STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Child's Opera House in said town on Tuesday, the Eleventh Day of March Next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk and Chief of Police for one year, Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for two years, Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, two Delegates to the Constitutional Convention, and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

- Art. 2. To hear the reports of the town officers to the auditors, the reports of the auditors, agents, committees or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.
 - Art. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the current expenses of the town and apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt.
- Art. 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the building and repairing of highways, bridges, and culverts.

- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to be applied upon the salary of the District Nurse.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for Senator Grimes Post, G. A. R., to be used Memorial Day.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of cooperating with the State and Federal governments in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust, or act in relation thereto.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise any money for the support of band concerts the coming season.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the support of the Fuller Public Library.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to construct a sidewalk on the south side of High St., raise money for the same or pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to be expended for Playground purposes, including the supervision of play at Grimes Field for a period of eight weeks during the summer of 1930.
- Art. 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

During the year 1929 the following improvements were made.

A new line of 4 inch cast iron pipe was laid on Cross St. from Henniker St. to the foot of Jackson St. to connect with the Jackson St. line. 360 feet of pipe was laid on this street at a cost of \$587.29 which was charged to extension account.

This extension eliminates the "dead end" formerly at the foot of Jackson St.

A new line of 6 inch cast iron pipe was laid on Jackson St. to replace the old 4 inch cement line pipe. 540 feet of pipe were laid on this street at a total cost of \$957.33 charged as follows: Renewal \$360.80, Excess Renewal \$596.53.

On West Mill St. a new line of 6 inch cast iron pipewas laid from Mill Square to the Hillsboro Woolen Mill office replacing the old 4 inch cement line. 670 feet of pipe was laid on this street at a total cost of \$1,165.73 charged as follows: Renewal \$381.90, Excess Renewal \$783.83.

A new extension was laid on Henniker St. to supply the new building of Harlan Colby. 51 feet of 2 inch Byers galvanized and 24 feet of 3/4 inch copper pipe was used on this job at a cost of \$88.46, which was charged to Extension account.

In reference to the fact that the items of care and repair were considerably in excess of last year, we wish to state that the increase in these items were due largely to the fact that a great many more service renewals were made during the year 1929 than have been made in any recent year. This of course represents added improvement to our water system.

The Superintendent of Schools hereby makes his tenth annual report of the Hillsborough Town School District, it being the report for the school year 1928-1929:

There were no changes in our corps of teachers, but Miss Barbara Hatch, a grdauate of the Music Course at the Keene Normal School was engaged as Music Supervisor, in co-operation with Antrim and Deering.

There was an increase of visits by parents in all but one school, but there was such a large falling off in that school that the total for the year was less than that for last year. The School Board has greatly increased its number of visits, as has the superintendent also.

Great improvement has been made in the school buildings and grounds. All our buildings were by the end of this school year correctly lighted, and money has been voted to provide playgrounds for the Merrill and Flat schools, the Upper and Lower Village schools having been well provided for in that respect, last year. Since the close of the year for which this report is made, but previous to its publication, a great deal more has been done which will properly appear in the report for the school year 1929-1930. In your superintendent's visits in other school districts he has every reason to feel proud of the progress your school board has made, and is making, in the improvement of school conditions.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the Hillsborough Special School District:

I hereby present my eleventh annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The following table gives the usual information regarding our teachers, and is valuable as a permanent record.

The total amount of the teachers' payroll was \$14,788.32. The salary of the music and drawing supervisors seems small but it should be remembered that they give one day a week to our schools, instead of five as the others do. The average length of teachers' experience is 15 years, and we had only two teachers without experience, Miss Holden, a graduate of Wheaton, and Miss Gale from the Keene Normal School. Three teachers were

college graduates, three attended professional schools, six were Normal graduates, while the remaining two report no post secondary education; but from their successful experience they are among our best teachers, both having received a teachers' certificate, the highest form of state approval. Nine of our teachers have certificates and five have licenses.

The minimum length of a satisfactory school year, in this state, is 36 weeks, and several districts have a longer year. We had 174 days of school, which is a loss of 6 days. We expect to have the length of the next school year approach more nearly to 180 days, by arranging the school calendar so as to include as many of the so called legal holidays as possible, in our vacations.

Pupils have been fairly regular in attendance, the average being 95.3 per cent, and ranging from 92.5 per cent in the primary room to 96.5 per cent in the eighth grade. Punctuality, a form of reliability, is one of the qualities the teachers have striven to inculcate with a fair degree of success. In the Grammar School, with an average membership of 252 there were 49 cases of tardiness for the whole year. Two rooms are worthy of mention, Miss Rickard's room with an enrollment of 50 had only two cases of tardiness, and in the primary room, Mrs. Scruton had 45 pupils with only three cases of tardiness.

In the high school however, with an average membership of 98 there were 132 cases of tardiness. There were in both schools taken together only 51 cases per 100 pupils whereas the state average was 96 per 100 pupils.

