TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon to four o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To vote by Australian ballot for all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see what action the town wishes to take in regard to assessors.

Article 3. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To hear the report of the budget committee and act thereon.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,605.00 for town officers' salaries or act thereon.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$750.00 for town officers' expenses, or act thereon.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$600.00 for election and registration expenses, or act thereon.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$250.00 for town hall expenses, or act thereon.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for forest fire expenses, or act thereon.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the police department and the additional sum of \$125.00, to provide watchmen and additional protection due to the war emergency, or act thereon.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$850.00 for the support of the fire department, or act thereon.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for continuing the control of white pine blister rust in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department, thereby receiving the usual state aid.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for the support of the board of health, and an additional sum of \$50.00 for the use of the board of health due to the war emergency.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$750.00 for the repair and upkeep of highway equipment, or act thereon.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$6,500.00 for town road maintenance, reserving \$1,000.00 of the same for calcium treatment, or act thereon.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,200.00 for snow removal or act thereon.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,900.00 for street lighting, or act thereon.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the town library system, or act thereon.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the support of the town poor, or act thereon.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,200.00 for old age assistance, or act thereon.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$10.00 for Memorial Day exercises, or act thereon.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to hold Old Home Day and raise the sum of \$50.00 in addition to the amount already in the hands of the committee, or act thereon.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for parks and playgrounds, or act thereon.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 for the support of the cemeteries, or act thereon.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the town beach, or act thereon.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$133.33 for interest on temporary loans, or act thereon.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for legal expenses, or act thereon.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$140.00 as the town's share in participating in the Monadnock Region, or act thereon.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to accept Town Road Aid (T.R.A.) for the ensuing year and raise the sum of \$744.19, or act thereon.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such an audit.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to rescind the vote of March 12, 1933, adopting the Municipal Budget Law, or act thereon.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from John Mansley, the income to be used for the perpetual care and maintenance of lot No. 63 in Spofford Cemetery and to be known as the Farr-Mansley Trust Fund.

Article 34. To see if the town will vote to accept the additional sum of \$100.00 from Etta L. Hildreth, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Assn., for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Etta L. Hildreth burial lot in said cemetery.

Article 35. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Mary Webb, the income from the same to be paid to Chesterfield West Cemetery Assn., and used for the perpetual care of the Nathaniel and Mary Converse Webb lot, and to be known as the Nathaniel and Mary Converse Webb Trust Fund.

Article 36. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Mary Webb, the income from the same to be used for the perpetual care of the Oliver and Marriette Hubbard burial lot in the Ware Cemetery, and to be known as the Oliver Marriette Hubbard Safford Trust Fund.

Article 37. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

TOWN MEETING MARCH, 1942

Proceedings of the annual meeting of the voters of the town of Chesterfield called at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, March 10, 1942.

The meeting was called to order at 9.45 a. m., by Moderator Arthur H. Post and prayer was offered by Rev. Norman J. Langmaid. This was followed by a Salute to the Flag led by Rev. Mr. Langmaid. Then the Warrant through Article 1 was read by the Clerk. The Moderator declared that balloting by Australian Ballot for all necessary town officers for the ensuing year under Article 1 was in order.

At 10.10 o'clock a. m., the meeting was again called to order by the Moderator and the remainder of the Warrant was read by the Clerk.

The Articles of the Warrant were then disposed of as follows:

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Albert D. Berry that the Selectmen act as Assessors. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes B. Chickering that the taxes be collected in same manner as in the past. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Voted by voice vote on motion made by E. James Winslow to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. Clarence K. Lewis, Chairman of the Budget Committee reported that the Budget Committee recommends a budget of \$40,550.45. The estimated revenue is \$6,395.50, leaving a property tax of \$34,154.98 with a tax rate of \$2.44. Voted to accept this report as read.

