## TOWN WARRANT

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars for the benefit of the Haverhill Firemen's Relief Association.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred and fifty (\$250.00) dollars to be used for the purchase of the land on Main Street owned by the Plaistow Construction Company and which has been previously leased by the Town as a site for the fire engine house.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty (\$150.00) dollars for the celebration and proper observance of Memorial Day. (By Petition).
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy dollars and fifty cents (\$70.50) for the installation of three street lights on Pine Street to be located between Seaward's Corner and the residence of Otis R. Jackman. (By Petition).
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred and seventy five (\$275.00) dollars for the purchase of a blade for removing snow from the streets.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred (\$300.00) dollars to rebuild the driveway to the Town Hall building and to repair the walks.
9. To see if the Town will vote to dispose of the stone crusher, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to carry out the provisions of any vote that may be passed.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and forty one (\$141.00) dollars for the installation and maintenance of six additional street lights on North



Main Street to continue from the location of the present lights.  
(By Petition).

11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the street known as Spinney Avenue Continuation to Pine Street. (By Petition).

12. To see what the opinion of the voters is in regards to a reduction in Town Officers' salaries. (By Petition).

13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectment to raise money in anticipation of taxes.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Plaistow :

I have the honor to submit my fifth annual report together with the reports of the Supervisor of Music and the School Nurse. These appended reports deserve your thoughtful consideration. Your attention is called to the table of statistics which follows this report.

The number of pupils enrolled in our schools last year was 235. This number is eight less than during the year ending in June, 1930. The attendance averaged 94.34% of the membership. The average for the state was 95.4%. Thirty-five pupils were neither absent nor tardy during the year.

There were twenty graduates from the eighth grade last June. Sixteen of these entered High School. This is a time when young people should continue in school. It is far better for them to be enrolled in schools than to be found merely forming habits of idleness. I urge all our graduates from the eighth grade to go to High School and to go through.

There has been one change in the teaching force since my last report. Mrs. Loleta Moore Palmer resigned after three years of splendid service. Miss Elsie Dickinson was elected to fill the vacancy.

A part of the money raised in the Red Cross Membership Drive was given to us for use in the schools. Two children were provided with glasses. Balance was used for medicine and first aid.

The Parent-Teachers' Association has continued its interest in the welfare of the school children. Dental and Toxin-Anti-Toxin clinics were held. The association has furnished free milk or cocoa to underweight children. Clothing has been supplied to needy children.

The Trustees of the Library in selecting new books have co-operated with the teachers and have purchased books that are of special help and interest to the school children both in school and at home.

An intensive drive has constantly been made by the teachers to encourage pupils to use the sidewalks rather than to walk on the street. Last Spring trees were planted on the playground and the classes had appropriate programs.

The cost of instruction per pupil in Plaistow continues below the State Median. Plaistow will continue to receive \$6,000.00 State Aid. Every School District in which a school tax of five dollars per one thousand dollars equalized valuation does not yield a sum equal to the approved budget, is entitled to State Aid for ele-

mentary schools. The State Aid is the amount that must be added to the yield of the five dollars tax to equal the amount of the approved budget. The approved budget for elementary schools is the amount fixed by the State Board of Education as the minimum amount necessary to maintain standard schools. Our budget is determined by the amounts that State Aid will allow on the various items. If maintenance costs are cut below this amount it will reduce State Aid rather than the cost to the local tax payer.

The Stanford Achievement Test has been given to all grades above the first. Scores obtained show that satisfactory work is being done. It is our aim to direct our teaching to individual pupils, first by discovering needs and then by adaption to work and drill. This year as in other years our tests are designed to reveal these needs, and we have given attention to choosing the right kind and amount of drill. The following table shows how our pupils compared with the standard scores in two subjects—Reading and Arithmetic:

The class in Domestic Arts has made jellies, and canned fruits, vegetables and relishes. They have made menus and prepared dishes for breakfasts, luncheons and dinners, but because of lack of equipment have not served any of these meals. They have made and served hot cocoa to those desiring it during the cold months. Each girl has also done many home projects.

For clothing projects they have made aprons, slips, and other underclothing, pajamas, nightgowns, cotton dresses, blouses, and

graduation dresses. For a Christmas project they made hem-stitched and embroidered articles. They crocheted edges and mats, and knitted mittens, scarfs or skating socks.

One of our greatest living teachers, Angelo Patri, says:

"The school cannot do it all. The parents, the grandparents, the community, the homes, the use of leisure, the play, the church, the library, and countless other agencies are at work quietly, but surely in the tremendous movement called education. There are twenty-four hours in a day. The child spends at best six hours in school, five days in a week, forty weeks in a year. He spends eighteen hours outside of school, seven days in a week and fifty-two weeks in a year. No, the school cannot compete! The handicaps are too great. It must be together, child, teacher, parents, home community, and church. All need the school, but even more does the school need all the other helpers. Educating boys and girls is the biggest job in this land of ours. It is too big a job for the schools alone. Confidence and faith are at the base of all co-operative endeavors. Children, teachers, and parents must co-operate."

In closing I wish to express appreciation of the courtesy and assistance given me by the School Board and the teaching force.

---

To the Superintendent and School Board:

I herewith submit my annual report as Supervisor of Music in the Plaistow Schools.

Music Education in our schools during the past year has developed a genuine enthusiasm and love for good music through vocal, instrumental and appreciation courses.

The children learn to sing many attractive and worthwhile songs before any music reading is taught. During the latter part of the first year staff notation is introduced, from this grade through the eighth the pupils progress step by step easily and effectively.

Recognition of musical instruments is taught by sight and sound with the help of the radio, victrola and charts. This work begins in grade one where the children learn to recognize the violin, trumpet and piano. Each year new instruments are introduced and at the end of the eighth year the entire symphony orchestra is completed. Through the rhythm band an opportunity for rhythm response is furnished.

Music lovers and intelligent listeners are being created through our musical appreciation course. Each grade has a music memory list selected from the best known classics written by the world's foremost composers.

The annual school concert was given in November. Each grade had a part on the program and the seventh and eighth grades presented the Myers Carrington opretta "Love Pirates of Hawaii." The cast consisted of eight characters, the other boys and girls acting as chorus.

In closing I wish to express my thanks to you and the teachers for the hearty co-operation extended me throughout the year.
