REPORT OF SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL GOMMITTEE.

- CONTRACTOR

The amount of money which our present State Law requires to be assessed for the support of Common Schools is much in excess of the appropriations of former years. The compensation of teachers also is much higher. In illustration of this the fact may be cited, that in the Winter of 1843-44 the school in the South District in this town, with an attendance of 25 scholars, was taught by a male teacher for \$17.00 per month, including board. The present Winter the cost of teaching 15 scholars in the same district has been \$39.00 per month. In the former years the whole amount appropriated was about \$70.00. The present year it is double that amount.

In addition to the amount which the law requires to be raised, the town has voted \$300 per annum for five successive years to the McCollom Institute, the larger part of which will be expended for the tuition of pupils resident in town, thus making this Institute virtually a free High School to the youth of Mont Vernon. This generous outlay for educational purposes should yield valuable results. That all of practical benefit will be obtained which should be from this increased appropriation, may be a

debatable question.

In Massachusetts, a leading State in expenditures for public schools, there is a demand for a radical reform in the school system; or, rather, that the industrial school shall be placed side by side with the common school. It is stoutly maintained that the present system of education is unsuited to the wants of the age, in that it does not train the pupil for some definite employment in life, and that the introduction of the industrial element into schools will remedy this disadvantage. lem of the day is the education of the masses, and the solution of that problem is the combination of the present with the industrial system of education. It is noteworthy that in some countries of Europe, agriculture and mechanics are made obligatory as a part of the programme of instruction. In the populous towns in Massachusetts, mechanical drawing is required to be taught; and in Manchester, in our own State, a special teacher of drawing is now employed, with most satisfactory results; the

progress in this useful branch, verifying the belief of Horace Mann, "that a child will learn to draw and write sooner than he will learn writing alone."

Centre School.—Miss Charlotte Anderson had charge of this school through the year. Miss A. is a graduate of the Normal School at Framingham, Mass., and is an apt and ready scholar. This was her maiden experiment in school-teaching. Her mode of instruction and discipline embracing some novel features, was generally approved by the Committee, though in some particulars, an experienced educator might suggest improvement. In reading and writing and map-drawing, the instruction was excellent, and the proficiency marked.

This district has within the year, at an expense of about \$200, substituted for its former sittings, single desks and seats, from the manufactory at Boston; also a fine eight-day clock has been placed in the school room. As now furnished, this school has every needed appliance for the comfort and conven-

ience of the pupils.

South School.-Miss Lucretia H. Rideout taught the Summer Term. Only eight scholars attended. Miss R. was competent and faithful. She governed her school by gentle means, securing the ready obedience of all. Mr. David A. Stiles, who taught the school three years since, was employed for the Winter term. With added experience in this vocation, Mr. S. was even more successful than before; and I repeat as applicable to his recent effort, what was reported of his school in 1869: "Good order was maintained and the school kept at work. The proficiency made was marked, especially in Arithmetic. This was taught in the best manner, drilling, and illustrating every point in the lesson until the scholar could explain with a readiness and clearness of statement that indicated a thorough knowledge of the subject. There was no mere surface work. The advance made under such instruction the pupil will hold secure."

East School.—Miss Mary L. Kelso taught both terms of this school. The kind and winning manner of Miss K. secured very pleasant relations between teacher and pupils. She is a faithful, honest teacher, and her school made good progress.

NORTH SCHOOL.—Miss Emma F. Robertson taught the Summer Term. Miss R. maintains good discipline in her school

without apparent labor. Her self-possession and quiet vigilance, with correct scholarship, impressed the Committee favorably with her worth as a teacher. Her labors were very acceptable to the District. Miss Ida H. Lamson was employed for the Winter Term. (Miss Catsly, a pupil in this school, is a young lady of ample promise of usefulness in this vocation.) Her government was fair. Lively interest was evinced in study and the proficiency manifest at the close of her school denoted thorough instruction.

West School.—Miss Nellie W. Jackson taught the Sunmer school. Miss J. is very young and for a first attempt did very well. For her years, her attainments are superior and her faculty of instruction and discipline good. Miss Lizzie W. King a young lady of experience in teaching was employed for the Fall Term. She is a good scholar and a teacher of merit. The school under her charge was orderly and dilligent, and the District and Committee were satisfied that the teacher was painstaking and the school profitable.
