to protect the scenic, rural character of the properties nearest Mt. Monadnock. The minimum lot sizes would remain as they are now, but the minimum road frontage would be increased and certain large buildings or types of development would be prohibited. The new boundary would match up more closely with the adjacent Mountain Zone in Dublin. If approved, this change would take effect on March 15, 2007.

The Planning Board recommends passage of this amendment.

3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #3 as proposed by the Planning Board to amend Town Ordinance Section 6.4.A.2 (Table of Use Regulations, Principal Uses, Residential) as follows: Multi-family dwellings such as apartment buildings, condominiums and town houses. Not Permitted in R-4.

Explanation: This change would prohibit large multi-family dwellings from being built in the Scenic, Rural District (R-4). The intent is to avoid the type of large-scale development recently approved in Jaffrey that would diminish the rural character of the properties closest to Mt. Monadnock.

School Board Chairman's Report

In reviewing the state of affairs of Marlborough School it seems safe to say, to paraphrase Dickens, that "It is the best of times, it is the worst of times."

On the bright side, individually and as a group, our students continue to achieve at high levels, both here in Marlborough and at Keene High. We continue to successfully attain the standards set by the No Child Left Behind legislation, our K-8 test scores have improved year after year, and our high school students' grades and SAT scores demonstrate that they are able to effectively make the transition from a 200+ student population to one of over 1800 students. Their success should make us all very proud! And thanks to the highly skilled and dedicated teaching staff, our students will make us proud for years to come.

The lynchpin to our students' success is the quality of the personnel that work with them. Be it a principal, teacher, aide, or support staff member, we need to be able to attract and hire individuals of the highest caliber. Fortunately, even with the problems we have with our facility, Marlborough continues to retain and hire highly qualified staff. This is particularly impressive given the fact that Marlborough does not offer either the highest pay or benefits in SAU 29 or the surrounding SAUs – nor will we after we finish negotiating a new union contract this spring. As long as Marlborough carries on its tradition of strong school support, we should be able to hire for and provide the quality services our students deserve.

Change is an inevitable part of any organization, and that has certainly been true for our school over the past year. As we bid a sad farewell to our principal, Susan Leach, and several teachers and staff, we welcomed Karen Parsells and a new group of folks to work with our children. These individuals have brought new perspectives and ideas to our school community, and while changes can, at times, be difficult for some people, the Board is confident that they will have a very positive effect on students, staff and families.

On the negative side of the ledger, we remain in a building that is problematic at best, unsafe and unhealthy at worst. Despite the fact that more than 60 percent of the voters support building a new school, it is not enough. As such, the Board undertook a number of actions to address the problems with the facility. We established a new cleaning and classroom set-up procedure to address mold issues. We removed the carpeting in the first floor, west side classrooms and put tile down in its place. The entire gym was professionally cleaned from top to bottom. We replaced badly worn hallway carpeting, and many classrooms and hallways received a fresh coat of paint. Thanks go out to the PTA and the volunteers who helped with this project! Unfortunately, this is not enough.

For the third time in seven years, the state fire marshal examined our building and found it severely lacking in many areas. Though we had addressed many of the issues noted in his first two reports, because we are not building a new school in the immediate future, we need to address the remaining fire code issues. To accomplish this, we hired Weller & Michal, Architects to take the citations listed in the fire marshal's report and come up with plans and costs to fix them. In addition, we asked that they address structural issues with the roof, as well as heating and air quality concerns, and the moisture penetration problem we have along the rear wall of the building. They have done so, and we will be presenting three warrant articles for your consideration at the March meeting: one to deal with all the fire safety issues and the roof, another to address the heating and air quality issues, and a third to address the moisture problem. All are worthy of being passed, and the Board hopes that you will vote in favor of them.

Two questions have been frequently asked by people in town. The first is, "Will the State shut the school down if we don't pass the warrant articles?" While there is no certainty that this will happen, if the town fails to pass the first warrant article, which addresses the fire marshal's noted fire safety issues, there is a strong possibility that we could be shut down. As our own fire chief stated, the State is looking at us very closely and has about run out of patience with us. Testing their resolve is not something the Board wants to do.

