

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hopkinton in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said Hopkinton on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing including three selectmen; one for three years, one for two years and one for one year; two trustees for cemetery fund.
- 2. To bring in your ballots upon each of the questions submitted by the convention to Revise the Constitution relative to the amendments proposed by said convention at a session held on January last.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 4. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges in addition to the amount required by law, and appropriate same.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Hopkinton Free Public Library, and appropriate the same .
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day, and appropriate same.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 to secure State Aid for Central Trunk Line maintenance under the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Law.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 to complete the Contoocook Valley Trunk Line No. 20 (as per continuing application for State and Federal aid of 1919.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Chap. 117, Laws of 1917, on a section of the Contoocook Valley Trunk Line No. 20, and appropriate or set aside from the amount raised for highway work, the sum of \$500 for this purpose.
- 10. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust, so called.
- 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase a set of hay scales for Hopkinton Village.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to accept from Mrs. H. P. Kelley, the sum of \$100, the income to go for the care of the burial lot of the late David A. Farrington.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to accept from Carry Evellyn Parry, the sum of \$100, the income to be devoted to the care of the burial lot of the late Cogswell N. Weeks.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to accept from Geo. C. Wiggin the sum of \$100, the income to be devoted to the care of the burial lot of the Wiggin lot in Hopkinton Old Cemetery.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 from the estate of the late Henry P. Danforth of Lawrence, Mass., for the care of the Danforth lot in Clements Hill Cemetery.

- 16. To see what action the town will take regarding the appropriation of \$200 to repair and alter the bridge over Kimball Brook, so called appropriation being inadequate for the purpose.
- 17. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate, such part as may be necessary for the employment of a district nurse.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to allow 2% discount on all taxes paid before July 15,1921.
- 19. To hear and act upon the reports of town officers, library trustees and committees.
- 20. To hear and transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

Statement of Selectmen

The Selectmen plead guilty to the usual amount of errors in the past year, of course, but the difference in our budget as prepared and in the way the sums therein included are raised is owing to new system required by the tax commission. It would appear upon the face of it that a larger amount was called for but there are to be taken from the amount, the sum of the revenues from other sources except property taxes so there is little difference in the net results from the old way of letting these revenues take care, as near as possible, of the town charges.

Owing to the financial condition of the state, it appears no new construction on state roads will be attempted in this town, except to complete last year's project in order it may be accepted by the Federal Government and the Federal money paid over to the State.



Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board of Hopkinton:

I herewith submit my seventh annual report as superintendent of Hopkinton schools.

STATISTICS.

Whole number of pupils registered in local schools September 30, 1920, was 216.

Whole number resident children accounted for in school and out, 241.

Whole number of children enumerated 5 years of age or older and under 16, 218.

Boys, 107. Girls, 111.

Whole number regular teachers now employed, 13.

Whole number different pupils registered during the school year, 1919-1920 was 247.

179 in the Elementary Schools.

68 in the High School.

Average membership for 1919-20, 195.

Average daily attendance, 176.

Number visits to schools by superintendent during year, 215.

GENERAL CONDITIONS.

The schools that opened in September, 1919, we were able to continue throughout the year without change of teachers, notwithstanding the shortage of teachers.

We began the present year with six new teachers, four of them in the high school.

This year, Farrington's Corner school was not opened on account of the small number of pupils there.

The school house in this district was the property of the city of Concord and I understand has been sold. This means the transporting of the children of that district to the nearest school in the future.

The Main Road school house was repaired, and made one of the best rural school buildings in town. After running this school eight weeks, it seemed best to close it as all but three pupils had moved from town.

The pupils of both these schools are being transported to the Hopkinton Village schools.

The Hatfield school was opened this year, and has had nine pupils.

It would seem that the crisis in shortage of teachers has passed or very nearly so. This does not mean that there is a surplus of teachers, nor that there will be next September.

It is a little early to state definitely what the situation will be, but my judgment is, that there will be plenty of teachers for next year; that present teachers can command but little, if any, more salary than they are getting, and that inexperienced teachers can be secured for less than they could a year ago.

The outlook is not sufficiently promising, however, to warrant estimating the teacher cost in our schools for next year below the present year cost.

It has been increasingly difficult for several years to get good teachers to go into the rural districts. They do not have to. For the past three years it has been impossible to get only inexperienced teachers for these teachers and there has been few of them. We have been fortuate in keeping all our schools opened.

The prospect for securing any better teachers for these schools next year is not encouraging.

To this problem is added the one in Contoocook of finding a dwelling house for the principal of the high school. One of the qualifications that seemed necessary in hiring a principal this year was, that he be unmarried as there was no suitable house to be secured for a man with a family.

I should recommend, (and I believe the action would be fully justified) that the School Board lease a suitable house for the use of the high school principal. If it could not be rented to him it could to others, without risk of loss.

