## REMARKS.

---

By reference to the financial statement on the preceding pages, it will be seen that the expenditures on account of High School during the past year amounts to \$1,710.30. This does not correctly represent the cost of maintaining the High School for the year, as approximately \$300.00 of the \$1,403.25 paid teachers, was for services rendered previous to the close of the winter term in 1904.

For the year ending in June, 1905, the salary of of High School teachers will be \$1,287.00, or \$116.25 less than has actually been paid out during the year ending Feb. 15, 1905. At the close of the present Winter term, there will be due teachers, \$178.25, which must be paid from the 1905 appropriation.

We are of the opinion that the yearly appropriation should be made to cover all expenses to the close of the winter term. This can be done by reducing the length of the school year, lowering the salaries of the teachers, or by appropriating an additional sum to cover present deficiency.

There are at present five pupils attending our High School from out of town, from whom we receive tuition of \$10.00 a term. We can only hope to increase, or maintain this number, by keeping up the standard and length of our school.



The School Census of October, 1904, shows that we have 234 school children in town, between the ages of 5 and 16 years. We have carried scholars from Division 7 to Division 1; from Division 6 to 2; from Division 5 to 3; and are also carrying children to Division 4. While the expense is considerable, it is less than it would cost to maintain schools in these divisions.

We are gratified by the interest displayed by the parents and others in the schools, as evinced by the large number of visitors, and invite suggestions and friendly criticism from all who have the good of the schools at heart.

- 4— To see how much money the Town will appropriate for the Antrim Free Library.
- 5— To see if the Town will appropriate Fifty Dollars to assist Ephraim Weston Post, No.87,G.A.R., in properly observing Memorial Day.
- 6— To see what action the Town will take in regard to street-lighting and appropriate money therefor.
- 7— To see if the Town will vote to have the Invoice and Taxes printed for the ensuing year, with the valuation of each lot of real estate printed separately, and appropriate a sum of money therefor, or take any other action thereon.
- 8— To see how much money the Town will vote to raise to repair roads and bridges the year ensuing.
- 9— To see if the Town will appropriate \$50.00 to improve the cemeteries.
- 10 —To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money for the proper observance of "Old Home Week."
- 11—To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to contract with Rev.W.R.Cochrane, or some person, to revise and publish the History of Antrim to 1905 and to take any action in regard to same.

- 12—To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure State aid for the permanent improvement of highways under the law passed at the January Session 1905.
- 13—To see if the Town will vote to return to the District system of repairing highways, and instruct the Selectmen to divide the town into ten highway districts, and appoint surveyors for the same
- 14—To see if the Town will vote to pay members of the Fire Department, when called outside the Precinct to a fire, the same rate per hour under the same rules as in the precinct, or take any other action thereto.
- 15—To see if the Town will vote to raise a certain percent. on the valuation to defray town charges, pay existing debts, to cover all appropriations made by the School District, and to carry the above articles into effect.