The second question is this: "if we fix the issues noted on the warrant articles, does that mean we can't build a new school or renovate the old one?" The answer is "no". Fixing the fire and health safety issues does not preclude the town from taking either of those actions in the future. The issues we've outlined must be fixed regardless of whether or not a new school is built or the current one is renovated. If the town decided to build a new school, these repairs would make the building more attractive to potential buyers or tenants; if the town decided to renovate, these fixes would have been part of the renovation plan. Though costly, they are a win-win proposition for the town.

Before closing, it is important to note that your Board members are actively involved in working out a new A.R.E.A. agreement with the other towns in the SAU, determining the location for the SAU offices, updating and implementing a technology plan for the school (we are fortunate to have two tech experts on the Board, Bob Hill and Mike Briggs), as well as negotiating a new teachers' contract and keeping up with all the ongoing duties required of a school board member. Please join me in thanking them for their hard work and support of our community.

On behalf of my colleagues on the Marlborough School Board, I want to wish you all a very happy, healthy and safe 2007.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

Over the past year the Marlborough School Board has worked very hard to present the best possible building repair proposal to the Marlborough voters. At the district meeting on Thursday, March 8, at 7:00 p.m., Marlborough voters will decide whether to approve the money necessary to get the school in compliance with safety codes. In addition to the safety issues, voters will be asked to vote on the operating budget and a teachers/support staff agreement. Please be sure to attend this meeting to participate in these important decisions.

Marlborough School has had a new principal since July 1, 2006. Our new principal, Karen Parsells, has worked hard to keep the school building issues from interfering with student learning. One challenge facing Ms. Parsells is the creation of a student schedule that can accommodate the potential building repairs.

Although the federal legislation, "No Child Left Behind," was adopted in 2002, there are new regulations still to be met. This past year we moved from testing all students in grades three and six to testing all students in grades three, four, five, six, seven and eight. Even though more than 75 percent of our students scored at grade level or above on the most recent assessment, we continue to be less successful with our economically disadvantaged student subgroup, as well as our special education population.

Next year a State Science Assessment will be added as part of No Child Left Behind. Every grade four and eight student will be tested in science. The proposed 2007-2008 budget includes funds for teachers to work over the summer aligning the Marlborough science curriculum with the new State Science Standards from which the science tests were created.

Marlborough students will benefit from a recent announcement that SAU 29 will receive \$75,000 from Title II of No Child Left Behind which authorizes a competitive Mathematics and Science Partnership Grant. We wrote the grant last fall with the help of Professor Tom Bassarar from Keene State College. The grant is intended to encourage institutions of higher education and local school districts to participate in professional development activities that increase the subject matter knowledge and teaching skills in mathematics. Professional development activities must be classroom focused and aligned with state standards. As a result of the \$75,000 SAU 29 received for this grant, several teachers from

Marlborough will be paid to participate in the five days of math workshops offered this summer.

The titles of the workshops available to Marlborough teachers are: Unpacking Math Grade Level Expectations, Manipulatives/Inquiry-Based Strategies, Reading and Writing across the Math Curriculum, Differentiated Instruction, and Alternative Methods of Assessments and Coping with Math Anxiety.

Teachers will be paid \$100 per day from the grant for participating in these workshops. We will also have workshops available for teachers in the fall and the spring of the next school year.

Although we are grateful for the federal revenue that supports this grant, the NCLB mandate is underfunded. The New Hampshire School Boards Association in 2005 projected yearly expenditures related to No Child Left Behind at \$577 per student. That same year they projected an anticipated increase in federal revenue for NCLB at \$75 per student.

A few Marlborough teachers and other staff members from nine schools in SAU 29 and Winchester Elementary School participated in summer curriculum work in science, math, health, and social studies in 2006. The primary focus of the activities was the alignment of SAU 29 curriculum to the New Hampshire revised Curriculum Framework.

