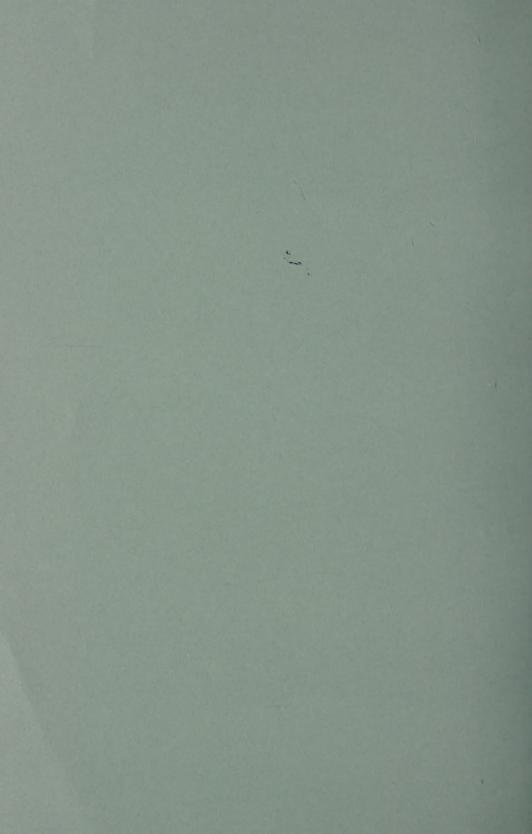

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The year 1987 was not an uneventful year, to the contrary, it was quite the opposite.

In retrospect, we are reminded of the heavy snow and subsequent flooding. There was much to be done in the Spring, road damage, bridges

washed out and other sundry problems.

Our thanks to Jim Fifield and his crew for the expertise exhibited in the face of almost insurmountable odds. Our major bridge project for 1988 will,

of necessity, be Ford Mill Bridge which must receive priority.

The acquisition of a computer has created a huge work load for our efficient secretary Marie Meola. The effort expended was well worth the inconvenience. We are now operating with far greater efficiency and accuracy since our records are now computerized. As time progresses, even greater efficiency can be expected.

Your selectmen have had a full workload with the new subdivisions in Town, plus new roads and new construction. We expect 1988 to be equally

busy.

Andy Phelps, as usual, has exhibited exemplary attention to the care of our cemeteries.

The Town is in the process of having a compactor installed at our disposal site. The pad is constructed, and as of this writing, work has begun on the electrical hook-ups. The problem of waste disposal becomes more complex with each passing week. The compactor will greatly alleviate the disposal problem.

We, as your representatives, are very pleased that despite the enormous financial burdens, we were able to keep your tax rate to a very small increase. We have expended every effort to keep a close watch on the budget in order fo prevent and escalation in the tax rates. There are, of course, certain areas over which the taxpayers have no control, such as school assessments.

We feel that our F.A.S.T. Squad should receive our acknowledgement and gratitude for a job well done. Their efficiency and timely response to

emergencies is to be commended.

We would like to remind all of our townspeople, that our Town Hall needs to be modernized and improved, especially in view of the projected growth of the Town. The Board will continue to explore other alternatives to alleviate this problem.

We wish to welcome Ragged Mountain Ski Area and wish the

management continued success.

We, the Board of Selectmen, deeply appreciate the efforts put out by Dick Gness in maintaining the "Town Triangle" during the summer. He has done this service ever since Carl Seward was no longer able to do it.

The Board of Selectmen will always be ready to assist in any pertinent matters within the scope of our authority.

We would be remiss if we failed to express our appreciation to all who have given their help and cooperation to your Board of Selectmen and other officials.

We expect 1988 to be a very eventful year and are looking forward to serving all of our people to the best of our ability.

We sincerely wish that all of our people in Danbury will look to the future of our Town and be willing to do their best to cope with the expected growth and its accompanying problems as needed.

ARTICLE 1: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. Moderator reads results of ballots cast (the above).

ARTICLE 2: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$238,732.00 for General Operations:

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of \$5,000.00 for repair of bridges.

Motion by Forrest Powers, seconded by Jon Schurger. Article passed.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an amount of \$10,000.00 for the purchase of a computer system for the Town Records & Taxes. This appropriation to come from Fund Balance.

Motion by Pat Hannaford, seconded by Ed Colby. Discussion of different prices for printer followed and a motion was made by Brian MacKay to reduce price to \$9,400.00, seconded by Teak Cavis. Article passess for \$9,400.00, as amended.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise & appropriate an amount of \$4,500.00 for an artesian well system for the Town Hall. This appropriation to come from Fund Balance.

