

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon to four o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To vote by Australian ballot for all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see what action the town wishes to take in regard to assessors.

Article 3. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To hear the report of the budget committee and act thereon.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,605.00 for town officers' salaries or act thereon.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$750.00 for town officers' expenses, or act thereon.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$700.00 for election and registration expenses, or act thereon.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$250.00 for town hall expenses, or act thereon.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for forest fire expenses, or act thereon.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the police department and the additional sum of \$125.00, to provide watchmen and additional protection due to the war emergency, or act thereon.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$720.00 for the support of the fire department, or act thereon.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for continuing the control of white pine blister rust in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department, thereby receiving the usual state aid.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$350.00 for the support of the board of health, and an additional sum of \$125.00 for the use of the board of health' due to the war emergency.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to pay the men employed by the town, fifty cents an hour, an increase of ten cents an hour, or act thereon.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$750.00 for the repair and upkeep of highway equipment, or act thereon.

Article. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$6,500.00 for town road maintenance, reserving \$1,000.00 of the same for calcium treatment, or act thereon.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,200.00 for snow removal, or act thereon.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,900.00 for street lighting, or act thereon.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to install three street lights on the Keene-Spofford road between the street light near the residence of William D. Pierce and the residence of Elisha Fuller and raise and appropriate \$60.00 for the same, or act thereon.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to install one street light on a pole between the residence of Byron A. Davis and the residence of John Orr and raise the sum of \$20.00 for the same, or act thereon.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for timber salvage, or act thereon.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for clearing up the brush and finishing construction on the new development at the foot of the Welcome road, or act thereon.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to construct a road starting from a point on the West Swanzey road, west of Phillip Greenewald's residence to the residence of Wm. Zinn, laid out on the present right of way to said Zinn, and raise the sum of \$300.00 for same, or act thereon.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the town library system, or act thereon.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the support of the town poor, or act thereon.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for old age assistance, or act thereon.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$10.00 for Memorial Day exercises, or act thereon.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to hold Old Home Day and raise the sum of \$100.00 in addition to the amount already in the hands of the committee, or act thereon.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for parks and playgrounds, or act thereon.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the cemeteries, or act thereon.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the town beach, or act thereon.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for interest on temporary loans, or act thereon.

Article 34. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for legal expenses, or act thereon.

Article 35. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$140.00 as the town's share in participating in the Monadnock Region, or act thereon.

Article 36. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid or Town Road Aid (T.R.A.) for the ensuing year and raise the sum of \$2,098.00 for State Aid or \$773.51 for T.R.A., or act thereon.

Article 37. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Article 38. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Carroll Chickering, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Assn., for the care and maintenance of the Herman E. Chickering burial lot in said cemetery.

Article 39. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Chester A. Brown and Lizzie A. Barrett, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Assn., for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Chester A. Brown and Lizzie A. Barrett lot in said cemetery and to be known as the Brown, Barrett Trust Fund.

Article 40. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Elizabeth Stoddard, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Assn., for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Ashbel Stoddard lot in said cemetery and to be known as the Ashbel Stoddard trust fund.

Article 41. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from the estate of Evalyn A. Farr, the income to be used for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Evalyn A. Farr burial lot in Spofford cemetery and to be known as the Evalyn A. Farr Trust Fund.

Article 42. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Leila Tucker, the income from same to be paid to Chesterfield West Cemetery Assn., and used for the perpetual care of her lot in said cemetery, and to be known as the Leila Tucker Trust Fund.

Article 43. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the section of the Welcome Hill Road, so called, starting at Route 9 and continuing past the residence of E. J. Winslow to the point of intersection with the new road, said new road having been built to replace the above described section of old road.

