## SCHOOL BOARD REPORT.

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The annual meeting of the School District was held March 18, 1922, and the following officers were elected:

Harry G. Atwood, Moderator; D. Beatrice Smith, Clerk; James E. Fowler, Treasurer; Eugene C. Patridge, Auditor. Christopher A. Pollard was elected a member of the School Board for three years.

The School Board met and organized as follows: Alice J. Patridge, Chairman and Clerk; James L. Coe, Committee on Repairs; Christopher A. Pollard, Committee on Fuel.

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### Report of Superintendent of Schools.

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*To the School Board and Citizens of Newfields, N. H.:*

I have the honor of submitting to you my fourth annual report as superintendent of our schools. In it I shall discuss briefly the accomplishment of the school year which ended in June 1922, the progress of the current year and suggestions for the immediate future.

I said in last year's report that June 30, 1922, would see a better per cent of attendance mark than 91.8 which was the average when the report went to print. Table I shows all the figures relative to attendance. The fine gain made last year over the year before was due partly to an increased interest created by the teachers, but more to the attendance officer. Few districts in the state have worse attendance records than was Newfields for the year ending in June 1921, but last year's record shows a good gain. However, we are now without an attendance officer and have been for

some months. While some of the pupils who have been irregular in attendance have moved away, we have others who need care. We are slipping back to the old record. I speak thus publicly of this hoping that some good citizen of Newfields, knowing the facts, may be willing to shoulder the burden of school attendance. The other statistical tables speak for themselves.

Standardized tests in reading, writing, spelling, and arithmetic were given in both schools at the middle of last year. Wherever the results were below standard results, means were provided for remedial drill, individual cases were studied and discussed with teachers. A repetition of the tests at the end of the year showed large gain all along the line. How to help the teacher get her best possible results in each of these subjects was one of the chief aims of the superintendent on each of his visits to the schools. He has studied individual cases with the teacher, teaching methods have been analyzed and submitted to criticism, thought given to selection of text book material. It can be readily seen, I think that the utmost progress of each pupil should be our aim. I am pleased to report fine co-operation on the part of teachers throughout the year in securing this progress. We are fortunate in securing Miss Kimball's services again for this year, and in the fine experience which Miss Murphy brings to her school. I am confident that when this year's testing time comes we shall see the fine results of their work. There is a good spirit of coöperation between pupils and teachers and between parents and citizens and school. The installation of the electric lights by the Parent-Teacher Association is a fine public spirited piece of work; much praise is due to those who put the project through. I'm pleased to report that the ground glass which was put into the upper sashes of the primary room last summer has been in every way an entire success.

There is one concern in our school life which I think is grave. I refer to the long day which pupils of Exeter High School and Robinson Seminary must spend away from

home. These hours, especially in winter, must be a severe tax on physical health. There are other phases of the question quite as unsatisfactory. Would parents consider any other kind of transportation in suitable parts of the year?

With deep appreciation of the continued support of school board, teachers, and community, this report is

3. To hear the report of all officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To see if the district will vote to make any alterations in the report of the School Board recommending the amount of money required for the support of schools and payments of statutory obligations.
5. To see if the District will vote to sell the Piscassic School House.
6. To transact all other business which may properly come before said meeting.
