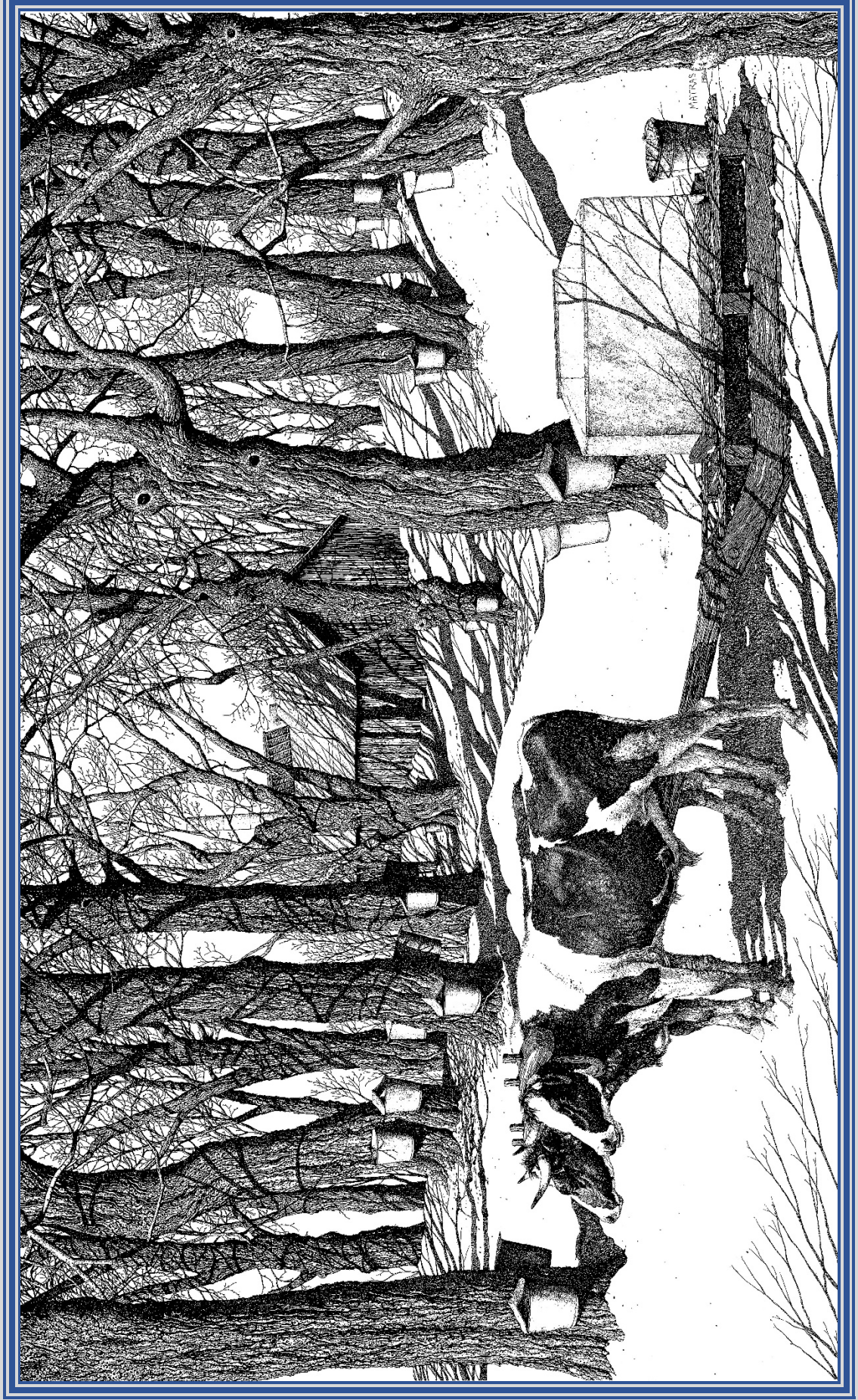

Carol L. Grainger



Carol Grainger moved to Pittsfield from Derry in 1972 with her husband, Randy, her grandmother, Mary and (at the time) 3 daughters, Andrea, Michele, and Lisa (Robin was born a few years later). Carol and Randy wanted to move from the city and raise their family in a nice small town.

Carol was a graduate of UNH where she received her Bachelor's degree in Hospitality. After graduation, she worked as a hotel manager for the Carpenter Hotel in Manchester. Carol also met her future husband while studying at UNH. Carol was fortunate to be able to spend time as a stay-at-home mom to her four daughters and later went back to school at Notre Dame College for her teaching certificate.

Carol worked for over 30 years at the Pittsfield Elementary school first as a Tutor in the Title 1 program and later as a First Grade teacher. She LOVED her first grade students. Her passion for teaching was prevalent in the way she went above and beyond helping kids with more than just learning- she would be their sounding board, help them learn to tie their shoes and learn proper manners. She truly put her kids first. Along with the daily duties of teaching, she was a member of many committees at school – helping in any way she could. She was a wonderful mentor to many new, first year teachers.

Carol was also very involved with the Josiah Carpenter Library. For many years, she worked as a Librarian. She then moved to the position of Children's Librarian - a position that she loved. She spent hundreds of hours preparing craft projects and selecting books and games for the Summer Reading program. She just wanted kids to learn to love to read – didn't matter what they read, just read! She also served as a Library Trustee for a few years.

Carol participated in and belonged to many Community organizations. She was a Brownie leader, member of Pittsfield Circle of Home & Family, Budget Committee, PCDC, PES PTO, and Booster Club. She was very involved with the Our Lady of Lourdes Church. She and her husband were always supportive of any of the activities their daughters were involved in.

Carol was a smart, caring, fiercely independent woman who did not like to be the center of attention and would quietly get things done. She was a loyal friend and would do whatever was needed to help someone. She will be missed by many, would want us all to love to read and to be involved in our community.

Carol, a pillar of the community, passed away peacefully on Saturday, June 25, 2022.

2023 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN OF PITTSFIELD

To the inhabitants of the Town of Pittsfield in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet for the first session of the annual meeting, to be held in the Pittsfield Middle High School Gymnasium at 23 Oneida Street in said Pittsfield on Saturday, February 4, 2023, at 10:00 a.m. This first (deliberative) session, for the transaction of all business other than voting by official ballot, shall consist of explanation, discussion, and debate of each warrant article as allowed by law. In the event of inclement weather, the snow date for the first session will be Monday, February 6, 2023 at 7:00 p.m. at the same location.

You are also notified to meet for the second session of the annual meeting, to be held in the Pittsfield Middle High School Gymnasium at 23 Oneida Street in said Pittsfield on Tuesday, March 14, 2023, to vote on the 2023 annual town meeting warrant articles by official ballot. The polls will open at 7:00 a.m. and will close at 7:00 p.m.

