SCHOOL REPORT.

March 15th, 1892, the School Board re-organized by choosing George W. Goodhue, Chairman, and Alden S. Wood, Secretary.

In school work the past year there has been much to commend on the part of teachers, pupils and parents. In some respects expectations have not been realized. The resignation of teachers just before commencement of terms with the alternative of hastily filling the vacancy or postpone schools, to say the least has been unfortunate. The school year has been twenty-two weeks with the addition of two winter schools at the Centre of about eleven weeks.

The agreeable is to be complementary, but if we wish to progress in educational methods and results it must be largely by remedying defects. When criticising it will be well for all to take in consideration how easy it is to detect the defects of other people, and so very difficult to see that we ourselves can be anything but wise. It has been gratifying to note generally so good deportment and advancement. We have found much that has been unexceptionable, and in summing up the amount of work accomplished during the year we find it to be above the average. With few exceptions those pupils have made the most progress whose parents have actively and wisely encouraged punctuality and regular attendance, and to make the most of present opportunity without regard to criticism that could be made of teachers or methods. We regret that there are pupils in town indifferent in regard to school privileges and who have made very little apparent effort to develop their intellectual faculties the past year. Our best teachers report that the most discouraging and unsatisfactory feature of their work, is the irregular attendance and indifference of this class of pupils; that most of their scholars would do fairly well were it not for the depressing influence of the few. Parents in the main must be held responsible for these conditions. It is not the whole intent of our schools to develop the greatest quantity of intellectual power. Organized sports, plays, and healthful amusements should be encouraged under intelligent direction. Self-control, obedience to right authority, and to treat one another politely, must be taught. Rudeness, personal violence, profanity, and obscenity, repressed. Some of our pupils by acts of insubordination and violating rules of common decency in association with their fellows, prove they have very little respect for themselves, or for their reputation, we trust that never will there again be occasion to have our attention called to anything of the kind. Public sentiment and home influence must be the basis for reform.

If there are those who desire to teach for the money only, having no enthusiasm in the work, our advice would be, don't try. Too much mechanical memorizing and cramming children for examination days and exhibitions are characteristics of the

past. There is an increasing demand for especially trained efficient teachers who evince great enthusiasm and professional skill with little tendency to mechanical methods full of ingenuity to interest every pupil, able to teach them from the first, to reason, and comprehend the meaning of what they learn. Try to develop self-activity, independence and self dependence in thinking. Our present need is a system of education having for its aim the imparting of knowledge with reference to its usefulness to humanity. The problems of education are complex and it is not possible to settle the question of a course of study or even of a method of instruction without reference to the effect of some reaction. It is evident there can be an improvement on present methods. Without entering into details we venture to suggest for consideration a system of graduation for common schools, and a basis for admission to higher grades at the Centre. This system simply takes the primary branches as a course of study for graduation and makes application of the plans and appliances of the best high school to the common schools of the town. It is the application of an old plan to a new purpose—common school diplomas to be granted graduates. This scheme of systematising schools will secure a higher order of efficiency in school work. The pupil will be enabled to do more work in a given time with an incentive to regular attendance and to complete the full course of elementary studies. Pupils moving from one school to another will readily find their proper place. We were pleased to note that so many teachers and pupils were interested in observing Arbor Day. Whittier says the wealth, beauty, fertility, and healthfulness of the country largely depends upon the conservation of our forests and the planting of trees. That these truths may be effectively impressed upon the minds of our people, we trust parents, teachers, and children will do all in their power to make next Arbor Day a day of the most inspiring interest.

At our last annual school meeting, Mr. Christy H. Duncan offered prizes, as an encouragement in this matter, to those schools that would make the most improvement on their grounds, and also for the cultivation of flowers. Several of the schools took an interest in the work and the prizes were awarded as follows: No. 5 school, although the smallest in numbers, was given the first prize of \$2.00 for improvement on grounds, the second of \$1.00 to No. 7 school, and the third of 50 cents to No. 6 school. The first prize of \$2.00 for the best cultivation of flowers was given to No. 7 school, and the second of \$1.00 to No. 5 school.

The proceeds of an entertainment by the young people has been given for the purchase of two clocks for the school-rooms at the Centre, which have been procured and placed in the school-rooms. It will be seen by the Treasurer's report that all money available to pay for the construction of the school house at the Centre has been paid to the building committee. Their report will show how it has been expended.
