



SCHOOL REPORT.

To the school district of Hill:—We herewith submit our annual report on the schools in the district.

The work of any one year cannot be completely reported unless it is shown in its relations both to the past and to the future. The year has been one of gradual growth along old lines rather than of radical change.

In harmony with the policy of last year the board has adopted the state program of studies, instructing the superintendent to adapt it to our schools in a way to harmonize with the work done in the Franklin schools. The superintendent is now preparing a special outline of work for the guidance of teachers. In selecting textbooks to replace worn-out ones their adaptability to our program of studies should be considered.

The district's appropriation for schools this year was larger than usual. We have endeavored to use economy in its expenditure, and to make every additional dollar count for a longer school year or greater efficiency. The school treasurer turns over to his successor a sum much smaller than the amount of cash on hand at the beginning of the year. The appropriation for the coming year must, therefore, be larger or the school year must be shortened by several weeks.

The appeal made to parents last year for assistance in lessening truancy has not secured a satisfactory response. Irregular attendance is one of the greatest foes to the efficiency of the schools of Hill. To continue indefinitely our present lenient policy toward truancy would be a neglect of duty. The law is as follows:

PUBLIC STATUTES, CHAPTER 93, SECTION 14. As amended 1901-3.

SECT. 14. Every person having the custody and control of a child between the ages of eight and fourteen years, or of a child under the age of sixteen years who cannot read at sight and write legibly simple sentences in the English Language, residing in a school district in which a public school is annually taught, shall cause such child to attend the public school all the time such school is in session, unless the child shall be excused by the school board of the district because his physical or mental condition is such as to prevent his attendance at school for the period required, or because he was instructed in the English language in a private school approved by the school board for a number of weeks equal to that in which the public school was in session in the common English branches, or, having acquired those branches, in other more advanced studies. Any person who does not comply with the requirements of this section shall be fined ten dollars for the first offense and twenty dollars for every subsequent offense, for the use of the district.

The short time during which a superintendent has been employed is not sufficient for a final decision as to the advantages of supervision, but we feel that he does a work beyond the power of an unprepared board.

We would recommend that the land around the Center school-house be properly drained, or that the building be moved to a more healthful site.

The next large expenditure of the district should be for a new school building at the Village.
