BENNINGTON TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bennington in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: You are hereby notified in accordance with RSA 40:13, the First Session of all business other than voting by official ballot shall be held on Tuesday, February 3, 2015 at 7:00 p.m. at Pierce School, 19 Main Street in said Town. The First Session will consist of explanation, discussion, and debate of each Warrant Article. Warrant Articles may be amended, subject to the following limitations:

- (a) Warrant Articles whose wording is prescribed by law shall not be amended.
- (b) Warrant Articles that are amended shall be placed on the official ballot for final vote on the main motion, as amended.

The Second Session of the annual meeting, to vote on questions required by law to be inserted on said official ballot, and to vote on all Warrant Articles from the First Session on official ballot shall be held on Tuesday, March 10, 2015 from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. at Pierce School, 19 Main Street in said Town, to act upon the following:

(Note: The casting of absentee ballots will begin at 2:00 p.m. The polls will close at 7:00 p.m.)

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. Are you in favor of amending **Article VII** (General Requirements) of the Zoning Ordinance as follows?
 - O. <u>Small-Scale Farming</u>: Small-scale farming, including horticulture, dairying, livestock and poultry raising, veterinary clinics, other agricultural enterprises or uses, and the care and raising of other domestic animals, is permitted in all districts, subject to the following conditions:
 - Farm animals in the Village District must be confined to a pen or other structure;
 - 2. Newly constructed housing for animals, including pens, must meet all setback requirements of the zone in which the lot is located.

Accessory Uses: Occupations such as sale of handicrafts made on the premises and sale of locally raised produce are permitted as accessory uses.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

3. Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an operating budget, **not including** appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the Budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the First Session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling one million six hundred fifty thousand nine hundred ninety five dollars (\$1,650,995)? Should this article be defeated, the Default Budget shall be one million six hundred fifty two thousand eight hundred forty eight dollars (\$1,652,848) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town or by law; or the governing body may hold one Special Meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

(Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

4. Shall the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to fill the Town Treasurer position by appointment rather than by election?

(Recommended by the Selectmen and Treasurer)

5. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to be added to the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund? (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

- 6. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (**\$10,000**) to be added to the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund?

 (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)
- 7. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Rescue Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund?

 (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)
- 8. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (**\$15,000**) to be added to the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund?

 (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)
- Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to be added to the Road Rehabilitation Capital Reserve Fund? (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)
- 10. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (**\$1,000**) to be added to the Mower Capital Reserve Fund?

 (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)
- 11. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Library Capital Reserve Fund?

 (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)
- 12. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of twenty five hundred dollars (\$2,500) to be added to the Fire Department Breathing Apparatus Fund?

 (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

- 13. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to be added to the Highway Truck Capital Reserve Fund?

 (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)
- 14. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (**\$15,000**) to be added to the Water Department Capital Reserve Fund?

 (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)
- 15. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (**\$15,000**) to be added to the Town Buildings Expendable Trust Fund?

 (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)
- 16. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Fire Department Protective Gear Fund?

 (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)
- 17. To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to NH RSA 35:9-a-II, to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to pay for capital reserve fund investment management services, and any other expenses incurred, from capital reserve funds income. No vote by the Town to rescind such authority shall occur within five years of the original adoption of this article.

(Recommended by the Trustees of Trust Funds)

18. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in support of The Grapevine Family & Community Resource Center — a nonprofit organization? The appropriation would provide \$4,000 funding for The Grapevine Family & Resource Center and \$1,000 funding for The Teen Center's programs and services.

- 19. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred eighty one dollars (**\$681**) in support of the American Red Cross a nonprofit organization?

- 20. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (**\$500**) in support of the Contoocook Valley Transportation Company a nonprofit organization? (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

TOWN OF BENNINGTON, NEW HAMPSHIRE MINUTES OF THE FEBRUARY 4, 2014 TOWN MEETING DELIBERATIVE SESSION-SESSION 1 AND MARCH 11, 2014 TOWN ELECTION RESULTS-SESSION 2

Session 1 of the 2014 Bennington Town Meeting convened on Tuesday, February 4, 2014 at the Pierce School multi-purpose room in Bennington New Hampshire. John J. Cronin III, the Town Moderator called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

The meeting was opened with the reciting of the Pledge of Allegiance and there was a moment of silence for long standing citizen, Harvey Goodwin. The Moderator, as mandated under Senate Bill 2, which the Town of Bennington adopted on March 12, 1996, briefly explained the procedures and rules of conduct for the Deliberative Session. Each warrant article will be read and discussed and any amendments proposed from the floor must be submitted in writing to the Moderator.

All voting on the Warrant Articles, Town and School District Officials, and the Conval School District Warrant Articles will be voted on at the polls on March 11, 2014 at Pierce School in Bennington, New Hampshire. The polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bennington in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: You are hereby notified in accordance with RSA 40:13, the First Session of all business other than voting by official ballot shall be held on Tuesday, February 4, 2014 at 7:00 p.m. at Pierce School, 19 Main Street in said Town. The First Session will consist of explanation, discussion, and debate of each Warrant Article. Warrant Articles may be amended, subject to the following limitations:

- (a) Warrant Articles whose wording is prescribed by law shall not be amended.
- (b) Warrant Articles that are amended shall be placed on the official ballot for final vote on the main motion, as amended.

