TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Allenstown in the
County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in
Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the new fire station in said town on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- ARTICLE 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for the purpose of securing the services of the Suncook Union Cornet Band for a series of free band concerts.
- ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary sum of money to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of main highways in town.
- ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to install one electric street light on Cross street near the residence of Emile Raymond.
- ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve hundred dollars in excess of the amount required by law for maintenance of highways in town.

- ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars for the observance of Memorial Day.
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars for the control of the white pine blister rust in town.
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee to investigate the merits of a town forest and pass any vote relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for the extension of the sidewalk on Granite street.
- ARTICLE 10A. To see if the town will vote to install one electric street light at the end of Webster street.
- ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will vote to install three additional electric street lights on the River road.
- ARTICLE 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars for widening, repairing and oiling Granite street, beginning at the junction at Main street.
- ARTICLE 13. To see if the town will vote to lay a sewer on Granite street and raise and appropriate fifteen hundred dollars therefor.
- ARTICLE 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand six hundred dollars for state aid maintenance of highways.
- ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and ap-

- appropriate the sum of nine hundred dollars for trunk line maintenance of highways.
- ARTICLE 16.** To see if the town will vote to extend the sewer from the corner of Cross and High streets to the residence of Paul Girard and raise and appropriate money therefor.
- ARTICLE 17.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred fifty dollars to widen the road on the long Sand Hill on the Candia road, so-called, and blast out three stones on the little Sand Hill, so that the snow plow can break the road in winter.
- ARTICLE 18.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars towards the Library Building fund.
- ARTICLE 19.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars to lay a sewer on Reserve street, beginning at the end of a sewer on said street near the house of John Richards and extending the same to a culvert on said street.
- ARTICLE 20.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars to install one fire alarm box on Mercier Plat, Cross street.
- ARTICLE 21.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars for the purchase of hose for the fire department.
- ARTICLE 22.** To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to make temporary loans in anticipation of taxes of the ensuing year in accordance with the provisions of chapter 42, section 75 of the Public Laws.

ARTICLE 23. To hear the reports of auditors, agents, committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens:

I herewith submit my sixteenth annual report of the schools of Allentown for the year ending June 30, 1928.

There were maintained during the year three schools for a school year of 36 weeks with no change in the teaching force.

The total school enrollment was 109 (62 boys and 47 girls) with a daily average attendance of 94.20 per cent.

The schools were in session on an average 348 half-days.

The school attendance was good. Most of the absences were caused by sickness.

The cases of truancy were confined to a few families who gave as a reason their inability to provide proper clothing.

The School Laws of New Hampshire, Chap. 117

“The school board of every district shall provide standard elementary schools for at least thirty-six weeks in each year at such places in the district as will best serve the interests of education and give to all the pupils within the district as nearly equal advantages as are practicable.”

The school authorities have endeavored to so arrange the school calendar that this law may be carried out and are constantly studying methods of improving the work done in our schools, and ways and means of eliminating waste in the expenditure of effort and money.

Some rural schools are becoming so small that the cost per pupil is more than double the cost per pupil in the village schools and the educational advantages not as good.

The school board now, as in times past, hesitate to close a small school and transport the pupils as long as there is a reasonable prospect of an increase in the number of pupils large enough to warrant keeping the school open.

The rural school, with the great decrease in rural population, presents a serious problem. This decrease is taking place not only in New Hampshire but in every state in the Union.

Frank O. Lowden, former governor of Illinois, speaking before the National Educational Association at Washington on Rural Education said—

“The trek cityward is already under way. If it shall go on as rapidly as it has in the last five years, the next generation will witness a farm population largely composed of the physically and mentally unfit.

“Educators have not been blind to this distressing contrast. In some sections of the country consolidated country schools have been established. These schools have marked a vast improvement in the life of the community, for farmers are as eager to give their children a good education as are those who live in the cities and the towns.”

