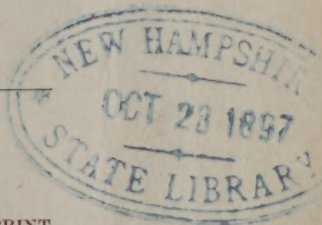



# WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING.

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

 L. S.  To the inhabitants of the town of Enfield, qualified to vote in town affairs.  
You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House, in said town, on Tuesday the 13th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.
- 2d. To choose by ballot and major vote a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, Treasurer and Overseer of the Poor.
- 3d. To choose all other necessary town officers and agents as the town may judge necessary to be chosen.
- 4th. To see how much money the town will raise to defray town charges for the year ensuing.
- 5th. To see how much money the town will raise for the support of schools for the year ensuing.
- 6th. To see how much money the town will raise for the support of highways the year ensuing.
- 7th. To see if the town will vote to raise money and how much for the support of County paupers residing in town, agreeable to pamphlet laws, Chap. 112, passed June session 1883.
- 8th. To see if the town will appropriate a sum not exceeding fifty dollars for memorial services, May 30th, 1888.
- 9th. To see if the town will take any action in regard to the delivery of blank inventories.
- 10th. To see if the town will vote to have the highway surveyors enter upon the duties of their office earlier than the 15th day of May, and instruct the selectmen to distribute the highway bills accordingly.

11th. To see if the town will vote to appoint an agent to sell what liquors and fixtures it has on hand.

12th. To see if the town will determine a compensation for the services of the Board of Education for the years 1886-7.

13th. To see if the town will instruct the selectmen in regard to any lawsuit it may have.

14th. To see if the town will vote to give to the Enfield Centre brass band the use of the town hall free for the purpose of practising and dancing in, or for holding any other entertainment they may want it for.

15th. To see if the town will vote to remove the seats at each end of the hall on the north side of the building, and let the floor down level with the main floor and make other needed repairs about the building.

16th. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation the firm of Spaulding & Abbott's shoe manufacturing establishment situated in Enfield Centre for the term of ten years.

17th. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation the capital invested in the Eclipse Corn Planter Company for the term of eight years.

18th. To see if the town will vote to license dogs.

19th. To hear the reports of agents, auditors and committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

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# SCHOOL REPORT.

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## BOARD OF EDUCATION.

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### DISTRICT NO. 1. (Special.)

The Board of Education for this district are pleased to report a prosperous school of 33 weeks in each department, during the past year, in charge of the same teachers as for the last three years, viz: Mr. Warren Pettengill in the Higher Department; Miss Hattie Dyer in the Intermediate and Miss Lizzie M. Williams in the Primary, and with the same satisfactory results. The scholars in former Districts, No. 2 and 9, have been received from the Town District on the same basis as last year, also the scholars from the "Cross District" in Hanover, and "Stevens' District" in Canaan, at a stated price, without materially crowding the rooms. A number of improvements have been made in and about the school buildings. The most prominent being the introduction of good running water, affording an abundant supply for all three departments. The house has been painted and changes made in the school rooms, especially in the Higher Department, and the good care which the teachers have taken of their respective rooms is a credit to themselves, the scholars and the district. Vocal music has been continued the same as for the two years past with marked improvement. The attendance has been large as can be seen by referring to the statistical table. The funds provided have, we think, been expended for the promotion of the best interests of the schools and everything is in good condition for another year.

SCHOOL REPORT FOR THE ENFIELD TOWN DISTRICT,

ENFIELD CENTRE.

Two departments. Miss S. Maria Hewes, teacher of the summer and fall school of the higher department. We were satisfied with the work Miss Hewes did in her school. She resigned her position at the close of the second term and Mr. Lester F. Smith took charge of the winter term. Without doubt Mr. Smith was the best qualified of any teacher we had in the district during the year. Those who attended school for the purpose of study, and we are glad to say there were some, who made decided improvement. We are of the opinion that he was intruded upon in his school by some who had not a pro-

per respect for common courtesy or civility. Yet he was dignified and courteous in all his relations with the school. A young man of scholarly habits, and without ostentation. 10 weeks each term. Wages of teacher and board summer and fall, \$22.00. Winter, \$32 00. Scholars summer and fall, 25, 31. Winter, 37.