Of the 386 pupils in our schools 52 were tuition pupils; 21 from Hillsboro Town, 17 from Bennington, 10 from Deering, 3 from Washington and 1 from Bradford, leaving a total of 334 of our own pupils in our schools.

Parents have been constantly urged to visit schools, and are doing so in increasing numbers. There were 527 visits from parents and friends and 30 from school board members. The superintendent made 496 visits of supervision and inspection.

The Chadwick Essay prizes were won by Lida Dow, a junior, and Ethel Smith, a senior, tying for first prize, and Helen Oski received the third prize. The Sons of the American Revolution Medal, a good citizenship award to eighth grade pupils, was won by Miss Lois Charnock, and the Haslet Scholarship was awarded to Miss Alta Fitzpatrick, who entered Keene Normal School in September.

For a number of years a high per cent of our eighth grade graduates have entered high school, this year 14 of our 15 graduates did so, and in their final examinations their averages ranged from 79 per cent to 90 per cent.

The high school graduating class presented a fine bust of Col. Lindberg to the school, and several other classes have rememberd the school with gifts. This is a commendable practice because it adds works of art to the school rooms, and because it encourages the feeling among the graduates, more and more that they are helping in making the school what it is and what it is to be.

Our high school offers the standard college preparatory course, a scientific school preparatory course, an office position preparatory course, and a home keeper's preparatory course. These are all good courses and should be given, but in the list we find no preparatory course for the mechanically inclined individual. He cannot go to college, he would not fit in an office, but if he attends high school now he must take one of the courses primarily

fitting for those places. At one time we did have a mechanics arts course, but as it was discontinued before my term of office I do not know of it at first hand, but I have been told that it was not popular and that so few elected it that it was given up. However, the state department of education, working with experts along this line, are getting out, and will soon have ready for distribution, a new mechanic arts course which we await with interest, believing that it will offer to a larger number of boys, a good preparation for the work they are best fitted to do. Although it would not induce many more to come to our high school, because we now receive about 100 per cent of our grammar graduates, yet it would no doubt keep more of those who do enter for the whole four years.

In May our Music Supervisor, Mrs. Lena Ball, held a Music Festival, which was creditably performed and enthusiastically received. It took the form of an exhibition of the work done in music in the different grades, and illustrated the development of the work from grade to grade.

The work of the schools has been going on for the most part along the usual lines. Our teachers are, however, constantly on the lookout for ways to present their work more forcefully and interestingly. Space will not permit me to mention all the ways that the work has been made of more than usual value to the pupils both in the Grammar and in the High School. Different typewriter companies offer certificates, bronze, silver and gold medals for excellence in typewriting. Miss Brooks has interested the pupils in these contests with the result that during the year our pupils won 36 certificates, 21 bronze medals, 21 silver medals and 14 gold medals. Miss Mary Cuddemi had a speed record of 65 8-15 words per minute for 15 minutes with only two mistakes. All pupils with a record of 60 words per minute are considered worthy of receiving a gold medal. One of the typewriting

companies publishes each quarter an honor roll, and the Hillsborough High School has appeared on all four Honor Rolls this year. The pupils in this department have opportunity to do thousands of sheets of extra work each year for different departments of the school and for many organizations such as the Music Clubs of the town, and the local P. T. A. Miss Graham's English work was made especially interesting by the making of illustrative posters, book projects, poetry booklets, original articles and poems published in the Messenger. Two interesting poetry projects were black and white cut outs by Marjorie Smith on "The House by the Side of the Road," and one on Kilmer's "Trees," by Rowena Yeaton. Classes, under Miss Camp, had two contests with prizes. Miss Rowena Yeaton won the prize given by the Royal Baking Powder Co. for angel cake, and a contest on Home Projects in which Carrie Stinson won first prize, and Agnes Diemond won the second prize. There was also a dress contest in which Vivian Cote, Janet Cote and Alice Crane were winners

The Grammar School has had a successful year, with Mrs. Dobel as principal. Discipline has been maintained under her guidance, and she has the confidence of her teachers and the community; and the cheerful cooperation of her faculty.

The annual medical examination was conducted by Miss Mildred Mattson, a registered nurse recommended by the State Board of Education, and the follow up work was done by Miss Gile. Some interesting figures of Miss Mattson's report follow. Out of 342 pupils examined

- 55 were underweight
- 26 had defective vision
- 167 had defective teeth
 - 32 had defective breathing, and
 - 92 had defective tonsils.

It is to be hoped that we may, in combination with some other school district or districts, engage a regular school nurse to do both the examining and the follow up work. Not once a year but many times during the year, to be at the call of the teacher for a health inspection whenever it is needed. The importance of health as a controlling factor in successful living needs no demonstration to the people of Hillsborough.

The graduation exercises of the Grammar School were held in the School Hall on Friday afternoon, June 7th, Emma Yeaton and Harriet Coxon were the honor pupils. The high school graduation took place in the Opera House on Thursday evening, June 6th. There were eleven graduates, with Grace Worth as valedictorian, and Ethel Smith as salutatorian.