In some localities there is no boarding place for the teacher located near the school house having the conveniences of a modern home. Teachers hesitate to accept a school unless they can have a good boarding place with a well-heated and lighted room in which they may do their work undisturbed.

Health

The school nurse, Miss Douillette, has done faithful and efficient work.

The health of the child, in a large measure determines his regularity of attendance, his behavior, and his ability to do his work.

Efficient supervision and instruction in matters of health should have an important place in the school organization.

School Activities

The teachers were faithful and worked earnestly for the best interest of the pupils.

The noon and recess periods offer to both teacher and pupils an opportunity for pleasure and profit. Athletic games, baseball, volleyball, basketball and other games may be promoted, and on stormy days educational games—arithmetic, geography, history, spelling, and cross-word puzzles may be enjoyed.

The success of these supervised school periods depends upon the initiative and the skill of the teacher.

The boys were interested and did excellent work in manual training under the instruction of John Hobson.

Excellent results were accomplished in domestic science under the instruction of Edna P. Benware.

The pupils were interested in the study of music and made great progress under the instruction of Martha F. Gale.

Your attention is called to the detailed reports which follow. The standardized tests given during the year in all the fundamentals showed an improvement in the work done in these branches during the year.

Parents and citizens are invited to visit the schools frequently.

In conclusion I express my appreciation for the co-operation and assistance given to me by the teachers, the school board and the citizens.

REPORT OF DOMESTIC SCIENCE TEACHER

Mr. Henry S. Roberts, Superintendent of Schools:

DEAR SIR—

Coincident with the new freedom of women in this country of ours, is the simplification of the preparation of food and construction of clothing in the home. Also it is so much easier to patronize the baker shop and to buy ready made clothing. Because of these facts, there has been a lessening in home interest among the young women and girls. To have interest in something one must have as much knowledge as possible of that thing. Such being the case too much stress cannot be placed upon the value of having a domestic science course in the elementary school.

Not only does domestic science teach the art of cooking, sewing and the care of the home, but it also teaches how health is dependent on diet and how to live happily with others which is so necessary for the best type of family life.

In our school kitchen we have an equal division of labor and responsibility. The girls are learning to do everything that is possible for themselves both in cooking and sewing.

In cooking they have cooked meat, vegetables and meat substitutes, made bread, biscuits, muffins, pies, cookies, deserts and cake, planned meals and served them, and learned to set the table for the different meals.

In sewing their projects have been cooking caps and aprons, bags, needle books, towels, some fancy work but not much, dresses, costumes for the operetta, a tablecloth and canning also one in jelly making and one in marmalade making.

I feel that the lessons learned in Domestic Science can be of great use to the girls in their future lives and the co-operation given us by the parents and citizens of Allenstown has done much to further the interest shown by the pupils in this particular subject. If, by learning to care for a household, the desire to be good housekeepers and home

makers is fully imbibed by the girls of this generation, then domestic science is deserving of the attention and time given to it.

Thanking the members of the school board, parents and superintendent, I respectfully submit this report.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

*Mr. Henry S. Roberts, Superintendent of Schools of
Allenstown, N. H.:*

DEAR SIR—

“They have ears to hear and hear not.” This was the subject of an address given by Mrs. Frances E. Clark, one of the leading figures among music educators, before the Indiana Teachers’ Association last year.

This statement is undoubtedly true, especially of the present generation, for many of us had to wait until maturity to hear the great music of the world, and even now there is much we shall never know about it because we began *too late!*

Modern industry and science are demanding more and more the trained ear. Telephone, telegraph, wireless and radio workers are dependent almost wholly on keenness of ear for success and modern education is realizing that training of the ear has not kept pace with eye training. The study of music in the Allenstown schools can and does have a great share in developing keener and more intelligent hearing through its appeal to the ear.

