State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the town of Haverhill qualified to vote in town matters: —

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said town on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, 1922, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following matters:—

Article 1. To choose a town clerk.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the selectmen, treasurer, cemetery commissioners, and any other town officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To choose one selectman for the term of two years, one selectman for the term of three years, a town treasurer, one or more highway agents, one or more auditors, one library trustee for the term of three years, one cemetery commissioner for the term of five years, one trustee of trust funds for the term of three years, and all other necessary town officers.

Article 4. To raise and appropriate money for the support of the poor.

Article 5. To raise and appropriate money for the construction of state trunk line roads.

Article 6. To raise and appropriate money for maintenance of state trunk line roads.

Article 7. To raise and appropriate money for the construction of state aid roads.

Article 8. To raise and appropriate money for maintenance of state aid roads.

Article 9. To raise and appropriate money for laying out, building and repairing highways and bridges.

Article 10. To see if the town will authorize the purchase of a steam roller, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

Article 11. To see if the town will authorize the purchase of a stone crusher, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

Article 12. To see if the town will authorize the purchase of a tractor, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

Article 13. To raise and appropriate money to pay interest and principal of outstanding town notes.

Article 14. To raise and appropriate money for town libraries.

Article 15. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day.

Article 16. To raise and appropriate money for the support of the Cottage Hospital.

Article 17. To raise and appropriate money to fight white pine blister rust in said town.

Article 18. To raise and appropriate money for other town charges.

Article 19. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to issue prescription permits to druggists.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to appoint a budget committee to supervise the appropriations of said town and to recommend to the next annual meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to es-

establish one or more voting districts and additional polling places therein, as provided for by Chapter 30, Laws of 1919.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to establish times for opening and closing the polls at the primaries and biennial elections of 1922, complying at the same time with all existing state laws.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to direct a discount to be made to those persons who shall pay their taxes within ninety days after their tax bills are made out, the amount of this discount to be determined after a discussion under this article.

Article 24. To transact any other business proper to come before said meeting.

Report of Selectmen

To the Citizens and Taxpayers of Haverhill:

The Selectmen submit herewith their report for the year ending January 31st, 1922. Upon the following pages will be found detailed statements.

FINANCIAL

The Town's indebtedness during the past fiscal year has been reduced \$7,327.75, so that the indebtedness of the Town now amounts to \$39,397.18. Owing to a misunderstanding of the state law concerning poll tax payments to the state, the sum of \$1972 was paid during the past fiscal year which should have been paid in the year ending January 31st, 1921; we also have reduced the Bracey lot from \$1,000 to \$300, a loss of \$700. Consequently the indebtedness of the Town was really reduced this past fiscal year \$9,999.75.

HIGHWAYS

In accordance with vote passed at the 1921 Town Meeting, the Selectmen appointed a highway agent and a deputy. Altogether this plan worked very well and a continuance is recommended for next year of this same general plan. By reason of unexpected and highly necessary brush cutting along the highways, and perhaps a slightly too ambitious program for permanent work, the appropriation was slightly over-run; however, the highway expenditures this past year were thousands of dollars less than the preceding year, when the total expenditures amounted to \$27,502.17.

Annual School Report

WOODSVILLE UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Woodsville Union High School District:

For my eleventh annual report I submit the following facts:

The total registration in grades I to VI is 228, in the junior high school 86, and in the high school 155. This makes the total 469, some 15 more than last year. This increase is largely in high school tuition pupils.

The list of teachers shows but three changes since last year's report. These were in the high school faculty. Below are given the names of the teachers and the positions they occupy.

Senior High School: G. Hampton McGaw, Headmaster, French, Spanish and United States constitutional history; Merrill A. Bigelow, Sub-master, science and mathematics, history, literature and B and C subjects; Catherine A. Tuttle, Latin and English; M. Virginia Musk, history and English; Lena E. Shorey, domestic arts and English.