Article 1:

To choose by ballot the following officers:

- one Cemetery Trustee for a three (3) year term
- one Library Trustee for a three (3) year term
- one Planning Board member for a three (3) year term
- one Board of Selectmen member for a three (3) year term
- one Town Treasurer for a three (3) year term
- one Trustee of the Trust Funds for a three (3) year term
- two Zoning Board of Adjustment members for a three (3) year term

Article 2 – Municipal Operating Budget

Shall the town raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including the appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling **\$5,190,496**?

Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be **\$4,995,952** which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

Estimated tax impact is \$8.481 per thousand dollars of assessed value.

2023 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

Article 3 - Municipal Sidewalks improvement

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$25,000** for the purpose of improvements to our municipal sidewalks and to authorize the withdrawal of **\$25,000** to come from the Municipal Sidewalks Improvement Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The balance collected in 2022 was \$28,785.00, which will be transferred to the Municipal Sidewalks Improvement Capital Reserve Fund in fiscal year 2023. The balance of the Municipal Sidewalks Improvement Capital Reserve Fund was \$23,377.03 on December 31, 2022.

There is no estimated tax impact.

Article 4 – public works truck replacement

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$210,000** for the purchase of a truck for the public works department, to authorize the withdrawal of **\$153,000** to come from the Public Works Small Highway Truck Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose, with the balance of **\$57,000** to be funded by taxation.

The balance of the Public Works Small Highway Truck Capital Reserve Fund was \$153,177.37 on December 31, 2022.

Estimated tax impact is \$0.16 per thousand dollars of assessed value.

Article 5 – raising matching funds for a Fire Department grant – 1994 fire tanker replacement

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$450,000** for the purchase of a tanker truck for the fire department, with a **grant revenue offset of \$400,000** to come from an Assistance to Firefighters Grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency, leaving \$50,000 required as matching funds and to authorize the withdrawal of **\$50,000** from the Fire Department Tanker Capital Reserve Fund. The matching funds amount will be spent only if the grant is received. This article is required to be written to show the entire appropriation and offsetting grant revenue, not just the net obligation, per the gross budgeting concept for transparency. The balance of the Fire Department Tanker Capital Reserve Fund was \$123,579.37 on December 31, 2022.

There is no estimated tax impact.

2023 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

Article 6 – ambulance replacement

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$385,000** for the purchase of an ambulance and the ambulance equipment necessary to be licensed by the State of New Hampshire, and to authorize the withdrawal of **\$385,000** to come from the Ambulance Replacement and Equipment Fund created for this purpose.

This article is being presented for a consideration a year ahead of the replacement schedule as the factory build times are two full years once an order is placed. The ambulance replacement schedule is not changing. To maintain the current 10-year replacement schedule, the 2014 ambulance has to be ordered in 2023, to be received in 2024.

There is no estimated tax impact.

Article 7 – increase annual deposit into the Ambulance Replacement & Equipment Fund

To see if the town will vote, in accordance with RSA 31:95-d, V, to change the fractional portion of revenues to deposit into the existing Ambulance Replacement and Equipment Fund, an RSA 31:95-c special revenue fund created in 1998 and last amended in 2020, the change being to restrict **\$70,000** in revenues from the annual amount of ambulance billings recorded in the General Fund to be deposited annually into the existing Ambulance Replacement and Equipment Fund for continued purpose of funding the replacements of the town's ambulances along with the ambulance equipment necessary to be licensed by the State of New Hampshire.

The revenues and expenditures accounted for in the Ambulance Replacement and Equipment Fund are separate from the General Fund. Any surplus in the Ambulance Replacement and Equipment Fund is not deemed to be a part of the General Fund accumulated surplus and shall be expended only after a vote by the legislative body to appropriate an amount from the Ambulance Replacement and Equipment Fund for a specific purpose related to the purpose of the fund and source of revenue.

Article 8 – add to the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$30,000** to be added to the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The balance of the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund was \$30,070.27 on December 31, 2022.

Estimated tax impact is \$0.084 per thousand dollars of assessed value.

2023 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

Article 9 – add to the Fire Department Fire & Rescue Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$10,000** to be added to the Fire Department Fire & Rescue Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The balance of the Fire Department Fire & Rescue Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund was \$207.17 on December 31, 2022.

Estimated tax impact is \$0.028 per thousand dollars of assessed value.

Article 10 – add to the Fire Department Small Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$1,000** to be added to the Fire Department Small Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The balance of the Fire Department Small Equipment Capital Reserve Fund was \$3,050.84 on December 31, 2022.

Estimated tax impact is \$0.003 per thousand dollars of assessed value.

Article 11 – add to the Fire Department Pumper Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$98,000** to be added to the Fire Department Pumper Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The balance of the Fire Department Pumper Capital Reserve Fund was \$137,437.37 on December 31, 2022.

Estimated tax impact is approximately \$0.276 per thousand dollars of assessed value.

Article 12 – add to the Fire Department Tanker Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$15,000** to be added to the Fire Department Tanker Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The balance of the Fire Department Tanker Capital Reserve Fund was \$123,579.37 on December 31, 2022.

Estimated tax impact is approximately \$0.042 per thousand dollars of assessed value.

Article 13 – add to the Fire Department Forestry Truck Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$8,000** to be added to the Fire Department Forestry Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The balance of the Fire Department Forestry Truck Capital Reserve Fund was \$29,097.82 on December 31, 2022.

Estimated tax impact is approximately \$0.023 per thousand dollars of assessed value.

2023 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

Article 14 – add to the Dump Truck Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$80,000** to be added to the Dump Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The proposed addition to this Capital Reserve Fund is to support the replacement of **three dump trucks, in different staggered years**. The balance of the Public Works Dump Truck Capital Reserve Fund was \$288,540.91 on December 31, 2022.

Estimated tax impact is \$0.225 per thousand dollars of assessed value.

Article 15 – add to the Loader Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$15,000** to be added to the Loader Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The balance of the Public Works Loader Capital Reserve Fund was \$80,899.33 on December 31, 2022.

Estimated tax impact is \$0.042 per thousand dollars of assessed value.

Article 16 – add to the Grader Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$42,000** to be added to the Grader Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The balance of the Public Works Grader Capital Reserve Fund was \$194,248.77 on December 31, 2022.

Estimated tax impact is \$0.118 per thousand dollars of assessed value.

Article 17 – add to the Backhoe Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$9,000** to be added to the Backhoe Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The balance of the Public Works Backhoe Capital Reserve Fund was \$43,973.93 on December 31, 2022.

Estimated tax impact is \$0.025 per thousand dollars of assessed value.