Listening attentively and comprehendingly is a part of the music program in every grade. Especially is this true of the first two years of the child’s school life, for music, being an aural art must be heard before any definite study of the technical side is attempted. Appeal through the eye gate is reserved for the higher grades.

Into the homes of the rich and poor alike comes the music of the radio, phonograph and other reproducing instruments, and its intelligent understanding has become a necessity. “Not to know” is no longer considered excusable. For a number of years the Allenstown school children have been studying great musical masterpieces, more than half of which is instrumental. In order to understand it better, each child beginning with the fourth grade has learned to

recognize by sound and sight the various instruments of the orchestra.

A noted physician has said that disease and crime are often the offspring of a distorted and warped emotional nature, and a writer in "Business" tells us that crime costs the United States at least ten billion dollars a year, giving as one reason that our intellectual life has progressed at a more rapid pace than our emotional development, and that our intellectual powers are under better control than our emotional faculties.

It is music's mission in its appeal to the emotions to remedy this and to build more sturdy characters of the rising generation who will also be a healthier race because it has been proven that music tends for a healthy frame of mind and we are largely what we think we are.

As in past years, songs have been an important part of the school projects from Columbus Day to the close of the school year, including this year an observance of Health Week. In addition to the graduation exercises, the closing day of school was marked by the rendering of the geographical operetta "Let's Go Traveling" in which the entire school was represented. The boys and girls learned something of the customs and characteristic traits of the people in the countries visited, but all agreed when homeward bound, that after all, there is no country like our own United States—a lesson in true Americanization.

It is gratifying to note that at the Conference of the Department of Superintendence of the National Education Association held in Dallas, Texas, last year, one of the resolutions passed was: "We favor the inclusion of music in the curriculum on an equality with the *other basic* subjects. We believe that with the growing complexity of civilization, more attention must be given to the arts, and that music affords possibilities, as yet but partially realized for developing an appreciation of the finer things of life. We therefore recommend that all administrative officers take steps toward a more equitable adjustment of music in the educa-

tional program, involving:—time allotment and equipment provided.”

But long before this resolution was passed, the members of the school board of Allentown and you, the superintendent of its schools, were alive to the situation and allotted time and provided equipment for the study of music.

To them and to you and also to the faithful and efficient corps of teachers, I express my sincere appreciation of the interest and encouragement shown and the hearty co-operation given in my work.

REPORT OF MANUAL TRAINING TEACHER

Mr. Henry S. Roberts, Supt. of Schools, Allentown, N. H. :

DEAR SIR :

This is my first annual report submitted of the work done in the manual training course of the Allentown grammar schools.

The boys as a whole showed interest in their work and progressed in a very capable manner. Principals of construction and accuracy were stressed. Much time was spent in practicing the correct use of saws, hammers, planes, etc.

The schedule worked out for the sixth grade was so chosen because of the many different tools needed in the construction of the projects. Sketches were made of all work done, showing construction and dimensions. The schedule is as follows: Bread board, swing board, broom holder, tool box, shoe shine box, and tooth brush holder.

Only a few of the boys bought their finished work, but due to the work being so practical, I would suggest that it be continued, even if it cost the school a little extra expense.

The seventh and eighth grade classes could be called a project and repair class. The boys did much repair work around the school building, besides making their projects.

The following articles were made: bird houses, boxtrap, medicine cabinets, paper and clothes racks, bottle carriers, window boards, bread and meat boards, jumping standards, base for girls diamond, toy bank, swing boards, tool and knife boxes, broom holders, skate guards, oil stone case, cupboard, tie racks, canoe paddle, basket ball backboard, gavel and gavel blocks, flower boxes, etc.

Some of the repair work done was as follows: door spring installed, school chairs assembled and installed, door and door casings repaired, window and curtain catches repaired, cloak hooks replaced, chairs glued, scraped and shellaced, etc.

I wish to express my appreciation for the hearty co-operation given by you and Mrs. Wattles, and all others that helped to make my task so agreeable.