Junior High School: Nettie W. McCoy, Principal, mathematics, history, literature and B and C subjects; Manola H. Cutting, French, science, history and B and C subjects; Esther Balch Mitchell, domestic science and manual training.

Grades: Helen A. Franklin, VI; Mary Mitchell Mann, V; E. Mae Hastings, IV; Beatrice P. Shaw, III; Marjorie G. Morrison, II; Emelda A. Chamberland, I.

Music: Hattie Richardson Meachem.

Each year the quality and quantity of the work done in the grades has improved. More is accomplished now in six grades than in eight ten years ago. Besides, the course of study is fuller and richer in content. Three or four times the amount of reading is required with greater variety. Subjects formerly never mentioned like thrift, health, good citizenship, etc., are now emphasized. Music has come to have a definite amount of time each day. I am confident that the children are each year getting a little bigger and better preparation for the problems they are later to meet.

While the junior high school adds new subjects like French, science, algebra and concrete geometry, time is allowed for reviews in all of the fundamentals. It is not intended that arithmetic, grammar, spelling and the like shall be forgotten. The teachers here are trained for elementary school work and for this reason are less likely to slight the fundamentals for the advanced work. The practical arts in the sixth grade and junior high has become a very valuable part of the required work. There is plenty of proof that this sort of training is practical from the reports brought in of actual application in the home.

McAllister, Marion Noyes, Una Reynolds, William Roy, Nelson Roy, George Sault, Helen Sault, Thelma Sault, Haines Schoff, Richard Stevens, Clarence Thayer, Undine Waldron, Lulu White, Isabelle Workman, Edith Wilkins, Jessie Woodbury, Elizabeth Wilson, Richard Welch.

The pupils in the lower and intermediate grades still find the school bank a popular institution. The older pupils might well profit by their example and save the small amounts which otherwise would be spent in unnecessary if not wasteful ways. On January 24,

1922, there was on deposit in the Woodsville Savings Bank \$484.86. Interest is paid on any amount at the regular savings bank rate plus a small dividend from the sale of bank books, etc.

The change in the state school law in 1920, requiring districts to raise a \$5 tax on every \$1000 of equalized valuation before receiving state aid, eliminated Woodsville Union District from the group of towns eligible to such assistance. Thus the whole burden of supporting its schools falls upon the district in the form of taxation except for such sums as come from the dog tax, the Southard fund, and the tuitions. From tuitions alone this year the district will probably collect over \$3000.

Medical inspection has continued to show excellent results. During the past year 177 cases of adenoids, tonsils, defective teeth and defective vision have received treatment. Occasional inspection of the grade rooms keeps the children interested in the proper health habits. The teachers too, are emphasizing in various ways this phase of school room work and are giving more frequently vigorous physical exercises during the sessions for rest and change of position. Miss Underhill has again taken charge of this work and given most effective service. There have been 83 visits made to the homes of those pupils whose need for treatment was greatest.

The appended report of Headmaster McGaw gives some interesting facts relative to the high school. The continued increase in enrollment, especially of non-resident pupils, and the small per cent of loss except for valid reasons is a sure indication of a successful school. I very much doubt whether there is another high school of the same size in the state which is doing more effective all round work. Deputy Commissioner May makes these statements in regard to the work of the past year: "In looking over the Work Reports of Woodsville High School the following deserve special commendation: (1) The exceeding of the standards by 173 pages in Spanish V. (2) Exceeding the standards in reading in French II by 726 pages. (3) Exceeding the standards in reading in French III by 850 pages. (4)

The report of B and C work. (5) The excellent record for tardiness, one of the best in the state, of 1-10 per pupil."

The work all along the line seems to show progress. I believe the community may justly be proud, if not boastful of its schools. It would be extremely helpful to teachers and all concerned if parents and other citizens would give a little time to actual inspection of this big plant where we are trying to turn out good citizens in embryo and give to teachers and school authorities the benefit of their criticisms both good and bad.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I offer herewith my fourth annual report of the Woodsville High School, covering the second half of the school year 1920-21, and the first half of the present school year 1921-1922, which half ends today.

