

Chief Engineer's Report.

In compliance with the law, I herewith submit my fifth annual report, giving account of fires and alarms for the year and the condition of the apparatus under my charge.

We have responded to twelve alarms during the year. April 30, at Exeter Machine Works; damage \$400, covered by insurance. April 27, at John G. C. Lord's, Linden street; damage \$100, insured. May 8, unfinished house of Bradbury York, Winter street; total loss, insured for \$400. August 11, in Swasey's woods. September 18, at Samuel B. Dyer's, upper Front street, damage \$1,500; insured. October 7, at Nathaniel Gordon's greenhouse, Pine street; damage, \$1,000, partially covered by insurance. November 28, on upper Front street, stable owned by John F. Goodell; total loss, insured for \$400. December 11, small blaze in a tenement house owned by Daniel Sanborn, in the Gilman field; damage nominal. December 12, small blaze on the roof of a house owned by W. F. Putnam, damage slight. January 14, house occupied by George E. Warren, Court street, caused by overturned lamp; damage \$200, insured. February 12, house on River street, cause unknown; damage \$75, insured. February 13, false alarm.

The new system of fire alarm is working with satisfaction, as far as it goes. The alarm boxes are too far apart and we need about six more, located at different points on the line, with possibly some changes in the line at some places. I would recommend the purchase of six more alarm boxes. We have seen the advantage of those we have; let us make the system better if we can. A few minutes at the beginning of a fire are worth hours when it has got under headway.

We are also deficient in hydrants, in some localities, in regard to which there is an article in the warrant.

The house for Hose Company, No. 3, has been built on land

leased of the Boston and Maine railroad, near the Front street crossing, and is already occupied.

We have changed our old hook and ladder truck for a new and lighter one, which is appreciated by the department.

The apparatus under my charge and the department generally was never in better condition than at the present time. In conclusion, I extend my thanks to the people in general and to members of the department for their support in all matters which tend to improve the department. I think the present efficiency of the Fire Department compares favorably with past years and I trust it will continue to do so.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT.

THE HONORABLE BOARD OF TRUSTEES:

I respectfully submit to you the following report:

NORMAL DEPARTMENT.

The change of time for organizing and graduating classes in this department is now fully accomplished. On the fifth day of June occurred the third graduation, when two young ladies received diplomas. The programme included professional essays and teaching exercises of a high order of excellence. The diplomas were presented by Dr. D. B. Hager, principal of Salem, Mass., Normal School. In September a class of thirteen pupils, ten of whom were graduates from our Academic course, began work under Miss Wiggin's instruction.

This department is accomplishing more for our graduates, for the promotion of the interests of our school and of good teaching than I had even hoped for in recommending its establishment. Of twenty-four graduates sixteen are, or have been, engaged in teaching. Several have shown great proficiency in their work and with very few exceptions the graduates have demonstrated the value of their instructions. The manner in which the principles, theories and methods of teaching is presented to our pupils is masterly, but the opportunity for exercises with classes of children is much too limited. Some plan must be devised as soon as possible by which our Normal pupils may have an opportunity to instruct daily classes of little children.

LATIN AND COLLEGE PREPARATORY DEPARTMENTS.

There are now four girls fitting for college. Their work in Latin is identical with that of the Academic classes. In Mathematics they are required to cover more ground than pupils of other courses. A considerable part of the time required for the cooking lessons has been taken from the recitation hours of the Latin classes. The

present Senior class will, at the end of the year, have read more Latin than any former class since my connection with the school. Next term this class will take up the study of Ovid. Daniell's Latin prose has been substituted for Jones's, and Collar's new book, "Gate to Cæsar," has been adopted in the Fifth grade and is proving a very valuable little work.

DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH.

By the adoption of some changes recommended last year the study of American Literature and of the elements of Rhetoric are taken up in the Fourth instead of the Fifth classes. By this means more time will be devoted to the important study of Botany in the fifth year. The Fourth class is now engaged in the critical study of Washington Irving and Hawthorne. The study of Ancient and Mediæval history has been taken from the Fourth year, a place much too early in the course, and must later be inserted in the Sixth year.

DRAWING DEPARTMENT.

