WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, 1935

(L. S.)

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Wolfeboro qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Brewster Memorial Hall in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, two Auditors, Treasurer, and Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year, one Selectman, one Library Trustee and one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.

ARTICLE 2. To elect one or more Highway Agents or instruct the Selectmen to appoint one Highway Agent.

ARTICLE 3. To choose all other Town Officers and Agents.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred (700) dollars in addition to that required by law for the Town Library.

ARTICLE 5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to pay Harry Harri-man Post No. 18 to defray expenses of Memorial Day, May 30, 1935.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand (6,000) dollars for Town expenses for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire a sum of money necessary to pay Town expenses in anticipation of taxes for 1935.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty (150) dollars for the maintenance of a public toilet.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred (200) dollars for a swimming instructor and maintenance at the public bathing beach located on Clark Sands.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred (500) dollars for the erection and maintenance of an information booth.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred (500) dollars to be expended for the building and maintenance of a skating rink.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred (1,500) dollars to assist the Wolfeboro Chapter, American Red Cross, in continuing its District Nursing Service.

ARTICLE 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay each fireman, legally returned for the year 1935 in addition to that required by law, Section 16, Chapter 146, Public Laws of New Hampshire.

ARTICLE 14.—To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding twelve thousand (12,000) dollars for purposes of relief to needy persons and families, contingent upon pending legislation by State or Federal Government.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five hundred (2,500) dollars for the purpose of constructing and repairing sidewalks.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred (400) dollars to be paid the Wolfeboro Band for weekly concerts during the months of July and August of this year.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and twenty-five (125) dollars to pay the balance due on building of band stand.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand (1,000) dollars for the purpose of widening the bridge over Smith's River.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to accept State aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of six hundred and forty-two dollars and seventy-one cents (642.71) on consideration of the State giving the sum of two thousand five hundred and seventy dollars and eighty-seven cents (2,570.87).

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred (1,500) dollars to be expended on Sewall Road for the purpose of continuing the improvement of said Sewall Road from a point near the property of Mrs. L. W. Pound.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred (1,500) dollars for permanent construction on the Cotton Valley road.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred (500)

dollars for the purpose of improvement of the old sections of the Dallas road.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred (1,500) dollars to continue permanent construction on Bay street.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand (1,000) dollars for the purpose of continuing the construction of Pine street extension towards South Main street.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand (2,000) dollars for construction on the New Durham Middleton road, so called, beginning at the Square in South Wolfeboro.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-five hundred (3,500) dollars for the continuation of the permanent construction on the Pleasant Valley road.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to extend its water system along Wood avenue, from the corner of Wood avenue and Bay street to the corner of Wood avenue and King street. This pipe to be not smaller than six inches in diameter and connected to a fire hydrant to be located at the corner of Wood avenue and King street, which shall have two (2) two and one-half inch discharge outlets, and one (1) four and one-half inch steamer connection, also that the hydrant now located on Bay street opposite the residence of Peter Greenier be re-located at the corner of Bay and King streets for the better distribution of fire protection. The expense of these installations to be taken from the earnings of the Water Department.

ARTICLE 29. To see what action the Town will

take concerning the purchase of new highway equipment and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise as a tax for each hydrant, the same to be held as a Sinking Fund to pay indebtedness on the Water Works.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand (1,000) dollars to aid and assist the Huggins Hospital.

ARTICLE 32. To choose a board of Water Commissioners; one for one year, one for two years and one for three years; said board to have the management of the Wolfeboro Water Works, agreeable to an act of the 1935 General Court entitled "An Act Relative to a Board of Water Commissioners for the Town of Wolfeboro."

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand (10,000) dollars to apply on its indebtedness.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a Town Planning board of five members, agreeable to an act of the General Court; one of whom shall be a member of the Board of Selectmen, appointed by the Selectmen; one shall be a Precinct Fire Commissioner, appointed by the Precinct Fire Commissioners; and three other citizens of Wolfeboro, appointed by the Moderator. The board shall elect its own chairman. The board shall be designated as the Building Inspector. The board shall have jurisdiction over Zone one ONLY in the Town of Wolfeboro so far as regulation applies.

ARTICLE 35. To see what action the Town will take regarding improvements and extensions of its water system and what sum of money it will vote to

raise to pay for said improvements, and also to select agents to carry into effect any vote taken thereon.

ARTICLE 36. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

To the Board of Trustees of the Wolfeboro Town Library:

Gentlemen:

The report of the librarian for the year ending February 1, 1935, is herewith submitted.

If the use of the Public Library may be regarded as a standard for judging a community, ours may be considered well-read. With the help at our command, it seems impossible to keep a record of the number of persons using the reading room. This is done in some of the larger libraries.

With changing conditions in the world at large, there has come a drop in the circulation of books of adult fiction; with an increase of books of a serious nature, books on world affairs, and those which have to do with the making of a living. There is an increase in the circulation of children's books of all classes.

