#### TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet in Childs' Opera House in said town on Tuesday, the Thirteenth Day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects.

ARTICLE I. To choose one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk and Chief of Police for one year, Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for two years, Trustee of Trust Funds for three years and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

- ART. 2. To hear the reports of the town officers to the auditors, the reports of the auditors, agents, committees or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- ART. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the current expenses of the town and apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt.
- ART. 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the building and repairing of highways, bridges and culverts.
- ART. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for Senator Grimes Post, G. A. R., to be used Memorial Day.
- ART 6. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
- ART. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for the support of the Fuller Public Library.
- ART. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to be applied upon the salary of the District Nurse.

- ART. 9. To see if the town will vote to accept the property in Hillsborough, part of which was formerly known as the Fair Grounds, for a recreation and athletic field, under the conditions now on file with the Selectmen.
- ART. 10. To see if the town will vote to accept from Francis A. Burbank the sum of \$100.00, the income to be used for the care and maintenance of the Horace Gilmore lot in Pine Hill Cemetery.
- ART. 11. To see if the town will vote to accept from Blanche Whittaker Richardson the sum of \$100.00, the income to be for the care of the burial lot of Capt. Henry P. Whittaker in Pine Grove Cemetery.
- ART. 12. To see if the town will vote to accept from Edith S. Jones the sum of \$300.00, the income to be used for the care and maintenance of the family lot in Pine Grove Cemeterv.
- ART. 13. To see if the town will vote to accept from Charles H. Russell the sum of \$100.00, the income to be used for the perpetual care of his burial lot in Maple Avenue Cemetery.
- ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to transfer the \$100.00 Lorinda O. Smith Cemetery Trust Fund to the Rodney Smith Trust Fund, and the income therefrom to be used in the care and maintenance of the Rodney Smith lot in Pine Hill Cemetery: in accordance with the request of the donor, Mrs. Ida Smith Lake, which request is now on file with the Town Clerk.
- ART. 15. To see if the town will vote to construct a sidewalk from Cross St. up Henniker St. on the left hand side to meet the sidewalk in front of Sidney Powers' residence, raise money for same or pass any vote relating thereto.
- ART. 16. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 oo for the purpose of cooperating with the state and federal government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust, or act in relation thereto.
- ART 17. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$300.00 from the late Chas. A. Goodwin, the income to be used for the care and maintenance of his burial lot in Maple Avenue Cemetery.

ART. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 to be expended in the Cemetery at Hillsboro Center.

ART, 19. To see if the town will accept as a gift from Miss Jennie G. Butler that real estate known as the Sarah M. Dodge Property, situate on the north side of Main Street in Hillsborough, New Hampshire, which gift shall be upon the condition that the buildings shall be removed and the land graded within six months from the date of the deed: that the land be used as a park and that the donor have the privilege of erecting and maintaining upon the lot a suitable tablet bearing the inscription, "This lot is given in memory of James S. Butler."

ART. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the support of band concerts the coming season.

ART. 21. To see if the town will accept from Clarence H. Wilkins and Dr. George C. Wilkins the sum of \$100.00 for permanent care of the Rodney Wilkins lot in the Deering Cemetery.

ART. 22. To see if the town will vote to observe "Old Home Day," raise money for the same or pass any vote relating thereto.

ART. 23. To see if the town will vote to purchase of Ernest B. Severance, a portion of that land in said Hillsborough owned by him, and known as the John B. Smith land, (containing about thirty-six acres) for the sum of four hundred dollars; and appropriate and raise said purchase price of four hundred dollars; or take any action relating thereto.

ART. 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

For the year 1927 the following new work was completed:

A new line of pipe was laid on East Mill St. to supply the Contoocook Mills and tenements below the mills. This line was laid to comply with instructions from the State Board of Health. 219 feet of 4" Cast Iron and 651 feet of 2" Galvanized pipe was laid on this job at a cost of \$967.72, which was charged to extensions. This item was charged to extension instead of renewal for the reason that the old line which was renewed was the property of the Contoocook Mills Corp.

On School St. a new line of 8" Cast Iron pipe was laid to replace the old cement 6" line. 1700 feet of pipe was laid on this street besides a re-arrangment and addition to the hydrant, making for better fire protection. The cost of laying this street was \$5,317.50, divided as follows: Renewal, \$1,309.00 (the cost of the old cement line); excess renewal \$4,008.50

## TOWN SCHOOL REPORT

To the School Board of the Hillsboro Town School District:

The ninth annual report of your Supt. of Schools is hereby respectfully submitted. It refers to the school year 1926-1927.

All our teachers had previous experience in our schools. The list follows:

At the close of the Fall term Mrs. Nellie Mellen resigned, and Miss Pierce took her place at the Goodell School. The Center School was closed and the children transported to the Flat School. We paid all teachers \$720, except the Lower Village teacher who received \$900.

Three years ago one of our teachers had the highest form of State Certificate but now four of them, Mrs. Crane, Mrs. Gile, Mrs. Mellen and Mrs. Murdo, have certificates. It must be remembered that all of this data is given for the year which closed some time ago, namely on June 30th, 1927, and since then some changes have been made. All but one of our teachers have kept up with the best in educational progress by attending summer school, but so far as I have been able to determine none have attended summer school since 1919. I recommend that a slight salary bonus be given the teacher for the year following attendance at a summer school. This would encourage such attendance and help defray the expenses. We pay our teachers an average of \$750 per pear while the average for the state is \$1,006.65. The average cost per pupil for this district is \$63.67, while 190 of the State's 250 districts have a higher average cost, running up to as much as \$577.82 in one district.

