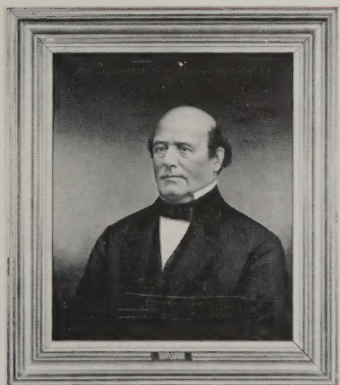
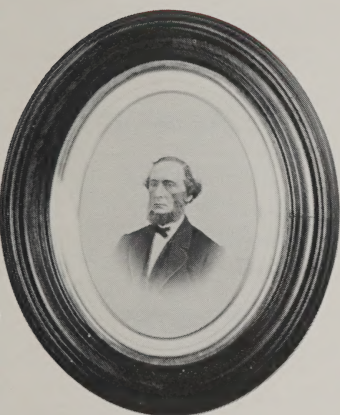

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The year 1984, has again been an active year for your Board of Selectmen. In carrying out the 1981 Town Meeting vote to do major reconstruction of the sewer lines, the Selectmen negotiated the Bond Issue of \$300,000 which will be paid over a period of ten (10) years, with this in mind, the annual long term debt payments have risen from \$92,484 to \$122,484 and the interest from \$76,785 to \$101,426.

During 1984, the Board formulated plans for a much needed Municipal office to house functions presently carried out in the Town Hall, and in addition, to bring the office of Town Clerk and Tax Collector into the same office orbit. The Board recommends that the site of the new building be in the rear of the present Town Hall. This will continue to carry out the original intended use of our beautifully classic Town Hall building.

During 1984, the Selectmen issued a total of 59 building permits; 17 new homes, 1 shopping center (The Gallery), the Colby-Sawyer library, 1 office/apartment building and 1 four unit condominium. Also, 38 permits for additions and renovations to existing homes. 53 yard sale permits, 18 pistol permits and 16 sign permits were approved.

Appointments to the various boards and commissions included the following: Susan Cooper, Carol Harris, Linda Drewniak, F. Read Clarke and Stephen Toy to the Recreation Commission; James Robjent, Milton Butterworth and Vernon Adams to the Conservation Commission; Carla Koop and Albert Stavitsky to the Zoning Board of Adjustment; Robert Wright, Planning Board; Peter Stanley and Sally Fifield were appointed representatives to the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council; and, Frank Gordon and Richard Biddle designated as New London's representatives to the Sullivan County Regional Refuse Disposal Board, with Dana Stanley and Catherine Robjent as alternates.

The Town continues to be plagued by lawsuits against the Town, its officers and employees. The Town has been sued for \$14.5 million in two cases against the Police employees and the Town itself. The Kezar Lake suit continues on the court docket. One suit, through the efforts of our Town Counsel, has been stricken from court action.

In 1984, the Board approved an additional 5 Current Use applications, bringing the number of tracts in Current Use to 121. A total of 4,006.66 acres are now in Current Use. These tracts have an original assessed valuation of \$3,414,575, but under 1984 Current Use regulations, their valuation decreases to \$144,759. In money terms, if these tracts were under regular assessment they would produce \$94,174.16

of taxable income, but under Current Use only \$3,980.87 is received. This means that \$90,193.29 has been transferred to other tax payers of the Town.

Problems of solid waste disposal remains a major problem. The present landfill site is filling up rapidly, and the Town must make arrangements to handle its waste in another manner. In 1984 the Town Meeting voted to join the Sullivan County Regional Solid Waste District and pay its assessment of \$7,980. Actually, the State had by its own action assigned New London to the District. Whatever is the final resolution of this problem, there will still remain the problem of closing the present landfill which may be a very costly operation.

The 1984 tax rate dropped \$1.02 from the 1983 rate of \$28.52 per thousand. This \$27.50 rate was the result of using \$90,000 in surplus, plus \$25,000 that was not used to pay interest on operating costs. This dramatic drop in operating interest costs resulted from the semi-annual collection of taxes, first instituted in 1984. This made it possible for municipal revenue and expenses to move in a more level flow of money. Unfortunately, while the Town's share of the tax rate dropped from the 1983 level of \$9.71 to \$6.85, the School Districts share rose from \$14.41 to \$15.67 and the County increased from \$4.40 to \$4.98 per thousand.