With the older classes more time is devoted to drawing from solid models and casts. The collection of casts and models has been enlarged by recent purchases and a case fitted up in the drawing room for their safe preservation. With the younger classes much time is devoted to accurate mechanical drawing. An important aid to this end is the "Springfield Industrial Drawing Kit" which has been furnished to each pupil.

DEPARTMENTS OF ARITHMETIC, LANGUAGE AND GEOGRAPHY.

The teaching of the elements of Algebra has been transferred from Miss Baker to Miss Chase in order that all the mathematics in the Preparatory course may be under the care of one teacher. Elementary composition work is required of the First and Second classes to apply the language principles taught. A MacCoun's Historical Chart has been secured for the class in United States History and is a wonderful help in fixing the facts of the development of our country. The classes in Natural History and Geography have taken much interest in making collections of specimens of animal life, woods, minerals, etc. Several dollars have been expended in procuring mounted birds and insects for the use of Miss Moulton's classes. Such collections are indispensable for Natural History,

and in the modern methods of making Geography real and interesting they serve a very important part.

DEPARTMENT OF DOMESTIC SCIENCE.

At the time of submitting my last report the first year's lessons in cooking were not completed. The interest in the work was sustained to the end of the course. Of the proficiency acquired by the young ladies in that course you are now able to judge for yourselves, having generously furnished from your own pockets the means of a practical examination and demonstration in that department. This year the work was arranged for three classes. The work in the First, somewhat more elementary than that of last year, has been taken by the Fifth and Fourth classes. The Second class is composed of the pupils who took First Course last year, and the Third class is made up of Normal pupils and the undergraduate girls who were in the Second class last year. In estimating the value of this department it is necessary to find an answer to the inquiry: Will it make our girls better housekeepers and home makers? Much of the answer is still in the future. Some of the girls do not like the work and never will, but I hear from many mothers that their daughters are more interested in the affairs of the household now and that there are enthusiastic workers in the kitchen of a Saturday morning who were seldom found there before we established the cooking courses. The objects to be sought by the cooking courses are a knowledge of the best ways of doing economical cooking. familiarity with improved cooking utensils, and food preparations. To these should be added a knowledge of the cost of food materials, the relations of foods to the nourishment of the body and their hygienic properties. I intend to arrange the instructions in Chemistry and Physiology so that these studies shall help to that end. I think it will be better to have but two courses in future and to have special instructions given with the demonstration lectures along the lines I have indicated.

BURLINGAME BREAD PRIZES.

These prizes were a great stimulus to practical cooking last year. At the contest more than sixty loaves of bread were offered, and nearly every loaf was so excellent as to be worthy of a prize. The donor renews his offer and I am confident that at the second contest more and better bread will be exhibited than was seen last year.

LECTURES.

The Cooking course was fittingly and pleasantly brought to a close last year with a lecture on "Domestic Culture" by Mrs. Mary A. Livermore which was received by our girls with great profit. I hope that we may secure the services of an equally cultivated lecturer for a similar occasion this year. In December Hon. J. C. A. Wingate, of Stratham, gave us an exceedingly interesting lecture on "India."

PHYSICAL CULTURE.

In conformity with your recent vote I am taking the first steps for the establishment of a department of Physical Culture. The Normal class have taken possession of the studio, leaving their former class-room to be fitted up as a Gymnasium. The black boards in the latter room have been covered with sheathing for their protection. I have ordered from Horace Partridge & Co., a supply of dumb bells and wands which ought to be received this week. The work for this year will consist of "setting up drill" and exercises with bells and wands. These are first steps toward what I trust will soon be a thorough and carefully conducted system of physical training in the Seminary. In taking these steps and in determining what is best for our school, I have consulted highest authorities and visited many schools and gymnasiums. I am particularly indebted for advice and suggestions to Dr. Otis; Miss Allen, of the Allen Gymnasium; Dr. Sargent, of the Hemenway Gymnasium at Cambridge, and Dr. Hartwell, Director of Physical Culture in the Boston schools.

THE BUILDING.