Article 44. To see if the town wishes to take any action regarding the following clause of the will of Ralph F. Mulligan: "Tenth. To the Springfield Safe Deposit and Trust Company the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.) to be held by it in trust and the income paid semi-annually to the officials in the town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, having charge of the public schools therein, the same to be used for general school purposes, and also for defraying the expenses of the chlidren in Chesterfield towards obtaining a high school education elsewhere. This is to be known as the RALPH F. MULLIGAN SCHOOL FUND. In the event that a new school building is needed at any time, then the trustee may advance such sum from the principal fund as may be reasonably necessary to provide such a building. At the end of twenty-five (25) years the entire fund shall be turned over to the board of Selectmen of said Chesterfield to be used within the town of Chesterfield for such municipal purposes as the Board of Selectmen shall, from time to time determine."

Article 45. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

TOWN MEETING, MARCH, 1941

Proceedings of the annual meeting of the voters of the town of Chesterfield called at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, March 11, 1941.

The meeting was called to order at 9.15 a.m. by Moderator Arthur H. Post and the Warrant through Article 1 read by the Town Clerk. The Moderator then declared that balloting was in order by Australian Ballot for all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

At 10.00 o'clock a. m., the Moderator called the meeting to order for business and the remainder of the Warrant was read by the Clerk.

The Articles of the Warrant were then disposed of as follows:

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Moses H. Chickering that the Selectmen act as Assessors. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by D. Homer Cray that the same method of Collecting taxes be used for the ensuing year as in former years. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Voted by voice vote on motion made by D. Homer Cray that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. The Moderator called for the Chairman of the Budget Committee to give the report of the Budget Committee. Neither the Chairman or the Clerk of the Budget Committee being present, Selectman Clifford E. Chickering announced that the actions taken by the Budget Committee were in the Town Report and would also be on the Bulletin Board in the front of the Hall.

Artice 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn to raise the sum of \$1,605.00 for town officers' salaries. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 to defray town officers' expenses, said sum to include as near as possible a proper census of the town. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on motion made by D. Homer Cray to raise the sum of \$600.00 for election and registration expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. A motion made by C. M. Burnham to raise the sum of \$150.00 for Town Hall Expenses was supported. An Amendment to the motion was proposed by Moses H. Chickering to raise the sum of \$200.00 for Town Hall Expenses and this was supported. When put to vote by voice vote, the Moderator declared the Amendment carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Moses H. Chickering to raise the sum of \$500.00 for forest fire expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

- Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Moses H. Chickering to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the Police Department. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.
- Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Louis W. Chickering that the Town insure its firemen under the Firemen's Retirement Act, the cost to be paid out of the general expenses of the Fire Department. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.
- Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Jessie B. Farrington to raise the sum of \$792.00, which is 10% over the sum given in the Warrant, for the support of the fire departments. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.
- Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by E. James Winslow to raise the sum of \$350.00 for the support of the Board of Health. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.
- Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin to raise the sum of \$1,200.00 for the repair and upkeep of highway equipment, to be spent under the supervision of the Selectmen. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.
- Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Newton E. Darling to raise the sum of \$6,000.00 for town road maintenance, reserving \$1,000.00 of the same for calcium treatment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.
- Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Charles A. Maynard that the Selectmen are requested to keep the Gulf and Herrick Roads in mind if and when the street lights from West Chesterfield to the Gulf Bridge are changed. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for street lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for snow red moval. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford E. Chickering to raise the sum of \$100.00 for timber salvage. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by D. Homer Cray to pass over the Article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Motion made by Harry E. Winn to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to be used with an equal sum from T.R.A. for relocating and constructing the lower end of the Winslow-Welcome Road. Motion supported. Amendment proposed by E. James Winslow that the road be built under contract and that the road not be built unless the contractor will build it for \$1,600.00.

Harry E. Winn, the maker of the original motion did not accept the Amendment so that it was withdrawn by E. James Winslow.