The State continues to short-change the municipalities in terms of its contributions. There has been a steady decline since 1980. In 1980, the Town received from the general fund \$174,006.07 but in 1984, that contribution fell to \$137,274.00. Legislation is now before the General Court to seek to remedy this and bring the contribution of the State back to at least the 1980 level.

The Board of Selectmen congratulates Elkins Village on its celebration of its sesquicentennial in 1985. This community has been a vital part of the life of the Town since 1835, and it will continue to contribute in many ways in the future.

Finally, as a personal note, may I express my thanks to the townspeople for their support over my 12 year tenure as one of your Selectmen.

### **NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS**

All property owners must file by April 15, 1985 an Inventory of Taxable Property and Exemption form with the Board of Selectmen completely filled out. Failure to do so, will result in a penalty of \$10.00 to \$50.00.

### **NOTICE TO CURRENT USE APPLICANTS**

Owners of land classified as Current Use must indicate on the Inventory form whether any changes in the use of the land have been made.

New applicants must fully complete a Current Use application form with a map showing clearly the land to be considered for Current Use. All applications and maps must be on file with the Board of Selectmen by April 15, 1985.

To the inhabitants of the Town of New London in the county of Merimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next at 10:00 o'clock to act upon the following subjects:

- ARTICLE 1. A. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- B. To vote by ballot on amendments to the New London Zoning Ordinance.

Note — By law, the meeting must open before the voting starts. Therefore, the meeting and polls will open at 10 o'clock for the consideration of Article 1, Parts A & B.

At 12:00 noon the Meeting will recess but the polls will remain open until 6:00 p.m. The meeting will reconvene at the Kearsarge Middle School Auditorium on Wednesday, March 13, 1985 at 7:00 p.m., to act upon Articles 2 through 37.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept from the Trustees of Colby-Sawyer College land known as The Commons, being west of the Town Hall on Main Street and between Main Street and Gould Road. [Tax map 85, Lot 13]

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75,000 for the purchase of land and buildings owned by Colby-Sawyer College, located on Seamans Road behind the Town Hall. [Map 85, Lot 38].

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to construct an addition to the Town Hall, for municipal purposes, on the proposed site at the rear of said Town Hall.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000 to add to the established Capital Reserve Fund for construction, reconstruction or acquisition of an additional municipal building.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to incur debts from time to time during the 1985 fiscal year to an aggregate amount not exceeding the 1984 tax levy, for temporary loans in anticipation of 1985 taxes, and to issue notes of the Town therefore, and to refund same, all as provided in the Municipal Finance Act. The Selectmen and Town Treasurer to be authorized to sell such notes.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,850.00, for the abutters of Sparrowhawk Road to construct, reconstruct or repair Sparrowhawk Road to conform with the standards and regulations established by the Town of New London for Town roads. This betterment assessment shall create a lien on the abutters of Sparrowhawk Road, payable to the Town; to be prorated over a period not to exceed ten years, subject to interest and such other charges as are applicable to the collection of delinquent taxes, all under the provisions of RSA:28 thru 33.

### REPORT OF THE NEW LONDON CENTRAL DISPATCH

During 1984 the New London Central Dispatch received a total of 14,219 telephone calls for service. The duties of the dispatchers vary, these include report typing, filing and answering general questions asked by the public, who come to the office or telephone in. Also included in our duties is the responsibility of dispatching police to emergencies for the towns of New London, Wilmot, Newbury, Sutton and Bradford. We are solely responsible for the dispatching of the ambulance and F.A.S.T. squads for the towns of New London, Wilmot, Sutton and Newbury. Newport Police Department and New London Dispatch act as a back-up for each other in this system. Our paging system also allows us to page New London Fire Department and Newbury Fire Department as well as dispatching Wilmot Fire Department by telephone. The dispatchers also issue burning permits. This was started in May and 205 permits were issued this year. In addition to the above duties, we also dispatch for Colby-Sawyer College security and New London Highway department, as well as monitoring over 140 alarms.

Two of our full time dispatchers attended a two-day dispatchers training conference in Laconia this year. These programs help keep us up to date on emergency procedures.

The dispatch center is manned 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. We would appreciate any support you can give to help us upgrade our present facilities.

