

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow, in the [L. S.] County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegatesat-Large, Alternate Delegates-at-Large, District Delegates, Alternate District Delegates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee to investigate the feasibility of establishing a town forest and make recommendation at the regular town meeting in March, 1925.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300, to build a reservoir near Pine street at its junction with Main street.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1300 to purchase a tractor and snow plow.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the control of the "white pine blister rust."
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6500 for the purchase of a combination fire truck.

- 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$498 for permanent improvements.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board of Plaistow: Gentlemen:—

I present herewith my first annual report for the school year 1922-1923 and the report of the supervisor of music. I wish to express my appreciation for the cooperation which I have received from members of the school board and teachers.

### STATISTICS

The average for the State is a little over 93%. Therefore, the record is a little low. Parents are urged to cooperate with teachers in raising this standard. In doing this pupils will form better habits of work and the efficiency of the school will be materially increased. Elimination of some of the present holidays will also materially help school progress, without bringing hardship on anyone.

### EDUCATIONAL SURVEY

A series of standard tests were given to determine the standing of various grades in reading and arithmetic and to serve as a means of ascertaining the amount of gain which pupils made during the year. The results are given below:

The above table may be read as follows, e.g. Grade II. at Pollard School achieved an average in reading equal to that of an average child 92 months old. The number given in () parentheses 90 refers to the standard which a normal child should reach at the end of the second year in school. Thus it is seen that this grade achieved the standard of a child whose average is two months above that established in this test. The other achievements may be read in a similar manner.

The foregoing table may be read as follows: e.g.

Grade IV at Pollard School had an average score of 14 in the Monroe test in Arithmetic in November and 26 the following May. The standard set in the test for January is 21. It will be noted, therefore, that the grade made creditable progress in the subject. In reading the November score was 6 while the January standard is 7.7. The May score was 7. The grade made normal progress for the time but was somewhat below at the start.

Any other score in the above table may be read in the same way.

An examination of the survey of the year shows that the fundamentals of arithmetic were well taught. Every grade began the year below standard and with the exception of the 7th reached a standard slightly above that set in the test. This is due to the care with which teachers used the Courtis practice tests in arithmetic. The 7th grade started the year with an achievement 1 point below that of the 5th grade and finished with an achievement 1 point above the 6th grade standard. Thus a good year's work was done.

The results in reading were normal in grades IV, V and VII, and somewhat above normal in grades VI and VIII. The reading program is being continued with vigor and good progress is being made during the current year.

### JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

During the summer of 1922 the Pollard Junior High School was approved by the State Board of Education. The school is developing a fine type of boys and girls and it will continue to function with increasing efficiency in building good citizenship.

Again I wish to thank the teachers of Plaistow for their faithful work and the school board for the cooperation they have given me in my work.

### REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent and School Board of Plaistow, N. H.:

I herewith present my fourth annual report as supervisor of music in the Plaistow schools.

The Supervisor of Music visits the schools once a week to give lessons and plan the work in general. The grade teachers carry on the work and if they show sympathetic interest the children are encouraged to make their best efforts. A large percentage of the success of the work in music is due to the constant helpfulness of the teachers. Most of the children do creditable work in music.

The course of study remains unchanged, the Hollis Dann Music Course being used throughout the grades.

Each year, as we hope, this course of study worked out in connection with the text books and other devices, brings us nearer to the aims which we have in mind in this work. These aims are:

First, to have the pupils study vocal music as a language, understanding how to read and sing it accurately.

Second, to develop as completely as possible the natural ability of each child to sing tunefully and to help those who lack the ability, to acquire it.

Third, to educate the pupils' taste in music so that the appeal and the cultural value of all good music shall be real and effective in their lives.

I have made approximately three hundred visits in the schools of Plaistow during the past school year.

In conclusion I want to thank the Superintendent, School Board and Teachers for the support given me.
