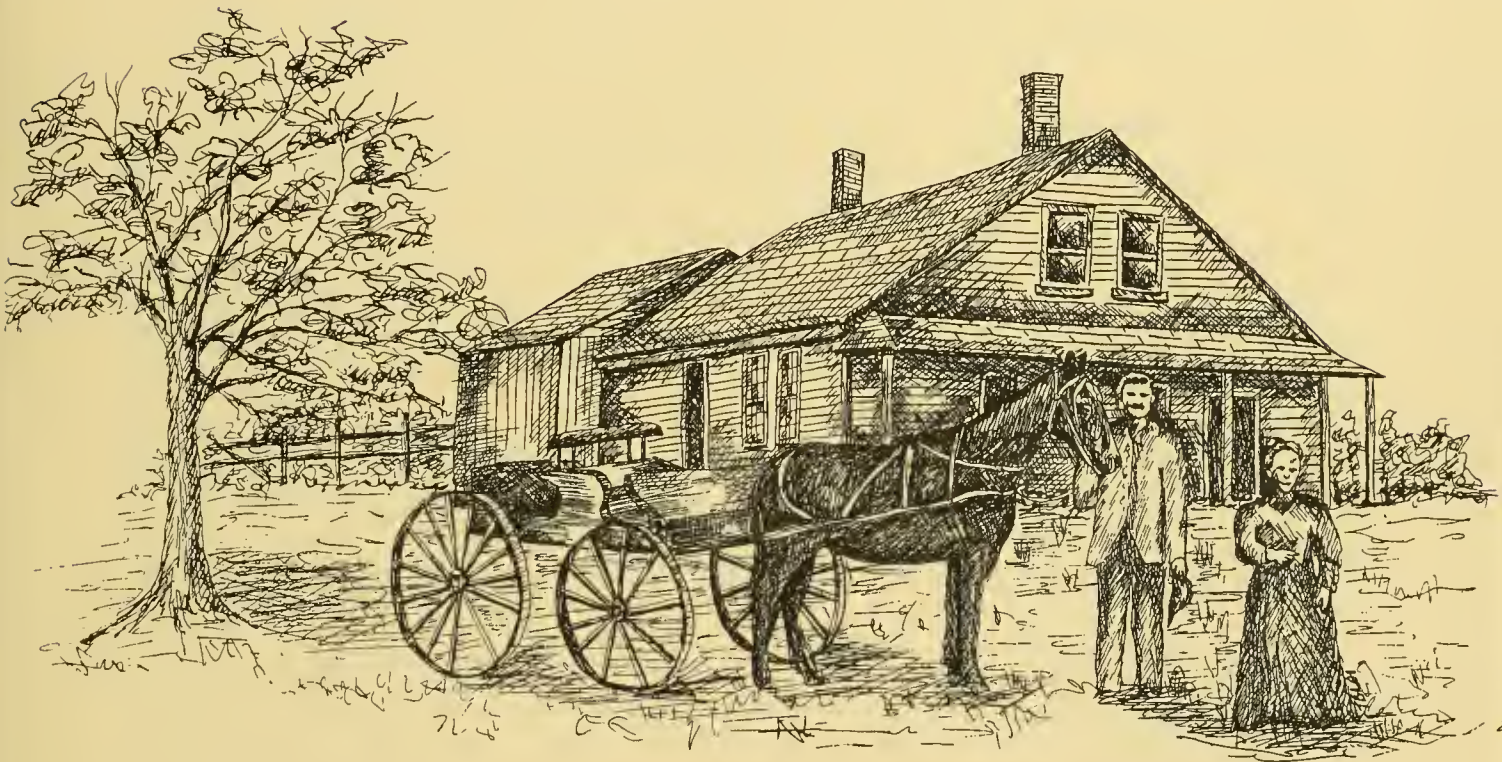

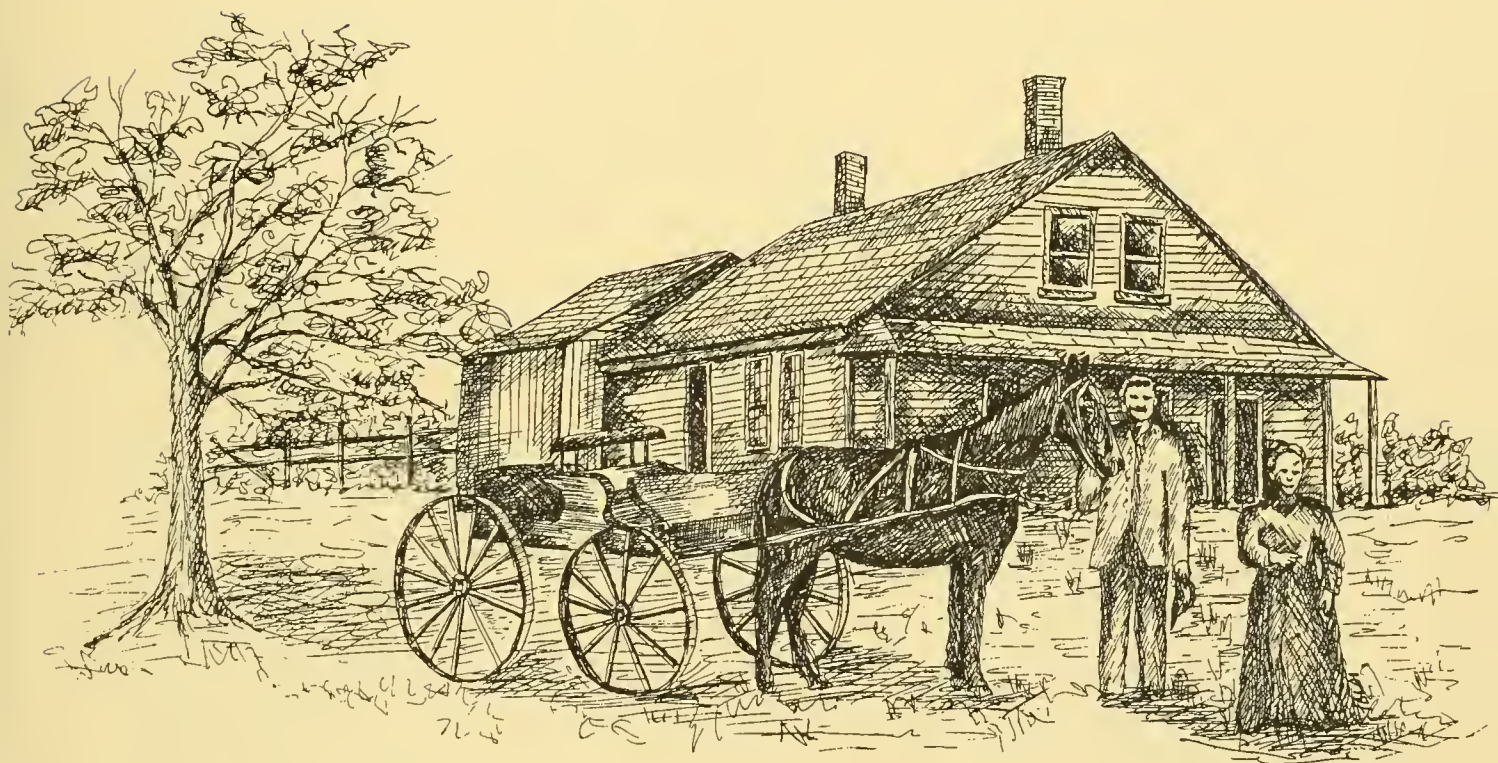

JONES FARM HISTORY

In 1889 at the age of twenty-four, Allie C. Jones purchased the major portion of the property on Loon Pond, now known as the Jones Farm, from Harvey M. Connor. Subsequently in 1900 and 1903, he purchased two additional parcels which now make up the entire Jones Farm.

He lived on the property until his death. He made a living as a farmer, and he and his wife, Lillian, raised four children. During Mr. Jones' lifetime, he added another section of the barn making it twice the size as is shown in the photograph, raised the roof of the house to make it two story, added a shed connecting the house and barn along with other outbuildings. In the early 1900s, the forested portion of the property was mostly cleared and was used for pasture as is evidenced by traces of the old barbed wire fence.

The meadows on both sides of the road used to be mowed for hay. Beavers moved in and built dams in the 1950s, the meadows flooded and haying was no longer an option.

The property passed to Allie's son, Ralph, in 1951. Selective timber was cut in the early 1950s. From that time until 1985, the only cutting was that of firewood for Mr. Jones' personal use.

Ralph Jones was born on the farm and also lived there until his death in 1985. Farming operations continued until Ralph's retirement in the mid 1970s. Even after his retirement, farming activities were still carried on. Cattle and sheep grazed in the pasture until 1989 or 1990 and the hayfield out front has been kept in production to this day.

Mr. Jones prided himself in keeping his fields looking nice, the brushes were kept at bay by cutting back to the stonewalls every year and the shoreline was kept cleared until he was no longer able to do the work. Much of it was done every year with a scythe. Twenty years of growth has resulted in nearly obscuring the view of the water.

Historically speaking, for those who remember Ray Paquette's store which was directly across from Laconia High School (presently it is an office building and was recently home of the Laconia Animal Hospital), for many years Ralph sold butter, eggs and potatoes to Mr. Paquette for resale. During those times, he also provided many of the summer residents of Loon Pond with milk and butter. Those who summered here would come to the farm for bottles of milk, cream and butter. Those were the days when milk was still in glass milk bottles and before homogenization. Some time during 1956, Mr. Jones started selling milk to a commercial dairy and was no longer in a position to sell his milk to the local patrons.

The Jones family owned this farm for 111 years. Due to the generosity of Gerry Prusko and of the many people in the Town of Gilmanston who have an interest in conservation of special places this land will remain undeveloped and a legacy has been created by naming the conservation easement after the Jones family. 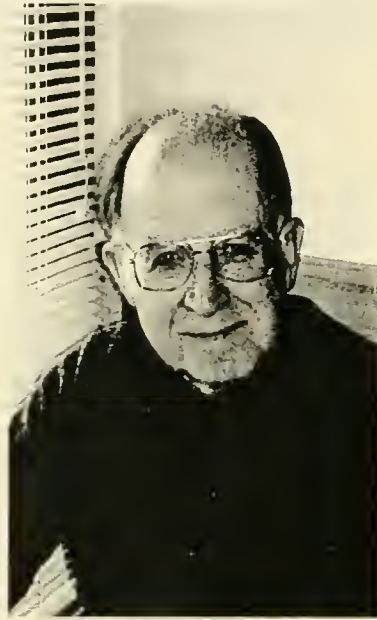

Independent Auditor's Report on Financial Presentation

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen
Town of Gilmanton, New Hampshire
Gilmanton, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general-purpose financial statements of the Town of Gilmanton, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1999. These general-purpose financial statements are the responsibility of management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general-purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general-purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general-purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall general-purpose financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general-purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Gilmanton, New Hampshire has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omissions described in the preceding paragraph, the general-purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Gilmanton, New Hampshire, as of December 31, 1999, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general-purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements and schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not required part of the general-purpose financial statements of the Town of Gilmanton, New Hampshire. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general-purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general-purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

Independent Auditor's Communication of
Reportable Conditions and Other Matters

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen
Town of Gilmanton, New Hampshire

In planning and performing our audit of the Town of Gilmanton, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1999, we considered the Town's internal control structure in order to determine the scope of our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements. Our review of these systems was not intended to provide assurance on the internal control structure and should not be relied on for that purpose.

Under the standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention relating to significant deficiencies in the design or operation of the internal control structure that, in our judgement, could adversely affect the Town's ability to record, process, summarize, and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the financial statements. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities, amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited, may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might constitute reportable conditions and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses as defined above.