## ANNUAL REPORT NEW LONDON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

During the past year the Conservation Commission continued developing and maintaining its many miles of footpaths in New London, and use of them continues to increase. Over 3,000 signed the register at the Philbrick-Cricenti Bog and many others visited the Low Plains Natural Area and Phillips Preserve.

The Bog boardwalk was partially replaced with funds donated in memory of Arch Bauer, a faithful trail worker.

The ever popular spring nature hikes and winter snowshoe/cross country ski walks enabled a large number of residents the opportunity to explore New London's protected areas.

The Commission purchased 20 +/- acres from Colby-Sawyer, bordering Great Brook, the main tributary to Pleasant Lake. The scenic trail to the Lower Cascades runs along Great Brook, and its access is now guaranteed by the donation of a permanent easement across the property of Robert and Arrolyn Vernon.

While continuing its efforts to preserve woodland and wetland areas for posterity, the Commission has recently begun to inventory agricultural lands and open spaces to ascertain which of these might be preserved for the future benefit of the Town.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NEW LONDON GARDEN CLUB

“In 1928 Dr. Anna Littlefield founded the New London Garden Club with the following purposes in mind; to encourage and aid in all civic beautification; to protect and perpetuate desirable plants and birds; to promote and encourage a knowledge and love of gardening and horticulture; and to stimulate an interest in all people to work with and for nature.”

The club works towards these principles in many ways. The civic-beautification committees made up of nineteen members, plant and maintain eleven areas in New London. A new planting was created at the Homan's Corner Triangle this past spring. We hold a plant swap in June, in which the town is invited to participate. Throughout the year members care for hospital patient's plants. In December the club has a greens workshop to make wreaths for all the town buildings and churches, and Christmas arrangements for the shut-ins. Forty-four members entered the New Hampshire Spring Flower Show in March. Our club distinguished itself by winning many ribbons and received many top awards. Our programs are planned to be educational, concerning conservation, gardening, and the growing and arranging of flowers, and most of these meetings are open to the public. We held our seventeenth annual Antiques Show and Sale in August, the proceeds from the show are given in the form of scholarships to two deserving students in the department of Plant Sciences and the two year program in Applied Sciences at the University of New Hampshire.

There are 125 members in the club and we are a member of the Dartmouth-White Mountain District, New England Region, New Hampshire Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc. and National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc.

## REPORT OF THE TOWN HISTORY AND ARCHIVES COMMITTEE

Activities and expenditures during 1984 have been concentrated on the preservation and conservation of town Records. The Selectmen designated \$500 of the Archives \$1,000 appropriation for microfilming non-current records. This procedure follows recent emphasis by the State Archives on surveying and regulating municipal public records. We have made a beginning on such micro-filming, specifically the Minutes of the Selectmen, early Minutes of the Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment and Building Permits.

Town Clerk's records from the Incorporation of the Town had previously been microfilmed by the Church of the Latter Day Saints. Additional copies of these films have been made for the Selectmen, the Town Clerk and the State Archives.

Copies of Cemetery Commission records have been photocopied to provide a complete file for the Town Archives.

A gift from the Service Organization of \$600 enabled us to have the first volume of the Town Clerk's Minutes, dating from 1779, treated at the New England Document Center in North Andover, Massachusetts. The pages were individually cleaned and treated to prevent further deterioration, and a special box was provided for this precious leather bound volume.

The Archivist has been assisted by Nancy Muller in advice and routine activities. We continue to replace verticle file folders in the collection with acid free folders.

Pauline Roos has continued work with the photograph collection of the New London Historical Society, an invaluable part of the Town Archives. This collection services numerous requests during the year from individual researchers, businesses and organizations. This year we were happy to work with the Committee for the Bicentennial of Elkins, particularly in the publication of the noteworthy history of Scytheville-Elkins entitled REFLECTIONS IN A MILLPOND.

Noteable recent accessions include early photographs of the Shepard Family, given by Maitland and Amos Shepard and family memorabilia of the Whipple Family in connection with the restoration and dedication of the Solomon M. Whipple House which has qualified as a National Historic Site. These gifts include Dr. Solomon M. Whipple's medical records for the years of his practice in town, 1849-1884. They were given by his granddaughter, Dorothy Whipple Fry Illig of Plymouth, Massachusetts, and they also include biographical material on Dr. Whipple's two sons Amos and Sherman. These brothers made

the gift of the Whipple Memorial Hall in memory of their parents.

