

Warrant for the Annual Meeting.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the town of Milford in the County of Hillsborough in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said Milford on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To hear the reports of all town officers, agents and committees, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

4. To see if the town will vote to employ a night watchman, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the building and repairing of highways, bridges and sidewalks.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the fire department.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the schools.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the lighting of the streets and town house.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town house repairs.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the free library.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for sewers, or take any action relating thereto.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

13. To see if the town will arbitrate a settlement with William L. Whittemore for alleged trespassing on his homestead, or otherwise act on the matter.

14. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 124 of the Public Statutes relating to dealers in old metals, and fix the amount of the license fee to be paid by such dealers.

15. To see if the town will vote to purchase a lot of land owned by W. L. Winslow, situated near the Pumping Station, bounded on the East by South Street, and on the North, West and South by land of the town, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

16. To see what action the town will take relative to furnishing water for street sprinkling.

17. To see if the town will vote to adopt by-laws prohibiting the depositing of rubbish in the river and in the streets and parks within the compact part of the town.

18. To see if the town will vote to provide for the collection of rubbish within the compact part of the town.

19. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to provide a public dumping place for rubbish.

20. To take the sense of the qualified voters whether

the alterations and amendments of the constitution proposed by the constitutional convention, shall be approved.

21. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway leading from Nashua-street into Riverside cemetery.

22. To see if the town will vote to buy the stone crusher now located at the Milford Granite Co.'s works, or take any action relating thereto.

23. To see if the town will vote to pay the damages done by fire on the property of F. W. Ordway, Leonard Merrill A. W. Merrill, guardian. R. W. Farley, Miss Kate Duncklee and B. R. Came in Nov. 1901, after said fire was under control by the fire department of the town of Milford, N. H. Said damages being estimated at \$355.

Report of the Selectmen.

In conformity with an established custom we would before presenting the statistics for the year just closed, offer some suggestions and explanations that may be helpful to a right understanding of the conditions that exist in relation to our municipal affairs. It has been the purpose of your selectmen to so conduct the affairs of the town that the motto upon our town seal of "equal and exact justice to all" should have an application. If we have failed in our endeavor no one regrets it more than we.

There is perhaps no matter that concerns a larger number of our people than the condition of our highways, and as the statutes make the selectmen responsible for their condition this subject may well be considered here. For years we have talked permanent roads and have kept right on repairing our highways in the old way. It was said by a noted statesman during the resumption of specie payments period that the only "way to resume was to resume," and the application of the same principle would indicate that the only way to have better roads would be to build better roads. Our highway agent has this year made a beginning in this direction, as he tells you in his report. If you approve of continuing this line of action it would seem to be wise for the town to own a stone crusher, and as the one now set up at the Milford Granite Company's works has proved to be a good one, and the condition under which it was brought here (that if the town desired to purchase it they could do so and have the profits of the

experimental piece of road apply toward its payment) would seem to be an advantageous one, we would recommend that it be purchased and if the road made with crushed rock proves satisfactory as large an amount could be built each year as our means would allow, probably one thousand dollars could be spared from the amount now appropriated for highways for this purpose. The cost of the crusher, elevator screen and two one one-horse dump carts with the necessary harness will be about \$750.

ELECTRIC LIGHTING.

The owners of our electric lighting plant, whoever they are, seem to have abandoned the control of the works to the local management, and we have no reason to complain of the service we have received the past year. The lighting of the town house has for several years been done at a contract price. We pay the same in the summer as in the winter months, this system proving unsatisfactory we are now paying for the current used, as registered by meter. There are several streets in town where street lights are very much needed, and we have in four instances tried to supply partial relief by using oil lights which we find more expensive than the electrics. We are spending less upon our town lighting than most towns of our size spend, and possibly an increased appropriation would be wise.

The taxes upon the Electric Light Co. property for 1900 have been paid with interest, those for 1901 are about half paid.

SEWERS.