Since my last report many improvements have been made in the interior of our building. The painting and decorating of our chapel, together with the new ventilator, have transformed it into a beautiful and comfortable audience room. I earnestly hope that it will be possible for you to make further improvements in the same direction the coming summer. The employment of a janitress is a long step of improvement which teachers and pupils greatly appreciate. The introduction of the town water, supplies a long standing need for an abundance of water under a strong head for flushing out the closets. I recommend that the old and defective pans in the closets in the basement be replaced by those of modern

construction. With that change the building will be in a perfect sanitary condition. During the Christmas vacation the walls of the chemical laboratory and lecture room were tinted and the wood and metal work painted and stained, and the floors oiled, making those rooms now among the neatest and most attractive in the building. The old book case was fitted up into a most excellent mineral case and placed in the lecture room. I am arranging our minerals, which have received large additions this year, in two cases for exhibition in this room, and to be used in connection with the study of Chemistry and Geology.

GIFTS.

I am pleased to gratefully acknowledge the following gifts to the Seminary: From Mr. Horace B. Cobbs, a set of charts of the Pacific ocean; from Mr. A. C. Grout, minerals from Colorado; from Mr. H. H. Moses, two lots of valuable minerals and fossils, and numerous other specimens from friends and pupils of the school; from the Rev. George E. Street, a megalathoscope for the exhibition of photographs and a choice collection of photographs of European works of Art; from the Normal class of '91, a bust of Juno for the Art Collection and busts of Fræbel and Pestalozzi and a portrait of Horace Mann for the Normal room; from Mrs. A. T. Frye, a sum of money for the Art Collection.

· ART COLLECTION.

I have been enabled to make decided progress in my plan for the acquisition of a representative collection of works of Art for the Seminary. Since September from the proceeds of the young ladies' concert, of the sale of *Our Magazine*, and of Mrs. Frye's gift I have been enabled to expend \$121.80 in the purchase of casts and photographs. A package of photographs from Rome is now waiting clearance in the New York Custom House and another is on its way from Munich. I shall hope to obtain additional funds to place these upon the walls of our chapel and of the halls before the end of this school year.

I thank you all very cordially for your support and for your readiness to lend me all possible aid in carrying out my plans for the advancement of our school.

The history of the Library for the past twelve months must be mainly a repetition of that embodied in previous reports. The increase has at least equalled that of former years, amounting to about five hundred volumes, exclusive of pamphlets and a few more substantial books which await rebinding and classification. The volumes in actual use now number 7,500. In regard to the more

essential feature of quality there is the testimony of impartial witnesses, who have examined the shelves, that they know of no other library of the class which contains less trash; and yet few deserving books of the day long remain unpurchased.

It has been the design of the committee, without neglecting the wants of the general reader, to provide for the special requirements of students of every class. It would be impossible with the money available so to fill every department that earnest searchers could ask for nothing more, but something will be found regarding political economy, sociology, the causes of crime, architecture, the various mechanic and fine arts, athletic and other sports, physical and moral culture, and a score of other topics of present and permanent importance. History, biography and works of travel, of course, are not neglected.

A growing library becomes more valuable every year, and constantly requires more room for the disposition of its treasures. It should also be safely placed, and accommodations should be furnished for those who wish to study up a subject without carrying books away. The Town Library owns complete sets of the Encyclopædia Britannica and its American supplement; The Dictionary of American Biography in six volumes octavo, and other works too bulky and too valuable for general circulation. If used they must be consulted at the library, and for the increasingly numerous class of studious visitors there are no proper accommodations. Moreover, there is space for very few more books, unless the rooms of the Natural History Society can be utilized, or a gallery is built on the top of the present alcoves. There are several serious objections to both these plans, but only one needs to be specified, viz.: the great insecurity of the building in which the library is kept. Several thousand volumes collected during nearly forty years, many of which could not be replaced for less than double their former price, and others which are scarce and out of print, are at the mercy of any chance spark that may kindle in the building or in one of the adjacent wooden structures. There is no economy in this, and new and virtually fire proof quarters should be sought with the least possible delay. The Library Committee believes that it has reached the limits of its duty in emphasizing the want, leaving to its fellow citizens, in town meeting assembled, the decision as to the best method of remedying the inadequacies and discomfort of the present situation. It should be said, however, that next to the safety of the books, provision for readers should be looked after, and a reading room well stocked with the leading periodicals would double the usefulness of the institution and would especially provide healthful evening occupation for those of our citizens who are busy through the day and have few home facilities for mental improvement.