The Archivist is grateful for all gifts of the past year and renews an invitation to visit the facility and share research information on families and town history.

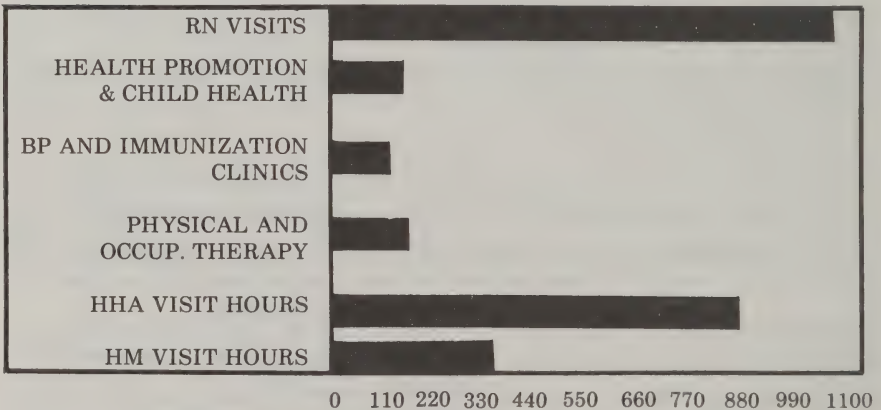

## SEWER COMMISSION REPORT

The New London Sewer System has been operating for four years and within projected operating costs. However, our system is large and complex, requiring constant attention to keep the system functioning.

Contract No. Four, the reduction of infiltration of storm water into existing sewers by replacing old lines, was signed early in 1984. The project was awarded to **Moriarity and Sons, Inc.** of Massachusetts. Construction began in April of 1984 and will be completed this spring.

The ongoing meetings with consulting engineers, hydrologics specialists, attorneys and contractors have required much time and effort. Art Dorley has volunteered many hours above and beyond his regular obligations as sewer commissioner to co-ordinate and attend these meetings. His perserverance, determination and adherence to detail are an asset to the town.

The Sewer Commissioners meet most Friday afternoons at the New London Pumping Station, on North Pleasant St. In the event you have any questions, this is the best time to contact us.

## ANNUAL REPORT 1984 TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY

During the past year Tracy Memorial Library has continued to play an important role in the life of our community as indicated by the number of adults and children who have made use of the library.

Circulation for 1984 was 40,654 which indicates an increase of 3,583 over the circulation for 1983. New London continues to hold the highest per capita circulation among towns of approximately 3,000 population. The number of books purchased during the year was 1,421. The library is now open an additional four hours, Tuesday mornings, making a total of 37 hours per week.

The front and both ends of the building were painted and the Garden Club assisted with some of the landscaping work.

The generous financial support given to the library by the Friends of Tracy Library made the following purchases possible: a cellar dehumidifier, a copying machine for the use of the staff and the public, a paperback book display rack and materials used in the childrens' programs. The contents of the building and the exterior and grounds were videotaped for the purpose of having accurate records for insurance claims. In addition Friends money was used to purchase books. Several childrens' activities and the Great Decisions program were sponsored by the Friends. These services and purchases would not have been possible without the Friends of Tracy Library as our budget did not include these items.

In March, Ernest Welch retired after having given twenty-five years of loyal service to the library as Treasurer. Many volunteers continue to give devoted service to the library which is of great assistance to the staff.

We invite our regular patrons and anyone who has not visited the library recently to come in to use the fine book collection and to take advantage of the many services offered to patrons. These services and the collection are the result of the continued support by the citizens of New London for which we are grateful.

## REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDENS AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages cause, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

## NEW LONDON HOSPITAL ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SECRETARY - 1984

The year ended on a true high, with the near completion of the new building project. In celebration, the annual hospital Christmas party was held on December 15th on the new premises. The January 13th annual meeting will be held there as well, with a tour being provided for guests, as well as the formal dedication of the building to all employees, past and present. It is anticipated that the public will be even better served.

The ambulance service now enjoys 100% participation of all the towns involved.

As a result of an ongoing dialogue with the Kearsarge Visiting Nurse Association, new quarters are being provided for them, hopefully to be completed by early January 1985. This has met with great enthusiasm by the KVNA staff, and the dialogue will continue.

