## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

---

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Littleton Qualified to  
Vote in Town Affairs.*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room, in the Town Building, on the twelfth day of March, next, being the second Tuesday of March, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

Article I. To choose three Selectmen, a Town Clerk, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, an auditor, an Overseer of the Poor, an agent to Prosecute Violations of the Liquor Law, three Members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, in place of Delia B. Mitchell, George S. Whittaker, and Frank M. Richardson, terms expired, Constable, two Road Agents, and a Health Officer for the term of three years.

Article II. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, for the purchase of text-books and supplies for the schools, for the laying out and constructing and repairing highways and bridges, for the payment of the Town debt and interest, for the maintainance of the poor, and for all other Town charges.

Article III. To see what sums of money the Town will



raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article IV. To see what action the Town will take in regard to raising and appropriating money to provide necessary furniture, apparatus and equipment for the Public Library.

Article V. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate in aid of the Littleton Hospital Association.

Article VI. To see what action the Town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for highways in this Town under the provisions of an "Act to provide for State aid and for the expenditure of other public monies in the permanent improvement of main highways throughout the State," approved February 24, 1905, and any amendments thereto; and to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed advisable, and to make suitable appropriations under said act or acts.

Article VII. To see if the Town will accept the act of the General Court passed at the present session of 1907, empowering this Town to issue bonds to refund its indebtedness.

Article VIII. To see if the Town will vote to fund its outstanding indebtedness to an aggregate principal amount not exceeding Sixty Thousand Dollars, and for this purpose to empower the Selectmen to issue bonds upon the credit of the Town to an amount not exceeding the sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars aforesaid; said bonds to be made payable to Bearer in (20) years from date, to bear interest at a rate not exceeding (4) per cent per annum, both interest and

principal to be payable in gold at the Atlantic National Bank in Boston, Mass., to be signed by the Selectmen of the Town, countersigned by the Treasurer thereof, to have the Seal of the Town affixed, to be in such denominations of not less than Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars and not more than One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars according as may by the said Selectmen be deemed most advantageous in placing said bonds on the market, and the Selectmen to be authorized and empowered to make sale of said bonds on such terms and conditions and at such prices and to such parties as may in their discretion appear advantageous to the Town.

Article IX. To see if the Town will vote to provide a sinking fund which shall be sufficient in the aggregate with all addition thereto and accumulations thereof to pay the principal of the bonds, to an amount not exceeding Sixty Thousand Dollars, as issued or to be issued in accordance with the vote of the Town passed at the Town meeting held March 12, 1907, within twenty years from the time of their issue; and to appoint Commissioners not exceeding three in number to receive, hold and manage said sinking fund, or to commit said duties to some appropriate agents or committee already appointed.

Article X. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of any highway that may be laid out between a point near the Horace Shute place on Farr Hill and a point near the Ira Parker green-houses, and upon what conditions, if any, said



outlay shall be made.

Article XI. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article XII. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and to choose or elect any Agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

Article XIII. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## COMMENTS.

---

Last year the statistics of prosecutions in this Court showed a total of 82, of which 59 were cases of drunkenness. This year the total of prosecutions is 50, while the cases of drunkenness have fallen off to 31. The difference of 28 in the two years is too large to be otherwise than significant.

As to the prosecutions other than for drunkenness, the difference in the last two years is trivial, there being of this class 23 in the year ending February 1, 1906, and 19 in the year ending February 1, 1907. Nothing of very heinous nature appears in this class of complaints.

Last year about two-fifths of the cases of drunkenness were charged to residents. This year, while the total number is very much less, about one-half of the cases were those of residents.

The prosecutions for drunkenness for last year were exceptionally numerous in this Town, and conditions relative to this subject seem to have been restored to the status which prevailed other years.

The vote on the question of license this year was, for license, 267, against license, 524. The majority given against license this year is only eight less than that given in 1903.

The usual statistics accompany this report and exhibit the finances of the department as well as other information.

## REPORT OF LIBRARIAN.

To the Board of Trustees :

I herewith submit the eighteenth annual report.

Our new library building was opened to the public on March third, 1906. The year has been in many ways a very successful one. The attendance in the reading room has been good.

Many that have come in out of idle curiosity, and critically inclined have been surprised to find what beautiful, attractive quarters we have, and have been pleased to come again.

The reference room fills a long felt want. Scholars, club women and others are found there daily.

One room that is very much needed is still unoccupied. How many times I have had the question put to me, "When will our room be ready?" and I am obliged to answer, "I do not know."

Tables for this room have been given by some of the clubs in town, and you have been able to put in the shelving. Now, if the chairs were only forthcoming the children could be made happy.

We have enlarged the usefulness of the library, by sending small cases of books to each of the outlying school districts, that the pupils may have the benefit of supplementary reading, same as in the village. In most cases this has been appreciated and a good number of books read.