The program of studies for 1921-1922 follows:

Academic Curriculum:—First year: English; Latin; Algebra; French. Second year: English; Caesar; Geometry; French. Third year: English; Cicero; Physics; Commercial Geography. Third year: English; Physics; (and two of) Modern History or Spanish or Household Organization. Fourth year: English; U. S. History; Economics.

General Curriculum:—First year: English; History of Civilization; (and two of) Algebra or French or Household Appliances. Second year: English; Geometry; (and two of) Science or French or Nursing or Commercial Geography. Third year: English; (and two of) Modern History or Spanish or Household Organization. Fourth year: English; U. S. History; Economics; (and two of) Chemistry or Review Mathematics or Spanish or Household Management.

Commercial Curriculum:—First year: English; Bookkeeping; (and two of) Algebra or French or Household Appliances or History of Civilization. Second year: English; Bookkeeping (and two of) Geometry or Science or French or Nursing or Commercial Geography. Third year: English; Stenography; (and two of) Physics or Household Organization or Spanish or Modern History. Fourth year: English; Stenography; U. S. History; (and two of) Economics or Household Management or Chemistry or Review Mathematics or Spanish.

One of the most difficult things is to select the most suitable course of study at the beginning of High School days. Too many pupils choose what appears to be easy or attractive and later regret that they have not had the real foundation subjects. A pupil who likes to study and wants to get the best development during these early years makes no mistake in selecting the old-fashioned Academic Curriculum—Latin, alge-

bra, geometry, French, physics, history and the rest. For such pupils a year of bookkeeping, stenography, or household arts may readily be added as an extra.

In common with most other schools in the country we are finding the capacity of the building taxed by numbers. The registration in 1917-1918 was 99 pupils; at present it is 155; this means an increase in attendance of over 56 per cent during four years. Several classes have too many pupils for effective work, and it is necessary to hold recitations in the auditorium as no other room is large enough.

About one-third of the pupils stay at the building for noon lunch. Most of these patronize the "hot dish" which is prepared by members of the domestic arts classes, and which is sold at cost; the price averages forty cents a week.

Three teachers new this year and three who served last year make up the corps of instructors. The school work would be more effective if teachers could be secured who would stay for several years, thus adding a basis of permanency to the instruction.

The interior of the school house was redecorated during the last summer, and the building is now one of the neatest in the state. Special mention should be made of the fine lighting of each room and of the harmonious tinting of the walls.

A balopticon projection apparatus has been purchased with funds gathered through Lyceum activities during the past three years. This outfit together with necessary dark shades at the windows has cost about two hundred and ninety dollars. The machine shows not only slides but also opaque pictures and text from books. The Lyceum treasury has supplied also a Bible, a silk flag for the platform, and a new international Webster dictionary.

During the summer vacation a circular of seven pages descriptive of the school and its work was printed on the rotary neostyle and widely distributed in this locality.

The twenty-fifth graduation was held on June 16, 1921, in the Opera House, Mrs. Mary D. Randall, who with her late husband and with other citizens was active in establishing the school a quarter century ago, gave the address at the presentation of diplomas; she reviewed the efforts of those earlier days, and pointed out the progress made since. Also, special note was made of the fact that this class included one member who is the first child of alumni to graduate, Phyllis Howland, both of whose parents graduated in the class of 1902. First honor in the class of 1921 was taken by Eva A. Darling, and second honor by Laurent Roy. The nineteen graduates in this class are: Ula M. Blake, Marcellus N. Brown, Madine H. Colby, Ellen H. Cromwell, Eva A. Darling, Harold E. Eames, Mildred V. Fletcher, Cleo J. George, Isabelle A. Howe, Phyllis M. Howland, Meda Kugelman, Carrie S. Lane, Hildegarde L. Pebbles, Jean Ross, Laurent A. Roy, Carolyn S. Trumpass, Helen W. Weare, Mabel M. White, Hazel M. Whitney.