The goal of the social studies curriculum committee was to create a fifth and sixth grade curriculum that is aligned with the newly-adopted New Hampshire State Frameworks. The document maintains a logical sequence through the grade levels. The revisions have eliminated unnecessary repetition between the fifth grade and the seventh grade curriculum addressing American History. The curriculum revision addressed the following fifth grade topics: U.S. Government and Citizenship, United States Regions, Canada, Latin American, and Mesoamerican Civilizations (Aztec, Inca, and Maya).

Sixth Grade topics include: Ancient Civilizations (River Valley and Classical Civilizations), Western Europe (Medieval to Age of Exploration), and Economics. Leaving off at the Age of Exploration in Western Europe provides an excellent transition to the U.S. History curriculum in the seventh grade.

In 2007, curriculum work will emphasize K-12 science, math, and guidance, as well as continued work in social studies with a focus in social studies kinder-garten through grade four.

All students in SAU 29 schools, including Marlborough, participated in the Northwest Evaluation Association program during 2006-2007. NWEA has grown dramatically in recent years as school districts seek a method for measuring individual student progress over time. The computer adaptive tests give students, parents, and teachers immediate feedback on student progress and level of performance.

Marlborough teachers continue to lead SAU 29 in curriculum mapping. Calendar-based curriculum mapping employing a technology base and involving all staff has only been in use for about five years. Marlborough teachers were early pioneers in an effort to use technology to map the curriculum. Curriculum mapping takes teachers beyond just drafting curriculum guidelines, to providing a real possibility of ongoing revision based on quality assessment data.

Marlborough's students at Keene High School continue to perform well. This past year Marlborough had 93 students enrolled at Keene High School. These students are taking advantage of a wide range of academic as well as co-curricular activities. In English, 57 percent of the Marlborough students earned a grade of "B" or better. In mathematics, 37 percent earned grades of "B" or better. In science, 57 percent of the students earned grades of "B" or better. In social studies, 53 percent of the students earned a grade of "B" or better. In world language, 74 percent of the students earned grades of "B" or better. The overall attendance rate for Marlborough students at Keene High School was 94.2 percent.

Marlborough's seniors from the class of 2006 reported their post-secondary plans as follows: Armed Forces-Navy; Clark University, MA; Dartmouth College, NH (2); Franklin Pierce College, NH; Keene State College, NH (3); NHCTC, NH (2); Saint Anselm's College, NH; Springfield College, MA; St. Michael's College, VT; UNH, NH (3); Western New England College, MA; Work (8).

Marlborough has a tremendous level of parental involvement and support, which research shows is critical to student success and overall school quality. A strong PTA presence and high volunteerism are characteristics of Marlborough School. These factors contribute to a very positive school environment and strong community ownership in, and support for,

the school. Marlborough teachers have continued their efforts to ensure that the children are offered a well-coordinated and challenging curriculum. Many have worked hard to broaden their subject area background and/or their skills to meet the needs of each child and to enhance their effectiveness as a teachers. This has come as a result of their involvement in quality professional development training in areas such as skillful teaching techniques, curriculum mapping, technology integration, Measure of Academic Progress, the needs of special needs students, and classroom management.

The constructive working relationship between the school board and staff continues to promote continuous school improvement. This is facilitated by good communication between the staff and board and by board members' recognition of, and interaction with, the staff.

The Marlborough School community should be very proud of its school. The improvement that has occurred should not be taken for granted, nor should the strong support given to the school by the community. Continuation of this improvement is highly contingent upon open lines of communication between the home and school and a good understanding of what goes on in the school. Please make the time to visit the school, to attend a school-related activity, or attend a school board meeting. Please be sure to attend the Annual District Meeting on Thursday, March 8, at 7:00 p.m.

