To the inhabitants of Alstead qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said town on the 12th day of March, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles.

Art. 1. To choose a town clerk, town treasurer, selectman, tax collector, overseer of poor, one or more road agents, auditors, constables, library trustees, trustees of trust funds, fence viewers, sextons, cemetery committee, measurers of wood and surveyors of lumber, and other town officers as the voters may direct.

Art. 2. To see what sum of money the town will raise for ordinary town charges and for the support of poor.

Art. 3. To see what sum of money the town will raise for highways and bridges.

Art. 4. To see if the town will raise \$750 for state aid construction bond.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will raise to oil the village streets.

Art. 6. To see if the town will raise \$1,131 for state aid construction and apply for state aid.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will raise for street lights.

Art. 8. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell real estate acquired by tax sale.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the control of white pine blister rust.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to oil Upper Main Street from a point opposite Mr. Lakin's born south to the second driveway of Bert Dana's house the work to be done in the spring or summer months.

Art. 11. To see if the town will raise a some of money for the care of cemeteries and put a new fence on the road side of Alstead Village Cemetery.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day and appropriate money for the same.

Art. 13. To see if the town will raise a sum of money for Memorial Day.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to accept a trust fund of \$100.00 from Eveline A. Hatch Est., for the care of cemetery lot.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to accept a gift of \$100.00 from Clyde Cook for the care of cemetery lot.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to pay the Shedd-Porter Library trustees water rent for the town hall and watering trough.

Art. 17. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to deed to the school district, the property acquired for the Vilas High School.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of the Library.

Art. 19. To hear reports and allow accounts.

Art. 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Alstead :

I herewith submit my second report as Superintendent of Schools.

ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

No changes were made in the teaching positions of the elementary schools this year. The teachers are all well qualified for work with their particular groups. They have been loyal, enthusiastic, and cooperative.

School work is being accomplished in accordance with the standards of the state. Standard achievement tests are being given and reports are required relative to the work completed in each grade.

Because of the decrease in enrollment, the school at Center Alstead was closed this year. The pupils from this section are being transported to the school at Alstead village.

The removal of pupils from grades seven and eight of the village school necessitated a reorganization of work in this school. The school is now organized for instruction in two units of three grades each. Pupils from the Porter district, from Center Alstead, and from a section of Acworth are now attending this school. The enrollment is slightly larger than it was at this time last year.

Milk is being supplied to twenty pupils in the Alstead schools. Cod liver oil is provided and given by recommendation of the school nurse. These are provided from federal funds.

VILAS HIGH SCHOOL

The Vilas High School was organized in the fall of 1934. Because of the delay in the construction of the new building, it was necessary to start the school in temporary quarters. Funds for this purpose were appropriated at a special meeting of the School District.

The town hall building was made available for the school. The upper hall was partitioned into three rooms. The organization rooms and selectmen's office were used for the junior high school and freshman classes. Temporary toilets were installed and a supplementary heater was purchased for the corner room on the upper floor. The building was very well adapted to the purpose and a very satisfactory school was conducted here until January 7, 1935. On this date the school was transferred to the new building.

The school was organized with work in four major curricula; viz., General Academic, Agriculture, Home Economics, and Commercial. One hundred and thirteen pupils are enrolled in the six year program. The school was planned to meet the secondary school needs of Alstead and surrounding towns. The school membership is comprised of pupils from Acworth, Marlow, Langdon, and Alstead.

Further details regarding the organization of the school are included in the report of the headmaster.

TEACHING STAFF

Considerable care was used in the selection of the first teachers. Paul J. Fenton of Derry was elected as the first Headmaster. He is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and has had graduate study at Cornell University. Mr. Fenton had five years teaching experience before coming to Alstead.

Mr. Richard Martin, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, was elected to teach the courses in mathematics and science.

Miss Gertrude Nye, graduated from the University of New Hampshire. She had taught English and French for four years at Colbrook Academy.

Miss Frances Pierce is a graduate of Keene Normal School. She was for two years in charge of the Home Economics work at the Quimby school.

Miss Amelia Witt, graduated from the College of Business Administration, Boston University. She taught commercial subjects for three years in the high school at Fort Fairfield, Maine.

Miss Christine Jones was elected to teach all the courses in social science. She is a graduate of Middlebury College.

Miss Alice Currier, Boston University, College of Music, teaches the music in the high and village schools on one day each week.

The pupils at the village school appreciate the gift which is given each year at Christmas by a friend.

I herewith submit my report as headmaster of Vilas High School.