We are pleased to report that, during the course of our review of internal controls, no material weaknesses in the Town's accounting systems and records were identified. Minor weaknesses or other considerations coming to our attention were generally procedural in nature and dealt with administrative or record keeping practices. In these instances, we made specific recommendations or provided instruction to those individuals involved during the course of our audit fieldwork. Areas of opportunity for further consideration include:

- ◆ Reconciliation of general ledge accounts and general accounting matters – Staff training for less reliance on external accounting expertise
- ◆ Annual report of the Town Treasurer
- ◆ Trust Funds – Resolution of GASB 31 issues

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management and others within the administration. This restriction is not intended to limit distribution of this report, which is a matter of public record.

**MINUTES OF THE TOWN MEETING
TOWN OF GILMANTON
MARCH 14, 2000 – MARCH 18, 2000**

The meeting was called to order by Moderator, George Roberts Jr., at 7:00 AM on March 14, 2000. It was voted to hold the adjourned meeting of Articles six (6) through twenty-six (26) on March 18, 2000 at The Gilmanton School. Ballots were unsealed by the Town Clerk and given to the Ballot Inspectors for counting. The Ballot Box was shown to the voters present as being empty. A special election for the State position of Representative was also held by separate ballot at this time and in accordance with all rules of order. The Moderator announced that absentee ballots would be opened and counted immediately following the close of the polls at 7:00 p.m.

ARTICLE #1: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. (See Results of Balloting)

ARTICLE #2: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1, *Change the Boundary of the Gilmanton Corner Historic District?* (By Petition) (The Planning Board DOES NOT support this amendment):

According to a meeting in March 1978, there is an imaginary line that goes through the property located on Route 107, directly across from the Dickey property line, putting the house and the garage in the Historic District and leaving the remainder of the property out of the District. The property consists of 4.25 acres. This proposal by petition would remove the entire lot from the Historic District.

ARTICLE #2 ADOPTED BY BALLOT IN THE AFFIRMATIVE

YES: 382* NO: 273

ARTICLE #3: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 to Zoning Ordinance Article VI – Mobile Home/Manufactured Housing, and Article XVI – Definitions, as proposed by the Planning Board? *The Planning Board DOES support this amendment)*

To update the article to be consistent with the current RSA definitions, require that replacement trailer coaches and manufactured housing meet applicable codes, and to require that replacement of these units with units of a different footprint obtain a Special Exception. Manufactured housing units have become relatively permanent structures and without some building code controls, could represent an ongoing danger not only to the original owners but to future purchasers and renters. Also, as manufactured housing units become larger, it is important to regulate their installation on undersize lots.

ARTICLE #3 ADOPTED BY BALLOT IN THE AFFIRMATIVE

YES: 539* NO: 153

ARTICLE #4: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #3 to Zoning Ordinance Article IV – Zoning District Regulations, and Article VII – Non conforming Uses, Lots and Structures, as proposed by the Planning Board? (The Planning Board DOES support this amendment)

To increase the minimum conventional road frontage from 150' to 200' in the Rural District to reduce the number of curb cuts thereby increasing traffic safety on Town and State Roads, to better accommodate well and septic requirements, and to be more in character with the rural nature of the Town. Lots currently conforming to the 150' frontage requirement in the Rural District will be grandfathered.

ARTICLE #4 ADOPTED BY BALLOT IN THE AFFIRMATIVE

YES: 465* NO: 231

ARTICLE #5: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:35, IV for an optional tax credit on the taxes due on residential property for service-connected total disability? The optional disability tax credit is \$1,400, rather than \$700.

Any permanently and totally disabled Veteran is entitled to a tax credit of \$1400 once this article has been adopted. Currently this tax credit is only \$700. This tax credit must be applied for before March 31st to be eligible for the previous year's taxes.

ARTICLE #5 ADOPTED BY BALLOT IN THE AFFIRMATIVE

YES: 568* NO: 121

The following articles were acted upon at the Gilmanton School on Saturday, March 18, 2000 at 10:00 AM.

The meeting was called to order at 10:10 a.m. The Moderator announced congratulations to Joshua Hughes for achieving Eagle Scout and asked Joshua to lead The Pledge of Allegiance.

The Moderator asked for a moment of silence in memory of Town Clerk/Tax Collector, Betty Smithers.

The Moderator read the results of balloting from the Special Election for Representative and congratulations went to David Russell, our new Representative for District 5. Results of Town balloting were then read and the Moderator announced that a request for a recount of the Selectman's position had been received and would take place on Friday, March 24, 2000 at 10:00 a.m. Newly elected officials present, with the exception of Selectman, were asked to step forward to take the Oath of Office by Moderator, George Roberts, Jr.

Stan Bean recognized Robert Potter Sr. for his exceptional 40 years of service on the Budget Committee. Mr. Potter received a standing ovation.

ARTICLE #6: It was moved by David Russell; seconded by Phylis Buchanan, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of not more than Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$800,000 gross budget) for the closing of the landfill and construction and equipping of a new transfer facility and to authorize the issuance of not more than Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$800,000) of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the municipal officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes

and to determine the rate of interest thereon. (Recommended by Selectmen \$800,000; Recommended by Budget Committee \$725,000) (2/3 ballot vote required)

The Moderator recognized Gregg Ward from Nelson, Ward & Associates, Inc.; Environmental and Civil Engineering to give a presentation on the proposal of the new transfer station and recycling center facilities.

Moderator, George B. Roberts, Jr., stated that this article being a bond issue of over \$100,000 would require a secret ballot vote which would need a 2/3 majority to pass. The polls will have to be open one hour per amendment being voted on. If the amendment passes with the 2/3 majority, Article 6 would be adopted as amended.

Amendment A: David Russell made a motion to amend Article 6 to appropriate \$800,000; the amount recommended by the Selectmen. Seconded by Eric Muzzey.

AMENDMENT (A) DEFEATED BY BALLOT.

YES: 84 NO: 56 *

Amendment B: Stan Bean made a motion to amend Article 6 to appropriate \$725,000; the amount recommended by the Budget Committee. Seconded by Judith Price.

