

TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Orford, on Tuesday, the 13th of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year; also to choose one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, one Library Trustee for three years.
- Article 2. To hear the budget of the Town and raise and appropriate any money recommended therein or pass any vote relative thereto.
- Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- Article 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town property.
- Article 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town winter roads for the ensuing year.
- Article 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of electric lights.
- Article 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Orford Free Library and Orford Social Library.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.

TOWN WARRANT — (Continued)

- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell and administer property acquired by Tax Deed or otherwise.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 100.00 for the use of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the State aid for the construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$557.00 for that purpose.
- Article 14. To see if the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relating to playing games of Beano shall be adopted in this Town.
- Article 15. To see what action the Town will take concerning the Orford Common and to raise and appropriate any money made necessary by such action.
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to cover the expenses of Memorial Day.
- Article 17. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Common.
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the control of Pine Blister Rust and \$150.00 for care of trees.
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 to be paid over to the Federal Airport Project.
- Article 20. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds for purchase of road equipment.
- Article 21. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Fire Department.
- Article 22. To see what sum the Town will vote to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds for purchase of fire equipment.

TOWN WARRANT — (Continued)

Article 23. To see what action the Town will take to improve library services and facilities in Orford and to see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for such purpose and to improve, repair, alter or extend the Library-Town office building.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 annually in the years 1962, 1963, 1964 and 1965, to finance the celebration of the bicentennial of the Town of Orford.

Article 25. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for increased police protection.

Article 26. To see what action the Town will take relating to purchase of land West of the Town Hall.

Article 27. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

The following is a report of the activities conducted in the Town of Orford by the N. H. Department of Health, Bureau of Public Health Nursing, for the year 1961.

A Tuberculin Sterneedle Testing program was given in the schools for grades 1 through 12 on March 21. Dr. William Prince, Director of Communicable Disease of the N. H. Department of Health, gave the tests, assisted by Dr. Hammond, School Physician, Mrs. Lois Reed, R. N., of the N. H. Department of Health, Mrs. Charlene McAllister, R. N., Orford School Nurse, and a local committee of nurses and clerical workers. The reactors to the tests were followed through and chest x-rays were given at either Plymouth or Lebanon Clinic in April and November. Others members of the families of the reactors were also recommended for chest x-rays and many took advantage. Chest x-ray clinics are sponsored by the N. H. Tuberculosis and Health Association and the N. H. Department of Health in Lebanon and Plymouth in the spring and fall of each year. Residents of Orford are welcome to attend either clinic. Reports of the findings are sent to the parties concerned and home visits are made by the nurse if necessary.

AN APPEAL FROM YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

In these days of constantly rising taxes and wages, any unnecessary expense is an added burden on everyone's pocketbook — yours and mine. Forest fires cost money and damage our valuable woodlands. Lightning sets some forest fires, but we have no control of lightning. Children cause many fires. Ninety-eight percent of our forest fires result from human carelessness — our carelessness. This, we — you — and I can do something about.

When we require you to obtain a permit for out-of-doors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations - hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump — we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you:

- 1. Follow the warden's directions.
- 2. Secure the required burning permit.

3. Keep your fires under control.

- 4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.

To the inhabitants of the School District of Orford qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Memorial Hall in said District, on Tuesday, March 6, 1962, at 8:00 P. M., to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for three years, and to fill any vacancies which may occur on the School Board.
 - Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board, and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relative thereto.
- Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.
- Article 9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation for 1961-62, a sum of money to be made available to the School District prior to July 1, 1962, in order to meet obligations due primarily to the receipt of less tuition than anticipated.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Orford:

I present herein my report for 1961, my eighth annual report as Superintendent of Schools in Orford.

New Principal

Mr. Paul Wenners resigned as principal of the Orford schools to accept a position elsewhere. A wide-spread search was made for a successor to Mr. Wenners. Several people who looked promising were interviewed by the superintendent and by the school board.

At the time that we employed Mr. Richard C. Hamilton as Mr. Wenners' successor we felt that we were most fortunate to secure his services. He has certainly demonstrated that our feeling was more than justified. He has shown his ability to administer effectively and to supervise the school, to get along well with the pupils, the teachers, the parents, and other citizens of the community and he has also created a very favorable impression in neighboring communities. He adds very real strength to the Orford schools.

School Finances in Orford

It seems to me that we have almost reached the cross-roads on the question of whether we can continue to maintain a comprehensive high school in Orford or will have to make other arrangements. I hope that we can continue to maintain the high school, for I am confident that if we did not do so, many of the Orford high school age pupils would lose interest in high school education and might even drop out, as they could do at age 14.

Orford is having to pay a high price for maintaining its high school. There is a question as to whether it can continue to do so unless other sources of revenue are found. We have fewer tuition pupils this year than was anticipated with the result that there is a substantial deficiency in the budget. We hope that we will have more tuition pupils next year, but cannot be certain. Every effort is being made to interest other pupils from the surrounding towns to attend Orford. We feel that we can offer them an educational program that is very worthwhile.