Motion by Pat Hannaford, seconded by Ed Colby. Article fails to pass.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise & appropriate an amount of \$3,010.00 for one radio for the Police Cruiser and one portable unit. This appropriation to come from Fund Balance.

Motion by Pat Hannaford, seconded by Jon Schurger. Article passed.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an amount not to exceed \$50,000.00 for the purchase of a new highway truck with body & sander. The above sum of money to be raised as follows: \$6,000.00 from Capital Reserve Fund; \$5,305.00 from Block Grant; \$1,040.00 that was left over from the purchase of plows and wings; \$7,665.00 to be raised by taxation; \$30,000.00 to be raised by issuing a long-term note for four years. This note to be paid in four equal installments of \$7,500.00 each plus each interest. Amendment submitted by Forrest Powers to raise and appropriate an amount of \$37,440.00: \$5,305.00 from Block Grant; \$1,040.00 that was left over from the purchase of plows & wings; \$6,095.00 from taxation, and \$25,000.00 for three years on a long-term note of \$8,333.00 per year.

Motion to vote on article as amended made by Phyllis Taylor, seconded by Pat Hannaford. Ballots were cast as 78 "yes" votes - 2 "no" votes. Article

passed as amended.

ARTICLE 8: Shall the Town of Danbury accept the recommendation of the Pemi-Baker Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Committee and appropriate \$1,224.00. This will enable the Committee to gather the necessary engineering, legal and financial information in order to determine the detailed costs for a District solid waste disposal solution including but not limited to the District acquisition of and improvements to the Plymouth Incinerator/Recycling Facility.

Motion by Twila Cook, seconded by Judith MacKay. Article passed.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$342.00 to pay Deborah Phelps for her hours for training at the Police Academy last Summer. This is in compliance with the U.S. Supreme Court decision in the Garcia case.

Motion by Phyllis Taylor, seconded by Tricia Ricker. Article passed.

ARTICLE 10: Capital Improvements Program: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to prepare and amend a recommended program of Municipal Capital improvements projects pursuant to RSA 674:5. Motion by Teak Cavis, seconded by Pat Hannaford. Article passed.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance: ORDINANCE VIOLATION PENALTIES. Any person who fails to comply with any ordinance adopted by the Town of Danbury shall be subject to a \$25.00 penalty. Each day of non-compliance shall be a separate violation. The Selectmen shall notify any persons in violation by certified

mail and may assess penalties from that date. Any penalties collected shall be committed to the Town's Treasury.

Motion by Chris Phelps, seconded by Twila Cook. Teak Cavis offers an amendment to change the wording for penalty to start the date notification is sent. Teak Cavis withdraws this amendment. Next amendment submitted by Jon Schurger, "Any person who fails to comply with any ordinance by the Town of Danbury shall be fined \$100.00 a day." Amendment seconded by Art Perry. Amendment voted on. Amendment fails.

Teak Cavis submits amendment, "May assess penalties from the date the Party in violation either signs for, or refuses to accept delivery of, the notification by certified mail." Amendment seconded by Ann Knott. Amendment voted on. Article passes as amended.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance: SIGNS ORDINANCE:

A. No sign or advertising device shall be erected or placed on any property in the Town of Danbury or be visible from outside of any structure in the Town of Danbury or be affixed to a vehicle and allowed to remain on the premises with intent to serve as a sign without a permit. applications for permits shall be submitted to the Selectmen. application for a sign permit shall include the site location, the sign's size and content.

Exemptions: B.

(1) Signs indicating the existence of private property, forbidding

trespass or other activities on the property.

(2) Signs located on private property and intended to regulate or guide activities with the property even though such signs may be incidentally visible from outside the property.

(3) Temporary signs in use for a period of not more than 30 days during a 12 month period. These signs shall be nonilluminated signs such as for community events, political campaigns, special sales promotions, auctions, and the like.

(4) Temporary real estate signs advertising sale of the property on which the sign is located not exceeding three feet by four

feet in size.

(5) Nonilluminated home business signs which shall not exceed two per property and shall not have a surface area in excess of eight square feet per sign.

All signs within the Town of Danbury shall comply with

the following standards:

(1) Flashing Signs: No signs shall be intermittently illuminated nor be of such traveling light type, animated, or

flashing, except such portions of the sign as consists solely of indicators of time or temperature or both.

(2) Shielding fixtures shall be arranged to direct the light

away from street and away from adjoining structures.

