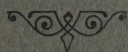

THE TOWN OF ALEXANDRIA

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Alexandria in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at Town House in said Alexandria on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for highways and bridges.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise \$1,002 for Trunk line construction, said amount not to be expended until 1921 or until we can get Federal aid again.
5. To see if town will vote to raise \$150 to build railing on Trunk line if state will appropriate a like amount.
6. To see if the town will vote to accept State aid.
7. To see if town will vote to raise \$300 for State maintenance.
8. To see if town will vote to raise \$250 for Trunk line maintenance.

9. To see if town will vote to raise \$559 50 for Trunk line construction.

10. To see if town will vote to buy snow roller.

11. To see if town will vote to cut down J. P. Martin hill, so called.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL SUPERIN- TENDENT

To the Citizens of the School District of Alexandria :

I present herein my first annual report as superintendent of schools, the report including the five months from Sept. 1 to Feb. 1. The outstanding fact in this district, as in all others of the state, is the new educational act which went into operation Sept. 1, 1919, by which the more wealthy communities of the state will generously come to the assistance of those less fortunately situated, so that the opportunities for education may be as nearly equalized as possible, and every child in the state shall have the privilege of attending a standard school. A standard school is defined by the act to be a school (1) maintained for at least thirty-six weeks, (2) in a suitable and sanitary building, (3) equipped with approved furniture, books, maps and other necessary appliances, (4) taught by an approved teacher, (5) directed and supervised by an approved superintendent, (6) with suitable provision for the care of the health and physical welfare of all pupils.

I shall confine this report to a statement of what has been done by your school board and superintendent in carrying out the terms of this act in Alexandria.

1. Doubt has been expressed as to the possibility of maintaining schools in a region with scattered population, drifting snows and low temperatures. We have succeeded in maintaining schools thus far through one of the severest

winters on record, so that there is no longer any reason for doubt. Up to the end of the present week, Feb. 20, we have completed in the Village school 20 weeks, in the Riverside school 21 weeks and in the South Alexandria school 22 weeks. We shall have ample time to complete the full school year of 36 weeks between the middle of March and the 1st of July.

2 It will require extensive changes in the school buildings to make them "suitable and sanitary" buildings within the meaning of the act. Toilets must be provided with fly proof vaults and provision made for more light from the left side. It is very desirable, in the case of the Riverside building, to secure a new location for the building inasmuch as the snow drifts to an unusual depth in front of the building as at present located. It would be necessary to move the building but a short distance to secure an admirable location. It is very desirable also in the case of the Village school that it be brought down into the village square and located in the midst of the other public buildings which make the square useful and attractive. I suggest that in repairing buildings one be put in perfect condition each year and that a beginning be made with the South Alexandria school inasmuch as the work here can probably be done at less cost than either of the other two.

The schools are equipped with suitable desks and seats, though I should hope that if new ones are needed in future single and not double desks will be purchased and that they be both adjustable and movable. It is desirable that desks and seats be exactly adjusted to the size of the pupils using them in the interests of straight bodies and good health, and it is a great convenience to be able

to clear a room of movable furniture for various school and community purposes.

An abundance of supplies has been provided and the schools are equipped for the work of the year. New text books will be needed as soon as funds are available.

4. It is the intention of the educational act that none but trained and qualified teachers shall be admitted to New Hampshire schoolrooms. It is impossible to attain this ideal at present, however, for there are not enough of such teachers to supply the schools. I cannot overstate the gravity of the situation as regards qualified teachers. Not only are teachers leaving the profession in vast numbers, but the supply of young people looking forward to teaching and fitting themselves in the normal schools has diminished alarmingly, while the number of children to be taught is constantly increasing. Even if teaching positions are made satisfactory in the matter of salary and in other respects it will take years for the supply of qualified teachers to equal the demand. Meanwhile many schools will be without teachers or taught by those not properly qualified for their work. Under these circumstances it will be a crime against childhood for any community to allow competent teachers to depart because their positions have not been made satisfactory.

The district has been fortunate under the conditions which I have described in being able to secure competent teachers for all of its schools. The Village school was taught by Miss Emogene Roby for four weeks when it was decided to close the school and send the 8th grade pupils to the Junior High school at Bristol. Miss Mildred A. Lockhart taught the Crawford Corner school until Thanksgiving time and Miss Gladys M. Monahan taught

the No. 6 school for the same length of time. Upon the resignation of these two teachers the two schools were united under one teacher in the Village school and Miss Ruby M. Ladd was engaged for the year. Mrs. Catherine Massey taught the Riverside school for the first five weeks, when Miss Isabel M. Morey took the school for the balance of the year.

5. The work of a superintendent of schools is both administrative and educational. I need hardly say that the administrative side of my work has been the absorbing one for the last half-year. The task of organizing the schools of the various districts, with the assistance of the school boards, in accordance with the new act, has been a large one, in which I can only report progress. To the educational side of my work, the careful inspection and supervision of teaching, the testing of pupils and the direction of their work, I have been able to give much less time than I hope to give in the future.

6. The lack of physical fitness revealed by the draft has set Americans to thinking, and in particular has stimulated the people responsible for the conduct of the schools to review their procedure to see if they have not left something undone, and if in future they cannot rear a race with better bodies. It is the intent of the educational act that every effort shall be made to remedy physical defects and to cultivate strong bodies and positive health. A school physician has been engaged by your school board, who will, at the opening of the spring term, examine all the children, and notify parents of defects requiring attention. It will be a part of our school program, also, to have such calisthenic exercises as will help to neutralize the evils of a sedentary occupation.

It is a pleasure to acknowledge the uniform courtesy and helpfulness of everyone connected with the schools. School board, teachers and parents have worked together for the best interests of the children.

REPORT OF HAYNES LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

We hereby make our 34th annual report of the library and its officers as required by its rules.

It is fitting to look back and see the rise and growth of the library, and a short glance at the officers of the association. The first books were purchased in March, 1885. Of the committee and selectmen who purchased them, two are now living, Charles E. Davis of Bristol and the writer. The library was opened to the public March 21, 1885, with 440 books on the shelves. In 1887, the library was incorporated under the name of the Haynes Library, by Orrin S. Gale and eight associates, of which the writer is the only one now alive.

The present library building was built in 1894, and was opened to the public Dec. 22, 1894, which was a great improvement over the old room over the hall in the old town house.

In closing we wish to mention those who have given money for the library. They are Timothy Haynes, M. D., of Concord, Clark Haynes, of Franklin, N. H., Elias A. Perkins, of Quincy, Mass., all natives of this town.

By the report of the librarian, Feb. 14, 1919, we find there was at that date 1903 books on the shelves.

During the past year the trustees voted to buy \$2,000 of Liberty Bonds, and enough was left in the bank to meet all necessary expense.

Thanking the members of the association for their help in the management of the library, and their kindness, I respectfully submit this report.