Acting under instructions from the last annual town meeting, we assessed a sewer tax on property situated within one hundred feet of a public sewer. That the town has alegal right to assess a part of the cost of public sewers upon property especially benefited, there can be no doubt, and it is done in many places in our state. In order that the tax might not beartoo heavily upon those of limited means, we have given all those who have spoken to us upon the matter, a year in which to pay it without interest. The demand that was made upon us for the construction of sewers shows that our people are awake to the necessity of proper sanitary conditions for the preservation of health.

After careful consideration we decided that the money that was to come from the sewer tax could properly be used in the extention of our system, and acting under chapter 79 of the public statutes adopted March 12, 1889, by the town which gives selectmen authority to build such sewers as they adjudge necessary, we have built on Souhegan street 8_{36} feet, Amherst and Grove streets, 8_{02} feet,

 Highland ave., 1,267 feet, Adams street, 130 feet, Spring street, 240 feet, Billings street, 120 feet, Willow street, 200 feet, Elm street, 275 feet,

Forest street, 265 feet, a total of 4,035 feet, which practically completes our system in the older portion of the village, with the exception of the outlets, which must at some time be carried further down the river. Attention must soon be given to caring for the drainage of Nashua street below B. R. Came's and the new settlement upon the old fair ground which can be done without large expense.

TOWN HOUSE REPAIRS.

In connection with the committee appointed for the purpose we asked and received several bids for the remodeling of the hall according to the plan submitted by Mr. Luther Greenleaf of Boston, no bid being satisfactory, we employed Mr. L. L. Junkins to superintend the wood and mason work, and J. A. Mixer the decorating, and did the work by the day. The appropriation for the hall was one thousand dollars and three hundred for the general repairs, of this amount nearly one hundred was spent in concreting and drainage in the fire department quarters. We know of no extraordinary repairs that will be needed upon the building this year, and the usual appropriations will be sufficient for the needed repairs.

REMARKS.

In addition to the regular highway work this year a strip of stone road has been put in near Smith's mill on Nashua Street. A small amount has been put in each season for the last four years. This exhausts the stone chip supply in town of suitable size except what will be made from year to year. Arrangements have been made with several sheds by which the coarsest chips are kept separate and the town clears out the sheds. A contract was made with A. B. Black of Concord, Mass., to macadamize 1442 square yards on Union street. A new crusher was set up at the Granite Company plant, which works to entire satisfaction. The capacity is 100 tons per day. Several cities and towns in the state are using this crusher. The machine is portable and can be easily moved when necessary. Arrangements were made with the Granite Company for power at price of extra fuel used. The price of crusher, elevator, screen, etc., is \$975. An agreement was made by which the highway agent should keep an accurate account of the expense in building this road, and if the town should see fit to purchase crusher the profit should be deducted from price. Several veins of trap rock of good quality have been found, which can be procured at moderate cost. Without doubt a roller can be hired the length of time needed at a less expense than a town of this size can maintain one. It is the opinion of your highway agent that a small appropriation should be made annually in addition to amount required by law to be used for permanent road. By order of the selectmen, the road near the residence of D. O. Handley has been widened, graded and straightened at an expense of \$154.00. There is yet a bank wall near Clarence Trow to be built. The day of the road machine on a great deal of our highway is passed. The heavy traffic from granite teams, etc., has caused all the material within reach to be worn out. The machine is obliged to be used in a good many places to keep up the centre of road and keep it from washing away, when in reality the material is good for nothing,

the appropriation being inadequate to meet the demand for new road. South street is the next strip that should be improved. The excellent teams furnished by the town have been fully appreciated and they have done good work. The teams do not make as good a showing as they should on account of the low price allowed for their use per day.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEB. 15, 1903.

On the evening of March 27, the trustees met and organized as follows:

W. F. FRENCH, Ĵ. E. WEBSTER, REBECCA F. DOANE, G. A. WORCESTER,	President, Treasurer- Librarian, Secretary.

The scope of the Library work is constantly increasing. The circulation has been much larger than in any previous year. The reference work and work with the schools increased accordingly. The children's corner which was arranged a year ago has proved very successful. There is not room for half that might be accomplished in that direction; for a time after school hours it is crowded. The reference table, the gift of the Woman's Club, has been constantly in use; the attendance in the reading room very satisfactory. In fact, there has been nothing provided for the public of which they have not shown appreciation by use.