The attendance record of the school was seriously affected early in the fall term by an epidemic of grippe and later by an outbreak of whooping cough. We hope in the new building to improve our attendance record.

SCHOLARSHIP

The standard of scholarship is in general good and our pupils are, for the most part, conscientious in preparing their assignments. There is a special period each day for pupils to make up work. The teachers are at all times glad to assist pupils who are experiencing difficulty with their work.

ORGANIZATION ENGLISH

In this department we aim to provide each student with a background of his common literary inheritance; to cultivate good taste in reading, and to develop to the highest degree possible for each individual, skill in self-expression, through the use of the English language (i. e.) speaking and writing.

The school library is under the supervision of the English department. A system of student supervision has been worked out so the library is in use the entire school day. The school is indebted to the Shedd-Porter library for the use of its books and magazines.

The librarian and trustees of the Shedd-Porter Library have been very cooperative and helpful and their fine spirit is very much appreciated.

Mrs. Vilas, Mr. Newell, and other friends have also given books for the school library.

The work of the Dramatic Club is correlated with the work in English. Two one-act plays have been selected. Work is being carried on with the idea of developing the individualities of as many students as possible rather than the polished presentations of a few. It is felt that good one-act plays are better adapted to our work than other types of plays. Instruction and practical work in costume, scenery, make-up, lighting, etc., will be provided for members from time to time.

The French course aims to teach the pupil to read with ease and understanding; to develop oral expression which will aid him to think in French and to guide him in gaining a knowledge of the people of the country.

MATHEMATICS

In the Junior High School courses are offered in arithmetic, concrete algebra and concrete geometry. In the Senior High School first course in Algebra, Plane Geometry, Advanced Algebra, and Trigonometry are offered. In all courses in mathematics

an effort is made to train the pupil, first to understand the problem and second to solve the problem by means of methods already studied.

SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

The Science Department offers four courses: General Science for Junior High, Biology, Physics, and Chemistry in the Senior High School. Seven periods per week are devoted to each of the above in the Senior High School, three periods in class discussion and four in the laboratory. The pupil has an opportunity to work out problems in the laboratory which are written up following a definite outline.

SOCIAL SCIENCES

The following courses are given: Junior High History and Geography. Senior High, History of Civilization, U. S. History, and Economics.

It is the purpose of the social studies to create an open mind and an appreciation of our civilization and to understand the chief modes of living in all parts of the world in the past as well as in the present.

COMMERCIAL COURSE

The following courses are offered: Junior Business Training, Bookkeeping, Stenography, Typewriting, and Office Practice.

The objectives of these courses are to give the student a working knowledge of the fundamentals of this subject. Stress is laid on the theory and practice of Bookkeeping, Stenography and Typewriting, with special emphasis on practical work in all three branches. Fixed standards must be met.

HOME ECONOMICS

Courses in Home Economics deal with problems and ideals in homemaking.

Juniors and seniors are offered the following courses. The House, Its Care and Management and Family Relationships on alternate years. The former course was offered at Vilas High

School in 1934-35. In this course we endeavor to solve problems in housing, financing, building, furnishing and equipping a home. We study and practice methods in cleaning and caring for the home.

Management problems in labor, time and money are studied.

Plans are made for the care of home grounds, the lawn and garden.

The courses offered for freshmen and sophomores are Clothing and Textiles and Foods and Nutrition on alternate years.

In the Clothing and Textile course, stress is placed on selection, use and care of fabrics.

Elements which contribute to personal attractiveness such as the care of the hair, skin and fingernails are studied, also color and line in costume design are emphasized.

Home Project work which is correlated with class work is carried on by each girl in the High School Home Economics course.

The purpose of project work is to give the girl a chance to work out real problems in a real situation, to make the home a better place in which to live, and to make herself as well as others, a more worthy member of the family.

The Junior High girls are given work in sewing and cooking. They learn to use the sewing machine, to make simple garments, to do simple embroidery stitches, and to care for their clothing.

The girls in cooking learn ways of preserving food, methods of preparing and serving simple meals and the great importance which food has on one's health.

AGRICULTURAL COURSE

The aim of the Agricultural Course is to prepare boys to become practical, intelligent, businesslike farmers, and useful citizens.

The scope of the work is based largely on the agriculture in the community and the home projects of the boys. Every boy

is required to have a home project each year. It is expected each boy will increase the size of his project from year to year so by his senior year he will have a good sized project.