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ada W. Allen to raise the sum of \$1,605.00 for town officers' salaries. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ada W. Allen to raise the sum of \$750.00 for town officers' expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ada W. Allen to raise the sum of \$700.00 for election and registration expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford E. Chickering to raise the sum of \$250.00 for town hall expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by D. Homer Cray to raise the sum of \$500.00 for forest fire expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Albert D. Berry to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the Police Department and the additional sum of \$125.00 to provide watchmen and additional protection due to the war emergency. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to raise the sum of \$720.00 for the support of the fire department. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul E. Welcome to pass over the article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Albert D. Berry to raise the sum of \$350.00 for the support of

the Board of Health and an additional sum of \$125.00 for the use of the Board of Health due to the war emergency. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George W. Goodridge to pay the men employed by the town fifty cents an hour, an increase of ten cents an hour. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn to leave it in the hands of the Selectmen to adjust the wages in town. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Albert D. Berry to raise the sum of \$750.00 for the repair and upkeep of highway equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to raise the sum of \$6,500.00 for town road maintenance, reserving \$1,000.00 of the same for calcium treatment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Floyd M. Fuller to raise the sum of \$2,200.00 for snow removal. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clarence K. Lewis to lay Article 19 on the table and take up Article 20. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clarence K. Lewis to pass over the Article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clarence K. Lewis to lay Article 19 on the table and take up Article 21. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clarence K. Lewis to pass over the Article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clarence K. Lewis to raise the sum of \$1,800.00 for street lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Albert D. Berry to raise the sum of \$100.00 for timber salvage. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by D. Homer Cray to raise the sum of \$150.00 for clearing up the brush and finishing construction on the new development at the foot of the Welcome road. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Albert D. Berry to pass over the article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford E. Chickering to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the town library system. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes B. Chickering to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the support of the town poor. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 27. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes B. Chickering to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for old age assistance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 28. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Floyd M. Fuller to raise the sum of \$10.00 for Memorial Day exercises. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 29. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Floyd M. Fuller to hold Old Home Day and raise the sum of \$100.00 in addition to the amount already in the hands of the committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 30. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Floyd M. Fuller to raise the sum of \$50.00 for parks and playgrounds. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 31. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the cemeteries. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 32. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul E. Welcome to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the town beach. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 33. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ada W. Allen to raise the sum of \$100.00 for interest on temporary loans. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 34. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ada W. Allen to raise the sum of \$200.00 for legal expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 35. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Albert D. Berry to raise the sum of \$140.00 as the town share in participating in the Monadnock Region. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 36. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to accept Town Road Aid (T. R. A.) for the ensuing year and raise the sum of \$773.51 for same. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 37. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Albert D. Berry to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to

raise the sum of \$150.00 to cover the expense of such audit. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 38. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Carroll Chickering, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Assn., for the care and maintenance of the Herman E. Chickering burial lot in said cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 39. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Chester A. Brown and Lizzie A. Barrett, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Assn., for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Chester A. Brown and Lizzie A. Barrett lot in said cemetery and to be known as the Brown, Barrett Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 40. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Elizabeth Stoddard, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Assn., for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Ashbel Stoddard lot in said cemetery and to be known as the Ashbel Stoddard trust fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 41. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to accept the sum of \$200.00 from the estate of Evalyn A. Farr the income to be used for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Evalyn A. Farr burial lot in Spofford Cemetery and to be known as the Evalyn A. Farr Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 42. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Leila Tucker, the income from same to be paid to Chesterfield West Cemetery Assn., and used for the perpetual care of her lot in said cemetery, and to be known as the Leila Tucker Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 43. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford E. Chickering to discontinue the section of the Welcome Hill Road, so called, starting at Route 9 and continuing past the residence of E. J. Winslow to the point of intersection with the new road, said new road having been built to replace the above described section of old road. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 44. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Albert D. Berry to accept the Article regarding the clause of the will of Ralph F. Mulligan when and if the money is turned over and that the Selectmen be authorized to take any action necessary in connection with it. Said clause is as follows: "Tenth. To the Springfield Safe Deposit and Trust Company the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.) to be held by it in trust and the income paid semi-annually to the officials in the town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, having charge of the public schools therein, the same to be used for general school purposes, and also for defraying the expenses of the children of Chesterfield towards obtaining a high school education elsewhere. This is to be known as the Ralph F. Mulligan School Fund. In the event that a new school building is needed at any time, then the trustee may advance such sum from the principal fund as may be reasonably necessary to provide such a building. At the end of twenty-five years the entire fund shall be turned over to the Selectmen of said Chesterfield to be used within the town of Chesterfield for such municipal purposes as the Board of Selectmen shall, from time to time determine." Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 45. Under this article, Walter J. Post, Spofford Road Agent, asked to open up and reconsider Article 17. Voted on motion made by E. J. Winslow to call for a rising vote to reconsider the article. A count of votes resulted in Yes 54, No 16. Vote declared by the Moderator as carried to reopen Article 17.