Amendment to Amendment B: Eric Muzzey made a motion to amend Mr. Bean's amendment to increase the appropriation to \$750,000. Seconded by David Russell.

**AMENDMENT TO AMENDMENT (B) PASSED BY 2/3 MAJORITY,
ARTICLE ADOPTED AS AMENDED BY BALLOT.**

YES: 92 * NO: 41

ARTICLE #7: It was moved by Phylis Buchanan; seconded by Eric Muzzey, to see if the Town will vote to appropriate Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) to be deposited in the Landfill Closure Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose, with \$250,000 coming from the undesignated fund balance and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) from taxation. And furthermore, to name the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend those funds. (Recommended by Selectmen \$300,000; Recommended by Budget Committee \$300,000)

ARTICLE #7 ADOPTED AS READ BY VOICE VOTE IN THE AFFIRMATIVE

ARTICLE #8: It was moved by David Russell; seconded by Eric Muzzey, to authorize the Selectmen as agents for the Town to apply for grant monies to be applied to the Landfill Closure project.

ARTICLE #8 ADOPTED AS READ BY VOICE VOTE IN THE AFFIRMATIVE

ARTICLE #9: It was moved by Stan Bean; seconded by Eric Muzzey, to see what sum of money the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Town Government and for payment of the statutory obligations of the Town for the 2000 fiscal year; this article

includes Warrant Articles 6 & 14. (Recommended by Selectmen \$2,490,824; Recommended by Budget Committee \$2,344,847)

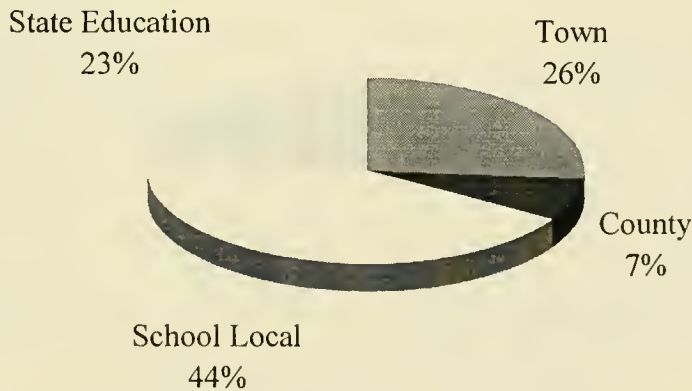

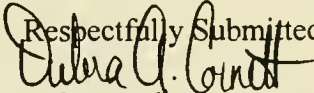
REPORT OF THE TOWN CLERK

The Town Clerk's job function includes a vast number of responsibilities. Our busiest function is that of registering, titling and renewing motor vehicles. In addition we are responsible for the recording and preparation of data and documentation for marriage licenses; vital statistics; dog licenses; town records; voter registration applications and information; elections; pole permits; Articles of Agreement (filings for non-profit); oaths of office; Sheriff's writs; UCC's; IRS and other lien attachments; and dredge and fill applications. This office also offers the services of a Notary Public and Justice of the Peace.

It is my pleasure and my Deputy, Betty Ann's, to serve the people of Gilmanton. We have had a very busy and productive year. Our overall revenues for Town Clerk functions have increased by over \$45,000 from last year, mostly due to an increase in automobile registrations (approximately 5,635 in 2000 compared to approximately 4,606 in 1999). In 2000 there was a new change in the classification of construction equipment for backhoes, loaders, excavators, graders, dozers, etc. to the new construction equipment (CONEQ) plate.

Both Betty Ann and I have attended workshops and the NHTCA annual conference to keep our certifications current and to obtain current information on any changes in the laws so that we can serve the public to the very best of our abilities. We thank you for your support and kindness in the transition period of the new staff in your office and look forward to serving you in 2001.

REPORT OF THE TAX COLLECTOR

In addition to serving the Town of Gilmanton as Town Clerk and Deputy Town Clerk, it is also my pleasure, and Betty Ann's, to serve as Tax Collector and Deputy respectively. The office of the Tax Collector has a complex and detailed job. Knowledge of accounting and various relevant State laws are important in running this office efficiently.

The office of the Tax Collector is responsible for collecting revenue for property, yield tax (timber), excavation activity and gravel taxes, and current use penalties. Record keeping for the collection of taxes are kept in format set by the Department of Revenue and remitted to the Town Treasurer on a weekly basis for all taxes due and all revenues collected, abated, refunded. We also report uncollected taxes, and manage the process of liening and deeding properties to the Town. Other duties include responding to inquiries from banks, mortgage companies, attorney's offices and the general public. We strive to provide all these services in an efficient, courteous manner.

Workshops and annual conferences, sponsored by NHTCA (New Hampshire Tax Collectors Association) and DRA (Department of Revenue), allow the Tax Collector to learn the tax collecting process and to stay current on any changes in procedures and law.

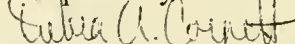
In July, I started my first year of Certification classes, which are a week long, with eight-hour days (and a commitment of five years). I found the Certification classes to be invaluable. Classes that I attended involved public relations; current tax laws, procedures and changes; group participation researching different tax laws using case scenarios to practice utilizing various RSAs (Revised Statutes Annotated) in the Tax Collectors lawbook. I look forward to next year's session.

This year I applied for a scholarship to attend the annual New Hampshire Tax Collectors Association meeting at the Balsams and was happy to learn I was the recipient. The Town of Gilmanton was reimbursed the full amount of the \$480.00 in fees. Software companies and other vendors (billing suppliers) were present so that we could see and speak with the people who support us via phone and Internet regarding any questions and/or problems we might be having. We are also able to compare current software with other computer programs that are on the market.

Attending such conferences, classes and workshops is important, not only for learning about changes in laws and procedures, but also for networking with collectors from other towns, who then becomes part of our "support system".

We look forward to continuing to work for and serve the people of Gilmanton. Thank you for your kindness and support!

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Another year has passed and it has been a very busy one for the Town of Gilmanton.