D. All signs shall be maintained in good condition and repair. Any business that closes its operation permanently shall remove any signs in connection with that business within 30 days. The Selectmen shall notify sign owners, in writing, to remove or repair any sign which is in violation of this ordinance or becomes in disrepair. If the owner fails to comply within 30 days after date of notice, the Selectmen shall have the sign removed at the expense of the owner.

E. All costs of removal of signs, including attorney's fees, costs, and expenses related to the removal of an unlawful sign shall be borne by the

violator.

F. Each business at a commercial site is allowed two advertising signs on the property where the business is located, either two single faced signs, each face not exceeding 36 square feet, or one double faced sign with each face not exceeding 36 square feet. Additionally, each business may display a business identification sign externally. Such signs shall not exceed 16 square feet per side.

G. All signs shall comply with minimum set-back requirements or

permanent structure.

H. No sign shall be erected or placed in the Town of Danbury which advertises a business not located in the Town of Danbury.

I. Directional signs may be allowed by permit of location of off the

business premises as follows:

(1) Such signs shall indicate only the name and direction or location of the business and its general type of activity (for example: building supplies, general store, etc.) and/or its logo.

(2) Such off-premise directional signs shall contain no other advertising matter and shall not exceed 16 square feet in

size per side per sign.

J. The height of any free-standing sign shall not exceed 20 feet above surrounding road grade or 2 feet above the roof ridge of any building to which it is affixed.

K. Any sign which is damaged or destroyed may be replaced and/or restored to its former condition within 180 days of the date of damage or destruction.

If adopted, this ordinance shall take effect upon passage. It shall be administered and enforced by the Selectmen with penalties for non-compliance as provided by Town Ordinance. Motion by Judith MacKay, seconded by Gordon Cavis. Amendment submitted by Andy Phelps to change 180 days

to 45 days in "K" for length of time to replace or repair damaged sign,

seconded by Craig Marston. Amendment voted on and is adopted.

Alan Brownell submits an amendment to strike "H": "No sign shall be erected or place in the Town of Danbury which advertises a business not located in Danbury." Seconded by Ed Phelps. Amendment voted on and fails to pass.

Article 12 voted on as amended (to 45 days instead of 180 days to restore

or replace damaged sign). Article passed.

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance: BUILDING PERMIT ORDINANCE: No person shall erect any building; locate any mobile home; locate any camper or travel trailer for a period of greater than 30 days; or construct any other dwelling for purposes of human habitation without first obtaining a permit from the Selectmen.

Applications for said permit shall include the following:

(1) Public Utilities Commission Energy Code approval as required by RSA 155-D.

(2) N.H. Water Supply & Pollution Control Commission approval

for septic system construction.

(3) A sketch of adequate detail to show the location of the proposed dwelling and its relation to roads and property lines.

(4) State or local driveway permits.

(5) Any other information that may be required to ensure that the dwelling shall comply with all state and local regulations.

The Selectmen shall issue or deny this permit in writing within 15 days of its receipt.

This ordinance shall be administered and enforced by the Selectmen

with penalties for non-compliance as provided in Town Ordinance.

This ordinance shall take effect 30 days after its passage. Motion by Brian MacKay, seconded by Andy Phelps. Amendment submitted by Paul Russell "to delete the word *construct* and replace with the word *erect* and also delete the word *dwelling* and replace with the word *structure*." Amendment seconded by Jon Schurger and voted on. Article voted on as amended and Article 13 passes as amended.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following: HEIGHT ORDINANCE: No building or structure, or part thereof, shall exceed 35 feet in height as measured from the high point thereof to the average natural or graded permanent ground level at the wall of the structure nearest to the below said high point, provided, however, that this provision shall not apply to television and radio antenna, lightning rods, cupolas, steeples, chimneys, utility poles or parts of building designed exclusively for agricultural uses.

If adopted, this ordinance shall be administered and enforced by the Selectmen with penalties for non-compliance, as provided in Town Ordinance.

This ordinance shall take effect upon passage. Motion by Andy Phelps, seconded by Judy MacKay. Article passed.

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint the Constable, commencing in 1988 according to N.H. RSA 105 - 1. Motion to pass over article by Twila Cook, seconded by Tricia Ricker. Vote was taken to pass over article and failed. Article passed.

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of Capital Improvement to the Town Hall. Motion by Phyllis Taylor, seconded by Reginald Glines. Article passed.

ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 2,000.00 to go into the Capital Reserve Fund for Capital Improvement to Town Hall.

Motion by Twila Cook, seconded by Ann Knott. Article passed.

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for the use of setoffs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated below: and further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon.

ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Danbury.