Voted by voice vote made by Walter J. Post to raise the sum of \$6,500.00 plus the ten per cent allowed by law for town road maintenance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative.

No further business appearing the Moderator declared the meeting adjourned except for Article 1 at 11.25 A. M. and that balloting would continue under Article 1 until 5.30 P. M.

At 5.30 P. M. the Moderator declared the Ballot box closed and a count of Ballots cast resulted as follows :

For Tax Collector. Harry E. Winn had 190 votes, Al Berry had 1 vote. Harry E. Winn was declared elected.

For Spofford Road Agent. Walter J. Post had 181 votes, Viola Tuttle had 1 vote, Lyle Pierce had 1 vote, George E. Joslin had 1 vote, Jessie Joslin had 1 vote, Bertha Rolf had 3 votes. Walter J. Post was declared elected.

For Center Road Agent. Frank A. Hubner had 70 votes, Roger C. Spaulding had 149 votes. Roger C. Spaulding was declared elected.

For West Chesterfield Road Agent. Newton E. Darling had 186 votes, Richard Howell had 1 vote, Lyle B. Chickering had 1 vote, C. M. Burnham had 1 vote, Shirley Bevis had 1 vote. Newton E. Darling was declared elected.

For Fireward. Shirley G. Bevis had 184 votes, Fred J. Stoddard had 2 votes, Lyle B. Chickering had 1 vote. Shirley G. Bevis was declared elected.

For Auditors. Floyd M. Fuller had 158 votes, Harold E. Randall had 170 votes, Chester Burnham had 2 votes. George Joslin had 1 vote, Shirley Bevis had 1 vote, Daniel Schlichting had 1 vote. Floyd M. Fuller and Harold E. Randall were declared elected.

For Budget Committee. Henry C. Chickering had 157 votes, Floyd M. Fuller had 146 votes, Maurice L. Amidon had 1 vote, George White had 1 vote, Paul Penning had 1 vote, Mr. Berry had 1 vote, Clifford W. Tuttle had 1 vote. Henry C. Chickering and Floyd M. Fuller were declared elected.

For Trustee of Trust Funds. William E. Nurse had 166 votes, Viola Tuttle had 1 vote, Roger Welcome had 1 vote, Paul Penning had 1 vote. William E. Nurse was declared elected.

For Sexton. Clinton A. Davis had 173 votes, Lyle B. Chickering had 1 vote, Lawrence Crowell had 1 vote. Clinton A. Davis was declared elected.

For Spofford Constable. Arvid W. Pearson had 181 votes, Mr. Henchey had 1 vote, Fred Partridge had 1 vote, William D. Pierce had 1 vote, Clara Ball had 1 vote, Nelson Ball had 1 vote, Charles Tuttle had 1 vote. Arvid W. Pearson was declared elected.

For Center Constable. Henry C. Chickering had 176 votes, Winston Cray had 1 vote, Roger Welcome had 1 vote, Roger C. Spaulding had 1 vote. Henry C. Chickering was declared elected.

For West Chesterfield Constable. Harold E. Randall had 178 votes, C. K. Lewis had 1 vote. Harold E. Randall was declared elected.

For Surveyors of Wood and Lumber. Chester M. Burnham had 166 votes, George W. Goodridge had 147 votes, John L. Castle had 4 votes, Paul Welcome had 2 votes, Paul Penning had 2 votes, Shirley G. Bevis had 2 votes, R. Chickering had 2 votes, George White had 2 votes, Henry J. LaPlante had 2 votes, and Roger Welcome, Morris Friedsam, Walter J. Post, Clifford Chickering, Fred W. Ball, Lawrence Crowell, Arthur Post, George Joslin, William Foley, Clinton Davis, Clarence Lewis, Richard Chickering, Lyle B. Chickering, H. J. Post, Olin Butler, G. O. Cobleigh, Fred Humphrey and Roger Spaulding each had one vote. Chester M. Burnham, George W. Goodridge and John L. Castle were declared elected.