The Second Session of the annual meeting, to vote on questions required by law to be inserted on said official ballot, and to vote on all Warrant Articles from the First Session on official ballot shall be held on Tuesday, March 11, 2014 from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. at Pierce School, 19 Main Street in said Town, to act upon the following:

Note: The casting of absentee ballots will begin at 2:00 p.m. The polls will close at 7:00 p.m.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. The March 11, 2014 election results are as follows:

When the polls opened at 8:00 a.m., the Voter Checklist contained 993 registered voters. During Election Day, 6 new voters were added to the checklist. When the polls closed at 7:00 p.m., the Voters Checklist contained 999 voters. A total of 214 voters cast their ballots in this election, which was a 22% voter turnout.

The Deliberative Town Meeting, Session 1 was attended by 30 registered voters.

The Moderator initiated the following articles:

- 2. Are you in favor of amending **Article VII** (General Requirements) of the Zoning Ordinance as follows?
 - N. <u>Poultry</u>: Non-commercial keeping of chickens or ducks is permitted in all zones, provided the following conditions are met:
 - 1. Chickens and ducks in the Village District must be confined to a pen or other structure.
 - 2. Newly constructed housing for poultry, including pens, must meet all setback requirements of the zone in which the lot is located.

Note: Selectman Rose noted that this article cannot be amended. The article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES-163 NO-48 THE ARTICLE PASSED

It was noted that the warrant articles would be presented out of order so that the article for the Grapevine can be heard.

17. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in support of The Grapevine Family & Community Resource Center – a nonprofit organization? The appropriation would provide \$4,000 funding for The Grapevine Family & Resource Center and \$1,000 funding for The Teen Center's programs and services.

Note: Selectman Rose asked Kristen Vance from the Grapevine to speak to the article. The Grapevine is asking for \$4000 for general operating costs and \$1000 for the teen center. The Town has given support to the Grapevine for the past 9 years. Though State support has

decreased, no programs have been cut. The Grapevine is currently restructuring the Teen Center. No amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 139 NO- 72 THE ARTICLE PASSED

3. Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an operating budget, **not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately**, the amounts set forth on the Budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the First Session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling one million five hundred eighty nine thousand nine hundred nine dollars (\$1,589,909)?

Should this article be defeated, the Default Budget shall be one million five hundred eighty four thousand six hundred two dollars (\$1,584,602) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town or by law; or the governing body may hold one Special Meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

Note: Selectman Cleary addressed the article noting that the school budget has an impact on the tax rate. No amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 141 NO- 71 THE ARTICLE PASSED

4. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of nine thousand dollars (\$9,000) for the purchase of a thermal imaging camera for the Fire Department?

Note: Selectman Osienski asked Fire Chief Michael Roina to address the article. Chief Roina stated that most towns have a thermal imaging camera and at the current time Bennington has to depend on the ability to use one from the truck of other towns. The Fire Department has raised a little over \$1000 for the camera. The estimated cost is \$10500. Christopher Maple asked if the Fire Department has done comparison shopping. They have. It was noted that the life expectancy of the equipment is 10 years and it comes with a 5 year warranty. Barry White asked if there is a service contract included. There is and a loaner camera will be provided if work is needed. Kristie LaPlante stated that if more donations are made, it will decrease the amount needed for the purchase but the Fire Department does not foresee any more fund raising. No amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 127 NO- 85 THE ARTICLE PASSED

5. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to be added to the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund?

Note: Selectman Rose addressed the article noting that this is an on-going fund. Fire Chief Roina noted that the current balance in the fund is \$175,875. A replacement truck will cost between \$200,000 and \$600,000. The next fire truck is due to be replaced in 2018. The Fire Department will be looking at trucks in the \$250,000 range. Barry White asked if the State dictates when a truck needs to be replaced. Selectman Cleary noted that the guidelines suggest trucks are replaced after 20 years but it can be stretched out. No amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 146 NO- 65 THE ARTICLE PASSED

6. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to be added to the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund?

Note: Selectman Cleary asked Road Agent Gary Russell to address the article. The money will be added to the fund to help replace Highway equipment. No amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 145 NO- 67 THE ARTICLE PASSED

7. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Rescue Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund?

Note: Selectman Osienski asked Fire Chief to address the article. Fire Chief Roina noted that the current balance in the fund is \$27,889. The rescue vehicle was replaced in 2009. This is the busiest vehicle the Fire Department has. The Fire Department is hopeful that they will be able to get more than 20 years of service from the vehicle. No amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 141 NO- 70 THE ARTICLE PASSED

8. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to be added to the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund?

Note: Selectman Rose addressed the article noting that funding for the Police cruiser was turned down last year. A cruiser needed to be replaced last year. Money that had been in the fund was used along with a donation of a cruiser package. There is currently \$3000 in the fund. No amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 109 NO- 100 THE ARTICLE PASSED

9. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to be added to the Road Rehabilitation Capital Reserve Fund?

Note: Selectman Cleary asked Road Agent Gary Russell to address the article. In the past three years, the total money set aside for road rehabilitation has not been depleted. This year the money will be used for the culvert on Bible Hill Road. Barry White asked if there will be money for drainage on Gillis Hill Road. No amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 153 NO- 57

THE ARTICLE PASSED

10. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to be added to the Mower Capital Reserve Fund?

Note: Selectman Osienski spoke to the article noting that this fund was created 4 years ago. The Town bought a new mower last year. Barry White asked where the mower was used. It is used primarily for the ball field on Bible Hill Road. It is currently not used for the ball field on Route 202 and is not used for the cemeteries. No Amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 135 NO- 76 THE ARTICLE PASSED

11. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Library Capital Reserve Fund?

