

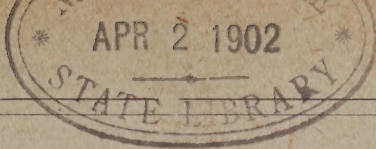

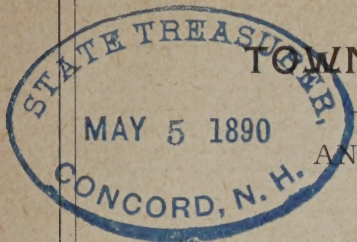

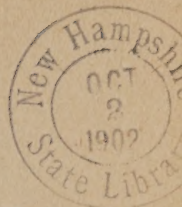

A large quantity of gravel removed from the streets macadamized was put upon other streets. No estimate of the value of the gravel so used has been made, but at the rates allowed for loads of gravel, the expense to the town would have been considerable, had it been procured elsewhere.

The road-bed has been covered with crushed stones to the depth of from twelve to twenty inches, with an average depth in the center of about eighteen inches. From careful inquiry, and also upon an examination of macadamized roads in other towns, we are of the opinion that upon streets travelled as much as those where the work has been done, a covering of less depth would be insufficient. The estimates of the cost of construction, made when the work was commenced, were based upon a depth of from eight to twelve inches. We now have on hand from two to three hundred dollars

worth of crushed stones, so that taking into account the allowances that should be made for the reasons above stated the expense of the work has not greatly exceeded the original estimates.

## Chief Engineer's Report.

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In compliance with the law I submit my third annual report as Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, giving account of fires and alarms for the past year and the condition of apparatus under my charge.

There have been twelve alarms during the year. The first was given at 7.18 P. M., March seventeenth, a barn on upper Front street owned by Mrs. Swallow. Damage \$400, covered by insurance.

On April twenty-seventh, 12.30 A. M., false alarm.

May ninth, 2.30 P. M., burning brush on Kensington road.

May nineteenth, 6.00 P. M., brush fire in the Oak lands.

June seventeenth, 1.30 A. M., a small fire in the Exeter Coal Company's shed on Newmarket road.

August sixteenth, 2.05 P. M., a barn belonging to the estate of W. P. Moulton was destroyed. Loss \$700, insured.

August twentieth, 2.40 A. M., a small blaze in E. L. Watson's stable. Damage nominal.

September twenty-second, 7.05 P. M., false alarm.

October thirty-first, 6.40 P. M., false alarm.

November twenty-fifth, 2.40 A. M., fire in the Hawes building on Court street. Loss about \$600.

December third, 3.40 A. M., the saloon of James Johnson on Lincoln street. Building destroyed. Loss on building and goods, \$1,000. Insured.

December tenth, 9 A. M., a fire in a bed in a house owned by the heirs of Christy Elliott, Kossuth street. Damage nominal.

January seventeenth, 1890, a small fire in E. Folsom & Co's brass shop. No alarm.

February fourteenth, fire in the cellar of Phillips Academy. Department out. No damage.

The apparatus under my care is in good condition. We have four thousand feet of good hose. One fifty-foot extension ladder

has been purchased, which I think will be of great service in the event of a fire in some of our high buildings.

I would respectfully recommend the purchase of a pair of horses for the use of the Fire Department and the town. I think they would pay good interest on the money invested. I would also recommend the building of a house for Hose Co. No. 3, now located with No. 2 at the house near the railroad crossing on Middle street. They are very much pressed for room and some provision must be made for them.

I will report the different organizations as being prompt and efficient in the performance of all duty.

My acknowledgments are hereby made to my assistant engineers, officers and members of the department, and to people in general for advice and interest manifested in the success of the department.

The first class in the Normal department, which had been organ-



ized but a few weeks when my last report was submitted, has since completed its prescribed course and been graduated.

The pupils have received instruction in the principles of teaching in their relation to mental growth, and in the history of education. They have applied and tested the principles learned in instructing classes of children under the close criticism of their teacher and associates. The pleasure of the associations of this year of study has been sadly marred for teacher and pupils by the failing health and death of one of their number, Miss Carrie E. Mace.