For Fence Viewers. Chester M. Burnham had 11 votes, John L. Castle had 10 votes, George W. Goodridge had 8 votes, Richard G. Chickering had 7 votes, Walter J. Post had 4 votes, Carl Castle had 4 votes, Shirley G. Bevis had 3 votes, Floyd M. Fuller had 4 votes, Paul Welcome had 2 votes, Roger C. Spaulding had 2 votes, Henry C. Chickering had 2 votes, and Newton Darling, Clifford Chickering, Roger Welcome, Fritz Richter, Otto Richter, Harold Randall, Albert Thomas, John Hutchins, Robert Mitchell, Fred Ball, Clifford Tuttle, Leon Smith, D. Homer Cray, Emroy G. Carey, Paul Penning, George White,, Raymond Rowe, Henry Capen, G. O. Cobleigh, Arvid W. Pearson, Morris Friedsam, each had one vote.

The Moderator declared the meeting adjourned at 7.42 P. M.

SPECIAL MEETING, APRIL 28, 1942

Article 2. A motion made by Chester M. Burnham that it be the sense of the meeting for the Selectmen to put an article in the Warrant next spring to discontinue the Municipal Budget Committee, was not supported.

Morris Friedsam suggested that the Selectmen get a written opinion from the Town Counselor as to the legality of raising the sum of \$2,500.00 for Flood Damage when the Budget Committee had not considered and approved the amount.

The Moderator then recessed the meeting on the call of the Moderator to allow the Selectmen time to get said written opinion and to post same.

The meeting was again called to order on April 29, 1942 at 8.54 p. m. by the Moderator who stated that the Selectmen having posted said written opinion in their office and therefore requirements of the meeting having been complied with, he declared the meeting adjourned.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

January 28, 1943

To the Trustees of the Chesterfield Library :

Herewith is presented the annual report.

It is gratifying to note an increase in circulation of nearly two hundred volumes through the central library during this year of greater war activity and gasoline limitation. Many patrons take advantage of the book limit for each member of the family and consequently make fewer trips to the library. Even with these curtailments each Wednesday is busy at the library.

The total circulation for the library system was 5,365 volumes. Central library 3,199 with 1,392 adult fiction and 405 non-fiction, 1,177 juvenile fiction and 225 non-fiction. Spofford branch circulated 941 volumes with 702 adult fiction and 70 non-fiction and 169 juveniles. West Chesterfield reports 1,225 books circulated.

New books added to the library were 332 volumes. 103 of these were adult fiction, 47 non-fiction, 88 juvenile books and one reference book. There were gifts of 93 volumes and two portfolios. Adult fiction 14 and non-fiction 10. The balance are the encyclopedias and dictionaries mentioned last year and 40 bound volumes of National Geographic magazines, added to reference material in accordance with the wishes of the donor.

The American Year Book purchased by the Hamilton and Beckley trust funds was the addition to the reference department this year.

An interesting portfolio on Harlan Fiske Stone was sent to the library by Mr. Luther Ely Smith of St. Louis, Mo.

A few interesting clippings and graduation programs from the Chesterfield Academy made up the other portfolio, a gift of Miss Pauline Fiske of Brattleboro, Vt.

A large safe has been placed in the library as a gift from the Friedsam Foundation Fund.

To the patrons register 30 names were added during the year, 17 were adults and 13 juveniles. There are now 143 active borrowers at the central branch. 105 residents and 38 summer residents.

The flag display in the children's room was given by Mr. Friedsam.

There were six book exchanges with the West Chesterfield branch and eight with Spofford.

Through the central branch 29 books were contributed to the Victory Book campaign and 57 from the Spofford branch.

There were several cases of Mumps in Town the past year. Some of which could have been prevented if people having them, also those exposed would report them to the Health Officer, so he could take steps to have them isolated, and quarantined if necessary.

Section 9 Chapter 133 Public Laws of N. H., reads as follows. "Notice to Individuals. When ever any person knows or has reason to believe that any member of his family or household has any disease required to be reported he shall, if no physician, or other person required to make reports under section 7 is in attendance, immediately notify the local board of Health of the Town or City in which he resides."

Several beaches on the shore of Spofford Lake were clean and supervised by Mr. Frank Whorfe. Several samples of water were taken from wells and springs and sent to Concord to be analyzed.

Twenty Milk Licenses were issued for the sale of Milk and Cream. Eight of which were issued to buy and sell Milk and Cream at Two Dollars each as follows. Paul Penning, Henry C. Chickering, Harry Nosek, Clifford E. Tuttle, John Ball, John Redding, Byron A. Davis and William Manch.

The temporary dump is still being used, as the New Highway was not finished until late in the Summer, a new location should be approved this Summer.