The March Election brought to us our newest member of the Board, Nathaniel T. Abbott. Nate brings many years of corporate experience, as well as his invaluable computer technology skills and willingness to assist the Town in any way possible.

The year 2000 brought many personnel changes. In May, the Board hired a new Police Chief, William Robarge. A new patrolman, Russell Boynton, was hired after the resignation of Officer James Quealey. There were also changes in the Fire Department. Andrew Davis and Michael DuVarney were hired as Firefighter/EMT's in May. Then in October, Glenn Davis, the new Fire Chief joined the Fire Department. Last year we also replaced the Landfill Manager by hiring Douglas Kapplain as the Transfer Facility Manager. In July, the Planning Administrator, Richard Mosher, retired and was replaced by Lynne Brunelle.

One of the year's major projects was the capping of the Landfill. This project was put out to bid in October and was awarded to the lowest bidder, James Piscopo, Inc., for \$464,920. We were able to complete much of the project before the end of the year with the remainder to be completed in the spring of 2001. The bidding for building the new transfer facility has not taken place and will be done as soon as possible. Recyclables are now being separated, which is generating more income for the Town.

Another major project was instituting the new E-911 street addressing system in Town, which has been in process for several years. In conjunction with the E-911 project, the Town now utilizes two zip codes rather than five. After many meetings and countless hours, E-911 was finally implemented in November. E-911 Liaison Cindy Bedford is still working with the State to complete the process and any updating that may be required.

A Budget Committee sub-committee for employee compensation presented the Board with a survey that helped us evaluate individual positions and compensation.

The Board of Selectmen wishes to thank all of the many committees and individuals who volunteer their time to the Town of Gilmanton. There are so many ways to contribute, including time, money, advice, labor, equipment and other resources. We are grateful to you all!

Finally, the Junior Board members would like to especially thank Phylis Buchanan for the many hours that she has given to various Town Boards and Committees. Her dedication to the position of Selectman is above and beyond the call of duty.

GILMANTON FIRE DEPARTMENT

The year 2000 brought many changes to the re-structuring of the Gilmananton Fire Department. In May of this year, Andrew Davis and Michael DuVarney were hired as full-time firefighters. The final hiring phase saw the Fire Chief position filled. Glenn Davis brings with him 17 years of experience from the Charlotte, North Carolina Fire Department, as well as 22 years of Air Force training. During 17 of those 22 years with the Air Force, Chief Davis served as a crash rescue supervisor.

All of our members strive to fulfill the mission statement of the Gilmananton Fire Department by providing residents with quality fire protection, life safety and Emergency Medical Services. We provide these services in the most efficient, effective manner possible while maintaining a high level of professionalism. In addition, all department personnel are provided specialized training to ensure their safety in the delivery of these services; which are oftentimes performed under adverse and life threatening conditions.

Gilmananton Fire Department responded to 313 calls during the year. These calls consisted of:

120 fire related emergencies
42 motor vehicle incidents

125 medical emergencies
26 other service related incidents

One area that newer residents of our community may be unaware of is the department's participation in the education and training of students enrolled in the Fire Science program at New Hampshire Community Technical College. This program is conducted in conjunction with the Gilmananton Firemen's Association. While earning an Associate in Fire Science, each student provides an additional 20 hours of manpower to the town each week. They have the same responsibilities as full time and call firefighters and respond with the crews to all emergency calls when not attending class. During the year 2000, we had five students enrolled in the program. Two students will be graduating in June 2001.

If anyone would be interested in how to become a member of the Department, call or stop by the Iron Works Station. In exchange for your willingness to become an active member of the Gilmananton Fire Department, we will provide the necessary training for you to become a Firefighter I or a Nationally Registered EMT-B.

The State of New Hampshire has adopted "Enhanced 911". This emergency notification system requires property owners to post their house / business number in a conspicuous spot clearly visible from the street. Please ensure that we can see your number from all avenues of travel. This will assist emergency response personnel to locate your address in a timely manner. In addition, property owners who live on private streets should post their street names at the entrances.

In conclusion, remember when changing your clock; change the battery in your smoke detector. It is the best insurance around.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

There are 2,200 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. The number of fires reported during the 2000 fire season was below average as referenced in the statistics below. Despite this, our network of fire towers and detection patrols were still quite busy with the fire towers being first to report over 135 fires. These fires were quickly and accurately reported to the local fire department for their prompt and effective suppression efforts. Wildland fires occurring in areas where homes are situated in the woodlands are a serious concern for both landowners and firefighters. Homeowners can help protect their homes by maintaining adequate green space around them and making sure that houses are properly identified with street numbers. Please contact the Forest Protection Bureau to request a brochure to assist you in assessing fire safety around your home and woodlands.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing **ALL** outside burning. Fire permits are required for any open burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow where the burning will be done. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are 11 Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. Forest Rangers have investigated numerous complaints regarding violations of the timber harvest and forest fire laws, and taken enforcement action to ensure compliance. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217, or for general information visit our website at www.dred.state.nh.us.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, two mobile patrols and three contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. These factors are critical in controlling the size of wildland fires, keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible. Due to permitting and fire safety concerns, please contact your local fire department **BEFORE** using portable outdoor fire places and vessels, including those constructed of clay, concrete or wire mesh.

Please contact your local fire department before doing **ANY** outside burning.

REMEMBER ONLY YOU CAN PREVENT FOREST FIRES!!

We are happy to report to all member communities that 2000 marked the eleventh complete year of successful operations. Some items which may be of interest follow:

The 2001 budget reflects a tipping fee of \$37.00 per ton, an increase of \$.50 per ton. This is the first time in seven years that the Cooperative has found it necessary to raise the tipping fee. This year also marks the first time that the Co-op will charge a higher tipping fee for tons delivered over the Fee Formula Tonnage (FFT, 133,600 tons). The fee will be \$67.50 per ton.

Co-op waste delivered to the Wheelabrator facility this year was 138,920 tons. That represents an increase of 6,070 tons over 1999, or a 4.57% increase. The amount of trash delivered continues to rise as predicted.