Note: Selectman Cleary addressed the article noting that this is an on-going fund. The current balance is \$37,164. NO amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 139 NO- 73 THE ARTICLE PASSED

12. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of twenty five hundred dollars (\$2,500) to be added to the Fire Department Breathing Apparatus Fund?

Note: Selectman Cleary asked Fire Chief Roina to speak to the article. The Fire Department received a grant in 2009 for the replacement of the bottles for the breathing apparatus. The bottles have a 10 year life but they will need to be replaced at the same time. No amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 162 NO- 56 THE ARTICLE PASSED

13. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,000) to be added to the Highway Truck Capital Reserve Fund?

Note: Selectman Osienski asked Road Agent Russell to speak to the article. The Town currently has three trucks ranging in age of 6 years to 18 or 19 years. NO amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 133 NO- 78 THE ARTICLE PASSED

14. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to be added to the Water Department Capital Reserve Fund?

Note: Selectmen Rose addressed the article noting that the dredging of the lagoon is more reasonable that expected. The fund is for expenses which currently there is an average of 2 breaks per year. It was noted that some of the parts of the system are over 100 years old. Barry White asked if Antrim pays for part of the expenses. Antrim pays the larger amount and is Bennington's back-up system.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 134 NO—77 THE ARTICLE PASSED

15. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to be added to the Town Buildings Expendable Trust Fund?

Note: Selectman Cleary spoke to the article noting that there is a current balance of \$48,686. The Town is in process of renovating the VFW to be used for voting purposes. The Town Hall is in need of repairs. The Fire Station needs work on the upstairs bathrooms. The Fire Department is currently looking at grants and work by volunteers. The main goal on buildings this year is the work on the VFW. The Town intends to maintain the integrity and history of the VFW. John Cronin noted that the SAU has been told that the Town will have a more suitable facility for voting before the next national election. Barry White stated that there is not enough parking at the VFW. No amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 122 NO- 87 THE ARTICLE PASSED

16. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Fire Department Protective Gear Fund?

Note: Selectman Osienski asked Fire Chief Roina to speak to the article. The Chief has met with the manufacturer of fire gear. The fire gear has a shelf life of 10 years and the Fire Department is hoping to replace 2 sets of gear each year. Barry White asked if the Firemen all wear the same gear. The pump operators do not need full gear as they are staying at the truck. No amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS YES- 169 NO- 43 THE ARTICLE PASSED

18. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred eighty one dollars (\$681) in support of the American Red Cross – a nonprofit organization?

Note: Selectman Cleary spoke to the article noting that this is an ongoing fund. No amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 139 NO- 72 THE ARTICLE PASSED

19. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) in support of the Contoocook Valley Transportation Company – a nonprofit organization?

Note: Selectman Osienski spoke to the article noting that this organization supplies rides for those in need in the area. No amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 151 NO- 61 THE ARTICLE PASSED

20. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) in support of the Court Appointed Special Advocates – a nonprofit organization?

Note: Selectman Rose asked John Cronin to speak to the article. Mr. Cronin noted that this is a critical time to help young people in the State. No amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 135 NO- 77 THE ARTICLE PASSED

21. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) in support of the Contoocook Housing Trust – a nonprofit organization?

Note: Selectman Cleary introduced the article. Jonathan Manley noted that the Contoocook Housing Trust maintains housing units for low income families. No amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 138 NO- 73 THE ARTICLE PASSED

22. Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) in support of the Child Advocacy Center of Hillsborough County – a nonprofit organization?

Note: Selectman Osienski introduced the article. John Cronin noted that the State funding for guardian at litem has been taken away. The program fills a gap and is a worthy investment. Police Chief Campbell noted that there is a center located in Peterborough which is utilized by Bennington citizens. No amendments were introduced and the article was accepted as written.

2014 RESULTS: YES- 156 NO- 56 THE ARTICLE PASSED Joseph MacGregor made an announcement that the School Board Deliberative Session scheduled for February 5, 2014 has been moved to February 6, 2014. There being no other business at hand, the meeting was adjourned at 7:56 p.m.

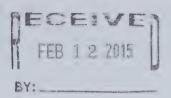

SELECTMEN'S MESSAGE

It is with a little bit of luck and a lot of tenacity that the staff at Town Hall was able to balance three significant projects this year. Construction of the Antrim/Bennington bridge, by Cold River Bridges, LLC, was completed in June of 2014. The Town's cost was 10% of the \$1,145,762 bridge project. Construction, by Landsite Corporation, began in July on the Bible Hill Road culvert replacement project; made possible by a 75% FEMA grant. The September completion of the 8' culvert installation, along with raising the roadway 4', proved its worth when significant rainfall moved through the area in the fall and travel at the Bible Hill Road/North Bennington Road intersection was not impeded. Throughout the year staff was assisting Fay, Spofford & Thorndike engineers with the Final Design process of TEP2. This construction project, which will start in the spring of 2015, will more clearly and safely define the Bible Hill Road/ Eaton Avenue/ Antrim Road/Main Street intersection while improving visibility and drainage in that area as well as Francestown Road to Eaton Avenue. The Town is liable for 20% of the project cost with 80% being paid by the NH Department of Transportation.

Revaluation of the Town was completed this year. The State requires every municipality to certify its values at least every five years. Failure to do this has serious financial consequences. The end result was a \$15,000,000 reduction in assessed value, which equates to a 13% decrease. As a rule of thumb, when assessed values decrease, the tax rate will always increase to pay for voter authorized appropriations.