The rehabilitation services of New London Hospital occupational and physical therapy are now being provided to Newport and Valley Regional hospitals, as well as New London Hospital.

A new service was introduced, i.e. the evening outpatient clinic, nightly from 6:30-9:00 PM. This will serve those who need non-emergency service during these hours. A flat fee of \$25.00 is being charged.

Another new service began on October 8, 1984, with the opening of Warner Medical Clinic, served by Dr. Brock and Judy Tabor, P.A., 4½ days weekly.

A series of tours of the hospital was developed and to date includes one for "newcomers" to the community, the Andover Service Club, and KVNA Board of Trustees and staff members.

Hospital Day was the usual successful event, generating substantial funds. The Development Fund generously exceeded last year's contributions. All of this has enabled the hospital to reduce the long range loan required for the new building, thus affording every participant a real stake in the project.

Plans are already developing for Hospital Day '85, with the general chairmen as well as essential committee chairmen already committed.

In closing, Dr. Evans addressed the full Board with a challenging report on the future of all hospitals in these times of government pull back. Ultimate success will depend heavily on mutual trust and understanding among trustees, hospital management and the medical staff.

**SULLIVAN COUNTY  
REGIONAL REFUSE DISPOSAL DISTRICT  
1984 ANNUAL REPORT OF ACTIVITIES**

After experiencing a number of setbacks early in the year which created delays and significant changes from previous plans, the District, together with the Southern Windsor/Windham Counties Solid Waste Management District and Clark-Kenith, is now approaching a bond sale and subsequent construction of a waste-to-energy facility.

During January Keene decided not to join the Sullivan County District and a Federal Urban Development Action Grant application was turned down. At a Joint Meeting with the Southern Windsor/Windham Counties District in February the District Committee decided to request a new proposal from Clark-Kenith and a competitive proposal from Vicon Recovery Systems for a smaller facility more closely matching the quantity of waste available from existing District towns.

The decision to request new proposals gave the Districts time to investigate other sites in Claremont that would be more acceptable to the residents of Claremont. The Claremont City Council agreed to support a site located in an area zoned for industry in southwest Claremont, east of the Joy Foundry. Revisions to the environmental impact assessment were subsequently made, with the City splitting the costs of the assessment and other site investigations with the Districts.

Clark-Kenith and Vicon Recovery Systems submitted bid construction costs and operating proposals to the Districts during May. Differences in projected disposal costs were less than two dollars per ton. Clark-Kenith remained the preferred vendor because of their technology and financial strength, and the uncertainties associated with beginning negotiations with Vicon.

On September 19, 1984 the District signed a long-term 20 year waste disposal agreement with Clark-Kenith for the financing, construction and operation of a 200 ton per day facility. An option to purchase 51 acres of land at the new location was also signed during September.

Lazard Freres and Company, investment bankers for Clark-Kenith, are now in the final stages of preparing a 28 million dollar industrial revenue bond sale through the New Hampshire Industrial Development Authority. Prior to closing on the bonds an equity commitment agreement must be signed which will provide for the sale of the facility to a private investor at the end of construction. The sale, together with

the expected retirement of certain contingency funds and bond reserve funds will leave approximately 16 million dollars in outstanding bonds which must be retired during the 20 year operating period.

The present schedule calls for finalizing an agreement with Signal RESCO, the expected equity owner, by March, 1985. Construction will begin immediately thereafter, with operation expected early in 1987.

REPORT TO THE VOTERS - 1984

☆☆☆☆☆☆☆☆

Superintendent James E. Bewley retired on 29 June 1984, after close to a quarter-century of dedicated service to customers of the Precinct. Mr. Richard K. LaPorte, a long-time employee, assumed the superintendency and Mr. Roderic J. Reyelt filled the resulting vacancy. The transition was made smoothly and in six months of service both employees have proved their competency.

Throughout the summer months much time and effort was spent coordinating extensive excavation work undertaken by the New London Sewer Department. Routine maintenance of the Precinct's distribution system continued and such interruptions as did occur were corrected with minimal inconvenience to customers. While discoloration of water remained a major complaint, water supplied met all bacteriological and turbidity standards throughout the year.