Five of those graduates are attending Plymouth Normal School, and five others have entered various schools and colleges, Woodsville is at present represented by twenty-one recent graduates who are attending higher institutions of learning.

The twenty-fifth Prize Speaking contest was held on May 27, 1921. As usual ten contestants participated, five boys and five girls. First prizes were awarded to John Battis and Jeanette Mann, and second prizes to James Joseph and Margaret Rowden; honorable mention was made of Norman Page and Arlene Henderson.

A group of boys attended the State Y. M. C. A. conference in Nashua last December; the school nurse has made her annual health inspection and recommended to parents needed medical attention; in both March and December the school gave a minstrel show; also an operetta, "Princess Chrysanthemum," with a chorus of seventy voices was performed in the Opera House in May; the Junior "Prom" was held in May; the orchestra has lost by graduation more than half of its former members and is at low ebb at present; the "Cycle" and the Lyceum continue their functions; and

frequent evening gatherings for social, literary, or athletic events are well sustained by pupils and visitors. The great need of the village is a hall suitable for recreation and games, for the school auditorium is not large enough and is hardly a suitable place for energetic games.

In athletics W. H. S. enjoys an enviable reputation. The boys' team in basketball has always played any team that challenged and has taken a majority of the challengers into camp. The girls began basketball only two years ago, but last season, 1920-1921, they were defeated only once and this season the team has made a very successful start.

The Alumni Association has now nearly 200 members, many of them holding responsible positions through training received in their High School courses. The association is striving for a closer relationship to the school. This year they are planning to celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of the first graduation. The annual banquets are held during Christmas week, and have aroused great interest.

The school seal bears the words "Woodsville High School" enclosing an ancient lamp standing upon a book, underneath which is the motto, "Unto the End." This seal has been adopted as the standard design for class pins and rings, each class placing its numerals at the bottom of the design under the motto.

The spirit sought to be inculcated throughout all school activities is expressed in these principles—

- (1) Frank, truthful speech.
- (2) Unaffected courtesy.
- (3) Doing well what ought to be done.
- (4) Doing it on time.

Report of the School Board of Haverhill

The undersigned members of the Haverhill School Board take pleasure to call the attention of the voters and taxpayers to the various reports covering the activities for the past year, more particularly to the annual reports of our superintendent and head master of Haverhill Academy, both of which would indicate progress.

The feature most outstanding for the past year was the extensive repair work on the Old Court House—now called "Alumni Hall." The work was carried out by the School Board, aided by a Citizens' committee, consisting of Messrs. Herbert E. Smith, Wm. Ingalls, Wesley White, Frank L. Keyes and Arthur K. Merrill. With its present remodeled interior the hall can be pointed out with just pride as one of the best in the northern section of our state. A hot air furnace has been installed and will be paid for by the Alumni association and the association is giving a series of dances and entertainments for the purpose of raising money for further needed improvements in the hall, like dressing rooms, stage equipment, etc. The building should also be painted on the outside in the near future.

Among other special repair work accomplished was the re-shingling of the roofs of both the Haverhill academy building and Pearson hall.

In accordance with the vote taken at the last district meeting the school board purchased a piece of land of Miss M. N. Eastman for play-ground at Brier Hill school and a piece of land from Hiram H. Buck for suitable play ground at Ladd Street school.

ly in back of the school building does not lend itself favorable for the purpose intended. It is a regular swamp and it has been estimated by the board that it would involve an outlay of several hundred dollars to drain and pipe the land, so as to make it a satisfactory play ground. The board approached Mrs. Guy Dearborn with the view of purchasing a piece of land situated in north-easterly direction from the school building and perfectly dry and satisfactory in every respect, but Mrs. Dearborn could not be induced to sell it.

In order to acquaint the taxpayers with the financial condition of the district at the present time we beg to submit a financial statement showing the approximate assets and liabilities of the district.