Voted by voice vote on original motion. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul M. Penning to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the town library system. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford E. Chickering to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the support of the town poor. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Marguerite Stoddard to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for old age assistance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham that the sum needed for aid to dependent soldiers and their families be taken from the \$1,500.00 already raised for the support of the poor. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Henry C. Chickering to raise the sum of \$10.00 for Memorial Day exercises. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 27. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Frank J. Guyette to hold Old Home Day and raise the sum of \$125.00 for the same. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 28. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford E. Chickering to raise the sum of \$50.00 for parks and playgrounds. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 29. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the cemeteries. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 30. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to elect one sexton to care for all town owned cemeteries to take effect March meeting 1942. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 31. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Henry C. Chickering to accept the gift of the land surrounding the Joab Wetherbee burial lot and described in the deed from Morris Friedsam to the town of Chesterfield. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 32. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul E. Welcome to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the town beach. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 33. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John P. Redding to raise the sum of \$100.00 for interest of temporary loans. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 34. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to raise the sum of \$400.00 for the purchase of new fire hose. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 35. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ada W. Allen to raise the sum of \$200.00 for legal expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 36. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Mansley to raise the sum of \$140.00 as the towns share in participating in the Mondnock Region. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 37. Voted by voice vote on motion made by E. James Winslow to accept Town Road Aid and raise the sum of \$751.95 for same. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 38. Voted by voice vote on motion made by D. Homer Cray to pass over the Article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 39. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ada W. Allen to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by tax collectors' deeds. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 40. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ada W. Allen to accept the sum of \$100.00 under the will of Frances L. Gorham, the income only to be used for the care and upkeep of the Almson Norcross burial lot in Chesterfield Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

- Article 41. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ada W. Allen to accept the will of Frank C. Hamilton and to be known as the Frank C. Hamilton Trust Fund.
- A. The sum of \$500.00 the income only to be used for the care and upkeep of and the purchase of flowers on each Memorial Day for the Frank C. Hamilton burial lot in Spofford cemetery.
- B. The sum of \$500.00 the income only to be used by the library trustees for the purchase of new books.
- C. The sum of \$1,000.00 the income only to be distributed annually by the Selectmen to the poor and worthy children in said Chesterfield and at the discretion of said Selectmen.
- D. The residue of the estate amounting to \$4,234.75 the income only to be used by the Selectmen each year at Christmas time for old and indigent persons of Chesterfield, each to receive from said income the sum of \$10.00.

Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

No other business appearing the meeting was declared adjourned at 1.40 p. m., except for balloting for Town Officers which is to continue until 4.00 p. m.

At 4 p. m., the Moderator declared the ballot box closed and a count of ballots cast resulted as follows:

For Spofford Road Agent. George E. Joslin had 133 votes, Walter J. Post had 133 votes. No elections declared.

For Center Road Agent. Frank A. Hubner had 134 votes, Roger C. Spaulding had 124 votes. Frank A. Hubner was declared elected.

For West Chesterfield Road Agent. Lyle B. Chickering had 2 votes, Newton E. Darling had 225 votes. Newton E. Darling was declared elected.

For Fireward. James J. Atema had 63 votes, Winston H. Cray had 85 votes, Kenneth L. Fales had 76 votes. Winston H. Cray was declared elected.

For Auditors. Chester Burnham had 1 vote, Shirley G. Bevis had 213 votes, Harold E Randall had 193 votes. Shirley G. Bevis and Harold E. Randall were declared elected.

For Budget Committee for two years. Clifford W. Tuttle had 1 vote, Charles Tuttle had 1 vote, John N. Ball had 1 Vote, Fred Pattridge had 1 vote Walter J. Post had 195 votes. Walter J. Post was declared elected.

For Budget Committee for three years. Harold Randall had 1 vote, Arthur Post had 1 vote, Chester Burnham had 1 vote, Richard G. Chikcering had 193 votes, Clarence K. Lewis had 168 votes. Richard G. Chickering and Clarence K. Lewis were declared elected.

For Trustee of Trust Funds. Charles Tuttle had 1 vote, Viola V. Tuttle had 217 votes. Viola V. Tuttle was declared elected.

For Sexton, Spofford Village Cemetery. Byron Davis had 1 vote, Walter L. Deselle had 212 votes. Walter L. Deselle was declared elected.