During the past year the Librarian has experimented, with good results, in sending books to some of the dis-

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trict schools; a few books, at a time, selected by the teacher, which may be given out for home use under same conditions as from the library; the teacher keeping record of the circulation, exchanging the books, and reporting the circulation. This has been done because the teachers desired the scholars to do home reading and it is very difficult for them to come to the library. This plan can be extended to other schools and districts wherever the teachers are willing to assume the responsibility of the return of the books.

At one of the monthly meetings of the Board of Trustees the following vote was passed :

"That non-resident people who desire to take books from the library shall pay for this privilege the required sum (\$1.00) per year, and non-resident scholars attending our public schools shall be restricted to the use of books required for school reading : and that summer guests shall pay 25 cents per month for this privilege."

As will be noticed by reference to the statistics which accompany this report the library appears to increase in usefulness year by year. The past year has been the most successful in its history if success is measured by the use accorded a library. The circulation has exceeded by over 1200 volumes the previous year, and is the largest since the library was established. Another gratifying fact is noticed from the statistics which is that the increase has not been in the fiction department, the percentage in fiction reading being smaller than ever before, accounted for by the increased use of the library by the schools.

When the services of the present Libraian were engaged the circulation of the library was small and the work attending its care much less than at present. It is desired by the Board, and we think by all, that her services be retained. She feels, however, that if she is to remain under the present conditions, that a janitor should be provided for the library at the public expense, and she be relieved of the expense of keeping the library in a proper sanitary condition. If this request is granted, an increase in the appropriation of at least fifty dollars will be necessary.

A frequent visitor in Milford recently made the remark that "she rarely asked for a book but what she was able to get it from the Milford library." It is the effort of the trustees to keep it up to date, and its generous use attests it as being a "working institution."

Your trustees would not close this report without paying tribute to the valuable services of a late member of the Board, Mrs. Laura B. Smith. She took a great interest in the work and growth of this library, and to her continued efforts in its behalf are we indebted for much of the valuable reading on our shelves today.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS.

To the Citizens of the Town of Milford :

The Board of Water Commissioner herewith submit their report for the year ending Feb. 15, 1903, together with the financial and detailed report of the treasurer and superintendent. It is gratifying to note that the measures taken last year to increase the water supply have proved very satisfactory and there appears to be no question, but what the town is now provided with an adequate supply of pure water for many years to come.

The Commissioners believing that the source of supply should be carefully guarded from any possible contamination have bonded for the sum of \$500.00 a small parcel of land situated on the southerly side of the town's land. This land is owned by Mr. W. L. Winslow, and on it he contemplates the erection of dwelling houses. The question of purchasing this land will be submitted to the town at its annual meeting in March. Your Commissioners believe that the purchase of this land is desirable as by securing it we shall then own sufficient land above the wells to insure pure water.

The water main has been extended on Nashua street 1,100 feet and an additional hydrant installed, also an extension of 168 feet has been made on East Union

street, and twenty one (21) new services have been added.

We are pleased to report that the property of the water works is in good condition and is kept at a high point of efficiency under the able management of our superintendent, Mr. Wilkins.

It will be seen by the treasurer's report that there has been an increase in receipts over last year. The interest on the bonds has been paid, the sinking fund provided for and a balance of \$900.00 paid over to the town.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT, REGISTRAR AND TREASURER.

To the Honorable Board of Water Commissioners of the Town of Milford, N. H.

Gentlemen:--I herewith present my fourth annual report. Inspection of every service is made twice a year, requiring two weeks' time at each inspection.

I have lined 1,500 feet of one inch service pipe with cement and 1,838 feet has been laid.

Meters.

Ten new meters have been installed, two old ones replaced by new ones, and one discontinued. Many towns and cities are adopting a complete meter system as the only way to stop the waste of water, and no doubt our town could save considerable by doing this as in the winter as much water is pumped as in the summer months. Faucets are often left open in winter to prevent freezing and in summer to have cool water.

Gates.