Facility Improvements

This summer the State informed us that our building status was only "Conditionally Approved," so we had to begin the task of dealing with many of our building's needs. We prepared for fire, health and playground inspections. Many classroom egresses were cleared, small appliances were removed and old books and papers were discarded to rid classrooms of clutter. It was not easy making those changes and I commend the staff for their efforts. The staff did a superb job.

We tiled the downstairs classrooms to solve our moisture problems and we continue to wash the first floor back walls on a monthly basis to prevent mold build-up. Through the wonderful work of our PTA volunteers, almost all of the 1st floor rooms have been painted and the upstairs hallway has a new face-lift with new paint colors on the walls and a new carpet. Two gym changing room doors were replaced, as well as the frame and the door to the gym storage room. The gym and kitchen were both cleaned from top to bottom by ServPro this summer. They did a thorough job and we have heard many positive comments about the gym's appearance.

Improved safety at the school has been a focus. We installed a security buzzer for our main door and conducted fire safety and bus safety drills throughout the year.

Also, unsafe playground equipment was removed this fall. I want to thank Jim Machado and Hale Woodward for their time and efforts in keeping our playground safe and attractive.

Instructional Programming and Curriculum Development

The staff is working hard to create a "Year-at-a-Glance" curriculum map. This will identify the skills that are taught, each month, in each grade, in every subject. These maps will indicate how the skills connect from grade to grade.

We are using the New England Common Assessment Program (NECAP) tests to determine our instructional needs. The staff has used much of its staff development time to do this important analysis. We are also using North West Evaluation Association (NWEA) assessments to determine our students' levels of achievement.

The staff is developing new school-wide procedures and routines regarding cafeteria, hallway and playground procedures and expectations. This has created a more consistent approach for all staff and has encouraged students to take more personal responsibility for their actions.

Integration of Support Systems

In order to provide our students with more practice and reinforcement of essential skills and concepts at each grade level, we provide the following supportive services and programs:

- Title I supplemental reading instruction, K-3
- Remedial reading instruction, K-8
- Special Education and Related Services
- Technology integration
- Foreign language instruction (Spanish)

One of the requirements to meet the State's safety standards was to implement a bullying policy. This was placed in our handbook and I discussed the reasons for the zero-tolerance policy with all students. The staff has been highly supportive and is reinforcing this requirement. I am happy to report that the incidences of bullying are decreasing.

Community Connections

I want to say that, throughout this year, I have seen a spirit of volunteerism from parents and community members that I've never seen before. Our PTA and other community members have been here on a daily basis. They have raised fun and funds for our children and are doing all that they can to help. I want to extend special thanks to Marlborough Chief of Police, Chris Lyons; Detective, Steve LaMears; Marlborough Fire Chief, John Manning; and Town Health Inspector, Tina

Torrelli for the support and encouragement they have extended to me and our entire school community.

Bob and Rose Ferranti, grandparents of Michael Ferranti, a sixth grade student, donated a new flag to our school. The flag had been flown over the Capital Building in Washington, D.C. On behalf of all of us at Marlborough Elementary School, I would like to express our thanks to the Ferranti family. I would also like to thank the Rotary Club, Verizon Pioneers, the town road crew and transfer station operators and the Marl-Harris After-School Program.

This has been a year of change. The staff has been instrumental in creating positive steps, as we adjusted to new building codes, safety standards and District expectations. I want to thank the staff for their support. I also want to thank the students and the parents for communicating with me, giving me their advice and sharing concerns. Working together and listening to one another, we will accomplish much.

Finally, I wish to extend a heartfelt thank you to JoAnn Robinson. JoAnn is retiring from teaching this year after 30 years in the field, which includes her 22 years in Marlborough. Through her efforts, JoAnn has made Marlborough Elementary School a better place. She has contributed much in time, knowledge, and positive energy to students, staff, parents and community members. Thank you, JoAnn, for your many years of exemplary service!