The Commissioners continued their study of deficiencies in the Precinct's system; study which culminated in release of a comprehensive *Management Study of the New London-Springfield Water System Precinct*, issued in July 1984. The study recognized the urgent requirement for (a) an adequate potable water storage reservoir close to the center of New London, (b) treatment of water from surface sources to insure bacteriological purity, eliminate discoloration, and remove all particulate matter, (c) development of an adequate source of potable water to meet rapidly growing demand, and (d) essential improvements to the existing distribution system to provide adequate fire protection and complete control of the system.

At the same time, examination of the Precinct's physical plant and equipment revealed that years of benign neglect have resulted in obsolete equipment which must be replaced. Included in this category is a master flow meter of such age that parts are no longer available for rebuild to insure accurate consumption data; an antique back-hoe whose continued use poses safety problems; and a number of fire hydrants which are not fully compatible with modern fire department apparatus.

Funds provided by the voters for the purpose of locating and determining the adequacy of an underground source of potable water capable of meeting the Precinct's requirements and located within an economically justifiable distance of the Precinct's system were spent in the employment of a qualified hydrogeologist and exploratory drilling in selected locations. Results reported are highly significant and suggest a capability of meeting current and future Precinct requirements. However, the delicate nature of negotiations for land use, easements, etc., and the recognized requirement to obtain voter approval prior to definitive action preclude release of more detailed information in this report. [RSA 91-A:3 II (d)]

The Commissioners have placed upon the Warrant, and urge the voters to support, Articles calling for the replacement of aged or

obsolete equipment, the modernization of certain fire hydrants and ancillary equipment, and--possibly the most important of all--employment of professional engineering assistance to examine and evaluate capital and operating costs of viable methods for correcting known deficiencies in the Precinct's system. Several of these recommended expenditures are based on guidance contained in the *Report on Water Supply for the New London Water System Precinct*, October 1981, prepared by the Ad Hoc Committee chaired by Mr. Lewis A. Vincent. This report was accepted and adopted by the voters in 1982.

At the forthcoming Annual Meeting the voters must decide whether they are content with the inadequacies of the existing system and willing to continue with known deficiencies in fire protection and palatability and aesthetics of domestic water OR are prepared to bring the system into compliance with the Safe Drinking Water Act [P.L. 96-502, as amended] and the standards of the New Hampshire Water Supply & Pollution Control Commission. The actions which must be taken are known and have been publicized; the wherewithal to accomplish these actions can come only from the voters and the Precinct's customers in a well-planned and carefully executed capital investment program extending over a period of years.

A companion question is the future of the Precinct. Customer demand within the existing Precinct boundaries already strains the Precinct's resources and capabilities. Shall the boundaries be extended? Shall additional major connections to the existing system be permitted? Is there a finite capability which must lead to voter approval of a moratorium on additional service connections? These are hard questions which affect the future growth of the towns served by the Precinct. Yet these are questions which must be addressed and on which decision must be reached.

The Contingency Fund (RSA 52:4-a) continued to serve the voters well. Expenditures to meet unanticipated costs were for auditor's assistance in conferences with the Municipal Services Division, Department of Revenue Administration, \$194; and publication of the Precinct's Management Study, \$108.

Despite the problems discussed above, day-to-day operation of the Precinct continues satisfactory. Year-end financial data show that direct operating income came within 5% of matching direct operating costs; tax receipts were spent primarily for capital expenses. A second upward adjustment of water rates, effective 1 January 1985, will lead to a balance between operating income and expense in the coming year. Precinct employees are dedicated, knowledgeable and hard-working; coordination and cooperation between the Precinct and town agencies and boards have continued to improve; and a brightening future can be forecast given voter understanding of existing problems and wholehearted support for essential corrective actions.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies employed in the preparation of these financial statements:

The income accounts of the New London-Springfield Water System Precinct are maintained on a cash basis, recording income as it is collected. The income accounts are converted to an accrual basis at year end.

Expense items are recorded only when cash is involved. The expense accounts are converted to an accrual basis at year end.

The inventory of supplies is priced at cost. Based on a physical inventory taken once a year, the increase or decrease in the inventory value is charged or credited to supply expense. The policy of the Precinct is to maintain a uniform level of supplies inventory.

Facilities and equipment are stated at undepreciated cost. Gifts and contribution of water facilities are recorded at fair market value at the time received. Assets disposed of or abandoned are written off at cost against the appropriate asset account and charged to the General Fund balance or Contribution-in-Aid, depending on the original source of the assets.