The school board over the past several years has tried to interest some of the surrounding communities in forming a cooperative school district in order that the financial burden might be lightened and the educational programs further improved. The response thus far has not been encouraging. The board plans, however, to continue its efforts. The board has also met with Commissioner of Education and members of his staff to determine whether there are other avenues for securing additional state aid. The present state aid program is far from realistic, although Orford did get much more in 1961-62 than was anticipated. This helped, but it is still far from enough. I hope that we will continue to search for some better way out of the situation.

For Orford to continue to operate a comprehensive high school program means a substantially increased budget for 1962-63. One of the major factors in this increase is the addition of a teacher to the high school staff. We must have this added teacher to continue qualifying as a comprehensive high school. Furthermore, teachers' salaries must be increased. Orford is not keeping pace with the average salaries for towns in the state. If anything, it is dropping somewhat further behind each year. Obviously, we cannot continue to attract and retain good teachers unless we are in a better position to compete.

School Finances in New Hampshire

I have dealt briefly with the school financial situation in Orford. We who are in public school work, whether as members of the professional staff or of the school boards, are concerned and troubled about the general financing of education in New Hampshire. We know that we have the responsibility to maintain and improve the educational program to the greatest extent possible within the money now available. I believe and hope that we are doing so. We can, however, go just so far without very materially increased budgets.

Wthout substantial added funds we cannot meet increased enrollments that have entered the schools and will continue to enter nor can we continue to provide the educational program demanded by the increasing complexities of our society. We cannot meet inflation; it is estimated that 8.3% of the increased expenditures for schools between 1958-59 and 1961-62 has been due to inflation. (School Management Magazine, January, 1962.) Without more money we cannot compete with continuously rising teachers' salaries. If we want to attract and retain quality teachers, we must be in a position to compete. Without that money, we cannot buy the equipment, the textbooks, reference books and library materials needed by those teachers in order to do good work. We cannot adequately maintain our buildings and equipment, meet the continuously rising costs for fuel, transportation, insurance, and many other costs that go into operating the schools.

If we who are connected with the schools are concerned about the rising costs, I am sure that the taxpayers are at least equally concerned. Our concern is to provide the quality of education that we believe the parents and other citizens want for the boys and girls of the community. The taxpayer has the same concern, but also the more direct and personal concern, evidenced in his question: "Where is the money coming from?". The tax on property is becoming almost prohibitive, and particularly in New Hampshire, where real estate and personal property bears most of the burden.

Statistics are sometimes boring, but I think that all of us should not only be aware of, but dynamically concerned about, the following data:

Each one who studies the above information will draw his own conclusions. To me, for the dates given, the following are evident:

- 1. New Hampshire's adult population has to pay for the public education of a smaller percentage of pupils than most states. It stands 46th out of 50.
- 2. It has a personal income per pupil enrolled in public schools that is well above average 12th out of 50.
- 3. For 1959-60 it was in the lowest eleven states in the percent of personal income going to public school education.
- 4. Its expenditure per pupil is below the national average. It stands 29th out of 50.
- 5. It has not kept pace with the rest of the country in increasing, since 1950, its expenditure per pupil.
- 6. Its average teacher's salary is well below the national average. In fact, it stands 33rd. Furthermore, in terms of salary, New Hampshire is becoming relatively less able to compete for New England teachers, and the other New England states better able to recruit New Hampshire teachers. The teachers are the schools.
- 7. Its state aid to education is unreasonably low as compared with the rest of the country. In the percent of revenue from the state it stands next to the bottom.
- 8. It naturally follows that the principal local source of revenue, namely real estate, is carrying a very heavy burden. New Hampshire stands 2nd in the 50 states in the percent of school revenue from local sources.
- 9. Even when state and local tax collections are combined, New Hampshire stands 35th in per capita general collections (1959), 31st in per capita collections for education (1959), and 44th in per capita expenditures for education (1960).

The above are generalizations for the state as a whole. The situation varies from community to community. All, however, feel the burden on real estate.

I believe the above figures to be reliable. They are merely the statement of objective data. Some may differ with my interpretations. How can anyone, however, who is truly interested in education or in the burden on real estate,

help but agree that New Hampshire must have a greatly improved and more realistic program of state aid to education? We are told by some that New Hampshire needs no new taxes. What, then are we to do: sacrifice education, or place an even heavier burden on real estate? It certainly does not look as though we would get added federal aid in the near future. We will get added state aid only when the people of New Hampshire are sufficiently aroused to demand it and to demand it in an organized and emphatic way.

Conclusion

In conclusion, I want to again express my very real appreciation for the help, support, and effort on the part of the members of the school board, the school staff, and the citizens of the community who have joined with me in working for the best interests of the Orford schools.