Submitted herewith is the report of an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Chesterfield, which has been made by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission in accordance with the vote taken at your annual meeting in March 1942. This audit covers the

fiscal year ended January 31, 1942, and the current year from February 1 to October 26, 1942. Schedules as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds and Library Treasurer.

FINANCES

In order to present a comprehensive picture of the financial condition of the town during the last ten years and the changes which have occurred in this period, certain statements have been prepared and will be referred to in the comments which follow.

Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes: (Schedule A-1)

The Town of Chesterfield occupies an enviable position financially. This is occasioned by the fact that during the last decade there has been no bonded or any other long term indebtedness, and the town closed its last fiscal year, January 31, 1942, with a Surplus of over \$5,000, as indicated by the Balance Sheet of that date. The assessed valuation has increased during the ten year period and the average local tax rate has been consistently lower than the average state tax rate. The 1942 rates were as follows:

Average State Tax Rate,	\$3 23
Average Local Tax Rate,	\$2 63

Revenues—Appropriations and Expenditures—1941: (Schedules A-3 and A-4)

The analysis of revenues, estimated and actual, and appropriations and expenditures for 1941, presented in detail in these schedules, indicates a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$1,790.07, a net excess of actual over estimated revenues of \$204.74, with a resulting net budget surplus of \$1,994.81. It is noted that the only appropriation which was overdrawn in any considerable amount was the appropriation for "Forest Fires," over which unfortunately it is impossible to exercise much control.

ACCOUNTS OF SELECTMEN AND TREASURER

Vouchers issued by the selectmen during the fiscal year ended January 31, 1942, and the current year to October 26, 1942, were examined as were also the supporting invoices and highway agents' payrolls. The cancelled checks of the treasurer, issued upon orders of the selectmen, were compared with the vouchers and found to be in agreement therewith. The receipts of the treasurer were checked by source, insofar as it was possible to do so. Totals of receipts and expenditures were verified. The treasurer's cash book balance as of October 26, 1942, amounted to \$39,611.39. The reconciled bank balance of like date was in agreement with this amount. (Schedule B-1).

TAXES

The tax warrants of Collector Winn for the levies of 1941 and 1942, were audited and balanced as of October 26, 1942, as indicated by Schedules B-2-a and B-2-b, respectively. An examination was made of the tax sales records for the sales on account of the levies of 1939, 1940 and 1941. A summarized statement of these accounts appears in Schedule B-2-c.

TOWN CLERK

The accounts of the Town Clerk, including the issuance of motor vehicle permits and dog licenses and the receipts from filing fees, were examined for the fiscal year ended January 31, 1942, and the current year to date of audit. All funds received by the Clerk were accounted for either through remittances to the Treasurer or funds on hand at date of audit. (Schedule A-8 and B-3).

TRUST FUNDS

The saving bank books representing the invested principal of the various trust funds were examined. All funds, as indicated in the trust fund record book, were accounted for. The unexpended balance of trust fund income was also verified. (Schedules A-7-a and A-7-b).

Owing to the failure of one of the duly elected trustees of trust funds to qualify for office by furnishing a surety bond

as required by law, the board of selectmen should make an appointment for the unexpired balance of the term.

LIBRARY

The record of receipts and disbursements of the Library Treasurer was examined and cancelled checks produced which corresponded with cash book entries. The treasurer's balance on hand October 26, 1942, as indicated by the cash book, was in agreement with the reconciled bank balance. (Schedules A-9 and B-4).

TOWN OFFICERS' BONDS

The surety bonds of town officers were found to be satisfactory as to form and amount. A list of officials, required by law to furnish surety bonds, the surety companies and amounts of bonds for the current year, are included in Schedule B-5.

GENERAL COMMENTS

It is recommended that the treasurer countersign the orders issued by the selectmen and use such orders as checks in place of the present practise of issuing separate checks. This change will also necessitate a slight change in the method of handling highway payrolls. One order-check may be issued to cover the total payroll as at present. This order-check would then be deposited in a special "payroll account" at the bank and the treasurer could issue payroll checks to individual employees against this account.

The accounts and records of all the town officials were found to be in good condition and the accounting procedure in accordance with the standard system prescribed by the tax commission. The thanks of this division is extended to the town officers of Chesterfield for their assistance during the course of the audit.