Two 6 inch gates have been put into the main line, one on East Union the other on Nashua St. These were to accommodate the extension of pipes on those streets. Four 4 inch gates have been put in the pipe line between the main and hydrants, so that hydrants can be shut off without shutting off the street. These

are on South, Nashua, Elm and Souhegan Sts. One 2 inch gate has been put in at the end of East Union St. extension as a blow off.

Leaks.

Leaks have been repaired as follows: Gate at Dane St. Gate at corner of Souhegan and Amherst Sts. Gate at pumping station. Leak on Oak St. service pipe, also leak in the 10 inch main at Stone Bridge. A section of this which was split was taken out and a new piece put in without serious inconvenience to water takers, the water being shut off only about three hours.

Hydrants.

I have oiled and packed all of the hydrants, and have put on new gates that have been cut out by operation. They were all pumped out in the fall to prevent freezing.

Five services of galvanized pipe have 'been relaid with cement lined pipe, and 21 new services added.

The 6 inch water main on Nashua St. has been extended 1,100 feet and one hydrant added, also an extension of 168 feet of 4 inch pipe has been added on East Union St.

Ten gate boxes and 23 service boxes have been fixed to conform with the grade of the street. The town has used for sprinkling its streets this last season 842,300 gallons of water, which would, at 20 cents per one thousand gallons, net the water works \$168.-46.

Pumps.

The pumps at the station after 14 years of service are in good condition and doing good work, raising 167 gallons of water to one pound of coal for the last year. A good showing for this particular make of pump is 96 gallons to one pound of coal. The standpipe is pumped full of water every day of the year, and the difference in the amount of water pumped at present and in former years, is due to the fact that under careful inspection, fixtures are kept in better order, and also a very important fact is that each pump delivers but 13 gallons of water at each revolution, instead of 15 as has been reckoned in former years. I have added 45 new services since I became superintendent.

Analysis of Water.

The water was analyzed by the State Board of Health at Concord last September and pronounced as "excellent water," H. E. Barnard, chemist.

The No. 3 well has produced abundant supply of pure water during this last year, and it would seem now that the town is well provided with an ample supply of water for all purposes for some years to come. No water has been pumped from the brook since the new well was completed. The grading around the well has been practically completed. A fence has been built at the water works' expense on the dividing line of land purchased of Mr. Cutts, upon which the new well is situated.

As will be seen by comparing the report of this and last year: We have used 22 tons less coal for actual pumping; but if we include the coal used for banking, we have saved 18 tons. The heating of the station is also included. What has been saved in quantity of coal has been offset by the high prices?

Dead Ends.

All dead ends, of which there are 17, have been

blown out for at least 5 to 20 minutes at least once a month during the summer, and in some instances every two weeks.

I run the pumps seven days a week through the winter, besides doing all necessary repairs. I wish to thank the board for the courtesy extended to me and trust that this year will be as profitable as the one just passed.

Report of the Board of Education.

The School Board presents to the citizens of Milford this report of the schools for the year ending, February 15, 1903.

Our schools have gained in numbers during the present year but as the gain has been a little in all grades we have not been much overcrowded in .any of our schools.

Never in the history of our schools has the district received as much money for tuition as during the past year. Nearly twelve hundred dollars have been paid into our treasury by towns and individuals during the year.

This fact, more emphatically than words can, declares the judgment of these towns and individuals upon our schools. We are not sure that the years to come will bring us as many tuition scholars as the year that is just past, but as inhabitants of Milford, we all ought to desire as well as work for such a high standing in our schools, that students desiring a better education than they can obtain at home, will be attracted to the superior advantages which we offer. The larger our high school the better equipped it must be both in teaching force and in modern appliances. The better the teaching force and the more ample the equipment, the more advantages will come to our own children, who attend this school from year to year. The scope of the modern high school grows wider and wider as the years come and go. Let us all, as patrons of our schools, both in financial help and in sympathetic well wishing, do our best to have our schools, one and all, stand in the van of educational advancement

We, as a board, earnestly urge the fathers and mothers of our scholars to become better acquainted with the teachers of their boys and girls, and by visits at the school rooms show an interest in the work there being done. The parent and the teacher are both workers together with God in the character building of the child, how can the parent and the teacher work together to the best advantage when they are strangers.