*Twenty-six thousand four hundred and twenty books and magazines have been loaned during the year, of the following classes: fiction, 16,117, non fiction, 5,396, children's books, 4,907. The average monthly circulation has been 2,202. Two hundred and ninety new borrowers' cards have been issued.

Ninety-seven books have been given to the library, and 282 purchased, making a total of 379 additions. The two libraries now contain over 11,000 volumes. There is comparatively little dead material.

The above financial report shows the work of our nursing service in cold figures—but not some of the interesting details of our Chapter activities.

Last March a Baby and Pre-School Clinic was held, and 38 children were examined.

In April the last of our Red Cross flour was distributed—56 bags in all. This flour—and the clothing sent us by the Federal Government—have been stretched to the limit by their judicious distribution by our nurse, and have been placed where they would do the most good.

In July a General Clinic, financed by the Rotary Club, was conducted by Dr. Clow—assisted by our nurse. Thirty patients were examined and many defects were found.

In October 4 clinics were conducted and 48 patients were examined—30 being found with defects. Of these 18 were later operated on and their defects corrected.

In December, 10 children were operated upon for tonsils and adenoids—these cases being paid for by State Relief.

In the late fall, at a meeting attended by representatives of most of the local organizations the Red Cross was made the custodian of any funds or clothing that might be raised and contributed by such organizations. These were to be, and are being dispensed by our nursing committee, after our nurse has made the necessary investigation. Much distress has already been relieved through this means.

At Christmas the boys of the DeMolay and the girls of the Order of Rainbow collected, repaired, wrapped and distributed toys to many of our less fortunate children—together with Christmas bags of pop corn, candy and oranges. Our secretary, Mrs. Hart, superintended this worthwhile project, ably assisted by our nurse who investigated and compiled the names of the children to be remembered. By this means nearly 200 children had a happy Christmas.

Our nurse and our nursing committee, wish to voice their deep appreciation of the hearty cooperation of the hospital, physicians, selectmen, health officer and in fact all of our people. With this continued loyal support, we hope to be more and more useful to the community.

MUNICIPAL COURT

The Honorable Board of Selectmen of the Town of

Honorable Sirs :

I have the pleasure to transmit to you the financial report of the Municipal Court of Wolfeboro, N. H., for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1935, (February 1, 1934 to January 31, 1935) and of which I am the Justice.

You will find herewith a detailed report of all financial transactions, both receipts and disbursements, also a summary of the same.

You will note that I have paid over to the Town Treasurer of Wolfeboro, the sum of two hundred dollars and hold a balance on hand of three hundred seventy eight $\frac{53}{100}$ ths, two hundred and fifty of which is cash surety for appearance of defendant in court, the remainder of the balance is held by the court, amounting to one hundred twenty eight and $\frac{53}{100}$ ths to meet other payments.

I wish to take this opportunity to express to you and through you to the townspeople and to all the officers of the Town and County my deep appreciation of the co-operation given me in the course of my duties during the years I have held the office of Justice of the court.

As the Constitution of the State retires all the justices of the courts at the age of seventy years and I having reached that limit on December 21, 1934, this is therefore my last annual report. I am acting as justice of the court at the advice of the Attorney General until such time as my successor is appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Council.

In the years of my incumbency of the office I have sought to impartially dispense justice in all cases com-

ing before this court, not only viewing my duty as an officer of the State and honoring my oath of office, but realizing the frailty of human nature, I have sought to do what would be for the best good of the violator of the law, and by so doing have him realize, that laws are meant to be obeyed and that no man, rich or poor, great or small, is above the law of the State or land.

I trust that the position may be occupied by one who will equally view the responsibility of the office.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER

The health officer has tried to make the functions of the office sufficiently inclusive during the past year to be of real value to the town and its citizens.

The water supply has had the usual amount of care, a specimen having been sent to the state laboratory each month by Mr. Britton. At one time it seemed that an auxiliary supply would have to be taken from Rust Pond, but the difficulty of insuring a safe supply and increase in rainfall decided the authorities against this procedure. It was learned that bathing in Rust Pond could scarcely be legally prevented and it was felt that no water carrying possible intestinal bacteria should be pumped into the mains.

More frequent examinations of the milk supply have been made. No samples of undesirable type have been found. Retail milk dealers, aside from producers who are also retailers are demanding, and rightly so, protection of the product they sell. Investigation of the possibilities of pasteurization of all milk sold in Wolfeboro has led to no feasible plan as yet, but the fact is certain that as soon as a demand is created some scheme will be found to accomplish this object. Producers claim that the increased cost will not yet be absorbed by the customer, because the latter is not educated to demand the more expensive product. A co-operative plan of ownership of a plant is not impossible of accomplishment. The milk producers of our town are progressive and they are trying to give consumers a clean wholesome product.