**CONCORD REGIONAL SOLID WASTE/
RESOURCE RECOVERY COOPERATIVE (cont.)**

A total of 67,021 tons of ash were delivered to the Franklin ash monofill for disposal. The Ashfill continues to operate very well. Phase III Stage III is being filled at this time. A standby generator was installed this past year to provide electricity during outages. The most recent expansion (1996) will provide disposal capacity for the next five years.

The air retrofit project at the plant has been completed. The project was completed on schedule and close to budget. The retrofit will enable the plant to meet the most recent EPA and DES regulations.

The Cooperative continues to look to the future by planning for construction of Phase IV at the Franklin site as well as expansion to a Phase V. It is also possible that there will be some negotiations with Wheelabrator concerning extension of the contract this coming year.

GILMANTON HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Once again we made it through another year, only this was supposed to be the year when we were all going to have millennium complications. Computers were going to crash, electricity was going to stop, cars weren't going to run, etc. Okay, we made it through into the year 2001, and we all lived to tell about it. (Now we can get into the Highway Department report).

The summer projects completed were started on Upper City Road. We placed the finish wear course of asphalt from the Route 129 State road to the boundary at the Loudon town line. The next project was on Sawyer Lake Road where we also placed the finish wear course from the intersection of Wood Drive, to the culvert just past the old store. Shimming and sealing were done to the remainder of Sawyer Lake Road from the intersection of Wood Drive, to the intersection of Route 107. The next project for safety was the installation of guard rail on Middle Route from the intersection of Harvest Hill Road, down the side of the swamp going towards Grant Hill Road. Other projects for safety were on Sawtooth Road where we also installed guard rail near the end of the road. The last location for guard rail was on Crystal Lake Road across Gnats Bridge.

Roadside ditching, asphalt shimming and sealing consisted of Guinea Ridge Road from the intersection of Places Mill Road up to the end of the existing asphalt. Ledge excavation was done in order to widen the roadway, increase drainage and improve visibility for safety. Sargent Road was completed from just past the Robertson Farm going down the hill to the bottom. Perkins Road was completed from the intersection of Crystal Lake Road to the top of the hill. Heath Road was completed from the intersection of Crystal Lake Road to the end of the Town maintained portion. Old Town Road was completed from the intersection of the Route 140 to the end at the top of the hill. North Road intersection with Route 140 was completed. Church Street near the fire station in the Iron Works was completed. The intersection of Elm Street and Route 140, (also known as the Iron Works square) was also completed. Stone Road and Burke Road were widened and a minimum of 24" of gravel was added to stabilize and bring the road up out of the poorly drained roadway. The base course of asphalt was placed and the wear course will be placed in 2001. (Part of this project was funded by the new subdivision). The widening of Places Mill Road, Mountain Road and Middle Route will be continued in the summer of 2001, due to the funds being used from the balance of the Selectmen's overall budget.

GILMANTON PLANNING BOARD

The year 2000 was a very active year for the Planning Board. A total of 21 applications were processed, a 70% increase from 1999 and a harbinger of things to come. Ten of the applications were requests for subdivision approval, which resulted in 13 new residential lots. Two of the subdivision applications were denied because they failed to meet our regulations pertaining to harmonious development of the neighborhood and driveway site distance. One of the subdivision applications was a Cluster Development, and was the first of its kind to be approved by the Board. This type of development allows for smaller building lot sizes while preserving 50% of the land as permanent open space. The Planning Board is trying to encourage this type of development in town and has proposed an updated "Open Space Ordinance" to replace the existing Cluster Development Ordinance. If the proposed article passes, it could entitle the developer to bonus lots in return for conserving open space such as farmland, trails and streams.

Three applications were received for commercial site plan review. The Board spent a substantial amount of time with these site plan applications to insure that the environment, property values and public safety were not adversely impacted, while encouraging commercial development whenever and wherever it is consistent with Gilmanton's Master Plan. There were also five Boundary Line Adjustments, all of which were approved. The remaining applications were requests for voluntary merger, where a property owner of two adjacent lots can request that they be merged into one.

The past year brought changes to Planning Board staffing. Richard Mosher retired after serving more than four years as the Town's Planning Administrator. He brought a vast amount of knowledge and expertise to the Board, and he will be missed. Dick's assistant, Lynne Brunelle, assumed the position of Planning Administrator and is valiantly trying to fill his shoes. In addition to the three years with the Planning Board, Lynne has six years experience of working for the Board of Selectmen and the Building Department.

We also had a change in command with regards to our Chairperson. George Twigg sat on the Planning Board for 15 years, and served as Chairman for six. George's experience as Chairman of the Board of Tax and Land Appeals was particularly beneficial. The Board wishes to express their gratitude for his wisdom and wit. Sarah Thorne was voted in to take over the helm as Chair. Sarah served as Vice-Chair for several years and brings extensive knowledge to the Board through the Gilmanton Land Trust and the NH Forest Society.

The Planning Board is diligently working to update, refine and clarify the language in the Town Regulations. Amendments were recently made to the Site Plan Regulations to require that a landscaping plan be submitted as part of a site plan application. This ensures that with any new commercial or multi-family development, landscape plantings be installed and maintained in order to enhance the community's environmental and visual character. The Board is currently addressing potential changes to the Subdivision Regulations to reflect any Zoning Ordinance amendments that pass at Town Meeting. There are several amendments on

the ballot this year and the Board is grateful for the community's support in approving these proposals.

The Planning Board continues to study ways to better protect the Town from uncontrolled growth as the economy of New Hampshire continues to expand. With the recent efforts of the Gilmanton Conservation Commission, a Natural Resource Inventory is being developed, providing the Planning Board with valuable information regarding the location of aquifers, wetlands, productive soil types and other natural resources. This information will become the basis of potential changes to the Zoning Districts. The Board plans to hold several public input sessions in the spring through the fall. All property owners are invited to attend these meetings to voice their opinions on whether the Board should propose increasing the minimum lot size in some areas of Town in 2002. Please help the Board with this important endeavor by participating in these forums.