Under the provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, Laws of 1939, it is required that this report or a summary of its essential features be published in the next annual report of the Town. The published section should include this letter of

transmittal in its entirety and such essential Schedules as may be deemed of sufficient importance to warrant publication.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Chesterfield:

I herein submit by tenth annual report as superintendent of schools.

From a discussion on education after the war, I wish to quote from a report made by the Conservative Party, viz. "Of all the State's activities, education is the basic activity, because it conditions the future character of the entire community." "In war time, the maintenance of these services at a level of high efficiency should have maximum priority."

To meet the ideals of above quotations, I report a few of the several objectives toward which we are aiming: (1) to maintain the purity of the English language, (2) to give greater emphasis on fundamentals, especially in mathematics, (3) to offer a total interpretation of history, geography and economics, (4) to imbue our pupils with a better understanding of the vital principles of our Constitution and the American Way of life. For the accomplishment of these goals we ask the cooperation of teachers, parents and citizens.

CALL FOR TEACHERS

Due to the call of war service, defense work and office work, many teachers have given up the teaching profession. As a result I have had to resort to commercial advertising in order to keep open some of the rural schools.

As conditions may be worse next year, I suggest that former teachers take advantage of the opportunity of attending the Summer School at Keene and thus place themselves in position to qualify with the regulations of the State Board of Education.

I believe this to be a patriotic gesture.

9. To see if the district will vote to raise the sum of \$2,160.00 to pay the transportation of every student residing in the township of Chesterfield who is qualified and desires to attend high school. It is understood that the money (\$1.50

a week) for each student will be paid only to those who are approved by the local School Board.

10. To see if the district will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Municipal Accounting Division, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

**SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING OF THE TOWN OF
CHESTERFIELD, N. H.**

Town Hall, March 10, 1942

The meeting was called to order at 2.00 p. m., by the Moderator, Daniel P. Schlichting and the warrant was read by the Clerk.

The Articles of the Warrant were disposed of in the following manner:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year. Daniel P. Schlichting was nominated and there being no other nominations, it was moved and carried that the Clerk cast one ballot for Daniel P. Schlichting for Moderator. This was done, he was declared elected and took the oath of Office administered by the Clerk.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year. Norman J. Langmaid was nominated, and there being no other nominations, the Moderator was instructed to cast one ballot for him for Clerk. This was done, Norman J. Langmaid was declared elected, and received the oath of office from the Moderator.

Article 3. To Choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years. The motion was made and carried that paper ballots be cast for this election. This was done and preparations were made for such voting, which resulted as follows:

Necessary for choice,	46
Alice L. Spaulding received,	72
Ardelle Haskill received,	19

Alice L. Spaulding was declared elected as a member of the School Board for three years and received the oath of office administered by the Moderator.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year. Evelyn L. Winn was nominated and there being no other nominations, the Clerk was instructed to cast one ballot for her for Treasurer. This was done, Evelyn L. Winn was declared elected and the oath of office was administered by the Moderator.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officer or agents of the District. It was moved and supported that this article be passed over. This was done.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto. Moved and carried that we pass over this article.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. It was moved and carried that the Town Auditors also serve as the Auditors of the School District as in other years.

Article 8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of Public Schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its Annual Report. The motion was made and carried that the sum of \$14,179.97 (Town Report, page 127) be assessed to be raised to meet the requirements of the School District.

Article 9. To see if the District will vote to raise the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to help pay the transportation of children going to High School. It was moved and carried that we ask Mr. Bank, a representative of Peoples' Bus Line of Brattleboro, Vt., to explain what they would do in regard to Bus transportation and what the approximate cost would be. This was done and an enlightening question and answer period followed. The one thousand dollars being insufficient to pay probable transportation cost, even counting possible reduced rates for a Student Contract for a year; it was moved and supported that we raise \$2,500.00 to pay

the cost of such transportation in full. The motion was defeated by voice vote.

Article 10. To see if the District will vote to appoint a committee to investigate the advisability of school consolidation for Chesterfield; said committee to report at the next District meeting. Moved and carried that this article be passed over.

Article 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting. It was moved and supported that Article 9 be reopened; but the motion was lost by voice vote. Attention was called to the fact that the original article had not been acted upon, and that under this said article we had only voted down another motion. Article 9 was then re-read by the Clerk. The motion then made and carried affirmatively that this article be passed over. There being no other business to transact, it was moved and supported that we adjourn. The motion was carried and the meeting was adjourned at 3.20 p. m.