Last year, like many other towns in New Hampshire and the nation, we were unable to adequately staff lifeguards at Whittemore Lake. Moving forward to 2015, the Selectmen voted not to hire lifeguards due to a cost saving concession for a very challenging budget year. The beach will still be open, the Highway Department will still be doing a weekly cleanup, a portable toilet will still be provided, an emergency telephone has been installed, and we are assured that with the proper signage (which we do display) the Town will not have any increased liability.

On the positive side we presently have many Recreation Department sponsored activities. Almost every night there are meetings for Scouts, Yoga, several different Martial Arts programs, Zumba, and there's talk of a Seniors Group starting. Our Town Hall, though not ideal, is being used almost every night. The need for more meeting space and an election polling place lead us to the VFW.

Though the Pierce School Administration is very accommodating, we recognize that we cannot vote at the school forever. We also need a handicap accessible facility for Boards and Organizations to meet. To that end the Building Committee has been pursuing plans for the renovation of the VFW building, which was offered to, and subsequently deeded to the Town in 2008. It was decided we would go through the process of design with both an historical architect and an energy consultant as these two avenues seemed to offer us the best possibility of securing grants to assist us with paying for building renovations.

Our investment in these two professionals also came at a reduced rate as we received considerable grants towards payment of their services. As a result we now have, and it has been accepted by the Building and Energy Committees, a Condition Assessment and Reuse Feasibility Report of the former Railroad Station. Armed with this tool we can now attempt to secure some construction grants.

The Selectmen believe that, without grant money, it is not feasible to completely follow the approved plan but we know we need to begin work on this facility. Our intent is to move forward

on the things we all agree need to get done, while waiting to see if any grant funds are available to us. In any case we feel certain we will need to ask for volunteer labor to assist with this effort. It is our hope that, as when our Fire Station was built and Newhall Field was constructed at no cost to the community, the Town will rally and help us achieve what we could not otherwise afford to do. Stay tuned as we will be asking for your help.

We are pleased to announce this year there were two recipients of the Edward E. French Memorial Scholarship awards. Selena Baldwin has plans to pursue anthropology and Christopher Ouellete has a passion for graphic and visual arts, especially film. This award, which comes with a \$1000 scholarship, is open to all Bennington seniors; be they in Conval, privately educated, or home schooled.

This fall a group of ten volunteers, responding to a Town-wide appeal, were appointed to a Police Study Committee. For the past twenty years C. Stephen Campbell has been our Police Chief. He has been a great asset to this community and we will be very sorry to see him go. With his declared intention to retire May 1, it seemed to be an appropriate time to get feedback from citizens about your Police Department. This committee debriefed the Chief on the status of the Police Department both present and past, examined many forms of historical Police data, and created, distributed and critiqued a survey soliciting feedback and providing valuable guidelines for the Selectmen and future Police personnel. It does not seem to be appropriate to try and sum up this extensive body of work in a few sentences, but the full report providing conclusions, and the reason those conclusions were reached, is available at the Town Hall. The Select Board thanks all the volunteers that worked on this committee with special appreciation to their elected Chairman Phil Germain, for a thoughtful comprehensive study and professionally presented report. Within the month of reading this report the Select Board, in conjunction with John Cronin (who has helped select the two past Police Chiefs), Debora Ash and Keith Nason from the Police Study Committee will begin the process to hire Chief Campbell's successor.

Speaking of volunteers we would like to thank Stephen Willette for becoming the newest member of the Conservation Commission. Regretfully we have vacancies on the Planning Board, the Zoning Board of Adjustment, and the Recreation Committee. We know your membership and participation on any of these boards would be valued and appreciated. These boards help guide and protect the many good things Bennington has to offer, but they only work when staffed with adequate volunteer participation.

As part of a Boy Scout project, Assistant Sr. Patrol leader of Troop 2, Maxwell Davie undertook a service project to revamp several weathered "Welcome to Bennington" signs. Maxwell cut, painted and assembled the framing for three new replacement signs. That's the kind of initiative that gets things done! Thank You Max for helping beautify Bennington.



We also would like to express our appreciation to the Bennington Fire Department Association for raising and contributing \$1,500 towards the 2014 purchase of a Thermal Image Camera. Voters supported a 2014 Warrant Article that partially funded this valuable tool but the Association's fund drive made the purchase possible.

Our most significant 2014 purchase, late in the year, was a new truck for the Highway Department. The new Freightliner SD 108 will replace the 1996 International for snow plowing and heavy hauling. We expect it to be on the roads by mid-February so you may have already seen it. Its cost of \$149,260 came out of existing Capital Reserve Funds, demonstrating the value of putting aside money each year for these known major expenses.

For anyone not yet aware of it, we want you to know that the Selectmen have approved an expansion of TDS's services. This summer and fall they ran fiber optic cable to almost all areas of Town; capable of providing telephone, internet, and television service. The TDS expansion provides a second choice for the purchase of these services, in addition to the Comcast Franchise.

Lastly, we pushed very hard to come up with a 2015 budget that is only 2.7% higher than last year's. We have had a number of issues that make this an expensive upcoming year. It is thanks to every Board and Department in Town that the budget isn't higher. The Selectmen want to assure you that we are constantly trying to acquire the best value we can for the services the Town must provide. With the exception of upgrading our computer software at a price tag of approximately \$24,000, that we simply must find funding for, we expect a more normal budget year looking forward.

2014 ANALYSIS OF MEETING WITH DEPARTMENT HEADS AND COMMITTEES.

Highway Department:

The Town expended \$40,000 from the Road Rehabilitation CRF for costs associated with the Bible Hill Road Culvert replacement project.