It is a pleasure and a privilege for me to work in a district which demonstrates, on a daily basis, its commitment to quality education and community involvement. Thank you all.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the school district in the Town of
Marlborough qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Marlborough School
Gymnasium in said district on the 8th day of March, 2007, at 7:00
o'clock in the evening to act upon the following articles:

ARTICLE 1: (Submitted by Petition) To see if the school district
will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300,000 (Gross
Budget) for renovation of Marlborough School including, but not
limited to, upgrades for electrical, heating, ventilation, plumbing,
roof structure and fire safety systems to code; interior renovation and
redecorating including ceilings, lighting, walls and floors; new
storage cabinets and instructional equipment; exterior and interior
structural additions or changes as needed; and related costs of said
renovations; and, to authorize the issuance of not more than
\$3,300,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of
the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33); and, to authorize the
school district to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to
determine the rate of interest thereon; and, further, to appropriate a
sum up to \$34,000 from interest earned on the invested bond
proceeds toward the first bond payment; and to take such other
action as may be related thereto. *(The Marlborough School Board
does not support favorable action on this article.) (Two-thirds ballot
vote required.)*

ARTICLE 2: (Submitted by Petition) To see if the District will
vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,700,000 (Gross Budget)
for the acquisition of land, planning, construction, original
equipping, and related costs of a new school building, and to
authorize the issuance of not more than \$9,700,000 of bonds or notes
in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act

(RSA Chapter 33); and, to authorize the school district to issue and
negotiate such notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon;
and, further, to appropriate a sum up to \$100,000 from interest
earned on the investment of the bond proceeds toward the first bond
payment; and to take such other action as may be related thereto.
*(The Marlborough School Board supports favorable action on this
article.) (Two-thirds ballot vote required.)*

ARTICLE 3: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees,
or officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the District will vote to authorize the
School Board to enter into a multi-year contract to provide building
repairs, including architectural, engineering and related costs, to
bring the Marlborough School building into compliance with the
orders and requirements of the NH State Fire Marshal, to make the
building code-compliant and safe for students and staff. The project
will include ADA compliant bleachers, a fire suppression system, a
new fire detection system, electrical system upgrades, egress
improvements including a new stairway, kitchen fire safety
upgrades, structural improvements, and related costs. The total cost
of said project to be \$1,400,000, of which the District will raise and
appropriate the sum of \$600,000 in the 2007-2008 school year and
\$800,000 to be raised in the 2008-2009 school year with \$200,000 of
that sum coming from the Capital Reserve Fund and, specifically, to
raise and appropriate the said sum of \$600,000 from general taxation
to apply toward the funding of the safety remediation contract; or to
take any other action in relation thereto. This contractual agreement
contains an "escape" clause. *(The Marlborough School Board
supports favorable action on this article.) (Majority vote required.)*

ARTICLE 5: To see if the District will vote to authorize the School
Board to enter into a multi-year contract to provide building repairs,
including architectural, engineering and related costs. The project
will include heating system upgrades encompassing a new boiler and
unit ventilators for classrooms, and related costs. The total cost of
said project to be \$950,000 to be paid in two annual installments,

\$475,000 in 2007-2008 and \$475,000 in 2008-2009, and to raise and appropriate from general taxation the sum of \$475,000 in the 2007-2008 school year to meet the obligations of the District for the 2007-2008 school year as set forth in the contract authorized herein; or to take any other action in relation thereto. This contractual agreement contains an "escape" clause. *(The Marlborough School Board supports favorable action on this article.) (Majority vote required.)*

ARTICLE 6: To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to enter into a multi-year contract to provide building repairs, including architectural, engineering and related costs. The project will include upgrades to the building's perimeter drainage including insulation of the school's west side foundation and related costs, to limit water intrusion into the school building. The total cost of said project to be \$150,000 to be paid in two annual installments, \$75,000 in 2007-2008 and \$75,000 in 2008-2009, and to raise and appropriate from general taxation the sum of \$75,000 in the 2007-2008 school year to meet the obligations of the District for the 2007-2008 school year as set forth in the contract authorized herein; or to take any other action in relation thereto. This contractual agreement contains an "escape" clause. *(The Marlborough School Board does not support favorable action on this article.) (Majority vote required.)*

