THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Littleton Qualified to Vote
in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building on the 10th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, Three Selectmen, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, an Auditor, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to Prosecute Violations of the Liquor Law, three Members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, in place of Geo. H. Tilton, Julia A. Eaton, Harry M. Morse, terms expired, Constable, two Road Agents.

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of Schools, for the purchase of text books and supplies for the Schools, for the laying out and constructing and repairing Highways and Bridges, for the payment of the Town Debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, and for all other Town charges.

Article 3. To see what sums of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 4. To see if the Town will adopt Chapter 105 of the Session Laws of New Hampshire for 1901 relating to political caucuses and conventions.

Article 5. To see what action the Town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for Highways in this Town under the provisions of an Act to provide for State aid, and

for the expenditure of other public moneys in the permanent improvement of main highways throughout the State, approved February 24, 1905, and any amendment thereto, and to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed advisable, and to make suitable appropriations under said act or acts.

Article 6. To see what sums of money the Town will vote and raise for a Fourth of July celebration this year.

Article 7. To see what action the Town will take towards observing Old Home Week.

Article 8. To see what action the Town will take towards instructing the Selectmen to dispose of the Town Histories.

Article 9. To see what action the Town will take with reference to contributing towards the support of a Band.

Article 10. To see what action the town will take with reference to providing the Littleton Water & Light Commissioners with sufficient funds to enable them to lay a 10 or 12-inch pipe down Union street from the Grange Hall to Mill street, and to so remodel our electric light system as to separate the street lights from domestic lights, and to enable them to furnish power and a 24-hour service.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of any highway that may be laid out between a point near the Horace Shute place on Farr Hill and a point near the Ira Parker greenhouses, and upon what conditions, if any, said outlay shall be made.

Article 12. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 13. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing, and to choose or elect any agents or

committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

COMMENTS.

In examining the statistics of criminal offenses which come before this Court, the fact should not be overlooked that our population is probably at the present time more than forty-five hundred. If we do not take into account the prosecutions for drunkenness, it appears that those brought before the Court in the year ending February 1, 1906, were 23. Those for the year ending February 1, 1907, were 19, and those for the present year 17. These are almost without exception offenses of a minor grade. Although this class of statistics is not infallible, still the tendency towards better social conditions and conduct indicated by these returns is gratifying.

A still more marked decrease in prosecutions for drunkenness is noted from year to year. In the first of the three years named there were 59 cases of drunkenness, in the second, 31 cases, and this year 24. Of these 24 only 6 cases were those of residents. The statistics do not appear as favorably for the inhabitants of the town in respect to prosecutions for other offenses than drunkenness.

The last Legislature passed what is known as a Juvenile Court Act. This makes the Police Court a juvenile court, that is, a court which must take jurisdiction of and deal with cases of juvenile offenders in accordance with the advanced ideas and methods which characterize this legislation. There is not space for elaboration of the provisions of this act in this connection, but they are important and interesting. They deserve careful study by those who are interested in the subject. The Act requires that a separate Court Room be provided for hearing of cases against juvenile offenders; that they be not

confined with adult offenders, and that they be not committed to or confined in places of detention which are made secure by bars and other similar features. Detention of offenders under the new law must be by personal custody of the Probation Officer or his assistance without imprisonment. Very few cases have come before this department of the Littleton Court. Mr. Herbert D. Stevens has been appointed Probation Officer, and Room No. 1 in Chutter Block has been designated as the Court Room for the consideration of cases of juveniles. The session of the Court for this purpose is on the first Monday of each month in the forenoon. The juvenile cases have all been reported to the State Board of Charities, as the law requires,