The Funding Committee voted to appropriate \$25,000 to the Highway Truck CRF, \$10,000 to the Highway Equipment CRF, \$25,000 to the Road Rehabilitation CRF and \$1,000 to the Mower CRF. Due to budget constraints identified in December, funding for the Highway Truck CRF was reduced by \$5,000 and the Road Rehabilitation CRF was reduced by \$10,000.

The Town expended \$1,731.87 from the Bridge Replacement CRF for completion of the Antrim/Bennington bridge replacement project. Due to achieving this milestone, the Funding Committee voted not to fund the Bridge Replacement CRF. The Funding Committee voted not to fund the Bridge Repair CRF since available funding seems to be adequate.

The Town expended \$5,273.59 from two Fire Department Capital Reserve Funds (CRF), which included \$458.09 from the SCBA CRF and \$4,815.50 for the purchase of protective gear (Protective Gear CRF).

The Funding Committee voted to appropriate \$40,000 to the Fire Truck CRF, \$5,000 to the Rescue Vehicle CRF, \$2,500 to the SCBA CRF and \$5,000 to the Protective Gear CRF. Due to budget constraints identified in December, funding for the Fire Truck was reduced by \$20,000.

The 2011 Crown Vic sedan is scheduled to be replaced in 2015 at an estimated net trade-in cost of \$32,000.

The Capital Reserve Funding Committee voted to appropriate \$15,000 to the Police Cruiser CRF.

Utility Departments:

The Town expended \$19,840.84 from the Water Department Capital Reserve Fund for water line maintenance at the Eaton Avenue/Bible Hill Road intersection; no funds were expended from the Sewer CRF.

The Capital Reserve Funding Committee voted to appropriate \$15,000 to the Water Department CRF. At the recommendation of the Water/Sewer Commissioners funds were not appropriated for the Sewer Capital Reserve Fund since existing funds should be adequate to pay for the 2015 dredging of the sewer lagoons.

December 31, 2014 CRF balances for the Utility Departments accounts are as follows:

Municipal Departments:

The Town expended \$33,000 from the Revaluation CRF for the State mandated 2014 revaluation of all real estate. The balance of the cost was paid from the Operating Budget. The Funding Committee voted not to fund the Revaluation CRF due to budget constraints.

The Selectmen continue their work with the Facilities Committee and the Energy Committee with the expectation of rehabilitating the VFW into a community building which will be able to accommodate voting activities. The Capital Reserve Funding Committee voted to appropriate \$15,000 to the Town Buildings Expendable Trust Fund.

During the 2014 calendar year \$11,940.86 was expended from the Sidewalk CRF for engineering services relative to the upcoming second phase of the downtown construction project. The CRFC initially voted to appropriate \$5,000 to the Sidewalk CRF. Rather than take the risk that the associated Warrant Article could be defeated, the Selectmen voted to add funds to the Operating Budget; construction is scheduled for spring 2015. Funding for the Sidewalk was reduced by \$5,000, a \$0 appropriation.

Materials can be borrowed from most statewide New Hampshire public libraries, school libraries, or college and university libraries. In 2014, Bennington patrons borrowed 811 print and audio visual materials from other New Hampshire libraries. Having access to multiple state collections makes it feasible for patrons to borrow materials that are of limited edition, are out of print, or that are too expensive to acquire. In addition to borrowing books from other state libraries, our patrons borrowed 14,291 materials from our own in-house collection and also went online and borrowed 466 titles from the NH Downloadables Overdrive collection, and 179 titles from Tumblebooks; both of which are our free digital subscription resources.

The library houses a materials collection of 24,295 that includes 1,687 DVDs of our own. In addition, we have access to a rotating DVD collection of 560 belonging to the Nubanusit Library Cooperative. Library patrons also borrowed from our collection of 25 periodical subscriptions and the Monadnock-Ledger Transcript newspaper.

A library card permits patrons to take advantage of the library's many museum passes. Patrons can check out passes to *The Museum of Fine Arts* in Boston, *The Currier Museum of Art* in Manchester, NH, *The Montshire Children's Museum* in Norwich, VT, *The Fells* in Newbury, NH, *The Mariposa Museum*, Peterborough, NH, *The Seacoast Science Center*, Odiorne State Park, Rye, NH.

With a card, patrons can take advantage of a variety of programs, activities, field trips, holiday programs, speakers and demonstrations throughout the year. As much as possible, programs are held within the library's walls. The summer reading program's story times and special activities are held under the library's reading tent and some of the programs requiring space for showing slides or movies are held at the VFW Hall. The Story Walks are held throughout the Bruce Edes Forest, field trips are throughout New Hampshire and New England and at least one program a year is held at Pierce School.

Reference is done a little differently in the 21rst century than it had been in the 20th. There are still the traditional in-house paper reference resources and a very good nonfiction collection. Now, patrons can also access an extensive online database called Ebscohost, for free. Ebscohost can be accessed from a patron's own home computers & devices or from one of the library's computers. Ebscohost provides access to a collection that includes: Masterfile Premier,

Business Search Elite, Health Source (medical references), Consumer Edition, Newspaper Source, Elementary through Secondary school academic reference resources, professional development collections and journals, ERIC (Education Resources Information Center), Novelist for elementary through adult ages, Ancestry.com and Heritage.com.