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any material or equipment deemed to be surplus to the Town needs. Motion by Phyllis Taylor, seconded by Gordon Cavis. Article passed.

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Motion by Phyllis Taylor, seconded by Brian MacKay. Article passed.

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell real estate taken by the Town for non-payment of taxes or by Collector's Deeds.

Motion by Brian MacKay, seconded by Jon Schurger. Article passed.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Town's representatives to the General Court to take all necessary measures to insure that no low level radioactive waste from the Seabrook nuclear plant shall be stored or disposed of within this Town of Danbury unless and until the proposed site of the proposed storage or disposal has been approved by the voters of the Town at the Annual Town Meeting. Motion by Jon Schurger, seconded by Twila Cook. Amendment submitted by Gordon Cavis "to strike the words no low level and to read no radioactive waste and to strike the words from the Seabrook and to read from no nuclear plant." Seconded by Jon Schurger. Amendment voted on and passes.

Article passes as amended.

ARTICLE 2. Not completed.

ARTICLE 2. #5 to be amended, submitted by Bill MacKenzie to increase Town Hall & Other Buildings from \$5,500. to \$7,000., seconded by Jon Schurger. Increase is to repair the existing pipes to Town Hall to obtain water all year round. Amendment voted on and passes.

Amendment submitted by Andy Phelps to increase #10 of Article 2 to \$85,000.

No second, amendment fails.

ARTICLE 2 voted on to raise \$240,232.00 as amended.

Article passes as amended.

ARTICLE 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting. Moderator Phelps motions to adjourn.

- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of \$30,000. for the repair of bridges.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$1,467. for the development costs associated with the District purchase of the Plymouth Incinerator/Recycling Facility and Rumney landfill site. The appropriation will be used to finalize the District Agreement, evaluate the hydrogeologic characteristics of the Rumney site, finalize the incinerator upgrade design and implement the recycling and transportation plan. The Pemi-Baker Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Committee recommends the appropriation.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to approve an addition to the schedule of wages, benefits for full time and part-time Town employees.
- 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000. to go into the Capital Reserve Fund for Capital Improvement to the Town Hall.

POLICE DEPARTMENT 1987 Annual Report

New Hampshire is in a time of high population growth statewide. Danbury has not been left out of this growth influx.

Police calls for service have increased and there are any number of "rules of thumb" which can be used to determine "where do we go from here".

Danbury has enjoyed a low key police department, part-time, whenever, for many years. A town of seven or eight hundred residents could coast along with that, (with backup from State Police) even when they have two major highways bisecting the town line, ninety-three miles of town road and 18,609 acres of land. With land development and the ski area opening up again, we are experiencing a large recreational influx on weekends and this is changing our picture.

If the police department were manned by a "Robocop" who never had to

eat lunch, go to the bathroom or take a day off, we'd have it made.

However, we are dealing with human beings and the assignment /availability factor is mind boggling. It takes 2,912 hours to staff one eight hour shift with one person seven days a week, fifty-two weeks per year. (This is 8 hours of coverage in one 24 hour day.) With one full time officer for one 8 hour shift, we must consider the fact that this person, manning this 8 hour shift will have two days off each week, so 2 days x 8 hours x 52 weeks = 832 hours to be subtracted from his availability factor, this reduces it to 2,080 hours. Then if you give him 2 weeks vacation, you subtract 40 x 2 or 80 hours and you are down to 2,000 available hours. The average officer takes 10 sick days leave a year, 10 days x 8 hours is 80 hours and your are now down to 1,920 hours, subtract 1 week in-service training a year and this deducts another 40 hours and you are now getting 1,880 hours of this person's work time to cover one eight hour shift seven days a week or 2,912 hours a year. This leaves that shift uncovered 1,032 hours each year. I didn't make this up. I detest figures. I borrowed it from an article written by Earl Sweeney, State Police Standards Training Council.

In light of the above, 7 days a week with 24 hour coverage is $2,912 \times 3 = 8,736$ hours for 24 hour police availability, 7 days a week, 52 weeks a year. Impossible for one person, not to mention the unaffordabe cost to the taxpayer in a small community. For a community to desire a cruiser on patrol and available 24 hours a day is a physical and financial impossibility. It takes 5 full time officers to provide such coverage for the patrol. (24 hour phone dispatch could take 5 dispatchers or else buying time from a nearby town that has such service.)

The 8,736 hours previously mentioned would be man-hours required available to answer calls for service. There is also report writing, cruiser maintenance, preparation for court presentation, court prosecuting. It does no good to issue summons if you are not prepared to win when you go to court. That is a waste of everyone's time. Additionally, there is mandatory

training update to maintain professionalism. As part of the Police Department's effort to keep abreast of changes and training in law enforcement, our officers completed 188 hours of in-service training in 1987. In-service training updates are an integral concept of modern law enforcement.