Theenrollment has been as follows, except that pupils have made several changes from one school to another. The total number of different pupils is 144, and in case where the pupil has changed from one school to another he is counted in the first school.

The enrollment for the past four years has been respectively 131, 131, 135, and 144.

Our total enrollment of 144, added to 2 who go to the Hillsboro Special Grammar School, and 22 in the High school, and 1 in college total 169, but from that number we must substract 3 non residents in our schools, giving 166 pupils living in our district and attending school.

The grade enrollment is 1st grade 35, 2nd 18, 3rd 15, 4th 17, 5th 29, 6th 13, 7th 9, and 8th 8.

There were 283 cases of tardiness, a poor record. This poor record is entirely due to one school, where there were 224 cases of tardiness, 14% more cases in that one school than there were in the whole district the year before. Close attention to this matter will result in improvement. There were absolutely no cases of tardiness in the Goodell, Bear Hill and Center School, although the record for the Center School was for but one term.

The percent of attendance was Center 97%, Bear Hill, Flat and Merrill 96%, Goodell 94%, Lower Village 92%, Upper Village 88%.

This is the fourth consecutive year in which Alice and Fletcher have had perfect attendance. We gladly recognize such close attention to school duties.

The Medical examination was given as usual, and the work was faithfully followed up by the District Nurse.

Teachers' records show that there were 6 visits paid to the schools by the members of the Board, 148 by the Supt., and 340 by parents and others. This increase in the number of visits by parents is appreciated. The number of parents' visits range from 18 at Bear Hill to 80 at the Merrill School. The Merrill School has been the banner school in this respect for three successive years.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

We present herewith the Report of the Board of Education for the year ending June 30, 1927.

In our last report we itemized the cost of the new high school building. There is at present \$188.38 remaining unexpended in the building account.

The following amounts for the school year, commencing July 1, 1928, are our estimates of the required expenses.

We expect about \$2,000 income in addition to the amount raised by taxation, and for that reason we recommend that the sum of \$25,700.00 be appropriated for the school year commencing July 1, 1928.

This is an increase over the amount asked for last year because we wish to have an additional teacher in the High school and an additional teacher in the grades. The cadet system has not worked out to our satisfaction, and we feel that it is much wiser to engage regular teachers hereafter.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Board of Education of the Hillsboro Special School District, the report of the Supt. of Schools, for the year 1926-1927 is herewith respectfully submitted:

All but one of our last year's teachers returned to us this year. Miss Dorothy Flint of Plymouth, N. H., a graduate of the Plymouth Normal School, with graduate work at Boston University, took the position of teacher of Latin and English held last year by Miss Mabel Shaw. Six of our teachers have certificates and five have licenses.

Keene Normal School sent us four cadet teachers, seniors, who remained with us nine weeks each. Only four of our eleven teachers report having taken any summer course of study. Such work is very important. It sustains interest and enthusiasm in the work, and keeps the teachers informed as to the latest methods of teaching her subjects. On the other hand a faithful teacher is weary at the close of the year. To encourage summer school work I recommend a slight addition to the

salary of a teacher who attends summer school, that addition being only for the year following such attendance.

The total enrollment for the past four years has been 285, 303, 306 and 329, an increase of 15.4 per cent in three years.

The highest percent of attendance was 97.76 in Mrs. Doble's room, the highest for several years. The average for all our schools was 96 percent. Our tardiness record is improving, 156 this year compared with 239 last year. Each room did well averaging from .11 cases per pupil in Mrs. Doble's room to .9 cases per pupil in the High school. I am sure that careful attention to this matter will result in still greater improvement.

Teachers' records show 10 visits by members of the Board of Education, 427 by parents and others, and 333 visits by the Superintendent.

From a report of the State Board of Education it appears that 55 New Hampshire high schools cost more per pupil for instruction than does ours, and only 28 cost less per pupil. The cost in different districts ranges from \$87.54 per pupil to \$401.64, our per pupil cost in the high school being \$119.36. Of the 246 districts in the state having elementary schools, only one has a less cost per pupil than ours. With that in view we have already added an extra teacher and a cadet teacher, and I recommend a regular teacher in place of the cadet for next year. Of 250 districts in the state 67 spend less per \$1000 of equalized valuation, and 182 spend more than we do. These amounts range from \$1.29 per \$1000 valuation to \$28.68. We spend for education \$7.85 per \$1000 valuation.

The following is also gathered from the report of the State Board of Education for the year under consideration. The average salaries for teachers and superintendents in this state compared with what we pay is as follows:

It seems that Hillsboro would gladly pay as much as the average. In the case of the Headmaster and elementary teachers we pay about the state average, while for the others we pay considerably less than the state average.

The scholarship was awarded to Miss Erlene A. Murdo who attends the Keene Normal school.

Miss Gile followed up the medical examination carefully.


When the term opened in January, the new high school building was opened for use, and teachers and pupils found it vastly more convenient than their quarters in the old building. The gymnasium especially has been regularly used and appreciated.

Mr. George W. Haslet insisted upon the acceptance of his resignation from the school board, much to the general regret. He had been a member of the school board for many years, most of the time, as its Chairman, and much of the success of the schools is due to him, and the credit for it is cheerfully given by his coworkers, who are, one and all, appreciative of his faithful services and friendly interest.