NOTE 2 - PRECINCT TAX

The Precinct Tax has no restrictions. Income from this tax is used primarily to pay principal and interest on outstanding debt and to pay for facilities and equipment. The tax is reported as other income to avoid distortion of the gain or loss from water operations.

NOTE 3 - CONTRIBUTIONS-IN-AID

Contributions-in-Aid in 1984 were \$1,511 for new connections paid by owners and contributed to the Precinct.

To the inhabitants of the New London-Springfield Water System Precinct in the towns of New London and Springfield in the counties of Merrimack and Sullivan respectively, qualified to vote in Precinct affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London, New Hampshire, on Tuesday, March 19, 1985, at 3:00 P.M., to act on the following subjects:

*[NOTE: By law the meeting must open before voting starts. Therefore, the meeting and the polls will open at 3:00 P.M. At 3:15 P.M. the meeting will recess but the polls will remain open until 8:00 P.M., at which time the meeting will reconvene to act on Articles 1 through 13]*

- ARTICLE 1: To choose all necessary officers for the coming year.
- ARTICLE 2: To hear the reports of officers, committees and auditors, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 3: To set the salaries of all officers for the coming year.
- ARTICLE 4: To see if the Precinct will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums to defray Precinct charges for the ensuing year:

- ARTICLE 5: To see if the Precinct will vote to transfer the sum of \$15,000 from general fund surplus to Capital Reserve Funds for the purpose of financing all or part of the cost of purchasing a new back-hoe for use in Precinct operations.

- ARTICLE 6: To see if the Precinct will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for the purchase and installation of a master flow meter, compatible chlorination equipment and ancillary items, the Commissioners being authorized to raise such sum by the issuance of notes or any other action relative thereto.
- ARTICLE 7: To see if the Precinct will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be spent for modernization of fire hydrants, control valves and other components of the Precinct's system, the Commissioners being authorized to raise such sum by the issuance of notes or any other action relative thereto.
- ARTICLE 8: To see if the Precinct will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000 for the purchase of a new back-hoe for use in Precinct operations. Funds for this purchase in the amount of \$24,000 to be withdrawn from Capital Reserve Funds established for this purpose (the Commissioners being named agents to expend such funds), and the balance of \$16,000 to be raised by the issuance of notes by the Commissioners or by any other action relative thereto.
- ARTICLE 9: To see if the Precinct will authorize the Commissioners to sell, by sealed bid to the highest bidder, the back-hoe presently owned by the Precinct and to apply the proceeds of such sale to the general funds of the Precinct.
- ARTICLE 10: To see if the Precinct will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the employment of professional engineering assistance in the development of estimates of capital and operating costs pertaining to acceptable methods of complying with the Safe Drinking Water Act [P.L. 96-502, as amended] as recommended in a *Report on Water Supply for the New London Water System Precinct, October 1981*, submitted by the Ad Hoc Committee, appointed January 21, 1981, chaired by Lewis A. Vincent; the Commissioners being authorized to raise such sum by the issuance of notes or by any other action relative thereto.
- ARTICLE 11: To see if the Precinct will vote to amend the purpose of the Capital Reserve Fund remaining after withdrawals authorized by the voters to read: "A Capital Reserve Fund is established pursuant to RSA 35:1 II for the purpose of financing all or part of the cost of acquiring a new truck, suitably equipped, for use of the Precinct operations." The Commissioners are hereby appointed agents for the expenditure of funds for such purpose.
- ARTICLE 12: To see if the Precinct will vote to declare a moratorium on additional water service connections to the Precinct's system effective this date, exception to be granted in those instances where the Commissioners and the New Hampshire Water Supply & Pollution Control

Commission can certify, after review of the application, proposed installation, and proposed usage of water, that available Precinct resources will insure adequate water flow and pressure to all customers of the Precinct subsequent to the proposed connection being placed in use; the Commissioners being empowered to rescind this moratorium at such time as, in their judgment, Precinct resources become adequate to insure adequate water pressure and flow to all customers under all foreseeable conditions of demand.

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Precinct will vote to authorize the Commissioners to borrow money through short-term notes (less than one calendar year) in anticipation of operating revenue and Precinct tax receipts.

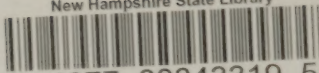