As the year ends an epidemic of mild scarlet fever is reaching its close. From October tenth cases have been reported, in all 76 patients have had the disease. As usual most of the patients have been children, and all from the central school. It is probable that cases so light in type that no physician was called occurred before the disease was recognized. One death occurred following a more severe type of the disease, in a child, but the fatality was evidently the result of an unavoidable complication. But two other cases of sequelae have been reported. Every family where the disease occurred has been promptly quarantined and the state board of health plan to limit the spread has been followed, as well as such fumigation measures as have been ordered. At all times the state authorities have been cognizant of the situation and have advised against strict measures of quarantine applied to the entire town. It is a well known fact that every few years when a number of susceptibles are in the community a more or less widespread epidemic is bound to occur. Our town has not had so many cases for a long period and only a relatively small proportion of the susceptibles even now have had the disease.

It is obvious from the way cases have developed that it is the child who is beginning with the disease that is the infecting agent. No evidence has been found that a spread from a quarantined family has occurred.

The health officer has tried to visit at least once every family who has been quarantined. Other physicians have generously given their time and effort to try to limit the spread and to care for those unfortunate enough to acquire the disease.

Through the aid of the selectmen food and medicines have been generously given to those who are unable to make adequate provision themselves.

With the advice and consent of the board of health a group of clinics, ostensibly for diseases of the chest, have been held by the health officer. Co-operating in this enterprise the Huggins Hospital furnished space, technical assistance and its resident physician; the local chapter of the Red Cross its competent social worker and nurse; Wolfeboro Rotary Club payment for radiographs and other laboratory procedures. Ninety-one patients were studied with a history, physical examination and necessary laboratory work. The results are given herewith:

Plans are made for more of these patients to be operated on this spring, when they will be re-examined. Improvement is noted in the medical cases from the medicines, advice and dietotherapy prescribed.

A small amount of medicine has been furnished the public health nurse for following up people who need treatment for anemia, tuberculosis, etc.

Parents have been urged to have their children vaccinated against smallpox and diphtheria early in life. Next year a concerted effort will be made to have every school and pre-school child protected. Diphtheria rarely occurs in our town but it is always just around the corner. Statistics mean little to citizens but when they are told that Manchester has gone three years without a case of diphtheria, probably the result of vaccination, it is information of understable quality.

The problem of sewage disposal still rises to plague us. The state board of health, finding that the town would not voluntarily co-operate in a modern method of disposal has brought suit against the town. Legal counsel has been retained and one hearing with the attorney-general, the officials of the state

board of health, attorneys and the Court has been held on the spot. Proceedings are at a standstill for the time being. The friendly spirit in which the higher officials are dealing with a matter which might leave feelings of resentment and compulsion leads me to believe that we will, in time, be able to comply with the requirements of the situation. No one questions the desirability or eventually the necessity of stopping the pollution of neighboring waters, but the difficulty is the way in which it may best be accomplished. The appropriation of a considerable sum of money at a time when taxpayers are demanding, and rightly so, that no increased burden be placed upon them until more pressing problems are solved is the obstruction. The increased expense placed on all towns by the welfare load must first be eliminated, and better incomes enjoyed else resistance to the payment of already heavy taxes will be decidedly felt.

The federal grant for removal of defects in children was used in our town for eye examinations and the provision of lenses. The sum allotted was less than fifty percent of the real requirement. A grant from the Wolfeboro Woman's Club was used for this purpose. It is expected that further gifts will be forthcoming to complete the care of this group of children.

The co-ordination of all funds for the use of the poor and unfortunate in our town would be a most desirable arrangement, to increase efficiency and prevent overlapping. A survey of the needs of the town has already been partially completed by the Community Service Committee of the Wolfeboro Rotary Club.

Wolfeboro is unusually rich in its resources for the aid of the underprivileged of all types, and only a careful spread of the resources is required to cover every need that official arrangement does not provide.

The grant to the Huggins Hospital for the benefit of our townspeople is but one of the many provisions made, carrying with it no stigma of pauperism and no sting of callous investigation and publicity.

There is no need whatsoever for any person to go unrelieved if the condition is made known, and fortunately the depression has made no inroads on our resources.

John Brewster, James Martin, Blake Folsom, and Mrs. Alice Petrie have each left funds that are constantly useful. The income should be used to the utmost during the present period of depression to aid our folks in the purchase of clothing, shelter, food and medical care. There are many people in this, as in every town, who ordinarily manage their affairs without assistance, but when illness comes, or the job is lost they must have help. Public charitable trust funds should be exhausted before they should be made to feel the stigma of official pauperization with its attendant publicity. To this time funds have been available to cover many of the needs of the underprivileged and it is hoped that still better organization in future will produce even more valuable results.

For the first time a small community chest has been organized. Sponsored at first by the Community Service Committee of the Wolfeboro Rotary Club a meeting was held of the heads of various local groups and as a result a modest sum

has been placed at the disposal of the Red Cross for use where it will accomplish the most good. Next year still greater effort should be made to establish a fund that would be large enough to reach more folks.

One hundred one births took place in Wolfeboro in 1934, resulting in 99 living babies. The presence of the Huggins Hospital in Wolfeboro increases the total number of births, and unfortunately to a still greater degree, of deaths. Below are the essential data in regard to deaths occurring in the town.