Primary. Miss Clara M. Sargent, teacher for the summer school. Mrs. Josie P. White fall and winter. These teachers worked for the interest of their pupils. A profitable examination at the close of the summer and fall schools. Length of school each term 10 weeks. Number of scholars, summer 27, fall 29, winter 19. Wages of teacher per month, including board, for the year \$21.00.

#### EAST VILLAGE.

Lulu M. Bryant taught the summer and fall schools. Miss Bryant has had charge of this school for five consecutive terms. She proved herself a very acceptable teacher to the board of Education and a profitable one for the school. The school was impartially conducted and each term showed a marked improvement on the previous one in the progress of every pupil. Winter school, Florence B. Emerson teacher. At each visit to this school we found teacher and scholars working in harmony. The school was brought to a successful close. Wages of teachers per month, including board, \$20.00. Length of school for each term, 10 weeks. Average number scholars for the year, 11.

#### GEORGE HILL.

One term. G. F. Pettengill teacher. Length of school 10 weeks. Number of scholars 8. Wages of teacher per month including wood and board \$20.00.

#### EAST HILL.

Summer school. Mary E. Hall, teacher. Fall. Selina D. Pettengill, teacher. These teachers have had a large experience in teaching. They gave the school the benefit of their experience. The scholars were studious and orderly. Length of school in weeks, 10 for each term. Wages per month, including board, \$18.50. Number of scholars, 10. Winter school of six weeks taught by Clarence B. Morgan. This school for the length did well. Mr. Morgan taught for the first time. He readily adapted himself to his work of teaching. The school opened with ten scholars; this attendance was kept up until the severity of the weather and deep snows prevented the scholars from getting to school, as the school is composed mostly of small scholars. The last week there was only two or three who at-

tended, and no prospect of any more for the above reasons, so we thought it best to close the school at the end of the sixth week. Wages of teacher per month including board \$19.00.

#### OAK HILL.

Summer. Julia H. Kenyon, teacher. This school taken as a whole was a very good one. Length of school 10 weeks. Number of scholars, 5. Wages of teacher per month, including board, \$14.09. Eva J. Edwards was employed for the fall school. No school in the district showed more improvement than this. Miss Edwards is a very thorough teacher. Length of school, 11 weeks. Number of scholars, 6. Wages of teacher per month, including board, \$16.00.

#### MONT CALM.

Summer and fall school taught by Etta M. Ryder. Good order and thorough instruction characterized this school. Teacher and scholars were on duty promptly at 9 o'clock. Length of school, 10 weeks. Number of scholars, 10. Wages of teacher per month, including board, \$16.50. Winter term, Eva J. Edwards teacher. Considerable work was put into this school, and the examination at the close of the term showed that every scholar had been largely benefited. Length of school 10 weeks. Number of scholars, 9. Wages of teacher, per month including board, \$20.00.

#### SHAKER SCHOOL. (Church.)

Agnes E. Newton and Fannie F. Falon, teachers. Length of school for the year, 26 weeks. Wages of teacher per month, including board, \$21.00. Number of scholars; summer, 26; winter, 14. We report this school as one of our very best; it was thoroughly methodized every branch was studied and taught to obtain practical knowledge and solid facts without superfluity.

#### SOUTH FAMILY.

Annie M. Ellis teacher. Length of school 20 weeks. Number of scholars 12. Wages of teacher per month, including board, \$16.00. We found this school doing a good work at each visit. A good class in Anatomy and all other branches carefully taught.

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## REMARKS.

In reporting the schools to the district we are enabled through a judicious selection of teachers, and a careful supervision of the schools to report them quite satisfactory. The schools have been consolida-

ted so far as they could be without too great inconvenience. There has resulted from this union of schools a growth in the progress of every pupil who has attended school that must be apparent to the unprejudiced mind. We do not think it necessary to report the schools at great length. We have endeavored to retain the same teacher in the school whenever they proved efficient just as long as we could. We are convinced from experience that is the duty of the School Board to make just as few changes in teachers as possible. When we have a good teacher keep them if they will stay, in no other way will the schools reach the high standard of excellence which should be the glory and pride of the district and town. We have an unexpended sum from last year's school funds, and if the school can be managed on the same basis as in the past we do not think it will be necessary to appropriate very much for the year to come for schools beyond what the law gives, and yet support as much school as last year, though we would not recommend parsimoniousness in caring for the schools.