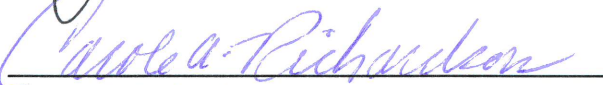

2023 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING DELIBERATIVE SESSION MINUTES

TOWN OF PITTSFIELD

February 4, 2023

Town Moderator Carole Dodge was unable to attend the First Session of the 2023 Town Meeting. The Supervisors of the Checklist appointed Town Administrator Cara Marston to serve as Interim Moderator for the meeting. Ms. Marston explained she currently serves as a Trustee of Trust Funds and asked the Legislative Body if they would prefer that the Supervisors appoint another person to serve as Moderator. The Legislative Body was comfortable with her serving in this capacity. The First Session of the 2023 Town meeting was called to order at 10:02 a.m. on Saturday, February 4, 2023 in the Pittsfield Middle High School Gymnasium. Interim Moderator Marston welcomed those in attendance and led the *Pledge of Allegiance*. Interim Moderator Marston explained she would read each warrant article and then would open the floor for discussion and the option to amend. She asked the Body if it was acceptable if she just read the article number and title or would they prefer she read aloud the articles in their entirety. The Body agreed she could just read the number and title. She stated that no final votes would be taken today, but would happen by ballot on Election Day Tuesday, March 14, 2023.

Interim Moderator Marston read the introduction to warrant:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Pittsfield in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet for the first session of the annual meeting, to be held in the Pittsfield Middle High School Gymnasium at 23 Oneida Street in said Pittsfield on Saturday, February 4, 2023, at 10:00 a.m. This first (deliberative) session, for the transaction of all business other than voting by official ballot, shall consist of explanation, discussion, and debate of each warrant article as allowed by law. In the event of inclement weather, the snow date for the first session will be Monday, February 6, 2023 at 7:00 p.m. at the same location.

You are also notified to meet for the second session of the annual meeting, to be held in the Pittsfield Middle High School Gymnasium at 23 Oneida Street in said Pittsfield on Tuesday, March 14, 2023, to vote on the 2023 annual town meeting warrant articles by official ballot. The polls will open at 7:00 a.m. and will close at 7:00 p.m.

Article 1:

To choose by ballot the following officers:

- one Cemetery Trustee for a three (3) year term
- one Library Trustee for a three (3) year term
- one Planning Board member for a three (3) year term
- one Board of Selectmen member for a three (3) year term
- one Town Treasurer for a three (3) year term
- one Trustee of the Trust Funds for a three (3) year term
- two Zoning Board of Adjustment members for a three (3) year term

Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be **\$4,995,952** which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

He stated that he has been doing a lot of research and attended the Town's Emergency Management Hazard Mitigation meetings this past summer. He cautioned that the weather is going to become increasingly more extreme, which will lead to more problems and more challenges. He handed out a climate fact sheet and shared statistics. He stated we all need to do our part. He would like a committee created comprised of students, school board members and selectmen to look toward solutions and sources of cleaner energy. We need to work toward eliminating fossil fuel emissions. He stressed that we are at a tipping point.

There being no further discussion, Interim Moderator Marston called for a vote to amend Article 2. The proposed amendment was defeated by majority hand vote.

There being no further discussion, Article 2 shall appear on the ballot as originally written.

The balance of the Public Works Small Highway Truck Capital Reserve Fund was \$153,177.37 on December 31, 2022.

Estimated tax impact is \$0.16 per thousand dollars of assessed value.

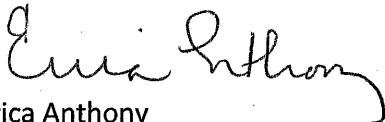

Town Moderator Cedric Dustin III called the First Session of the 2022 Town Meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, February 5, 2022 in the Pittsfield Middle High School Cafeteria. He welcomed those in attendance and asked Select Board Chairman James Allard to lead the *Pledge of Allegiance*. Moderator Dustin explained he would read each warrant article and then would open the floor for discussion and the option to amend. He stated that no final votes would be taken today, but would happen by ballot on Election Day Tuesday, March 8, 2022. He stated any proposed amendments must be submitted in writing.

After explaining the rules of procedure, Moderator Dustin read the introduction to warrant:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Pittsfield in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet for the first session of the annual meeting, to be held in the Pittsfield Middle High School Cafeteria at 23 Oneida Street in said Pittsfield on Saturday, February 5, 2022, at 10:00 a.m. This first (deliberative) session, for the transaction of all business other than voting by official ballot, shall consist of explanation, discussion, and debate of each warrant article as allowed by law. In the event of inclement weather, the snow date for the first session will be Monday, February 7, 2022 at 7:00 p.m. at the same location.

You are also notified to meet for the second session of the annual meeting, to be held in the Pittsfield Middle High School Gymnasium at 23 Oneida Street in said Pittsfield on Tuesday, March 8, 2022, to vote on the 2022 annual town meeting warrant articles by official ballot. The polls will open at 7:00 a.m. and will close at 7:00 p.m.

Article 1:

To choose by ballot the following officers:

- one Cemetery Trustee for a three (3) year term
- one Library Trustee for a three (3) year term
- one Town Moderator for a two (2) year term
- one Planning Board member for a three (3) year term
- two Board of Selectmen members for a three (3) year term
- one Supervisor of the Checklist for a six (6) year term
- one Trustee of the Trust Funds for a three (3) year term
- one Zoning Board of Adjustment member for a three (3) year term

Article 2 – Municipal Operating Budget

Shall the town raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including the appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling **\$5,180,655**?

Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be **\$4,855,485** which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law; or the governing body may hold one

special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

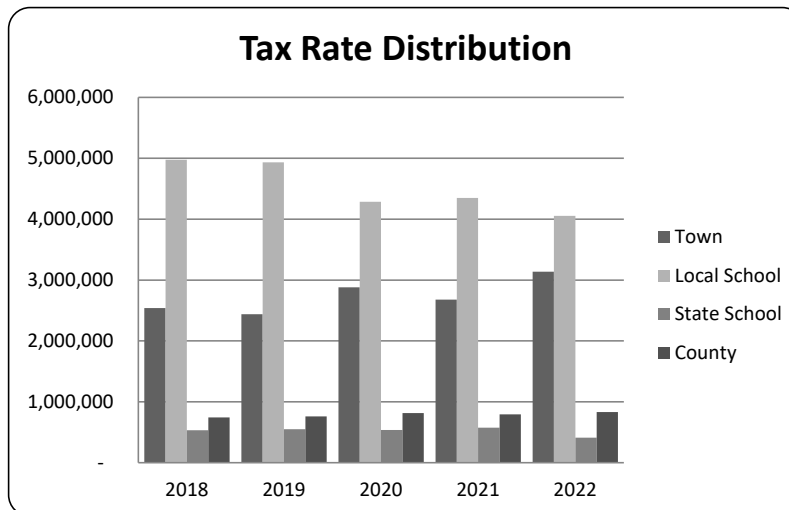

The State of NH Department of Revenue Administration conducts an annual statistical study, comparing the recorded values that properties sell for to the values that the properties are taxed. This study is done for the purpose of equalizing the local assessed valuations of municipalities and unincorporated places across the state. One of the statistical ratios that are determined from this study is the median ratio, which can be used to modify a property's current market value to the town's assessed value. This is an important ratio as most towns do not annually adjust their property values to market.