The past year has seen the introduction of drawing in our courses of study. Our plan in this is the same as that followed in the introduction of music. The first year all below the high school have instruction, the second year, the class passing from the ninth grade to the high school will continue their drawing and each succeeding class will do the same; in this way drawing will in time become a part of the high school course.

In the introduction of this new sucject, the subject of music has had less time given to it than during the past years, but in years to come the idea of the Board is that an equal amount of time is to be given to music and drawing.

We have expended very little money in the way of repairs, the past year, and the Board know that more must be done the coming year. The No. 9 school house needs quite an outlay to make it as equally well equipped as the other houses in the village. The hall over the high school should have something done to it, the walks about the high school building should be put into better shap. All these cost money but the Board can spend only the money which is given it to spend.

As we come to the close of another year we desire to thank the able corps of teachers for the faithful and painstaking work they have done for the boys and girls under their care.

And we desire as well to thank the citizens for their hearty support of the work we have endeavored to do.

The motto of our school must ever be "Forward," never that other word, "Backward."

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF HIGH SCHOOL.

Milford, N. H., Feb 13, 1903.

To the Chairman of the School Board:

The public high school, or any school, should stand for Christian manhood and Christian womanhood, citizenship, and whatever makes for the developing of, and the power to further develop in future, the talents with which God has endowed us.

In the ways and means by which such ends may be attained, opinions, and consequently schools and methods, differ. It is my firm belief that, whatever be the outlined course, whatever the particular subject, this is the keynote: "Do what you do to the best of your ability."

Good teaching is much; it must be secured and maintained; yet it only directs—shows how. It does not do. The pupil must do for himself. Self teaching and self education is the kind that counts; the kind that will stand by us.

Most boys and girls have the materials, if they will only use them. Samuel Johnson says: "He who waits to do a great deal of good at once, will never do anything."

It is attention to common and everyday things that we need.

Good habits, as well as bad habits, hold fast. The pupil who has been required and hence accustomed during a school course to attend every session, to be on time every day, to prepare every point in every lesson, to attend faithfully to the business of his school, is not likely on graduation, to change suddenly to a shiftless and unreliable youth. Now we, the teachers, can not look after all this unassisted. Theparents must co-operate with us and assist us.

The boy who has in his soul no liking for hard work, can never use his brain and body to the best advantage. If he does not possess a liking for work, it is his first business to cultivate one; to actually do some good hard work,—not of the frantic last-for-a-day-ortwo kind, born of a sudden resolution, that leaves him tired out, and back again in the rut soon,—but steady, continued work, that gains power and gives power as it continues, and fills us with the joy and confidence that comes from the knowledge that we are doing something.

We, the teachers, are here not to act solely as testers of knowledge, not to entrap the pupil, nor to frighten him by terrific questions; neither is it our purpose to help, by supplying vital points, a blundering pupil through a poorly prepared recitation. In and out of school we are glad to explain to any pupil a point difficult to him; to assist by showing how to do the work, or where to get the information which will set him right. By no means do we believe in doing the work for him. Seeing us do examples, and hearing our replies to ordinary questions will never educate a pupil. He must solve his own problems, perform his own experiments, actually do his own examples and think out his answers to questions before

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he gets anything that will stick to him.

No school can turn out good graduates which has not demanded and exacted from its pupils hard work. I know of nothing which can be used as a substitute in attaining any desirable ambition.

Work of the grade I mean is not beyond the power of the average pupil, nor is it injurious to health. I believe a large per cent. of trouble is caused by the mental inertia and moral cowardice which precedes and postpones work, rather than the actual performance. There are some pupils, fortunately or unfortunately few, who will under the driving of a strenuous teacher, work beyond right or necessity. A teacher who loves to teach, and means to learn all he can about teaching, will find a way to know such pupils and set them right.

An outline of our course is appended. This is subject to change in detail at any time, e.g., the substitution of German for Greek in the third year work, and the introduction of English History in the second year.

Pupils wishing to prepare for college should indicate their intentions at as early a date as possible, to secure the proper course.