The daily opening of the Library, mentioned last year as a successful experiment, is an experiment no longer. It has indicated the wisdom of those who suggested it, and the only wonder now is that this advance step was delayed so long. There is urgent need of a good catalogue for the Liberary, a lack which has been partially supplied by the completion of a card catalogue and issue of a leaflet, and by posters. In the opinion of the committee it would be inadvisable to publish a new catalogue, or even a supplement just now, when there is a possibility of a transference of the books to new quarters. Such a removal would necessitate re-arrangement and re-numbering, thus rendering either catalogue or supplement of no account. The preparation of a full catalogue would occupy much time, and perhaps require extra assistance, and in a few months would, like the former ones, become imperfect. The only perpetually complete catalogue is one on the card plan, now in use at the Library, but some other help to visitors is required, even if it be short lived in its perfect form. This, however, is subordinate in interest to the primary question—a change of quarters. Thanks are due to several generous donors of books during the year, among whom Mr. and Mrs. Abner L. Merrill and the Rev. Jacob Chapman deserve special mention.

The Committee would ask for the usual appropriation for the support and increase of the Library.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Exeter qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting and for the

ensuing year.

To choose by ballot and major vote, a Town Clerk.
 To choose by ballot and major vote, three Selectmen.

4. To choose by ballot, one trustee of the Robinson Female

Seminary for the term of seven years.

5. Upon petition of S. G. Morse and ten others, "to see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to employ regularly, three policemen, for night and for day duty, and raise and appropriate money to pay for the same."

6. Upon petition of A. J. Hoyt and fourteen others, "to see whether the town will vote to choose by ballot and by major vote, three health officers, seven constables and seven police officers for

the ensuing year."

7. To choose all other necessary town officers, Auditors or Com-

mittees for the ensuing year.

8. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, for the maintenance of the poor, for repairing the highways, for repairing and building sidewalks, for repairing and building bridges, for building drains and sewers, for the payment of the town debt, for lighting the streets, for defraying the expenses of decorating the graves of Union soldiers and for all other charges arising within the town, fix the price of labor on the highways and the pay of firemen for the ensuing year.

9. Upon petition of Bradbury L. Cilley and eighteen others, "to see what action the town will take relative to completing the macadamizing of those portions of the streets which the town formerly voted to macadamize but which have not yet been macadamized and to appoint all necessary committees to carry such action into effect;

and to see what sum of money the town will raise for macadamizing streets of the town, and in what way such money shall be raised."

10. To see if the town will vote to alter, enlarge or improve the old County building, and to fit up the same for a Town Library or to rebuild the same and appropriate such sum as may be deemed necessary for that purpose.

To see what sum the town will raise to improve the Gilman

Park.

To see if the town will accept the Drinking Fountain on Water street.

13. Upon petitions of H. B. Cobbs and others, "To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to contract with the Exeter Water Works for placing a hydrant on Front street, between Elm and Elliot streets and one on Vine street at a cost not to exceed twenty dollars a year for each hydrant and also to contract

for a hydrant at the corner of Front and Cottage streets."

14. To see if the town will vote to establish street lights as follows. One at the corner of Front and Winter streets, one on Winter street near the Pound, one on Winter street opposite Merrill field and one at the corner of Winter and Main streets, one on High street opposite the residence of Miles Avery, one on High street near the residence of James Watson, also on Cottage and Washington streets.

15. Upon petition of C. E. Warren and twenty-four others, "To see if the town will vote to raise five hundred dollars or so much thereof as shall be needed to defray the expense of putting in six

or more fire alarm boxes."

16. Upon petition of Alfred Conner and others, "To see if the town will vote to build a new highway from Lincoln street through the Robinson Female Seminary grounds and the adjoining lands to Main street as indicated by plans made by Arthur W. Dudley."

17. Upon petition of Frank W. Swallow and eighteen others,

"To see if the town will accept Cottage street as now laid out."