Report on the Financial Statements

Adverse and Unmodified Opinions

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Pittsfield as of and for the year ended December 31, 2021, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Adverse Opinion on Governmental Activities

In our opinion, because of the significance of the matter described in the "Basis for Adverse Opinion on Governmental Activities" paragraph, the accompanying financial statements do not present fairly the financial position of the governmental activities of the Town of Pittsfield, as of December 31, 2021, and the changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Unmodified Opinions

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of each major fund and aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Pittsfield as of December 31, 2021, the respective changes in financial position, and the respective budgetary comparisons for the general fund and the sewer fund, for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Town of Pittsfield and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Basis for Adverse Opinion on Governmental Activities

As discussed in Note 1-B to the financial statements, management has not recorded the long-term costs of retirement healthcare costs and obligations for other postemployment benefits for the single employer plan in the governmental activities. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that those costs be recorded, which would increase the liabilities, decrease the net position, and increase the expenses of the governmental activities. The amount by which this departure would affect the liabilities, net position, and expenses on the governmental activities is not readily determinable.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

The Town of Pittsfield's management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Our opinion on the basic financial statements is not affected by the missing information.

Supplementary Information – Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Pittsfield's basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The combining and individual fund schedules are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining and individual fund schedules are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

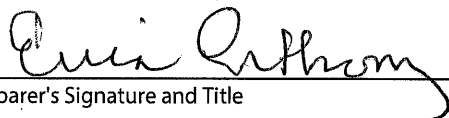

TOWN CLERK/TAX COLLECTOR'S REPORT

In an effort to continue our mission to provide the best service possible to you, the residents, we offer a number of options to conduct business online. Our town website, "www.pittsfieldnh.gov" has tabs on the home page which link with "eb2gov.com" and "nhtaxkiosk.com" for the following services:

"Auto Registration"- pay for motor vehicle registration renewals, duplicate registrations, replacement decals, as well as calculate estimates.

"Dog Licenses" - pay for new or renewing dog licenses.

"Vital Records" – request and pay for birth, death, marriage, and divorce certificates.

"Property Taxes" - pay and/or print property and sewer invoices.

"Code Compliance Payments" - pay for building, electrical, mechanical, and plumbing permits as well as Planning Board and Zoning Board application fees.

"Citation Payments" - pay for locally issued parking tickets and dog civil forfeitures.

"Misc Payments" - pay for cemetery lots and Parks & Recreation fees.

Supporting documents such as rabies certificates, code compliance permits and scans of your photo ID may be directly uploaded through the dog, code compliance and vital records modules. Other forms and applications may be scanned and e-mailed, mailed, faxed, or dropped in the drop box next to the Town Hall door. Once we receive notification of your payment, we will process your request and mail you the documents/receipts.

We extend the courtesy of e-mail renewal notices for vehicle registrations and dog licenses and the option of paperless notification of property tax and sewer invoices. If a property owner chooses paperless invoice notification, they will receive up to three emails alerting them that their bills are available online.

In addition to serving as a certified municipal and boat agent, our office is also an approved Fish and Game agent. Fishing and hunting licenses, ATV, snowmobile, and trail bike registrations may all be purchased at the Town Hall.

As more people choose to receive their news and information digitally, we have taken even more particular care to make sure the information on the town website is kept current. We encourage everyone to subscribe to the website newsletter and notices. I have also created a "Pittsfield Town Clerk/Tax Collector" Facebook page.

To stay informed of changing laws, regulations, and best practices, we take advantage of the professional development opportunities offered by the NH Town Clerk Association, the NH Tax Collectors Association, Department of Motor Vehicles, Offices of the Secretary of State, and the NH Municipal Association.

In addition to the annual workshops and conferences, Deputy Town Clerk/Tax Collector Greta Sarte began the 4-year program toward becoming a NH Certified Town Clerk/Tax Collector. I cannot thank her enough for her hard work and dedication to this office, and her willingness to continue her education in this unique field. I completed a volunteer project to earn my recertification as a NH Certified Town Clerk/Tax Collector. I also had the privilege to serve as the 2021-2022 President of the NH Tax Collector's Association.

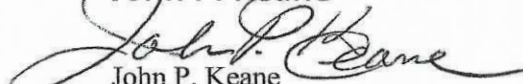

Fire Department in 2022 ended up with 954 calls. We provided a lot of Mutual Aid and gave a lot, as well. We work well with our surrounding towns. I would like to thank the voters for approving the replacement of our Engine 2. We did a lot of research and looked at a lot of vendors. E-One came in at our price level and worked with us non-stop to build us a beautiful truck. It will take two years to build - so the wait is on.

We received grant for (Gator) UTV this year and trailer through Government surplus to store and transport it. This will help in forest fires to get to places that are hard to with bigger equipment. A skid unit in the back will hold 70 gallons of water and pump and tools and is also set up to help transport a person that has been hurt out of the woods. The Gator also has tracks so we can use in the winter for emergencies, as well.



The department is filing again for a FEMA grant to replace our 29-year-old Tanker. The grant will be in a 2023 warrant article, asking to use \$50,000 dollars in matching funds that have been put away in reserve for our Tanker truck. The Tanker is 1994 and its 29 years old. The cost of the tanker is around \$500,000, so receiving the grant with a \$50,000 would be a huge deal for the town.

I would like to thank the CIP Committee, Board of Selectmen, and Budget Committee for the time and communication throughout the budgeting process. In the past few years, with the work that has been done with these three committees on the CIP program, and with taxpayer support, all of our big-ticket items will be back on track in the next replacement cycles by getting the funds put away for the future so there aren't any big surprises.

Last March we hosted a community supper - Thank You for a huge success of the Spaghetti Dinner! We had a huge turn out and are doing another one this March, along with another raffle with exciting items to bid on.

We are always looking for new members for the support company, call fire members, and EMS. The support Company is going strong. They would come help at major incidents with food and water or assist with traffic control, if needed. They are welcome to come to trainings and get involved as much as they want to, just a great group of people volunteering their time. We had two members start on the support company and really wanted to get certified as Emergency Responders to help on EMS calls and they both just passed and got their State Licenses – Great Work!!

Please feel free to come down and visit anytime the door is always open.

JOSIAH CARPENTER LIBRARY

The library is finally seeing things returning to normal from the pandemic and foot traffic has increased 47% over last year. Our programs are back in full-swing and new programs have been added as well. We continue to communicate and collaborate with other community organizations and look forward to more feedback in order to better serve Pittsfield citizens.