The transportation cost from the Emerson Hill district to the village school, is at the rate of \$800, or more, a year. This is probably no more than it is worth. Undoubtedly the children are securing better advantages than they otherwise would if that school was opened with such a teacher as could be secured to go there. It would be economy however to open it. A school in that district at this time would have ten scholars at least, if all the children there should go. neighborhood itself in the past has been divided on the question of opening this school. Some have expressed their preference to have their children go to the village, while others have wished the school might be opened. If the neighborhood could unite on the question, and agree to send their children there I should certainly recommend opening it another year. If however, there are to be five or six children to attend, the expense necessary to put the building in readiness would not warrant opening it.

I wish the parents of this particular district could definitely make known to the board their desires about the school, in time for action at the school meeting. If the school is to be opened next September the money necessary for repairs must be raised at the coming March meeting.

It is a pleasure to call your attention to the great improvement made in the high school tardiness record this last year over that of the previous year. The state average tardiness record last year was 1.6 per pupil. The record of our high school was 1.2 per pupil.

The attendance record, 93 per cent, just equalled the state average on this point.

REPAIRS.

In estimating cost of repairs for the next year consider the following:

The Hopkinton village Grammar School room needs more light.

The West Hopkinton school building should have chemical toilets.

The Tyler school building, if to be opened next year, should be repaired generally.

The toilets at the high school should be made more sanitary. They are very unsatisfactory at present and have been severely criticised by officials of the state department.

The Emerson Hill school building, if opened, would need to be generally repaired.

EXPENSE.

The expense in conducting the school business like the expense in every other business has greatly increased in the past three years. The ratio of increase, however, I believe will compare favorably with that of any other business enterprise.

From the report of the State Board of Education, I find only 17 towns in the state with a high school, having the same number of schools as Hopkinton, and the same, or nearly the same number of pupils.

The average total cost of these schools for the year 1919-20 was \$18,029.

The total cost of the Hopkinton schools was \$17,437, or about \$600 below the average. The teacher cost in Hopkinton however, was about \$1300 above the average of these same towns. This difference is accounted for largely by the fact that the high schools, in most of these towns, were running

only two courses with three teachers, whereas, we have three courses with four teachers.

The following figures, compiled from records, will show the increased cost of the Hopkinton schools for the past four years 1916-17 to 1919-20.

Feb. 15, 1916 to Feb. 15, 1917, Total Cost, \$10,770.92; teacher Cost, \$6,797.05; No Schools, 10.

Feb. 16, 1917 to Aug. 31, 1918, Total Cost, \$18,154.29; Teacher Cost, \$11,206.23; No Schools, 11.

Sept. 1918 to Aug. 31, 1919, Total Cost, \$14,357.11; Teacher Cost, \$8,595.11; No Schools, 12.

Sept., 1919, to Aug. 31, 1920, Total Cost, \$17,437.39; Teacher Cost, \$10,287.72; No Schools, 11.

These figures show an increase in the total cost of the schools from 1916-1920 of \$6,666.47 or 62 per cent.

The teacher cost for the same period of time has increased \$3,490.67 or 51 per cent.

The increase in the total cost during the last two years has been 21.5 per cent.

The increase in total cost throughout the state has been 21.8.

To show that the increased total cost is not due entirely to increased teacher cost, I submit the following data:

In 1916-17 the teachers salaries were 63 per cent. of the whole cost.

In 1917-1918 the teachers' salaries were 62 per cent. of the whole cost.

In 1918-19 the teachers' salaries were 60 per cent of the whole cost.

In 1919-1920 the teachers' salaries were 59 per cent of the whole cost.

I believe the figures submitted, will show that the increase costs of local schools has kept well within the per cent of increased cost of local schools has kept well within the per cent of increase of school cost in the state and increase in the cost of town government as a whole.

So much criticism has been made, and is being made, of the expense of the new Educational Law, that I wish to submit the following figures to show how it affects Hopkinton.

In 1919-1920 the town of Hopkinton paid the state as the direct result of the Educational Law, \$1,606.99 state tax, \$544 per capita tax, and \$57,15 excess salary of the superintendent. A total of \$2,208.18. The town received from the state, because of this law, \$4,064.01, or \$1,855.83 more than was paid.

In 1920-21 the town will receive about \$3,375 more than is paid out, if the state fully meets its obligations.

GENERAL REMARKS.

I wish to commend most highly the employment of a school nurse. The results have been very beneficial and in my opinion account for the small number of pupils absent on account of illness this year, so far. I wish to commend the very faithful manner in which Miss Gordon has followed up the school cases.

The school conditions at the present time are, for the most part, very satisfactory. We have a good corps of teachers, doing faithful work. The pupils are apparently much interested in their work and good results may be looked for.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation of the good counsel and help that the chairman of your board has given me in the seven years that I have been associated with him.

For the past twelve years he has given unsparingly of his time and ability, and has ever worked for the best interests of Hopkinton schools. I feel sure that the citizens join me in this expression of appreciation of his valuable services.