For Sexton Center Cemeteries. Percy Rowe had 1 vote, Lawrence G. Crowell had 187 votes. Lawrence G. Crowell was declared elected.

For Sexton New Boston Cemetery. Percy Rowe had 1 vote, Lawrence G. Crowell had 187 votes. Lawrence G. Crowell was declared elected.

For Sexton Pattridge & Atherton Hill Cemeteries. Eleanor Pearson, Roger Welcome, Shirley G. Bevis, Henry C. Chickering, Frank Guyette, William E. Fuller, Harry Winn, Fred Ball, Bill Pierce, and John Nurse each had 1 vote, Byron A. Davis had 2 votes, Lawrence G. Crowell had 7 votes, Frank Whorfe had 13 votes, Walter L. Deselle had 16 votes. Walter L. Deselle was declared elected.

For Spofford Constable. William Pierce had 2 votes, Jessie M. B. Joslin had 1 vote, Stephen Henchey had 1 vote, Arvid W. Pearson had 219 votes. Arvid W. Pearson was declared elected.

For Center Constable. Winston Cray had 1 vote, Leon Smith had 2 votes, George S. White had 3 votes, B. E. Aldrich had 1 vote, Henry C. Chickering had 204 votes. Henry C. Chickering was declared elected.

For West Chesterfield Constable. Shirley Bevis had 1 vote, Richard Howell had 1 vote, Harold E. Randall had 225 votes. Harold E. Randall was declared elected.

For Surveyors of Wood & Lumber. Eleanor Pearson had 1 vote, Chester M. Burnham had 201 votes. Louis W. Chickering had 198 votes. George W. Goodridge had 194 votes. Chester M. Burnham, Louis W Chickering, and George W. Goodridge were declared elected.

For Fence Viewers. Carl Castle had 1 vote, John L. Castle had 195 votes, Floyd M. Fuller had 187 votes, Leon E. Smith had 183 votes. John L. Castle, Floyd M. Fuller, and Leon E. Smith were declared elected.

There being a tie vote for Spofford Road Agent and therefore no election the Moderator declared the meeting adjourned for two weeks to March 25, 1941 at ten o'clock a.m., allowing the same candidates to be candidates again and filing with no fee up to March 18, at 6 p. m.

On March 25, the Moderator called the meeting to order again and a count of ballots cast resulted as follows.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF TOWN LIBRARIES LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the Chesterfield Library Trustees,

The annual report is herewith presented:

With the year ending Jan. 31, 1942 we find a total circulation of 5,633 volumes loaned through the library system, Spofford 1,041, West Chesterfield 1,526, the central library 3,066. These figures show the value of the library to the community.

We are very proud of the recent gift to the library from the Friedsam Foundation Fund, of 3 large Webster dictionaries with tables, one for each branch, a set of encyclopedia Britannica, a typewriter and table, a fire screen, besides the oil burner for the furnace. These are all gifts which increase the efficiency of the library.

Early in the school year the upper grades started having a one-half hour class in reference work at the library each week.

Miss Ruth Morris, the substitute librarian, attended the Library Summer school for 2 weeks.

Mr. Morris Friedsam gave 20 years of National Geographics which are now at the book bindery. These will add about 40 volumes to the non-fiction department.

To the patrons register 36 names have been added. The active list is 138 borrowers, 100 residents, 38 summer residents. Total of all branches 233.

From the Beckley & Hamilton Trust Funds the book "Lincoln Library of Essential Information" was purchased. It has been a valuable aid in the reference department.

The 50 years of Town Reports given by Mr. Post were bound in 9 volumes.

Total number of books added during the year was 298 volumes.

New books, 219; adult faction, 71; juvenile fiction, 90; adult non-fiction, 34; juvenile non-fiction, 21; reference 3; gifts, 81; fiction, 60; non-fiction, 12; reference, 9.