As part of Winterfest, a PJ story hour was held at the library. Old Home Day brought an opportunity to showcase youth art in a contest featuring one lucky artist's work on a recycled mural that community members worked on at the Old Home Day event as well as Balloon Rally. To celebrate the 40th Balloon Rally, trustees offered a cupcake eating contest.

The community came together once again for the Pittsfield Celebrates-Homecoming Event in Dustin's Park in September where a Panther Pride craft was made at the library booth. We were fortunate to have another weekend of beautiful weather for the Harvest Fest event at the town beach where we offered a fall scarecrow craft project to the youth. During the town's Annual

Christmas Tree Lighting, 90 individuals joined us at the library to hear holiday stories, sip hot cocoa, enjoy cookies and to check out our large Christmas village display.

Over the course of the year, we introduced 7 new StoryWalks to Pittsfield. We thank all of the businesses who have supported this literacy and movement project. A new partnership with Head Start has allowed us to continue laminating these book pages and offering the program regularly.

After numerous requests, a teen book club as well as a Mead and Read adult book club were formed. The Summer Reading Program had a large increase of participation this year, especially with our teen patrons. We continue to promote the JCL Birthday Club and currently have over 175 members.

In the fall, our children's librarian brought back the ever-popular puppet show. The members of the afterschool Adventure Club made puppets, back drops and practiced their lines throughout the entire month of November. The show was held at the PMHS Lecture hall with over 70 folks in attendance. The stories of Three Billy Goats Gruff and The Gingerbread Man were acted out by the students and a question and answer/interview session concluded the event.





Teens have been visiting the library and spending time in the newly upgraded teen space. We've added yoga mats and card/board games to the area as well as coloring sheets and take and make art projects. New charging stations, with various cords to accommodate vast electronics were also added.

JCL was pleased to be the recipient of the Dollar General Grant, which added \$2500 to our summer planning budget. Many new children's and teen books were purchased, supplies for programs were bought, raffle baskets were organized and

awarded. Extra staff hours were also covered from this grant to assist with summer programs. A family ice cream social and swimming party closed out the summer fun in August.

We were also the recipient of a 2022/2023 Clif Grant. The grant included a total of \$2500 in new books for JCL and PES Libraries. Local author, Marty Kelley visited PES students and all preschool-aged attendees received free books. Another author visit is anticipated for Spring of 2023 with free books for all elementary school-aged attendees.

JCL also expended funds for the Library of Things, which was a joint initiative with Northwood, Epsom, and Pembroke through round two AARPA Grant. The Library of Things has added various new items to the collection- including a laminator, disc golf sets, gardening tools, tennis racquets, an ice cream maker, a digital frame, and a season pass for Squam Lake Science Center.



The basement continues to have issues with water coming in and the damage was excessive during a December storm. The downstairs space has been temporarily closed until progress can be made to rectify the damage. We continue to work with the Board of Selectmen to make a plan for the future re-opening of the downstairs space.

We do continue to offer curbside pick-up as well as delivery for those who may need it. Many thanks to all the citizens of Pittsfield for your continuous support. We are always open to new ideas for activities or programs; let us know your ideas and we'll work with you to make them happen.

PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board started the year by continuing to review and modify the town's Land Use Regulations. This has been a time-consuming project for the Board. The Planning Board recognizes that the need of a document that contains the information needed for the applicant, but also for the ease of understanding what is being required by the applicant.

The Board, along with K&M Developers, was able to secure the Open Space agreement for the Bailey Park Development (Bailey Drive) on Laconia Road. In doing so, this has allowed ten new homes to be built and the completion of the development to be finished. K&M Developers came before the Board to amend the original decision of the 1,008 sq. ft. maximum building footprint and to allow garages and decks to be excluded in the calculation of the 1,008 sq. ft. building footprint for the properties located in the Bailey Park subdivision. After reviewing and discussing the request, the Board voted to amend the Bailey Park Subdivision plan.

In March, Vertex Tower Assets, LLC came before the Board with an application for a telecommunications tower to be located at Map R21 Lot 12, DEMES Investments, LLC (Maxfield's Hardware), on Upper City Rd. The application was for the tower to be a lattice style tower at a 150' to be located on the behind the store. The Board held a hearing and heard concerns from the abutters. After taking into consideration of the opposition of the abutters, the Board denied the application. This decision was challenged by Vertex Tower Assets, LLC. Vertex offered a settlement, with modifications to the plan. The Board reviewed and had a discussion, and the settlement was approved by the Board.

The Planning Board held public hearings on two applications for lot line adjustments and one minor subdivision. These applications were heard and went relatively smooth for the applicants and the Board.

Over The Moon Farmstead came before the Board with a Site Plan application for an indoor tasting area and restaurant. This would be an improvement on the property which was previously approved for an outdoor tasting area with an indoor ordering counter and gift shop within the barn. The Board welcomes this new addition to town and wishes success to the business.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

2022 was a good year for the Pittsfield Police Department as we saw the return of many of our community events that had been derailed for several years by the Covid-19 pandemic. It was great to see the return of the Pittsfield Rotary's Hot Air Balloon Rally, our Old Home Day Celebration, and many more events throughout the year.

In April, two of our officers were recognized with a meritorious service/life-saving award for their actions at a major fire on Depot Street. Officer Trent Rodrigues and Corporal Justin Worthley played a critical role in getting residents out of the building safely and protecting surrounding properties from becoming involved in the fire. I want to thank these officers for their selfless service to the citizens of Pittsfield. Also in April, officers Wyatt Gulliver and Trent Rodrigues both completed their field training and were added to the schedule to work as solo officers. Corporal Justin Worthley left the department to open his own business as a car mechanic. We wish Justin well in his new business and hope he is successful. Our staffing level has improved over the last couple of years, and we currently only have one full time opening left to fill. The goal for the department is to have our positions filled by the end of 2023.

The Department provided security and traffic control for the Tour of the Relics of St. Bernadette, of which Pittsfield was one of the select locations of this once-in-a-lifetime nationwide tour. The Our Lady of our Lourdes parish on River Road was the host of the tour and it was a three-day event held in May. The event was a success and went off without any issues or major disruptions to the town.

In June, officer Justin Bishop returned from his 16-month deployment in Africa and resumed working full time. Officer Bishop volunteered to go to the firearms instructor course and is currently the department firearms instructor. We are glad to have officer Bishop back and patrolling the streets of Pittsfield! In November we hired full time officer Seth Guyer who started the full-time police academy in January 2023. We also added part time officer Donald Bolduc who is part time certified and started his field training beginning in January 2023.

The Pittsfield Police Department provided security and parking enforcement for the return of the annual Hot Air Balloon Rally. The weather was very hot that weekend, but the event was a success and went well. We also participated in many of our community events like the Old Home Day Celebration, Community Night Out, Trunk or Treat, Halloween, Tree Lighting, Breakfast with Santa, and several visits to the Senior Center and Pittsfield Youth Workshop. We are also active going in to the elementary and high schools and continuing to build and strengthen our relationships with the youth of Pittsfield and the staff of the Pittsfield School System.