The Board meets regularly on the second Thursday of each month at 7:30 p.m. at the Gilmanton Academy. Check the *Citizen*, the Academy Building, and the Post Offices for the posted agenda.

HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION

The Historic District Commission has had a relatively quiet year. We processed four applications over the course of the year:

Two of the applications represented minor exterior changes to residential property in the historic districts. The most significant project involved the Roxey's Furniture building in the Gilmanton Corners at the intersection of Routes 107 and 140. The building, now owned by Doug Towle, was constructed in the early 1800s and will be substantially renovated. An addition to the building was also approved. When the work is completed, the building will serve as a retail store and residence.

The Commission also reviewed its regulations and at the time of the writing of this report, has proposed amendments to clarify their provisions. The proposed amendments will be considered at a public hearing in February.

The Commission encourages any person who owns property in the historic districts and is considering renovations, repairs or new construction to informally discuss the project with the Commission before submitting an application. Informal discussions help explain the requirements of the regulations and speed up the approval process.

The Commission has discussed the possibility of adding a new historic district in the Gilmanton Iron Works to protect the historic character of buildings in that part of Town. The Commission would be pleased to receive your comments and ideas as to the desirability of such an addition.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

In Gilmanton, as in most of New Hampshire, population growth and development increased substantially. This growth resulted in more opportunities and challenges for the Conservation Commission than in previous years. Environmental protection of water, wetlands, forests, farmlands, wildlife, and outdoor activities is becoming a major concern.

The Conservation Commission is striving to work more closely with the Selectmen, the Planning Board and the Gilmanton Land Trust. Our input on subdivision requests and other developmental issues has been welcomed. A conservation commission should be involved in updating the towns Master Plan and in developing new ordinances and zoning proposals that are in the best interests of our town.

We are fortunate to have some members who are capable of identifying soils and wetland issues with the goal of completing mapping for a Natural Resources Inventory.

A file with maps and details of Town and State owned conservation parcels in Gilmanton has been compiled and surveying needs are being addressed.

The Commission donated \$2500 to the Jones Farm Project, and the preservation of a large tract of public conservation land on Loon Pond became a reality. We supported legislation that established "The Citizens for NH Land and Community Heritage," a grant program.

The Commission monitored the Town Forest off Gale Road and other smaller parcels.

Copies of "A Guide to Developing and Re-Developing Shoreland Property in New Hampshire" were purchased and distributed to Town offices, individuals, and companies. Other copies are still available. New household hazardous waste brochures have been ordered and will be available soon.

Education and public awareness of rules and regulations is essential in avoiding wetland problems. The Conservation Commission has no enforcement powers of its own and reports to the NH Department of Environmental Services and the Selectmen. Seasonal dock applications have become more simplified and must be reviewed by our Commission. Numerous complaints concerning illegal construction and wetland impacts were received. In addition, many permit application reviews and other requests for assistance in dealing with conservation issues required action. As conservation land is acquired and open space protected, the need for future monitoring and management becomes evident. We are fortunate to have a conservation trust fund and much of this years balance has been committed to costs associated with the Natural Resources Inventory and land management needs.

Being a volunteer on the Conservation Commission is gratifying and sometimes difficult, as it is on many public boards. We appreciate the cooperation of Gilmanton residents in keeping our town special.

LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION

Lakes Region Planning Commission (LRPC), with a service area covering over 1,200 square miles in Belknap, Carroll and Grafton Counties, is one of nine regional planning agencies established by state statute. We continued to have a very busy year. Our work program remains full with activities such as local planning assistance, circuit rider planning, regional information systems and mapping, transportation planning, economic development, and natural resources planning. We are funded through multiple sources including local dues contributed by member municipalities. LRPC is called upon many times each week to provide local technical advice, and to respond to requests for service. We have also continued to maintain a regular dialogue with those state agencies that depend on us as a resource for the entire Lakes Region. Our goal remains to provide support and leadership to the region, its governments, businesses, and citizens.

A few of our accomplishments over the past year are as follows:

- Updated the Region's Transportation Plan which lays the ground work for future transportation-related projects. Initiated the update of the 2000 regional Transportation Improvement Program.
- In cooperation with the New Hampshire Municipal Association, LRPC organized a day-long workshop on "Planning Board Basics" which was well received by area participants.
- Co-hosted and organized three public Municipal Law Lectures where practicing attorneys provide a legal perspective on local planning, zoning and other municipal issues.
- Coordinated the 15th annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection (HHW), the largest single day, multi-site collection in New Hampshire. Renewed efforts to include a permanent HHW Collection Center by creating the Lakes Region Household Hazardous Product Facility Committee.
- Prepared and released an annual report on Development Trends in the Lakes Region. Over 92% of all development in the region remains residential development.
- Prepared an assessment on the way area communities regulate home occupations through zoning ordinances.
- Represented local interests on the policy boards of area economic development councils.

- Performed approximately 130 traffic counts around the region, as the result of a new initiative with the NH Department of Transportation.
- Continued to provide support to the Pemigewasset River Local Advisory Committee leading to the adoption of a River Corridor Management Plan.
- Co-sponsored a regional meeting, in cooperation with the NH Office of State Planning, on the federal and state flood insurance program.
- Expanded the digital, regional land use database; twenty-one municipalities are now completed.
- Completed and submitted the Lakes Region Tour Scenic Byway Plan, a unique resource to aid regional transportation and tourism.
- Convened four area commission meetings that focused on transportation, historic preservation, Main Street and groundwater.
- Co-hosted a tourism economic development forum, in cooperation with the Division of Resources and Economic Development and Belknap County Economic Development Council.

TRUSTEES OF CEMETERIES 2000

The Trustees of Cemeteries are appointed by the Town to oversee the establishment and management of all municipal cemeteries placed within their responsibility. Although the four most active cemeteries, Pine Grove, Smith Meeting House, Buzzell and Beech Grove, are under the care of their own individual organizations, the Trustees have been charged with the care of the remaining 31 burial and historic sites within the community. Many of these have been reclaimed and require only seasonal maintenance. Some are in the process of being reclaimed with the repair and construction of walls, fences and gates, the trimming of trees to eliminate falling branches that can shatter antique head stones, the installation of steps and the repair and resetting of damaged stones. A few sites remain where reclamation has not yet started.