The school board also desires to draw the attention of the voters and taxpayers of the district to the budget for the fiscal year from July 1, 1922 to June 30, 1923 in this report.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Haverhill School District:

I offer for your consideration the following facts as my eleventh annual report.

The total number of pupils registered to date in all schools is 391 as compared with 336 at this time last year. The number in each school with the name of the teacher is here given.

Haverhill Academy—70, Justus C. Bailey, Headmaster; E. A. Janes, Sub-Master; Carl E. Howland, Edith F. Stoughton and Edith C. Morrill, assistants. Haverhill Grammar—24, Minnie E. Morris; Haverhill

Primary—23, Florence S. Lang; Ladd Street—31, G. Enrita Brock; North Haverhill Grammar—18, Mary E. B. Coolidge; North Haverhill Intermediate—22, Hilma Swanson; North Haverhill Primary—35, Sadie R. Carr; Brier Hill—19, Hazel Crook McDonald; Center Haverhill—21, Marion White Young; Number Ten—9, Frances M. White; Number Six—21, Gladys J. Dunkley; East Haverhill Grammar—21, Mildred M. Foster; East Haverhill Primary—22, Maude M. Harris; Pike Grammar—19, Altha E. Walker; Pike Intermediate—16, Elsie Fletcher; Pike Primary—20, Mabel Tragansa; Practical Arts, Ethel W. Wheeler.

Of the twenty-one teachers in town only five were new to their positions in September. At the middle of the year Callie Davis Peters took the place of Marion White Young, who resigned on account of ill health.

The attendance of all the schools in town for the year 1920-21 averaged 94 per cent and the number of tardinesses dropped from 1157 in 1919-20 to 762. Considering the situation of the Haverhill schools and the distance many of the pupils must travel, the above results show an excellent spirit on the part of parents and pupils as well as commendable persistence of the teachers. Attendance at school is the pupil's business which he should be taught to pursue with the same zeal and regularity as he must show in later years, if he is to be successful in any pursuit.

Under the revised school law, school districts must raise for elementary schools a tax of \$5 on every \$1,000 of equalized valuation in order to qualify for state aid and no town shall receive over \$6,000 in any one year. The State Board has allowed Haverhill for the present school year the maximum amount, \$6,000. The \$5 tax amounts to \$9,826.86.

Medical inspection has been continued with Miss Underhill as school nurse. During the fall term all of the pupils in town were carefully examined, weighed, measured, and a record of all defects made. Since a year ago 176 cases of various kinds have received treatment. Miss Underhill has also made 57 visits to the homes of those children who especially needed treatment to talk the matter over with the parents. This is valuable educational work and the results have been most encouraging. Teachers are making an effort in various ways to teach their pupils practical hygiene and proper habits.

The report of the Headmaster of Haverhill academy is appended. It will be noted that the school is larger than for some years, that the attendance is excellent, and that there is a considerable increase in tuition pupils. The school is listed as a Smith-Hughes school because it fulfills the requirements of the federal law and will receive its share of federal aid allotted to this state, for advancing the study of agriculture in secondary schools. Because the work in agriculture in this school is so satisfactory, the state college in the spring term of 1921 sent here one of its seniors for observation and practice teaching. Deputy Commissioner May speaks of the work of last year as follows: "I find the following especially commendable: (1) Per cent of attendance of 96. (2) The reading of 174 pages in excess of the standards in French I and 207 pages in excess in French II."

All the rooms in the academy building badly need tinting and varnishing. With the exception of 25 chair desks in the high school room the desks are the oldest and poorest in town. New desks should be put in for the comfort of the pupils if for no other reason. If the building at Number Ten is to continue in use, some repairs need to be made and the building painted. The

one room schools need painting and tinting inside and a coat of paint on the outside. School buildings should be as attractive and comfortable as the best homes in the community. Some means should be employed for keeping the rural schools cleaner. A nasty school room is not the ideal environment for teaching that "Cleanliness is next to Godliness."