The Pittsfield Police Department continues to build relationships with other agencies and have worked closely this year with the Merrimack County Sheriff's Office, New Hampshire State Police, NH DOC, DCYF, NH Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force, and many of our local departments.

Renovations and improvements continue in the station as we are still finishing the floors and painting the walls as well as upgrading some of our locks and video equipment. We also have finished the conference room and the officers' weight and workout room as well as our temporary evidence storage room.



I want to thank this community for their continued support for this department and the officers who have worked hard to make this department what it is today. We will continue to serve with the best interest of the citizens of Pittsfield as our primary goal. Thank you all and I wish you a safe and healthy 2023.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

January 2022 started off with freezing rain which froze instantly on the road surfaces. The crew worked hard on chaining up the trucks and treating the roads as quickly as possible. There were four more snow events totaling two feet of snow.

February started very similar with another ice event. The crew once again chained up and treated the town as quickly and safely as possible. The town saw three more snow events totaling approximately a foot and a half of snow.

There were four more snow storms in March totaling just over a foot. We saw five ice storms in the winter of 2022 and roughly five feet of snow for the season. The roads got posted for the month of March. The crew spread gravel and stone on muddy sections and cut brush on days when the weather was good. The town received its new backhoe at the end of March.

April started out with catch basin cleaning, street sweeping, ditching, and grading roads. The town loader had a mechanical issue in the transmission which was covered by warranty, but took two months to repair. The timing of the new backhoe worked out well because it was used heavily during grading and ditching season.

In May we finished up grading and replaced a large culvert on Will Smith Road that had failed over the winter. We also started roadside mowing to get a jump on the growing season.

The crew continued to overhead cut trees. Parking spaces and crosswalks downtown got striped In June. Summer construction commenced with Franklin Street and Park Street getting reclaimed and repaved. The sidewalks were rebuilt on Park Street, as well.

Towards the end of summer crack sealing was done and the crew continued on roadside mowing and overhead cutting. Shaun Waites resigned to pursue a different career. The crew wishes him well and all feel he was a great asset during his short tenure.

Fall started off well with the town receiving extra highway grant money which was used to pave Beudet Lane and Kaime Road. Trees were cut on Dowboro Road. The crew also replaced a failed culvert on Eaton Road and a large culvert replacement got started on Dowboro Road.

The town welcomed Dakota Meiers for the open operator position. The roads got lined striped and the box culvert on Dowboro with guardrails was completed.

The crew finished up ditching and grading roads in early November. We saw our first snow storm on November 16th to warm the gear up.

December started off mild and gave the crew time to work on equipment and do some shop repairs. We saw two snow events totaling just over a foot of snow.

The year ended with a two-day wind and rain storm just before Christmas. The crew along with all departments worked 48 hours with little rest removing trees and fixing washouts.

I can't thank the crew enough for their hard work during that storm. This is nothing new, they do this throughout the year. I am sincerely thankful for their dedication.

WELFARE DEPARTMENT

2022 has been a repeat of 2021 for the Welfare Department.

The Emergency Rental Assistance Program continued from January to the end of October. This program provided funding to those renting in NH to help with rental payments, utility payments, and internet connection for those who qualified.

New Hampshire Housing Finance Authority continued its program for the NH Homeowner Assistance Fund. This funding helps homeowners struggling to stay in their homes who have been impacted by Covid-19 and it helps with mortgage payments, property taxes, utilities, homeowner fees, and insurance payments for those who qualify. There have been a few homeowners taking advantage of this program and hopefully, more homeowners apply before the program runs out of funding.

The largest impact on the budget this year was again the increase in requests for burial assistance and help with heating fuel prior to the Fuel Assistance Program funds being released. Housing inquiries and homelessness continue to be the biggest requests this department receives.

A Message from the District Committee

Overall, 2022 was a good year at BCEP. Tonnages and pricing for recyclables remained strong through the first two quarters. We saw a significant downturn in recycling markets for the second part of the year, mainly with the fibers (paper & cardboard). The District was able to minimize revenue losses by producing a quality product whereby we were able to receive better than market pricing. Thanks to our processing guidelines followed by the employees and the patrons doing their part as well. Thank you to the public for your recycling efforts, this helps offset monies spent on tipping fees. Also a big Thank you to the Staff at BCEP for their hard work.

The District's Skidsteer started to be plagued with repair problems which continued into the second quarter. The committee consensus was that it was time to replace the aging Skidsteer and voted to utilize the monies from the Capital Reserve Fund. BCEP was able to obtain a \$5,000.00 grant, from New Hampshire The Beautiful, towards the purchase of the new Skidsteer.

The District finally received its new Oil Filter Crusher in December. Due to supply chain issues this piece of equipment took 1-1/2 years from purchase to delivery! We are seeking an Oil Grant for this filter crusher through New Hampshire DES's "Used Oil Grant Fund" in the amount of \$2,500.00.

The District Committee meets the last Thursday of each month at the District Facility at 6:00 PM. The November meeting is usually the Thursday before Thanksgiving, while the December Meeting is posted at the Town Offices of the District, The Concord Monitor, and the Pittsfield Post.

CAPITAL AREA MUTUAL AID FIRE COMPACT

2022 ANNUAL REPORT TO BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The 2022 annual report is prepared for the Board of Directors of the Capital Area Mutual Aid Fire Compact as a summary of general activities and events occurring through December 31, 2022. It is also provided to the Town offices of the Compact's member communities for information and distribution as desired.

The Compact now serves 24 communities in 4 counties. The Compact's operational area is 877 square miles with a resident population of 147,782. The Equalized Property Valuation in the area we protect is over 21.7 billion dollars. We also provide and receive mutual aid responses with communities beyond our member area.

The Compact provides 24/7 emergency dispatch service to member communities. This service is contracted with the City of Concord Fire Department's Communications Center under the direction of dispatch supervisor Captain Elisa Folsom. During 2022 Captain Folsom was promoted to Deputy Chief. The Dispatch supervisor position remains unfilled at the end of 2022. Congratulations to Deputy Chief Folsom!

At the end of 2021 our second attempt at replacing our Computer Aided Dispatch software (CAD) stalled when the vendor announced that they were unable to deliver us a working CAD and that they were suspending any further development of their product. We began 2022 with another search for a CAD vendor that can meet our needs. After reviewing proposals from several vendors, we selected Tyler Technologies.

At the June 18, 2022 Compact meeting the board voted to contract with Tyler Technologies and to expend up to \$160,797.00 from the General fund to pay the initial costs associated with the CAD purchase. We have been working with the vendor since that vote and anticipate having the new CAD in service during the fall of 2023. During 2022 we received \$72,085.69 in settlement fees from the two CAD companies who failed to deliver a working CAD software program to us.

