

HARRY SILVER

The son of Andrew J. and Juliett E. (James) Silver, was born in Epsom, September 2, 1882. On December 25, 1906, he was united in marriage with Alice B. Yeaton, daughter of Daniel and Annie B. (Rowell) Yeaton.

Mr. Silver was a life long resident of Epsom and for forty-six years operated the general store at Gossville, previously owned by his father. Since 1919, he was an Insurance Agent.

Mr. Silver served the town of Epsom as Treasurer for a number of years, was a member of the budget committee, and Supervisor of the Checklist. He was an outstanding penman and had written the names of the Epsom Grammar School graduates on their diplomas for the past forty-five years.

Mr. Silver died June 11, 1966, after a short illness.

# The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Epsom in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Epsom on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see what action the Town will take upon the budget submitted by the Budget Committee.
- 3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$812.23 for the maintenance, construction or reconstruction of Class V Highways, the State to contribute \$5,414.89 as provided in Chapter 83 Laws of 1953.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. Pursuant to the Provisions of the Laws as revised, Chapter 292, Section 7, 1949. The following Article is submitted: Shall the Provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this town?
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$794.00 for the Concord Hospital to

help offset the estimated operating deficit for the year 1966.

7. "Shall the zoning ordinance as proposed by the planning board be adopted for this town?"

(By Petition)

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 to be used in the White Pine Blister Rust Control Program.

(Recommended in the Budget)

9. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this meeting.

#### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

The library completed their lighting project this year and had the roof newly shingled. Temporary arrangements have been made by placing a metal book box on the front porch to receive all oversize books too large to put through the regular book slot. This has proven a worthwhile improvement and is being used to advantage at the present time. A screen door has been put on the back door so as to enable better circulation of air during the warm months. Coming events have been listed on the bulletin board and any newspaper clippings of interest to the public.

Throughout the year there has been exhibits or displays of groups, organizations, school classes or individuals at the library. Many hours have been spent, with the and of a state consultant, throughout the year to weed and reorganize the books so they are better available to the public.

The histories of towns and genealogies have been placed together in the reference room. State officials and users of the books have commented very favorably to the large number we have in our collection as compared to other small libraries. We feel very fortunate to have such a collection available for public use.

Story hours have been held on the average of one a month with ten to thirty in attendance. These were done with the cooperation of Mrs. Rosemarie Borden, Mrs. Elise Fife, Mrs. Jane Waite and Mrs. Spencer Crosbie.

Film programs were held during the winter months at the Epsom Central School with Mr. Norman Fortier running the projector, Mrs. Rosemarie Borden selecting the films. Average attendance was 75.

A reading contest was held during the summer months with eleven completing the requirements qualifying them to attend a party and receiving prizes.

School classes and organization groups visited the library during the year and became more acquainted with library policies and how to use the library.

This year was the first year for our library to use a library card. This has worked very well and children have become aware of using the library properly, we feel.

The Flying Squirrels 4-H Club planted flowers on either side of the front steps and in front of the Honor Roll, which added much to the attractiveness of our library.

The librarian and library trustees would like to thank the volunteers for the fine service they have given which enabled us to keep the library open more hours for use by the school children and general public.

Many items have been donated by interested persons, such as use of fans, grass clippers, rugs, etal. Also wish to thank Jack French for his donation of a vacuum cleaner and two double card files.

Library week was observed by having library open daily throughout the week with many interesting crafts on exhibit. A story hour and film program was also held during the week.

The back storeroom has been cleaned out and tentative plans are made to use as additional space for old books desired to be kept but not in regular collection.

This year we have set up a paperback collection of regular paperbacks, which go out on the basis of "Take one and bring one."

A record player has been loaned for use at the library in assisting in the cataloguing of the record collection which is now being worked on.

During the year the librarian was asked to speak on public relations at one of the workshops held in Laconia; attended a three months extension course in cataloguing and classification held in Laconia and recently was invited to attend preview of films in view of purchasing by the North County Libraries Film Cooperative held at Laconia.

An active Friends group has been organized with much activity in book sales, food sales and selling boxed soap. Mrs. Gertrude Stevens, Mrs. Alma Johnson, Mrs. Frances McLeary, Mrs. Ruth Heath and Mrs. Phylis M. LaClair attended the annual meeting of the N. H. Friends at the Wayfarer in Bedford in September. The Friends have purchased six Samson folding chairs for use at the library. A shut-in service, through Friends of the Library, has been well used by shut-ins of the town.

Throughout the year members of the book committee and librarian have attended the book selection meetings in Concord N. H. Trustees and Librarian have attended various workshops.

Many more projects need to be completed before meeting the recommended state requirements for small libraries, but many accomplishments have been made this year.

#### REPORT OF EPSOM POLICE DEPARTMENT

March 15, 1966 thru December 31, 1966

The reorganization of the Epsom Police Department was completed soon after the March Town Meeting.

Sgt. Robert Demers and myself were fortunate in being able to attend a 16 week course in police training at Belmont, N. H. from which we graduated in April of 1966. At present time Patrolman Gerard Levassuer is attending Police Training School which is being held at Pembroke, N. H.

The department has provided 24 hour telephone service and prompt dispatch of officers on complaints and accidents. There is a great need of a local radio communication system which could be used together with the State Police radio network to provide instant contact between telephone dispatch stations and the officers cruisers and other emergency vehicles in town.

The officers have provided themselves with uniforms and necessary police equipment at their own personal expense, which averages about \$200.00 per man.

