REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

The annual meeting of the school district was held April 16, 1921, and the following officers were elected:

Harry G. Atwood, Moderator; Willietta Webb, Clerk; James E. Fowler, Treasurer; Eugene C. Patridge, Auditor. James L. Coe was elected a member of the School Board for three years.

On November 3, 1921, the resignation of Willietta Webb was accepted and D. Beatrice Smith was appointed Clerk of the school district.

The School Board met and organized as follows: Christopher A. Pollard, Chairman and Committee on Fuel; James L. Coe, Committee on Repairs; Alice J. Patridge, Clerk.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT.

To the School Board and Citizens of Newfields, N. H.:

It gives me pleasure to submit my third report as Superintendent of our schools, a report on the last school year, ending in June, 1921, and on the recently completed first half of the present school year.

May I call your attention to Table I and ask you to compare the figures for total enrollment, average daily absence and per cent of attendance, as recorded for last year, with those in the same columns for the first half of this year? I think the favorable gain is due in large measure to the greater attention given by you to the matter of an attendance officer, though I do not leave out of consideration the fact that our teachers are successful in making children want to go to school. We can make a better mark for this complete year than the 91.8 per cent attained on January 31, 1922, and we ought to do so.

A glance at Table III will show a small gain in physical defects corrected, though, in this connection, the

smaller enrollment of this year should be taken into account. As a whole, the pupils have not been so clean and tidy physically during the last two years as they are now. The teachers not only teach healthy living but are most persistent in requiring cleanliness in the schoolroom. It is highly desirable that those pupils who bring their luncheons to school should, in cold weather, be helped to some hot addition to their luncheons and supervised during the noon hour. Facilities for such a procedure are not out of the question and I recommend the matter to your attention. I think it would be wise to investigate the feasibility of securing the part-time services of a school nurse for more follow-up work in health supervision than our teachers can give. Even a monthly weighing and measuring of the pupils usually results in great good if the figures are taken home and the co-operation of parents is thus gained. The proximity of towns employing school nurses might make this matter practicable at a small cost.

Standardized tests in reading, spelling, handwriting and arithmetic for the first half year's work have been recently completed and they show that our schools have gained much from the conscientious teaching and drilling given this year by both teachers. With nearly a half year left in which to continue the work on these fundamentals, we can expect that at least the average number of pupils will be up to standard next June. I wish to commend the present teaching staff for their zeal and hard work in the schoolroom and to congratulate them on the place they have made for themselves in the community.

With reference to the school building. I have only one recommendation. The eastern windows of the primary room admit direct, glaring sunlight all the morning, a condition full of great danger to eyesight, unless corrected by continuously drawn shades. This procedure shuts out so much light that I am afraid we are still endangering eyesight. If the upper half of the windows could be filled with transucent instead of transparent glass, that part of the windows would need no shades at all and yet admit abundant light of excellent quality. The shade fixtures could then be placed at the top of the lower half of the windows, to be used only for that half. This improvement could be made at small cost and I urge the matter on your attention.

Teachers, School Board, citizens and community organizations have shown consistent and continuous interest in our schools. For this co-operation as well as for many personal favors, I wish to publicly thank them.