The 2022 Compact operating budget was \$ 1,373,643. Funding for all Compact operations is provided by the member communities. We continue to apply for State and Federal Grant Funds when possible.

During 2018 we received a Homeland Security Grant in the amount of \$387,415.00 to replace the existing dispatch console equipment. Work on that extended into the final weeks of 2021, due to delays caused by the pandemic. This grant funded project is now complete and we received final reimbursement from the State during 2022.

The Compact and Hazmat Team have received over 3.65 million dollars in grant funding since 1999. These funds have been used for communications improvements, training and equipment. The direct benefit that your community has realized from these grants is made possible by your participation in the regional service that we provide.

During 2021 efforts were made to secure funding for a Class B foam response unit and a supply of Class B foam for all Compact fire agencies. This would improve our ability to respond to flammable liquid fires. It would replace the legacy Class B foam that many agencies had. That foam has been determined to be an environmental and health hazard. The Compact applied for Directed Funding from the Federal Government through Senator Shaheen's office. We were not successful in acquiring those funds. A grant application was made to the 2022 Homeland SHSP program. We were prospectively awarded \$162,398.00 for this project during June of 2022. We just received the final approval process from the State so we can begin the process to expend these funds.

As Chief Coordinator, I responded to 642 incidents, a 5% increase over 2021. In addition to responding to provide command post assistance at those mutual aid incidents, I also aid all departments with response planning, updating addressing information, and I represent the Compact with several organizations related to public safety.

The Training Committee was reconstituted in 2022 after several years on hold due to the pandemic. The committee has many new members and has added an EMS subcommittee. They presented one quarterly training Compact wide and have been working to find a solution to the lack of Firefighter 1 training courses available to our communities.

The Central New Hampshire Hazmat Team represents 59 Capital Area and Lakes Region communities and is ready to assist or respond to hazardous materials incidents in our combined areas. The Team responded to 11 hazmat incidents during 2022.

All departments are encouraged to send representation to all Compact meetings. Your input is needed. The Compact was created for the mutual benefit of member communities and active participation is a necessity to ensure the needs of all are being met.

Established in accordance with state law, the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission (CNHRPC) is a voluntary association of 20 communities in Merrimack and Hillsborough Counties.

CNHRPC's mission is to comply with State statute (RSA 36:47) by preparing and adopting regional land use and transportation plans and a regional housing needs assessment. CNHRPC evaluates developments of regional impact (RSA 36:54-58) and provides data, information, training, and high-quality, cost-effective services to our member communities. CNHRPC also provides technical assistance services, including zoning ordinance development, grant writing assistance, circuit rider assistance, plan review services, local master plan development, capital improvements program development and guidance, hazard mitigation planning guidance, and Planning Board process training. CNHRPC advocates for member communities and assists and encourages them in both municipal and regional endeavors.

In 2022, CNHRPC undertook the following activities in Pittsfield and throughout the Central NH Region:

- Staff provided local technical assistance and plan review assistance as requested.
- Continued the development of the Regional Housing Needs Assessment in coordination with the NH Office of Planning and Development and the other eight NH regional planning commissions.
- Assisted in the development of Hazard Mitigation Plans in five communities (including Pittsfield) under the Building Infrastructure and Resilient Communities (BRIC) 2020 program and provided continued hazard mitigation plan implementation assistance in communities throughout the region.
- Coordinated the activities of the CNHRPC Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC). In 2022, CNHRPC held five TAC meetings. The CNHRPC TAC solicited projects for the NHDOT 2025-2034 Ten Year Plan, and received and ranked project submittals for possible inclusion in the Ten Year Plan.
- Participated in a range of regional and statewide bicycle and pedestrian planning activities related to trails, sidewalks, bike lanes and bike shoulders, roadway surfacing, and safety. Assistance to local trail organizations and trail committees is a key component to this work.
- Provided coordination assistance to the CommuteSmart NH program that works to support transportation demand management services and rideshare coordination across the state utilizing Agile Mile transportation demand management (TDM) software.
- Conducted over 240 state and local traffic counts throughout the region. In Pittsfield, staff completed 17 counts in 2022.
- Continued to work with communities on Natural Resource Inventory (NRI) development. Tasks include the identification and mapping of natural resources and the development of methods to overlay and quantify the relative value of natural resources in the community. Interactive online StoryMaps were developed to communicate results.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

This year was another year where we observed wet weather in early spring followed by rapid drying and drought conditions which extended through the summer for much of the state. Drying conditions in early May led to large fire growth on numerous fires which required multiple days to extinguish and firefighter response from local, state, and federal agencies. Wildfire activity continued through the summer months where dry conditions led to more multi-day fires. Fires burned deep into the ground, requiring firefighters to establish water supplies and to spend days digging out all the hot spots.

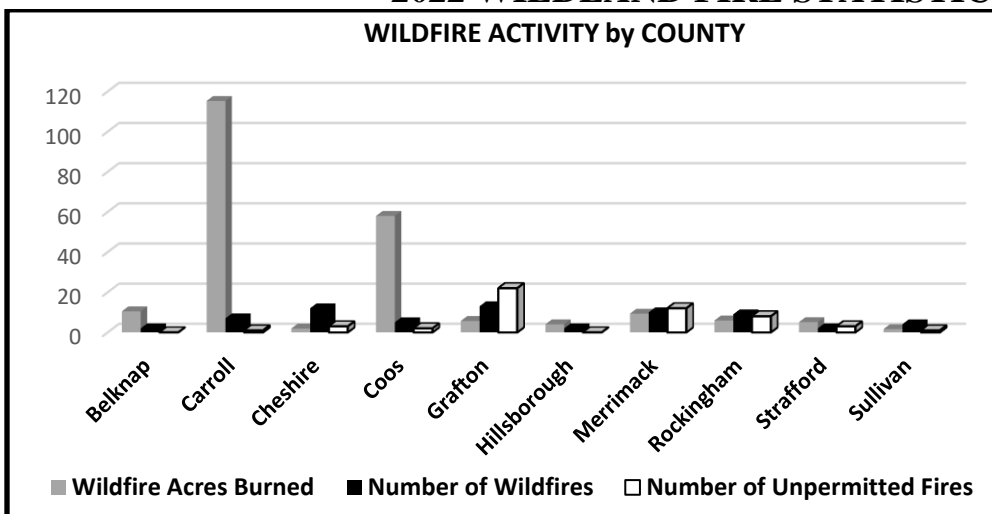
This fall we had multiple fires started by the careless disposal of woodstove ashes. Before dumping your woodstove ashes, you should place them in a covered metal container until they are out cold. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Every year New Hampshire sees fires which threaten or destroy structures, a constant reminder that wildfires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildfire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department, and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