ARTICLE 7: To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate \$100,000 to reduce the general fund deficit pursuant to RSA 189:28-a. *(The Marlborough School Board supports favorable action on this article.)*

ARTICLE 8: To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the statutory obligations of the District, or to take any other action in relation thereto. *(The Marlborough School Board supports favorable action on approval of the sum of \$3,824,174.)*

ARTICLE 9: To see if the District will vote to approve the cost items included in the collective bargaining agreement reached between the Marlborough School Board and the Marlborough Education Association which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits:

And, further, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$74,164 for the 2007-2008 fiscal year, such sum representing the additional costs attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. *(The Marlborough School Board supports favorable action on this warrant article.)*

ARTICLE 10: To see if the District, if Article 9 is defeated, will authorize the Marlborough School Board to call one special meeting, at its option, to address Article 9 cost items only.

ARTICLE 11: (Submitted by Petition) To see if the District shall authorize and direct the Marlborough School District Moderator to appoint an independent Marlborough School Renovation Committee, comprised of the school principal, one school board member, and five citizen representatives; excluding any persons with potential conflicts of interest such as contractors or their employees who would bid on said renovations; charged with producing a detailed plan and payment schedule for presentation to the School Board and the residents of the town, in order to carry out the District's will to renovate the school building within the approved budget to create a safe, bright, attractive learning and working environment; and to take such other action as may be related thereto. *(Majority vote required.)*

ARTICLE 12: (Submitted by Petition) To see if the District shall reimburse George and Joan Nichols, currently living at Apt. 18, Pierce House, Marlborough, NH, for documented expenses of up to \$3,258 for hotel rent, moving and storage incurred following their forced eviction from their rented home on Fitch Court. These expenses constituted an unanticipated hardship directly resulting from the sale of the house and property at the Ball Flats to the Marlborough School District. *(The Marlborough School Board does not support favorable action on this warrant article.) (Majority vote required.)*

ARTICLE 13: (Submitted by Petition) To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$28,000 from general taxation. Said sum to be used to renovate the school's playground, the project will include replacing the unsafe playground equipment that has been removed with safety code compliant and long lasting equipment, for the routine maintenance of the playground, federally approved groundcover, and the purchase of new equipment to ensure a safe and productive environment for our children and related expenses. *(The Marlborough School Board supports favorable action on this warrant article.) (Majority vote required.)*

ARTICLE 14: (Submitted by Petition) To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000 from general taxation for the purpose of producing a detailed plan of construction and/or renovation of buildings and/or related costs to said construction and/or renovation; and, further, to direct the school board to recognize the Citizen's Committee of Marlborough (CCM), and to support their production of a detailed plan to carry out the District's will to explore either a new school construction plan, or a renovation construction plan. *(The Marlborough School Board does not support favorable action on this warrant article.) (Majority vote required.)*

ARTICLE 15: To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the School Board
Marlborough School District
Marlborough, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of Marlborough School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2006, which collectively comprise the Marlborough School District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the School District's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on the financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

The government-wide statement of net assets does not include any of the School District's capital assets nor the accumulated depreciation on those assets; and the government-wide statement of activities does not include depreciation expense related to those assets. These amounts have not been determined. Therefore, in our opinion, the financial statements referred to above do not fairly present the financial position of the governmental activities of the Marlborough School District at June 30, 2006, and the respective changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

As described in Note 2, as of July 1, 2005, the School District has implemented a new financial reporting model, as required by the provisions of GASB Statement No. 34, *Basic Financial Statements - and Management's Discussion and Analysis - for State and Local Governments*.

The budgetary comparison information is not a required part of the basic financial statements, but is supplementary information required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

The Marlborough School District has not presented a management's discussion and analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America have determined is necessary to supplement, although not required to be part of, the basic financial statements.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Marlborough School District's basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund schedules are presented for the purposes of additional analysis and are not a part of the basic financial statements. They have been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements, and in our opinion, are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.