In the evening an address was given by Superintendent A. P. Marble, of Worcester, upon the subject "About the Newness." The lecture was replete with advanced though conservative thought, touching subjects of interest to teachers. It has since been published in the *New England Journal of Education*.

Professor Marble was followed by Dr. C. C. Rounds, principal of the Plymouth Normal School, who gave the results of several months' study of the advanced educational methods in France,

dwelling especially upon the progress that is being made in normal and manual training in that country.

At the close of his address, Dr. Rounds with a few well chosen and impressive words presented diplomas to the following graduates: Nellie E. Adams, Eva L. Brown, Emma L. Chase, Bessie P. Grouard, Alice F. Mace, Mattie C. Moulton, Gertrude E. Smith, Elizabeth Stevens, Florence E. Wood.

At the opening of the winter term a second class was organized, consisting of five members: Dora E. Dudley, Alice L. Gilmore, and Matilda E. Irvine, of Exeter, Clara E. Kimball, of Kensington, and Isabel C. Wingate, of Stratham.

A few changes have been made in the curriculum of study. United States History was changed from the Second to the Third grade, and Scudder's text book substituted for Barnes' Primary History. English History was introduced into the course in the Senior year, necessitating some modifications of the assignment of studies to the teachers of the upper grades.

Provision was also made for exercises in calisthenics with all the classes four times per week. These exercises are under the charge of Miss Barrows, the music teacher, and are designed to give a uniform and natural development to the muscles of the body, cultivate a graceful carriage, and develop the respiratory organs.

A number of volumes have been added to the library, and reference and text books purchased. Some new wall maps and additional scientific apparatus have been provided.

The Town Library has about 7,000 volumes on its shelves, nearly 500 of which were added during the past year. The Merrill fund, by the will of the donor, can be applied only to the purchase of standard and permanently valuable works. In compliance with this condition, care has been taken to render as complete as possible various departments of literature and science. Success in this un-

undertaking has been rendered obvious by the increased number of teachers, and students of all grades who have visited the Library for purpose of consultation and have found what they wanted. Meanwhile, the purchase of books of the day has gone on undiminished, or rather has been increased, since the Merrill fund has rendered possible a more exclusive devotion of the town's appropriation to procuring popular literature, including records of travel, biography, fiction, and reading for young persons. One addition was made to the library during the season just closed, which merits special notice. Harper's Magazine, established in June, 1850, has scattered through its seventy-nine semi annual volumes, many articles of great interest and value. Complete sets are growing scarce and high, as a few years ago the publishers melted all the plates cast previous to 1883. The present price for which a finely bound set can be bought is \$100, a sum far beyond the means of the library. Yet the magazine was often inquired for, and its possession for consultation purposes very essential. During the summer of 1889 a considerably broken set was bought at auction for \$5. An appeal was then made to the citizens of Exeter, through the papers, for odd numbers and stray volumes. The response was so generous that in order to complete the set up to the end of 1889, only the small sum of \$2.50 was required to purchase the still missing numbers. The set has now been cheaply but strongly bound, and is in place on the library shelves. As in the case of the file of the *News-Letter*, help was given in connection with the binding by the board of selectmen. As a result of the whole undertaking, the town has been furnished with a complete set of Harper at a cost including everything of not over \$45. If favorable opportunities offer, other leading periodicals may be gathered in the same way.

The space of the library is constantly becoming restricted. New shelves have been put up during the year. These will soon be filled, and if no new building is provided, or the Natural History Room is not added to the present accommodations, an upper gallery will be required. This can be constructed at small expense, resting on top of the present alcoves, with a staircase at the end. Public documents and other books seldom called for can be removed thither, thus making room for the more popular works below. A supplement to the catalogue of 1885 would seem desirable at no



very distant day, but, judging by past experience, the sales of such a pamphlet would by no means balance its cost. As a cheaper substitute, a card catalogue might be prepared, but this would be more serviceable to the librarian than for general consultation.

The librarian, Miss F. E. Moulton, has discharged her duties with intelligence and fidelity, and like testimony can be borne to her occasional assistant, Miss C. Morrison.

In conclusion the Committee would ask for the annual appropriation of \$500.
