Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, on the eighth day of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1 To choose a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for the term of three years, two or more Road Agents, for the year ensuing, two Auditors for the year ensuing, and one Trustee of Trust Funds for the term of three years.

2 To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the School and Parsonage Fund interest for the year ensuing.

3 To see how much money the Town will vote to appropriate for Memorial Day expenses for the year ensuing.

4 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars for the maintenance of the District Nurse Association, jointly with the Town of Northfield.

5 To see if the Town will vote to accept State aid for highways and appropriate the amount required by law to secure the same.

6 To see if the Town will vote to macadamize and lay a sidewalk on High St., commencing at Chestnut St., and running West through Cedar St., to Moses Park (so called), raise and appropriate money for the same.

7 To see what action the Town will take in regard to purchasing new equipment for snow removal.

8 To see what action the Town will take in regard to starting a program of sewer improvement.

9 To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars, (\$400.00) to be increased by one hundred dollars (\$100.00) from the state for the eradication of white pine blister rust.

10 To see if the Town will vote to spend for band concerts, the sum of two hundred dollars (200.00), raised in 1926, but unexpended to date.

11 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for all purposes for the ensuing year.

12 To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to the reports of its officers and agents for the past year.

13 To choose any other officers and agents for the year ensuing.

14 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Boards and Citizens of Tilton and Northfield:

I take pleasure in submitting to you my twelfth annual report, the nineteenth, I believe, in the series of such reports.

Deserved commendation is too often forgotten. I wish to commend the boys and girls whose faithfulness and good fortune made possible a perfect record in school attendance for the school year ending last June. You will find their names in the Roll of Honor. The financial reports will tell you how the school money is being expended. The proposed budgets give the needs for the next fiscal year.

One hundred ten pupils from Tilton and Northfield were enrolled at Tilton School last school year. This was about forty-two per cent of a total enrollment in the Secondary Department of this school. At the time of opening in September last, exactly the same number (110) registered from Tilton and Northfield. At this writing there are one hundred one in attendance. They are classified as follows: Freshmen, 32; Sophomores, 28; Juniors, 21; Seniors, 20.

At the present time there are 307 pupils enrolled at the Union School as follows: Grade I—53, II—33, III—40, IV—35, V—37, VI—29, VII—41, VIII—39. Last year at this time the number was 289. Of these 307 pupils enrolled, 158 are resident in Tilton and 149 in Northfield. Where were these children born? 151 were born either in Tilton or Northfield, 100 elsewhere in New Hampshire, 53 elsewhere in the United States and 3 outside of the United States.

Of the other new teachers Miss Sullivan, Miss Gerrish, Miss Palmer and Miss Starkey are graduates of Keene Normal. Miss Meserve, one of our own girls is a graduate of Plymouth Normal. Miss Kelley has had several summer sessions at Normal school.

Josephine Downing and Gerard Laplante completed the eighth grade work at the Center School in June and both entered Tilton School in September.

The school enrollment in this district is steadily declining. Two or three years ago we had a large school at Oak Hill. At the time of opening schools this last September there were but seven children in the Oak Hill community to be provided for. No boarding place within a reasonable distance of the school was found available for a teacher. These pupils are being conveyed to the Center School. The number of school children in the Hodgdon community is reduced to three, and these are being sent to Franklin. In order to do away with one transportation route the Tibbetts School has been closed and the Rand School reopened.

The only teacher new to us is Miss Connolly, one of our own Northfield girls, who was graduated at Plymouth Normal last June.

At the annual school meeting last March, it was voted to pay the tuition of any seventh or eighth grade pupils from this district who cared to attend the Union School in the village. Five children have availed themselves of this privilege.

The School Board was authorized at the annual school meeting to purchase the lot adjacent to the Oak Hill School. The small number of children in this community and the closing, temporarily, of this school, seemed to make it ad-

visable to defer action in this matter.

There has been a decrease this year in the expenditure for school maintenance, and it is probable that there will be a balance in the school treasury at the close of the year of at least \$1,800.

THE NEW SCHOOL DISTRICT

At the request of the three school boards of Tilton and Northfield, a bill was introduced in the legislature early this session by Mr. E. R. Gale, representative of Northfield, which provided for the union of the three existing school districts into a single district to be known as the Tilton and Northfield Union School District. A public meeting was held for the discussion of this proposed legislation. The meeting went on record as unanimously in favor of the proposition. The bill has since passed both the House and Senate and will doubtless become a law. I believe this to be a forward movement.

This legislation recognizes the inter-dependence of the village and the outlying parts of Tilton and Northfield, that the two towns really constitute one community, and that their educational interests are identical.

Administration will be much simplified. Instead of three school boards there will be but one. Educational opportunities will be more nearly equalized. This does not mean the closing of the rural or outlying schools. However, in case the number of children in a certain community became so small that the running of the school would be unwise it is probable that these children would be conveyed to the graded village school rather than to another small school, as would be necessary under the old organization.

We have had in the past a different school tax rate for

each of the three districts. Hereafter there will be a uniform rate for all parts of the towns. Our so-called school tax rate has been based not on all the money raised for the maintenance of schools, but simply on the amount raised in school meeting in *addition to the amount required by law*. The law requires the selectmen to assess for school purposes \$.35 on each \$100 of the valuation. This has always appeared as a part of the Town tax rate. It is probable that hereafter *all* the money needed for the maintenance of schools will be raised in school meeting. Under this arrangement the school rate would be \$.35 more and the town rate \$.35 less than under the old plan. One advantage would be that the school tax rate as determined and published would show to just what extent the community was taxing itself for school purposes.

The first annual meeting of the new school district will be held Friday, April 15.

Again I wish to thank the school boards for their patience and forbearance, and the teachers for their co-operation and loyalty.