Besides regular seasonal maintenance, the 2000 reclamation work included both the French burial ground off French Road for the second season and beginning work at the Osgood site off Loon Pond Road.

Our schedule has been to include a more substantial project every other year. In 1999, we began the reconstruction of stonewalls at the Tibbetts Cemetery on Route 140 in the Iron Works. In 2001, additional stonework will be done at this or the Stage Road Cemetery site. This allows regular progress to be made on the larger projects without attempting to fund all in one year.

Carl Moorehead continues to provide site maintenance and repair work for the sites under the care of the Trustees. In some instances, citizens have adopted the care of a cemetery in their own neighborhood. This assists by lowering the cost to the community and provides a great opportunity for neighbors, young and old, to work together on a project that can result in a great deal of personal satisfaction.

The Trustees would like to thank the voters and members of the community for their support and assistance to preserve and maintain this important link to Gilmanton's heritage.

On behalf of New Beginnings A Women's Crisis Center and those we serve, I would like to thank the Town of Gilmanton for its continued support. The \$525.00 allocation in 2000 assisted us in providing emergency services, advocacy and support to those whose lives have been affected by domestic and sexual violence.

New Beginnings offers 24-hour crisis line. We operate a full time shelter for women and children and have safe homes for male victims; provide support and advocacy at courts, hospitals, police stations, and social service agencies. New Beginnings offers peer support groups for those affected by domestic or sexual violence, assists with needs assessments, case management and housing options; and does community outreach and education programs for youth, teens and adults. **All services are confidential and are provided free of charge.**

The advocacy, outreach, education and support services our agency provides represent many service hours and individuals. In 2000, our agency documented 7008 requests for services as well as requests for education and community outreach.

New Beginnings is one of 14 members of the statewide NH Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence, promoting statewide networking and resource sharing among domestic and sexual assault programs. The coalition is an evaluating body and administrator of state and federal contracts that provide subsidiary funding for member programs while advocating for legislative change that affect victims/survivors of domestic and sexual violence.

We greatly appreciate the support of the Gilmanton community. We are dedicated to human service, social responsibility and fiscal accountability. Although, New Beginnings represents a finite portion of the Gilmanton Town budget the returns immeasurable. We welcome your participation in our efforts to insure a world of safety for our children and ourselves.

Volunteers are an integral part of the work done by our agency. In 2000, there were 12,625 hours of service provided by volunteers. They are always needed and the opportunity to serve is fulfilling.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Gilmanton in the County of Belknap in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Gilmanton Academy in said Gilmanton on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March 2001, next at 7:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE #1: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE #2: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 to Zoning Ordinance Article IV – Zoning District Regulations, as proposed by the Planning Board?

To amend the Article by removing the term “Private” from the use “Campground, Private” in Table 1; and to add an asterisked statement to Table 2 to clarify that any lot that conforms with the 150 foot frontage requirement in effect prior to March 2000 shall be treated as a conforming lot. (The Planning Board RECOMMENDS the adoption of this amendment)

ARTICLE #3: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 to Zoning Ordinance Article V – Open Space Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board?

To amend the Article by deleting the existing “Cluster Development” provisions and replacing them with the new “Open Space Subdivision” regulations; and to replace the term “Cluster Development” with “Open Space Subdivision” throughout the Ordinance. The revised Article would encourage open space planning for land containing 20 acres or more in cases where certain natural resources and special features are predominant and can be preserved as open space. Bonus lots are offered as an incentive to use this ordinance to encourage the conservation of agricultural and forest lands, habitat, water quality, and rural character that would likely be lost through conventional development approaches. (The Planning Board RECOMMENDS the adoption of this amendment)

ARTICLE #4: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #3 to Zoning Ordinance Article VI.D. – Storage and Use of Trailer Coaches, and Article XIII – Definitions, as proposed by the Planning Board?

To amend the Article by removing the definition of “Trailer Coach” and replacing it with the definition of “Recreational Vehicle” as defined in RSA 216-I:1, which includes all types of vehicles used for temporary living; and to require that recreational vehicles which are located on land by seasonal permits for 120 days meet the same setbacks requirements as buildings to protect the environment, health, safety and well being of the community. This provision would also allow the placement of a recreational vehicle on property where a dwelling exists for up to seven (7) days without meeting required setbacks. (The Planning Board RECOMMENDS the adoption of this amendment)

ARTICLE #5: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #4 to Zoning Ordinance Article VII – Non-Conforming Uses, Lots & Structures, as proposed by the Planning Board?

To amend the Article to allow the expansion, relocation or total rebuild of any existing non-conforming structure on a non-conforming lot by Special Exception rather than by Variance under certain conditions by strict guidelines; and to make the Article more understandable by addressing non-conforming uses, lots and structures separately. (The Planning Board RECOMMENDS the adoption of this amendment)

ARTICLE #6: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #5 to the Zoning Ordinance to add the following section, as proposed by petition?

To protect public health and welfare, and to protect surface and groundwater resources, the landspreading of septage, and the stockpiling and landspreading of municipal sewage sludge (“Biosolids”) and industrial papermill sludge (“short paper fiber”) is not allowed in the Town of Gilmanton. This ordinance shall not apply to sewage/septage/sludge generated within the Town of Gilmanton, nor shall it apply to Class A sludge-derived products sold by the bag. (The Planning Board DOES NOT RECOMMEND the adoption of this amendment)

The following articles will be acted at the Gilmanton School on Saturday, March 17, 2001 at 10:00 a.m.

The Balance of Twenty Nine Thousand Dollars (\$29,000.00) will be withdrawn from the undesignated fund balance. (Recommended by the Selectmen \$55,000.00) (Recommended by the Budget Committee \$55,000.00) (Majority vote required).