Patrons who do not have online access at home can get online 24/7 with the library's free public access Wi-Fi. Patrons can use their own devices or use one of the library's two public access computers. If we are not open, patrons can get online with their portable devices while sitting out in front of the library or from their vehicles. With the library's computers, patrons can print in black & white or color. Some can even print wirelessly from their own devices, which includes from their cell phones. Patrons can use the library's online access to apply for jobs, send and receive email, write resumes, do their homework, download airline tickets, check in with NH Unemployment, fill out tax and banking forms, apply to colleges, take online courses and tests, post items on E-bay & Craig's list, check Pinterest, Facebook, and generally keep in touch with family and friends. Aside from printing from the library's computers, patrons can photocopy documents in black and white and or color from the library's photocopier. Patrons can also send and receive FAXes from the library's FAX machine.

We thank all of our library patrons and volunteers, of all ages, who faithfully use the library's resources, donate their time, talents, money and materials to the library for the benefit and enrichment of their neighbor patron's lives. We look forward to seeing all of you many times over this coming year and we hope that patrons of all ages will take advantage of this year's summer reading program, that will be all about HEROES, entitled: 'Every Hero Has a Story'.

We will see you at the library!

POLICE DEPARTMENT

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

2014 was another quiet year for Emergency Management in Bennington, with zero events requiring the activation of local Emergency Management officials. While we kept an eye on weather systems that drenched the central part of the State during the summer, monitored snowstorms, and maintained situation awareness regarding the international Ebola outbreak, Bennington was able to rest easy and focus on its own.

Although it was a quiet year for emergencies that certainly does not mean we enjoyed a vacation from our duties. In 2014 we worked behind the scenes to update a crucial Hazard Mitigation Plan and administratively managed the culvert replacement project on Bible Hill Road.

<u>Hazard Mitigation Plan</u> – In 2007 the Town completed its first ever Hazard Mitigation Plan with the assistance of Southwest Region Planning Commission. The Plan serves as a means to reduce future losses from natural or man-made hazard events before they occur by identifying critical facilities and potential hazards. It is because of this plan that we were qualified to apply for the FEMA Hazard Mitigation Grant funds that were awarded for the Bible Hill Road culvert project.

Although the hazards and facilities don't change much over time, the Town was required to update this Plan in 2014. Throughout the spring and early summer the Hazard Mitigation Committee convened once a month to review and update the Plan with the goal of "checking in" on the hazards and facilities identified in 2007 and develop a plan to address mitigation strategies to keep our residents safe. The updated Plan was completed in the fall of 2014 and is currently in the hands of FEMA for approval.

<u>Bible Hill Road Culvert</u> – In January 2012 the Town was awarded Hazard Mitigation Grant funding through FEMA to reduce the frequency of flooding at the northern end of Bible Hill Road. Following the construction of the Depot Street bridges in Antrim and the shared Antrim/Bennington Bridge in 2013, the Town was finally able to focus its monies and attention the Hazard Mitigation project on Bible Hill in 2014.

As approved by FEMA, the Town was awarded \$304,684 to raise 475' of roadway approximately 4', replace a deteriorating and inadequate corrugated metal pipe culvert with an 8' precast concrete box culvert, and make other drainage improvements on the southern end of the project area. This project was a 75%/25% match, with FEMA obligating \$228,513 and the Town being responsible for \$76,171 in costs.

After two and a half months of construction, Landsite Corporation was able to complete the project on schedule at a total project cost (engineering and construction) of \$316,725. The end result is a roadway surface that is now 3' above the 10 year storm cycle river flow elevations, a larger, more durable culvert has been installed, and drainage along the roadway embankments has been greatly enhanced.

NH Alerts - In late 2014 / early 2015, the State of NH rolled out a free preparedness App for smartphones and Tablets, called "NH Alerts". NH Alerts is used by NH public safety officials to inform and protect State residents and visitors and delivers notifications to subscribers within a specific geographic area. If you are a NH resident and you do not have a smartphone or if you would like warnings sent to your landline phone you must sign up to receive emergency information by landline or other non-smartphone methods. Visit www.readynh.gov to learn more and sign up to start receiving notifications.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Bennington Conservation Commission was established in March of 1989 with the purpose of conserving, protecting, and managing Bennington's natural and historical resources.

We are pleased to highlight the Conservation Commission's news and events from 2014.

This year, Rose Melanson stepped down from the Conservation Commission. We would like to thank Rose for her time and enthusiasm on the Commission. In turn, the Selectmen appointed Stephen Willette, who has become an integral part of our Conservation Commission.

In January, members attended an Invasive Species talk sponsored by the Peterborough Conservation Commission. The speaker, Doug Cygan, is the Invasive Species Coordinator at NH's Department of Agriculture. The talk was educational and emphasized the detrimental effects invasive plants and insects have on our native plants and wildlife. Scientific research links the warming climate with invasive species proliferation.

Japanese Knotweed, an invasive plant common along many roadsides, not only crowds out native plants vital to wildlife habitats and healthy ecosystems, but its roots can damage roads and building foundations. Commission members have identified Knotweed close to the river near the VFW and have taken steps to eradicate it.

When purchasing plants and shrubs for your property, it is highly recommended to buy plants that are native to our region and from a reputable nursery. For information on prohibited species in NH and controlling invasive species go to:

Most importantly, we would like to thank all of the Bennington residents who took time from their busy schedules to help clean up the litter and debris from Bennington's roadsides. The Conservation Commission maintains and makes the Bruce Edes Memorial Forest a resource for all to enjoy. The GEP Dodge Library has sponsored story-walks and other events for people of all ages in the forest. In the fall, ID markers were officially placed which correspond with the Bruce Edes Forest brochure and map. Take some time to get out and take a hike in the forest. Studies show that spending time outdoors is a great way to unwind, relax and appreciate the wonders of the natural world.