I wish to express my appreciation of the helpful attitude of all those who have been associated with me in the work of the year.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER OF HAVERHILL ACADEMY

To the Superintendent of Schools, Sir:—

I present herewith my fourth annual report.

Haverhill academy offers four courses of study.

The subjects given under each follow:

Academic Curriculum:—First year: English, Algebra, Ancient History, Latin I. Second year:—Eng-

lish II, Geometry, French I, Latin II. Third year:—English III, Physics, French II, Latin III. Fourth year:—English IV, U. S. Constitutional History, Latin IV, (Elect one), Math. Review, Senior Math., Chemistry, or French III.

English Curriculum:—First year: English, Algebra, Ancient History, Arithmetic and Bookkeeping. Second year: English II, Geometry, Med. and Modern History, French I. Third year: English III, Physics, French II, English History. Fourth year: English IV, U. S. Constitutional History, Math. Review, or Senior Math., (Elect one) Chemistry or French III.

Agricultural Curriculum:—First year: English I, Ancient History, Animal Husbandry I, Shop Work. Second year: English II, Med. and Modern History, Plant Production, Shop Work. Third year: English III, Physics, Animal Husbandry II, Farm Engineering. Fourth year: (Elect one) English IV or Chemistry, U. S. Constitutional History, Farm Management, Forestry and Rural Life Problems.

Domestic Arts Curriculum:—First year: English I, Ancient History, Household Appliances, (Elect one) Latin I or Practical Math. Second year: English II, Nursing and Physiology, French I, (Elect one) Latin II, or Med. and Modern History. Third year: English III, Household Organization, French II, (Elect one) Latin III, or Physics. Fourth year: English IV, Household Management, U. S. Constitutional History, (Elect one) Chemistry or Latin IV or French III.

CLASS OF 1921

Out of eighteen pupils that entered with the class the following named graduated: Philip E. Dargie, Milan C. Gale, Beatrice M. Gregory, Marie E. Henderson, William S. Morse, Frances White, George White, Grace Winchester. Two are farming, one entered business college, one normal school, one college, two normal summer school, now teaching, and one is in training to become a nurse.

ALUMNI HALL

The committee in charge of repairing this building rushed the work along so that the class of 1921 had the honor of being the first to graduate within its walls. Nearly five hundred people were accommodated to witness the exercises.

The school appreciates the efforts of all who have contributed to make this hall available to us. Among other things, it has a good basketball court, an excellent stage and floor, is well ventilated, lighted, and fairly well heated. We are justly proud of the piano that has been placed there by the local people. When the repairing is finished and the stage equipment added, we feel that we shall have a hall, the value of which will not be measured in dollars and cents alone.

ENROLLMENT

The enrollment is the largest in four years. With a total of 70, there are now 66 in school. Of these, 14 are tuition pupils. The bus carries 44, and 27 come by train. By classes there are 10 seniors, 11 juniors, 22 sophomores, 22 freshmen, and 1 special. By courses there are 20 academic, 27 English, 11 agricultural, and 8 domestic arts pupils.

There have not been many unnecessary tardinesses. The attendance has been 96 per cent. The train service has been good, except in severe weather, the fact that train pupils are carried by bus means much school time saved and comfort to pupils in winter.

EQUIPMENT

Because of the large enrollment, it has been necessary to have more books, supplies, and chairs. An addition to the blacksmith shop is being constructed, and when completed will serve as a carpenter shop, thus relieving the main building of noise incidental to manual training. An electric bell system is contemplated that will insure a simultaneous dismissal of classes in the two buildings. A new atlas has been given the school by the public library, and a life size portrait of Lincoln has been donated by Mrs. N. Della Carbee.

In Conclusion, I hereby express my appreciation for the loyalty of teachers, the support of the alumni and public, and for your helpfulness and interest in the welfare of the school.