Circulation: Total, 3,066; adult fiction, 1,468; juvenile fiction, 1,136; adult non-fiction, 307; juvenile non-fiction, 155.

A loss of 3 books is reported.

Books have been exchanged 8 and 12 times with the branch libraries.

Your librarian wishes to express grateful appreciation to all who have given time and work to the library.

Miss Catharine Pratt executive secretary of the N. H. Library Commission visited the library Oct. 30 at which time she gave many helpful suggestions.

One case of scarlet fever developed in town and was under quarantine several weeks and had to have all supplies delivered. Also had one case of measles reported, two school children were exposed and they were kept from school several days to prevent the disease from getting into the school. One case of chicken pox was reported, and all children exposed were kept from school so that it was kept from spreading. Doctors are required to report all cases of communicable diseases to the health officer and if in case of sickness all parents would report all suspected cases it would help to prevent the spread of diseases.

Owing to the building of a new road from the Yeager four corners to the Stone House near Spofford Lake the old town dump had to be moved to another location temporarily, after the road is finished another place will have to be provided.

The beach near the outlet of the lake and the beach near Camp Marquette were supervised by Mr. Frank Whorfe and seemed to be satisfactory.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Chesterfield:

I herein submit my ninth annual report as superintendent of schools.

Let the scintillations from your characters and teaching direct and guide them to a higher level of life. This generation expects your strong moral and financial support. Let us give it.

The meeting was called to order at 2.10 p. m., by the Moderator, Daniel Schlichting, and the Warrant was read by the Clerk.

The Articles of the Warrant were disposed of in the following manner:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year. The motion was made and carried that the clerk cast one ballot for Daniel P. Schlichting for Moderator. This was done and Daniel P. Schlichting was declared elected as Moderator for the coming year. The Oath of Office was administered by the Clerk.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year. Moved and carried that the Moderator cast one ballot for Norman J.

Langmaid for Clerk. This motion being carried in the affirmative, it was done. Mr. Langmaid was declared elected as Clerk for the ensuing year. The Oath of Office was administered by the Moderator.

Article 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years. The motion was made and carried that the member of the School Board be elected by ballot. The ballot box was prepared and the voting took place with the following results:

Mrs. Record received,	1

Pauline Record, has been declared elected to the School Board for three years, the Oath of Office being given by the Moderator.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year. Moved and carried in the affirmative that the Clerk cast one ballot for Evelyn L. Winn for Treasurer. This was done, and having received all votes cast, Evelyn Winn was elected Treasurer and took the Oath of Office administered by the Moderator.

Article 5. To Determine and Appoint the Salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the Compensation of any Officers or Agents of the District. Moved and carried affirmatively that we pass over this Article.

Article 6. To hear the Reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto. Under this article, Mrs. Clinton Farrington, representing a Committee chosen at the last P. T. A. meeting, brought before the voters of the School District the idea of a new, central, consolidated School to be located in Chesterfield Center, and which would take the place of the three school buildings which we have at present. There being no motion nor comment, the matter was passed over. Under this Article, Agnes Chickering reported for the Committee on the use of the Australian Ballot in School District Elections. Competent legal advice had been

obtained. It was reported that such a procedure would involve a lot of time and expense, with necessary permission to be obtained from Concord. It was thought that this new method would be no more satisfactory than the one already in use.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant. The motion was made and carried affirmatively that the Town Auditors serve as the Auditors of the School District.

Article 8. To see if the District will make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of Public Schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report. The motion was made and supported that the sum of \$15,101 be accepted as our School Budget to be raised this year.

Article 9. To see if the Chesterfield District will authorize the School Board to purchase a pump for West Chesterfield Well and raise the sum of \$25.00 for same. The motion was made and carried affirmatively by voice vote that the \$25.00 be raised for the pump for West Chesterfield.

Article 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting. There being no other legal business to transact under this article, the motion was made to adjourn. This was carried in the affirmative by voice vote, and we stood adjourned at 2.40 p. m.
