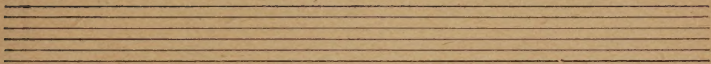
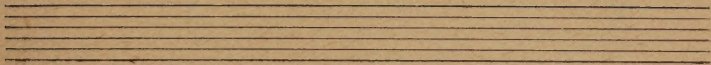

REMARKS.

Our schools are nearly all closed this year except the village schools at the time of rendering our annual accounts.

Last year so many of our schools were in session that three or four hundred dollars of the money reported on hand was required to complete the term's work, and between three and four hundred dollars more was used to put new seats and desks in the 2d Primary and Intermediate rooms.

Two schools in the out-districts, one at the Pond and one at the Centre, have been re-opened. Another teacher and another room is in demand for Division No. 1.

It looks as if more money would have to be raised this year.

The committee appointed at the last annual school meeting to examine into the existing conditions, with reference to purchasing additional grounds and building for the use of the schools in Division No. 1, we understand will report at this meeting.

There are on hand and ready for shipment quite a

large lot of old and worn-out books, which will soon be returned to the publishers who will allow us a credit on them when purchasing new books.

As the Village schools were in session when report was made up, it was impossible to print a complete list of perfect attendance.

I have tried to be humane to the people that have received assistance, and have tried to save the town all the expense that I could.

Some people think that the Overseer of Poor should pay something for the job, but I assure you that I have earned my money this year.

The County is wholly caring for James Cuddihy. Since April 1st Arthur Curtis is boarded at Grasmere at the expense of his guardian; the County will not do business with individuals, but prefer to do it through the towns, hence his account is in my report.

I take this opportunity to thank all that have given on papers in order to keep several from coming on to the town.