In June, thirteen Danbury homeowners became statistics, by vandalism and burglary. The suspects were "fingered" by an alert citizen and apprehended by local and State Police after grueling hours of critical cooperative investigation. At this time, we are still in the juvenile judicial system with these cases.

The highlight, of the summer police activity, was getting a call from a resident, that they had found a little boy. Up to that point, I was unaware of the intensive search being organized, in Hill, for a lost child. It was with great delight that I was able to reunite the child with his Fresh Air host family.

A part time department, such as Danbury has at present, is stressful for the persons manning that department. I am on call 24 hours a day, when I am near the phone to answer the call. I am not paid to stand by and be on call because it would not be feasible to be on standby for 24 hours a day. I'm not "Robocop". It cannot be done. I get paid for the actual time that I am on a call. I do some patrol, I attend professional meetings, I prosecute my court cases, and I keep up with my profession through in-service training seminars. Some at my own expense, having been refused funding from the police budget for two seminars in the past 1 1/2 years.

This is not meant to be a sad story. I thoroughly enjoy being a police person in Danbury, otherwise I wouldn't be doing the job. It is just information that should be presented to the community, in view of the fact that the budget I helped the selectmen prepare for 1988 is a considerable increase from previous year. Police Departments are presenting a new profile, everywhere. You must also remember that the position of Chief is now a hired position. If you intend to attract the trained professional person to this position you need to have something to offer him/her. With this in mind I urge you to support the budget request for 1988 as presented.

DANBURY PLANNING BOARD

From March 1987 to December 1987, your Planning Board has been very active. In addition to the monthly meetings for regular Board business, many additional meetings have been held to revise the Subdivision Regulations. These are now being printed and will be available for purchase at \$4.00 per copy. The public hearing for them was held on August 24, 1987 with a relatively small attendance. We also revised and updated our Planning Board By-laws and are now in the process of updating the Minimum Road Standards of the Town of Danbury.

Several major developments have been approved or are pending. Virtually all of these have been by non-local developers.

The work of the Danbury Planning Board is hampered, to some significant extent, by the lack of an adequate office to operate out of. The regular meetings of the Board are held on the second Monday of each month and are posted at the Town Hall and other places in Town. The public is always welcome.

PEMI-BAKER SOLID WASTE DISTRICT INVESTIGATES AN ALTERNATIVE IN 1987

In 1986 the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District (PBSWD) developed a proposal to buy out the existing Plymouth Incinerator/Recycling Facility to handle the District's waste. The proposal included an upgrading of the facility by installing a new continuous feed incinerator and an expansion of the recycling activities. To establish this proposal as the best available solution to the waste disposal problem, the Pemi-Baker towns voted in March 1987 to fund a complete analysis of the buy-out proposal.

The District contracted with James Dohrman and Ted Siegler to perform

this analysis. Dohrman and Siegler concluded the following:

1. Intensive recycling will have a significant impact on incinerator sizing and ash disposal needs.

2. Both a 50 and 36 TPD incinerator would fit in the existing building, however due to the significant seasonal fluctuations and relatively small waste stream a 36-TPD unit is the most appropriate.

3. The Plymouth landfill site is limited in long-term capacity; therefore, an alternative site must be developed. Siting a new landfill in Rumney or contracting with an out-of-District landfill will be necessary.

4. Changes in state and federal regulations could have a significant impact (as much as 43% increase) on the total project costs.

Based on conclusion number four, the District contracted with Environmental Research Technologies to assess the air quality impact of an upgraded incinerator at the Beech Hill site in Plymouth. The initial air screening model results have been submitted to the state Air Resources Division for review, and a meeting, to more clearly define the requirement of air emission control devices, has been scheduled.

The District has also established that a landfill is an essential component of their proposal and plans to identify a site in 1988. Additionally, PBSWD will continue its investigation of other out-of-District options and actively promote recycling in 1988.

DANBURY RESCUE F.A.S.T. 1987

Completing our seventh full year of operation, the Danbury F.A.S.T. had seventeen calls for service from January 1, 1987 to December 31, 1987.

We welcomed a new memeber in late summer, Ray LaVallee, EMT. Ray is serving provisional time with us for six months before applying for National Registration.

The squad has filed with the state of New Hampshrie as a non-profit organization.

We have four EMT's and several auxiliary members. We welcome qualified new members.