The boys in the department are divided into two groups, one group consisting of Freshmen and Sophomores and the other of Juniors and Seniors. This year there are thirteen boys in the lower group and seven in the upper group.

Approximately one-third of the time is spent in the school shop. Here the work is made as practical as possible. The boys build such things as truck braces, chick feed hoppers, wheelbarrows, tool racks, etc. The boys have also overhauled a truck engine, pleasure car engine and we expect soon to be working on a tractor.

Our school was represented at the annual interscholastic judging contest held at the University of New Hampshire. Teams were entered in the following contests: Dairy Cattle, livestock, fruit, poultry, wood chopping, and wood identification. Four boys exhibited eggs in the egg and baby chick show held at Concord in January.

The practical, scientific and business points of farming are balanced so as to equip a boy to meet and solve the problems which will arise as he lives as a rural citizen.

The cooperation of the parents will determine to a great extent the value of the course to the boy, especially in assisting the supervision of the Home Projects.

MUSIC

All members of the student body participate in chorus singing, at least twice a week. Special work for those especially interested in music is given each Monday, at which time special training is given in instrumental and vocal music.

SOCIAL PROGRAMS

The social program calls for one event each month sponsored by a different class. The aim is instruction as well as entertain-

ment. To date instruction has been given in round dancing and the grand march. Socials have included a Hallowe'en party, a "nutty" party, a Christmas party, and a school carnival.

We have a Stamp Club, Commercial Club, and Agricultural Club which meet once each month. These clubs meet for social activities and also to sponsor assembly programs etc.

We have assembly programs once each week. These programs are put on by the various classes and occasionally an outside speaker is heard. Devotional exercises are held two mornings each week.

Athletic instruction is given in soccer, basketball and baseball. Regular interscholastic contests will be held in basketball and baseball but it is felt that a good intermural program should be conducted so as to give a large number of students a chance to participate.

Some parents have come to the school to talk over their children's problems. It is felt that this is very helpful and hope many more such visits by parents will be made.

The school nurse has examined the pupils and reports the desirability of a dental clinic. It is hoped it will be possible to carry out this program.

In behalf of the school, I wish to thank the people of Alstead, Acworth, Langdon, and Marlow who have supported our work and cooperated in making it more effective. I wish to make grateful acknowledgement of the cordial cooperation of the Grange, Outing Club, and other organizations while we were in the temporary school. May I also express appreciation to the superintendent, teachers, pupils, and parents for their whole-hearted cooperation.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

Mr. C. D. Dalzell,

Dear Sir:

I herewith submit my first annual report as supervisor of music.

The schedule permits one day in the Vilas High School and the graded schools of Alstead village.

In the graded schools one-half hour is given each week in both rooms. In the primary room we have been training the child voice and the ear. We have only two pupils in this room at present classified as monotones. A toy orchestra has been started here. The instrument used by each child is a horse shoe which is struck by a long spike.

In the grammar room, books have been put into the hands of the pupils. They are studying note reading, instrumentation and the famous composers.

In the Vilas High School much interest is shown in the building up of an orchestra. At the beginning of the year we had one violin and one trumpet pupil. We have at the present time five violin pupils, five trumpets, one clarinet, one C melody saxophone and one trombone pupil. More pupils would be playing and studying instruments if they could get the instruments. It is hoped that the music department may later own the more unusual and more expensive instruments.

One forty minute period of choral singing is given in the Junior High School. The choral class in the high school is an elective subject. There are forty-eight pupils enrolled. This class plans to present an operetta in the spring.

On January 23rd a music festival was held in the Vilas High School auditorium. The guests were Simonds Free High School orchestra, Walpole High School orchestra, Simonds double quartette, Walpole sextette and five boys from the Kurn Hatten band. A rehearsal was held in the morning which was attended by the music pupils of the Vilas High School. In the afternoon a program was presented before the high school. It is hoped that the program was an inspiration to the pupils of Vilas High School to have such organizations in their own school.

I wish to thank Miss Jones who has helped the pupils with their music during the week and also Mr. Fenton for his help and cooperation with the music department.

19 pupils were unvaccinated without proper excuse.

6 pupils were vaccinated once unsuccessfully.

7 pupils from the Mica Mine school attended a dental clinic at Dr. G. Alex. Campbell's office, Keene, N. H., and had complete dental care.

32 pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist.

Tonsil clinics were held June 6th and Dec. 1st 1934.

2 tonsil cases were treated.

1 tonsil case was treated privately.

6 pupils have had special eye examination and defects corrected.