PLANNING BOARD

In New Hampshire, the Planning Board has several functions. Its adjudicative functions include regulation of land subdivisions, review of site plans, and regulation of excavations. Legislative functions include preparation and adoption of the Master Plan and the Capital Improvement Program and recommendation of changes to the Zoning Ordinance, which take the form of proposed warrant articles for voter approval.

The Planning Board proposed one Zoning Warrant Article for the 2014 Town Meeting, which was approved by the voters. It allows the keeping of poultry in all zones, as long as certain conditions are met. For the 2015 ballot, the Board will propose a single Warrant Article that will allow small-scale farming in all districts in town. Currently farming is allowed only in the Rural-Agricultural Zone.

The Board received and approved one Subdivision request and one Lot Line Adjustment request this year. In addition the Board granted final approval of a Subdivision request that was submitted in 2013. In addition a Site Plan review was held for a property on Route 202. The Site Plan was approved on June 11, 2014.

Excavators must receive permits from both the State and the Town. The Board received one request for renewal of a gravel pit Excavation Permit in 2014. The renewal request was granted, and the permit is now set to expire in 2019 at the same time the State permit comes up for renewal. Excavation permits for the two other gravel pit operations in town will need to be renewed in 2015.

The Planning Board is working on the Town's Master Plan. In particular, the plan is Statemandated to include a vision statement that captures the Town's land-use philosophy. The Board issued a questionnaire to town residents in order to obtain guidance in preparation of the vision statement. The tally of survey responses appears elsewhere in this document. Guided by the survey results, the Board prepared the following vision statement and incorporated it into the Master Plan:

VISION

Bennington, New Hampshire is regarded by its residents as a charming small rural town. Residents value its good schools, friendly and community-spirited people, and the availability of a wide range of housing types. The natural environment, scenic beauty, and many opportunities for recreational activities help to make Bennington a nice place to live.

Most town-provided services are highly regarded, with the current level of funding considered adequate. However, road-service repair (potholes) is thought to be in need of increased funding.

There is no consensus on the desirability of future population growth. Citizens favor green spaces and maintaining Bennington's rural and historical character. More recreation programs and neighborhoods conducive to walking and talking are deemed desirable. Improved access to childcare is desired.

Support for business, particularly existing businesses, is strong. Attracting domestic and small businesses is favored, particularly along State Route 202, the main highway through the town. However, major changes are narrowly opposed. Residents express strong support for small-scale farms. "Alternative energy sources" are considered worthwhile.

In summary, opinion favors maintaining a rustic and historic atmosphere with increased availability of recreational activities to enjoy the town's natural environment and scenic beauty.

I would like to thank the current members of the Planning Board for their dedicated service: Sam Cohen, Christopher Maple, Peter Martel, and Jeffrey Rose.

HUMAN SERVICES

I would like to start by saying, as always, it has been a pleasure serving the Town of Bennington and helping residents who are in need. It is always rewarding to help those who often need guidance to find their way through difficult situations. Helping families get to the other side of a difficult situation is very rewarding. Sometimes all a person needs is someone to listen, a little guidance, and redirection.

Unfortunately, the State and Federal budget cuts have trickled down to the smaller communities, causing hardships for many communities like Bennington.

In 2014 12 families were assisted, nine of which were new families. Those assisted were primarily single parents who just did not have adequate income. Fortunately, many of those assisted have found employment. Between finding adequate employment and other programs available, most have become self sufficient. Assistance was granted a total of 37 times in 2014, with housing being the primary need for assistance. It is very apparent that the Monadnock Region needs more low income housing. Until that happens I anticipate housing costs will continue to be the primary need for local assistance.

Again, I thank the local Churches, Crotched Mountain Ski and Ride, and many other local programs for continuing to include the Town of Bennington when holidays arrive. Often when people are reluctant to ask is when they need the help the most.

I also sincerely thank the residents, who so willingly anonymously help during the holidays and at other hard times for their neighbors, with no questions asked. They are selflessly helpful when times are tough and people are in need and they give of themselves and provide unexpected gifts to those less fortunate.

If you know of a family who may be in need, give me a call and I am sure I can arrange a brief meeting with them. I work closely with the local agencies and there is most likely a program that could help - programs that may not be known to the average person.

Again, it is with great enthusiasm and pride that I am able to assist Bennington residents.

SUPERVISORS OF THE CHECKLIST

2014 was a mid-term election year, which always brings a bit of buzz and excitement to the polls. Usually voter turnout is good - and 2014 did not disappoint in that regard - but it never matches turnout for a Presidential year.

People who enjoy elections and follow them might enjoy browsing through the Secretary of State's website, where they now have results of all Primaries and General Elections since 1992 available online at http://sos.nh.gov/ElectResults.aspx

As of this writing, there are 987 registered voters in Bennington:

215 Democrats, 317 Republicans, and 455 Undeclared voters.

This year's Town Elections will be Tuesday, March 10th. This year, we vote at the Pierce Elementary School. The Polls will be open 8am – 7pm. Remember, we have Same-Day registration in New Hampshire. Bring a picture I.D. with proof of residence to register to vote at the polls.

Even if you are already registered, you will be asked to show a photo I.D. in order to vote.

Citizens wishing to vote must now bring the following forms of ID to the polls or be prepared to fill out a "challenged voter affidavit" as means of proving that they are indeed qualified to vote in town.

The following 5 types of photo IDs will be accepted in 2015:

- (1) A driver's license issued by any state or the federal government.
- (2) An identification card issued under RSA 260:21 or a nondriver's identification card issued by the motor vehicles division, department, agency, or office of any state.
- (3) A United States armed services identification card.
- (4) A United States passport or passcard.
- (5) A valid student identification card.

