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

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Northfield, N. H., in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notfied to meet at the Town Hall in said Northfield on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairing of highways and bridges, and town maintenance.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid construction and appropriate money for same.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid maintenance and appropriate money for same.

- 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray the expense of Memorial Day.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for district nurse.
- 8. To see what action the town will take in regard to purchasing a snow plow and tractor and appropriate money for same.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to accept and adopt the reports of the Town Officers, as printed.
- 10. To transact any other business that may come before the meeting.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Tilton and Northfield:

I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The merger of the three local school districts,—Union School District No. 1 in Tilton, Tilton School District, and Northfield School District—which was well on its way when my report of last year was submitted, became effective in all details with the close of the school year last June. This new arrangement is proving quite as satisfactory as was anticipated. There is no other instance in the state of the union of two entire towns for school purposes.

The legislative act which made possible this union is as follows:

Section 1. The towns of Tilton and Northfield shall constitute a single school district to be called the Tilton and Northfield Union School District.

Section 2. This union district shall have all the powers and perform all the duties given by law to single school districts, except that the selectmen of the towns shall jointly assess the school tax upon the ratable estates of the district in proportion to the part which lies in each of said towns.

Section 3. Said union district shall take over the buildings and all other property of the school districts now existing in the towns of Tilton and Northfield,

namely, Union School District No. 1 in Tilton, Northfield school district and Tilton school district.

Section 4. The school board of said union district shall consist of nine members for the first year, seven for the second year, six for the third year and five for the fourth and succeeding years and election shall be for a term of three years; provided, that the duly elected members of the school boards of Union School District No. 1 in Tilton, Northfield school district and Tilton school district shall continue as members of the school board of said union district until the expiration of the terms for which they have been elected and the school board and treasurer of each district shall manage the finances of such district until the end of the fiscal year.

Section 5. The first meeting of said union district shall be held April 15, 1927, and shall be warned by the school boards of the now existing school districts, acting as a joint board.

Section 6. Except as is inconsistent herewith the provisions of chapters 116 to 123, inclusive, of the Public Laws shall apply to the said union district.

Section 7. Chapter 94 of the Laws of 1872 and all acts and parts of acts inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed and this act shall take effect upon its passage.

Schools opened in September with several changes in our teaching force. Miss Frances Meserve and Miss Helen Palmer resigned their positions at the Union School in June to accept positions in Massachusetts. We were sorry to have these teachers leave us. We were very fortunate in securing experienced teachers to fill both these vacancies. Miss Margaret Rowden, a Plymouth graduate, was selected for the second grade, and Miss Ida Cushing, a Keene graduate, for the sixth grade. Both Miss Rowden and Miss Cushing

are excellent additions to our force. Miss Mabel Connolly was transferred from the Rand School to the Highlands School, to take the place of Miss Ethel Foote, who resigned in June. Miss Irene Luneau, one of our own girls who was graduated from Plymouth in June, was selected to fill the vacancy at the Rand School. Miss Mina E. Pike, who was re-elected to the No. Four School, asked for a leave of absence on account of ill health, and Mrs. Florence C. Barnard has been substituting for her.

An increase in the number of children at Oak Hill made it necessary to reopen this school last September. Miss Mary E. Glines taught here until Thanksgiving, when she resigned. Miss Vera L. Favor was then transferred from the Center School to Oak Hill, and the Center children were assigned to the Union School. As no boarding place is available within reasonable walking distance of the Oak Hill School, this teacher has to be conveyed at the expense of the district. The following table shows the schools which are now open, the teachers and the enrollment at each school at this writing:

In accordance with the vote of the school meeting the school board has entered into a contract with Tilton School for high school tuition. This contract is similar to those which the three local districts formerly had with Tilton School. The tuition is at the rate of \$125 per pupil for the full year, payments to be made in two equal installments corresponding with the two semesters of the school year. "In case a child shall be in attendance for not more than one-half a semester, the charge shall be one-half the regular semester rate. If a child shall be in attendace for more than half the semester, the full semester charge shall be made."

This contract provides that should either party wish to terminate the contract it may do so at the end of any school year by giving three months previous thereto a written notice to the other of its desire to terminate the agreement at the end of the school year. The cost this current year for high school tuition will be approximately \$13,000.00.

Miss Mary E. Davis, who for several years had been District Nurse and School Nurse, gave up her work here in April. Miss Davis had been faithful and very efficient in her work for and with the school children. Her going was a distinct loss to our schools. Miss Elizabeth Partington, her successor, has entered into the work in connection with the schools with much interest and enthusiasm.

The improvements which had been begun at Lochmere were completed last summer. This school building is now in excellent shape.

The total appropriation made at the last school meeting for all purposes was \$41,525.00. The school board recommends an appropriation of \$40,971.50 for the next fiscal year. The school board's budget in detail is printed on another page.

The question of the advisability of the school district establishing a high school was presented for consideration at the school meeting last year. This question was raised in part by a change in the character of Tilton School from co-educational to a strictly boys school as far as resident pupils are concerned. The proposition did not meet with favorable action by the school meeting, but the school board was instructed to secure plans and estimates for a high school build-

ing and estimates of the cost of maintaining a high school, and to present the same at the next annual meeting. At the time of the annual meeting last year the school board was unanimously in favor of establishing a high school, believing that the educational interests of the community would be better served by a school maintained and controlled by the school district. The Superintendent was of the same opinion. The School Board and Superintendent are still of this opinion. This matter will doubless come up for consideration again this year.

The terms of three members of the school board will expire at the time of the annual meeting, namely, Mr. Burt C. Abbott, Mrs. Winnifred F. Walker and Mrs. Minnie S. West. As the law fixes the membership of the school board at seven for next year but one new member will be elected. The annual meeting will be called for March 23.

I wish to thank the members of the School Board for their helpfulness and forbearance, and the teachers for their cooperation and loyalty.