A pupil may obtain at this school a course which wifl entitle him to admission to college, provided he gives us reasonable notice and does work up to our standard. It is unnecessary for a pupil to go from this school to any "fitting school" to complete his course. If he desires our recommendation he must expect to work hard in preparation. He must not expect, however, by informing us at the end of his third year, to be prepared on any such short notice, unless he has taken, and done good work in courses in keeping with college requirements. We will be very glad to give any information we can concerning any course, or to send for information upon request.

The equipment in chemistry and physics is not the best, but is such that we can meet the minimum requirements of the colleges. It can be made much better and arranged at a moderate expenditure to suit the more exacting institutions, and what is far more important, at the same time better illustrate the principles underlying a practical and commercially useful knowledge for the pupil who does not go to college. I hope some day to see a course in popular physics prescribed in the first year work.

The mathematics course has been extended to cover the period of four years, five days per week during each year.

I wish drawing might be given in the High School.

I believe a commercial course is good. There certainly is an increasing demand for such a course in our High Schools, but I think the time for it here in Milford is not now.

Most men, and now many women, have occasion during their lives to say something in public. The experience of facing for the first time an audience of one's peers is often attended by peculiar sensations. I have required each pupil, at least once during the school year, to speak before the school. No pretention of instruction in oratory or elocution is made; we do nor drill the pupils, nor insist on any spasmodic interjection of gestures. They simply have the experience of saying their say to an attentive and courteous audience which will remain till they have done. All selections are under the supervision of the teachers, and have thus far been excellent, usually very well delivered and well received. All work and no play is not our motto. While the military drill is not to be classed as play, yet it serves as a break in the regular programme of the week. The boys enjoy it, and take hold of it with an interest and a vim that I like. I think the work of Mr. Cutter as instructor merits praise, and I take this opportunity to say that the school appreciates it.

The exercise in music, singing, comes every Friday. We have little opportunity to practice the selections during the week, so the entire burden of practice and theory falls upon the music teacher.

There has been an unusual amount of sickness among the pupils during the last two months, the absence list averaging from twelve to fifteen daily. This has made it hard for the pupils and has handicapped all of us in our work. It is unavoidable. We must simply make the best of it.

Athletics, if kept within proper bounds, seem to me good. A school team fosters school spirit and loyalty, and the actual benefit of outdoor exercise derived from participation in games like base-ball, running, etc., is often of inestimable value in building up a sound body in which to house the knowledge acquired. In all matters of athletics I insist upon two points: 1, That every team or organization passing under, or in any way connected with the name of the "Milford High School" be comprised of Milford High School pupils, and of those only, to the last man. 2. That no pupil whose school work is below the standard necessary for promotion shall participate in the games, nor spend his afternoons in athletic pursuits.

I hope, also, that something may be done for the girls in the way of physical culture.

Personally, I have thoroughly enjoyed my work in

Milford, and have been pleased and encouraged by the kindly interest manifested by your citizens. You have generously furnished us with suitable, even excellent accommodations; you accord us your hearty support; we have a class of pupils whose spirit is good, and under God's guidance, we will work.

New Hampshire's sons and daughters can work. They have made rapid progress during the last few years, progress that has attracted favorable comment from other states. The boys and girls in our high schools are not too young to work, and work hard, for they have in them the blood of a race with

l wish to thank the members of the School Board for their many acts of kindness; the teachers for their hearty support and cheerful work; and the pupils for uniform courtesy and attention.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF DRAWING AND MUSIC.

To the Chairman of the School Board:

As the study of drawing was introduced this year for the first time in the Milford public schools, I will give you a general outline of the work to be pursued. The course I have plauned for this year embraces the five following subjects: 1, Nature Drawing; 2, Color; 3, Pictorial Drawing; 4, Structural or Mechanical Drawing; 5, Decorative Drawing.

- I. Nature Drawing includes: Study of growth in leaves and flowers. Beauty of line in growing forms. Balance of masses. Radiation of parts from centres of growth. Natural forms treated decoratively.
- II. Color includes: Natural order of colors as found in the spectrum. Six standard colors. Twelve intermediate hues. Tints and shades. Harmonies.
- III. Pictorial Drawing includes: Memory drawing of common objects. Free illustrative drawing. Principles of foreshortening. Drawing of foreshortened forms.