Expiration date on photo IDs cannot be more than 5 years old, with the exceptions of qualified IDs of voters over 65 years of age or student IDs issued before Sept 1, 2018.

We still count votes by hand in Bennington, and we welcome volunteers to help. Vote counting is an interesting and rewarding way to get involved with your community. Every vote will be counted, and every vote counts! Paper ballots are still the best guarantee of free open elections, as they ensure a voter-verified paper trail. All are welcome to lend a hand on Election Day evening. Volunteer with the Town Moderator or Town Clerk if you would like to help either during the day or in the evening.

Don't forget to visit the Bennington Elections web-pages if you have questions about voting, elections, etc. In them you can find information about registering to vote, the photo I.D. law, the Election schedule, absentee voting, previous years' election reports, links to State and Federal Elections' sites, and more. WATER AND SEWER DEPARTMENT

In 2014 the Water and Sewer Department faced very few issues. The Commissioners authorized replacement of valves, hydrant, and piping at the Eaton Avenue and Bible Hill Road intersection. This was ahead of the sidewalk project which is scheduled for 2015. In 2015, the Commissioners will be looking to move forward on the Eaton Avenue pipe line project. At this time the Commissioners feel that the project should be completed within a three year cycle.

The Commissioners were advised from the Antrim Water and Sewer Department that the dredging of the sewer lagoons is on schedule for 2015. The funds for this project are already in capital reserve, so the Commissioners requested no funds for this for 2015.

During a snowstorm around Thanksgiving, the pump house sustained a major electrical surge when power to the building was restored. This was the second time in as many years that this had happened. The Commissioners requested that our operator look into options. As of this report, the equipment has been installed and hopefully we can say this will end this ongoing issue.

The Bennington Historical Society is proud to announce that the history of Bennington, N.H. was completed and has been on sale since September. This book, "A History of Bennington, New Hampshire," is the result of many years of compiling pictures and memorabilia by David Glynn, life -long resident of Bennington. David is the co-author and Stephanie Roper is the author and professor in history. The book covers the Town from its early days as "Society Land" to the point we are at now. ENERGY COMMITTEE

The Bennington Energy Committee (BEC) was established in the fall of 2010 with the charge to help the town find ways to save energy and thereby save money. A secondary objective is to help the town's citizens save energy. The vision of the Energy Committee is to find ways that the town can cut energy costs by 50% over the next decade. The BEC intends to examine all aspects of town energy use, including both indoor and outdoor usage.

The town's Building Committee has begun a process of planning the renovation of the Bennington Train Depot (VFW building) so that it can be used as a voting venue and also as a meeting place for the town. The Town will seek to obtain outside funding for the renovation project. The strategy for doing so is to present the project as combining historical preservation with high energy efficiency. The Building Committee has engaged an architect to plan how the building can be renovated while preserving its historical character as a train station. This effort is partially funded by a grant that was received because of the historical value of the building. At the same time, the BEC applied for and received a grant from the New England Grassroots Environment Fund to hire an expert to design energy efficiency features that can be incorporated into the architect's design. The BEC's efforts in 2014 were devoted to working with the Building Committee to assure that the final design maximizes the energy efficiency of the building.

Jill Young has also been working on cleaning up growth in the Cemeteries. Storms this past year brought down some trees. Due to the damage trees can cause in a Cemetery, it is important for the Trustees to control what is planted. When left unattended, trees, shrubs and other ornamental growth can take over and eat an entire headstone.



In going forward with maintenance and preservation, the Trustees have identified a list of top concerns in Sunnyside Cemetery. With funds graciously provided by a donor through the New Hampshire Charitable Funds, the Trustees will be able to begin to maintain and preserve several cemetery stones in order to preserve their history. This will hopefully be a project that we will be able to continue each year as needed.

In closing, the Trustees would like to recognize the fine work by Jeremy Gagnon who has done a wonderful job this past year in the upkeep and maintenance at Sunnyside and Evergreen Cemeteries.

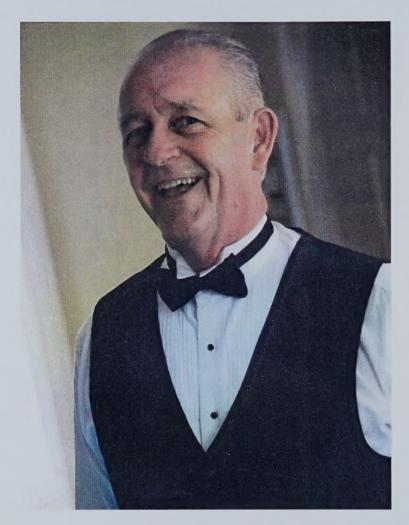

Harvey S. Goodwin 1949-2014

Harvey grew up in Peterborough and moved to Bennington with his family in the early 1990s. Harvey was a family man, raising his three children with his wife Barbara. Harvey worked for the New Hampshire Department of Transportation for 37 years, retiring as the Administrator for the Bureau of Turnpikes in 2009.

Civically, Harvey was an active member of the community in which he lived. Prior to living in Bennington Harvey and his family lived in Antrim where he was a member of the Zoning Board of Adjustment and was Vice-Chair of the Antrim Planning Board from 1981-1988. While in Bennington, Harvey served on the Town's Budget Committee and Capital Reserve Funding Committee from 1996 until his passing in January 2014. He also worked very closely with the Board of Selectmen during the first phase of the Downtown Improvement Project. Harvey served his communities with a genuine sense of pride, integrity, and responsibility.