The long-lasting drought effects in Rockingham County are showing some minor signs of improvement but a good portion of Rockingham County remains in moderate drought and much of the state is still in the abnormally dry category. While the drought conditions have improved, we expect some areas of the state may still be experiencing abnormally dry or drought conditions this spring. For this reason, we ask everyone to remember Smokey's message about personal responsibility and follow his ABC's: **Always Be Careful** with fire. If you start a fire, put it out when you are done. **"Remember, Only You Can Prevent Wildfires!"**

As we prepare for the 2023 fire season, please remember to contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a fire permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. Fire permits are also available online in most towns and may be obtained by visiting www.NHfirepermit.com. The burning of household waste is prohibited by the Air Resources Division of the Department of Environmental Services. You are encouraged to contact the local fire department for more information. Safe open burning requires your diligence and responsibility. Thank you for helping us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. UNH COOPERATIVE EXTENSION MERRIMACK COUNTY

UNH Cooperative Extension serves residents in each of Merrimack County's 27 towns with diverse programming through 4-H Education & Youth Development, Health & Well-Being, Nutrition Connections, Food & Agriculture, Community & Economic Development, Natural Resources and Dairy. Extension is the public outreach arm of the University of New Hampshire, bringing information and education into NH's towns, helping to make individuals, businesses, and communities more successful and keeping NH's natural resources healthy and productive.

Food & Agriculture: We support the county's agricultural industries, including producers of fruits, vegetables, ornamental plants, and livestock, through workshops and trainings, diagnostic services, applied research, and one-on-one consultations. In 2022, 1100 individuals participated in programs focused on food and agriculture production, 430 individuals received one-on-one consultation through email and phone conversations, and 120 farm visits were conducted, during which recommendations were tailored towards the individual educational needs of the client. A total of 320 soil tests were reviewed and approved, optimizing soil fertility practices, and maximizing production on sites throughout the county. UNH Extension in Merrimack County has led the Vegetable and Fruit Integrated Pest Management program for the past two seasons. This program monitors vegetable and fruit pests on 15 farms and provides recommendations for best management practices. In 2021, the program saved producers an estimated \$425,000 in value of reduced crop loss due to optimal pest control practices combined with reduced costs associated with fewer pesticide applications, labor costs and fuel consumption.

The State Dairy Specialist position has been filled after a 3-year vacancy. The office has been moved from its traditional location (Grafton County) to Merrimack County. Sarah Allen started November 14, 2022, and is now more centrally located in the state to serve the dairy producers and be involved in policy development.

Natural Resources: Our natural resources team provides research, education, and stewardship throughout the state with a "boots on the ground" approach, extending state-wide programs in forestry and wildlife, natural resource development, land and water conservation, and marine fisheries. This year, 1,398 Merrimack County residents received one-on-one education from woodlot visits, educational events, telephone calls, and email correspondence. At least 758 County residents participated in-person, outdoors, educational events: Tree Farm Field Days, Tree Id Walks, Invasive Plant Control workshops, Wildlife Habitat field tours, Forest Health workshops, and Forest Ecology Field Tours for Middle School Science Classes. This year's educational offerings were augmented by a wide variety of virtual meetings and Facebook Live webinars (<https://www.facebook.com/nhwoods.org>) to comply with the COVID-19 restrictions and to provide residents with virtual learning opportunities. This year, there were 400 Volunteers who worked with UNH Extension in Merrimack County helping to conserve and manage its natural resources. The Volunteers participated in the Natural Resource Stewards program, the Coverts Project, Nature Groupie, the NH Big Tree Program, and the Lakes Lay Monitoring Program. Community and Economic Development (CED): The CED team provides programming and technical assistance to communities, businesses, and nonprofit organizations around New Hampshire. The CED team's work focuses on revitalizing main streets, retaining and growing local businesses, supporting entrepreneurs and innovators, improving quality of life, and leveraging tourism and the recreation economy. Central to the CED team's work is engaging individuals from throughout the community in developing a vision, designing an approach, and moving to action. The Merrimack County CED role transitioned to a new staff person in mid-2022

who has taken lead on a variety of projects that have begun throughout the county. Support is continuing for the Northfield-based Foothills Foundation, an organization that plans to make the area a hub for recreation access and economic development through collaboration, promotion, and trail building. Additional work and engagement is starting in Hopkinton/Contoocook Village to provide support and programming surrounding business and engagement and retention, with additional work to assess recreational resources and downtown vibrancy. The Merrimack County CED is also supporting community programming surrounding housing and broadband and is developing a County-wide needs assessment where stakeholder engagement and from all communities throughout the county will be incorporated.

Education and 4-H Youth Development: 4-H is the youth educational program of UNH Cooperative Extension that provides youth the opportunity to engage in hands-on learning opportunities that spark their passion for life after 4-H, while learning important life skills such as communication and leadership. Programming is delivered utilizing 4-H volunteers that involve youth in the learning process through youth-adult partnerships. Coming out of the COVID-19 pandemic, Merrimack County 4-H members were able to participate in a variety of program opportunities. A highlight for many is the annual Hopkinton State Fair. Sixty-three 4-H members submitted items to the Ruth Kimball 4-H Exhibit Hall to display their projects from throughout the course of the 4-H year. Over 100 4-H members exhibited their animals at the fair and helped to educate the public about agriculture. To close out the 2021-2022 program year, Merrimack County involved 310 youth and 122 volunteers.

Nutrition Connections is a no-cost, hands-on nutrition and physical education program that provides limited-resource families the knowledge and skills needed for better health. In Merrimack County, Nutrition Connections provided programming to youth in schools around making healthy food choices and eating fruits and vegetables. Nutrition Connections partnered with local agencies and housing sites to reach adults and families, covering topics like reading food labels, preparing low-cost meals and snacks, saving money at the grocery store, choosy eaters, and more.

Health & Well-being: Provides information, programs and training grounded in research to help young people and their families succeed and thrive, such as Youth and Adult Mental Health First Aid Training, Chronic Disease, and Chronic Pain Self-Management Programs. We are working collaboratively with schools and public health partners to increase prevention and early intervention for mental health and wellness and substance misuse in communities. Our Merrimack County Field Specialist is serving as Project Director for the NH Opioid Prevention Project, funded by SAMHSA, which is bringing opioid prevention education to audiences across NH.

We would like to thank our Advisory Council that consists of 11 citizens of Merrimack County, and a representative of the County Commissioners office and County Delegation. These advisors assist Extension program staff to evaluate current programming, identify local educational and research needs, and to consider new programming across the county. Our 2021-2022 council members included: Chuck & Diane Souther, Josh Marshall, Tim Meeh, Jill McCullough, Ken Koerber, Mark Cowdrey, Chip Donnelly, Janine Condi, Page Poole, Anya Twarog, Commissioner Stuart Trachy, and Rep.