Drawing of type forms. Landscapes.

IV. Structural or Mechanical Drawing includes: Drawing of geometric figures, as squares, circles, triangles, etc.

Paper cutting and folding.

Drawing to a scale.

Working drawings of common objects.

Design and manufacture of common objects.

- V. Decorative Drawing includes:
- Regular arrangement of units in borders and surface patterns. (Units may be elements derived from nature or geometric forms.)
 - Simple designs for plaids, tiles, fabrics, ornamental initials, book-covers, etc.

In the first three grades colored pencils have been used, but in all the other grades water color.

In the primary grades work has been confined principally to nature drawing, paper cutting and folding; to the study of simple geometric forms and original arrangement of these forms in borders and surface patterns; to exercises in accurate measurement.

In the intermediate grades work has been study of leaves, flowers and fruits in color; free-hand drawing of spherical and cylindrical objects including simple perspective principles, study of color and the harmonies, designs for borders and surface patterns, using geometric units.

In the grammar grades the work has been study of flowers, leaves and fruits in color; study of geometric and type forms, including perspective principles; freehand drawing of objects illustrating the application of these principles; study of color and the harmonies; designs for tiles, plaids, Christmas cards and valentines. Designs for Christmas cards in the different grades proved of special interest.

Work in design will be carried on farther, taking up those subjects mentioned in my outline.

'Two teachers' meetings have been held for the grade teachers and one for the district teachers.

I have given two lessons a week in all the grades in drawing. I allow about thirty minutes a lesson for the lower grades and from forty-five to sixty minutes for the upper grades. Several of the grade teachers have given extra lessons during the week.

On Teachers' Day at the Woman's Club, January 10th, there was a small exhibition of drawing representing the work from the first grade through the ninth.

The results of an art instruction should be: Acquaintance with the beauty of nature; development of a love of nature and habit of observation; ability to draw common objects with some degree of facility and correctness; knowledge of the principles of design and a well-trained sense of good arrangement and harmonious coloring.

As the subject was new to the schools this year, it has been extremely interesting to me to watch the progress which in many instances seems very marked.

The hearty co-operation of the teachers and the ready way in which they have accepted this new branch has been very helpful.

In presenting this my first report as Supervisor of Music, I would like to express my appreciation of the methods and work pursued during the few years that music has been taught in the Milford schools. It is largely owing to this thorough work that I have found the work of this year so satisfactory. By the time scholars have reached the fourth grade, they have studied the different keys, time signatures, notes and rests; have sung at sight simple exercises in different keys, and have done excellent work in two part music for beginners.

When they have reached the seventh grade, they have had various fractional divisions of the beat; exercises in chromatic and minor scales; three part work, both exercises and songs.

In the ninth grade, major, minor, and chromatic scales are reviewed, and "Introductory Third Reader" completed. Supplementary songs are studied from the "Coda" and elsewhere.

The high school has chiefly studied "Codas" and "Octavo" music.

The study of music in school should prepare the pupil to understand and enjoy good music, and to be able to read at sight any ordinary music.

Music is also beneficial as a means of mental and physical training and introduces a spirit of cheerfulness and enthusiasm into the school room.

I take this opportunity to express to teachers and members of the School Board my appreciation of the interest manifested in both these subjects.




Of the deaths in town in 1902, 29 were buried out of town : 11 in Amherst Catholic cemetery, 4 in Wilton Catholic cemetery, 1 in Nova Scotia, 1 in Maine, 1 in New York, 1 in Massachusetts, 10 in different towns in our own state.

There were brought here for burial from other places, 14.

The average age at death for the year was a fraction over 45 years.

The oldest person 98 years, one other 90 years; between 80 and 90, 3; between 70 and 80, 6; between 60 and 70, 10; between 50 and 60, 8; between 40 and 50, 3; between 30 and 40, 5; unknown, 1. The sex was females, 23; males, 29; 17 of whom one or both parents were born outside the United States; 8 themselves were born outside our country.







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