Relationships with neighboring police departments have been strengthened and improved to provide a better flow of information and better coordination of investigation of crimes in the Epsom area.

During the coming year I have recommended an increase of town patrol for the summer months for nights and weekends when traffic and outdoor activities are at their height.

Preventive law enforcement is the key to a peaceful town.

The department will work toward greater efficiency and speed of response so that any resident requiring police service will obtain it quickly. We will continue with and increase preventive activities so necessary for a safe and peaceful town.

Activities have grown in Epsom in recent years demanding a great deal more time and travel by the department as the following page of analysis of complaints will show.

Residents of Epsom are urged to call Chief Ronald A. Briggs, Sgt. Robert F. Demers, or Patrolman Gerard Levasseur when service is needed or to report curious or suspicious happenings that may be observed. Below are the numbers to call for police service.

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

#### Fire Record

Fire records are made by people, those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966.)

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

- 1. A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.
- 2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres, a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is

covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.

- 2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.
- 3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.
- 4. Most important, Instruct your children that matches are not play things.

- 3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 4. To elect a Commissioner for a term of three years.
- 5. To elect a Commissioner to serve a term of one year.
- 6. To see if the District will authorize the Commissioners to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- 7. To see what action the District will take upon the budget submitted by the Budget Committee.
- 8. To see if the District will raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 dollars to be placed in Capital Reserve Fund for emergency use in the maintenance of the existing system. This sum to be turned over to the Commissioners at such time as they deem its use necessary.

- 9. To see if the District will authorize the same salaries for the District Officers as last year.
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Epsom Central School in said district on the 11th day of March, 1967 at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and

- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,435.91 for a Contingency Fund, as provided by the New Hampshire Revised Statutes, 198: 4-b.

Two new teachers joined the staff of the Central School this year. Mrs. Louise Parker replaced Miss Scamman and is teaching one division of Grade One. Miss Diane McVittie is teaching the third grade.

Much time has been given this year to the study of a possible Cooperative School District by a committee which was appointed at the last School District Meeting. A report has been made, and voting by the School District members will take place in the near future. We are in a period of change encouraged to a great extent by the pronouncements of the State Board of Education relative to the small high schools. However, our own interest in the future educational opportunities for our students should create an impetus from within, which will direct our energies to study the factual information available and be guided wisely.

An innovation in programing was instituted at the upper level within the school at the beginning of the school year. In a semi-departmentalized program at grades 5 and 6 and also grades 7 and 8, the strong teaching areas of individual teachers are used in two grades instead of one as has been the practice. Both students and teachers have been enthusiastic about the accomplishments that have come as a result.

Through the provisions of Title I, monies of P. L. 89-10, a remedial reading program has begun at all grade levels. This program is designed to help boys and girls improve those reading skills which are weak and develop a desire to read because they will find that they can read!

We are appreciative of the fine educational climate which exists within the Community, Staff, School Committee, and Administration.

#### SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

#### **EPSOM**

To the Superintendent of Schools:

It gives me much pleasure to present this report of the health program as carried out in the towns of Barrington, Epsom, Northwood, Nottingham and Strafford during the school year of 1965-66. I feel this has been a very successful year with complete dental health programs being carried on in the towns of Epsom and Northwood, plans being made by Barrington for such a program in the coming year, and a full-scale tuberculin testing program with follow up x-rays having been completed in all of the schools except Epsom. Here again, arrangements have been made for Epsom to participate in 1966-67.

Each school has had its share of the various contagious diseases and skin eruptions, but these were well controlled and presented no major problem. The parents were most cooperative in this matter, as well as in obtaining professional care and treatment for any reported physical defects. Such cooperation is a necessity in carrying out an effective school health program, and I wish to express my sincere approciation for it.

The following is a brief summary of the health services provided in each school during this past year:

During this school year, glasses were provided for one child by the Concord Lions' Club, and the New Hampshire Sight Conservation Program provided eye examinations and glasses for four more children.

Preschool clinics for registering children for grade I were held during the spring of 1966, and were attended by 24 children at Barrington, 30 at Epsom, 24 at Northwood, 12 at Nottingham and 12 at Strafford. These clinics were conducted as in previous years except in Strafford. There, the children were accompanied to school by one or both parents. Registration was done by the principal and the nurse checked vaccinations and discussed with the parents any health problems which

the child might have. Each child and parent was given an opportunity to visit in the first grade classroom.

The Heaf Tuberculin Test was administered in four of the schools with 255 students and faculty members taking advantage of this service in Barrington, 194 in Northwood, 122 in Nottingham and 137 in Strafford. Later an x-ray clinic was held at the Northwood Elementary School. The necessary equipment and technicians to run it were provided by the N. H. Tuberculosis and Health Association. Chest x-rays were taken of 48 people at this clinic.

Dental programs for cleaning teeth and receiving applications of topical fluoride (this solution is known to reduce decay in the teeth) as well as programs to provide fillings and/or extractions were organized in both Epsom and Northwood.

The Epsom programs were jointly sponsored by the New Hampshire Bureau of Dental Health and the Epsom Parent-Teachers Organization, while those in Northwood were sponsored by the New Hampshire Bureau of Dental Health, the Harvey Lake Women's Club and the Northwood Parent-Teachers Association. Contributions were also received from numerous organizations and businesses in Northwood. The dental health committee members in both towns should be commended for the services they performed in setting up these clinics, keeping records, and in providing transportation when needed.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank Mr. Martineau, Mr. Houghton, members of the School Boards, the teachers, the parents and the children for their consistent helpfulness.
