

MAYOR'S INAUGURAL ADDRESS

Gentlemen of the City Council:

Today marks the beginning of a new year in the administration of our civic affairs and we are here assembled to fulfill the wishes of the citizens of Somersworth, by accepting, with all of their responsibilities, the respective offices to which we have been elected. For the ninth consecutive year, the voters of this city have most generously conferred upon me the highest office of their municipal government. I sincerely hope that our accomplishments during this coming year will be a satisfactory expression of my appreciation for their most liberal endorsement.

To secure such results as would be in keeping with the great trust reposed in us by a devoted public, it is very essential that we study all problems which may appear before us, unmindful of party spirit, devoid of all sectional divisions, free from all personal differences. I am confident that this will be done and that our achievements during the year will be outstanding. I am doubly assured of this when I realize that this council is made up, for the greater part, of men of experience, well acquainted with the principles which underlie every successful municipal enterprise.

In every city, in every section of our country, the foremost and all-important problem appears to be that of unemployment. Various plans have been proposed to relieve this disastrous situation, but the one most acceptable toward the relief of this civic condition is employment. Better to create jobs than soup lines. It has always been my policy to advocate the practice of economy in every department. I shall continue to follow this policy throughout this coming year, only

it shall be economy of an entirely different nature. It shall be economy governed by the needs of humanity and based upon the most prudent and judicious expenditure of public moneys, which will not only lend aid to the unemployed citizens, now in unfortunate circumstances, but will, at the same time, improve the appearance and the traveling facilities of our city. After a careful study of similar conditions in other cities, I am fully convinced that by concentrating our efforts on the improvement and construction of our roads, we can best solve this momentous problem, carrying with it all of the many dangers which always accompany unemployment. I shall discuss this plan more fully under the department dealing with our Highways.

It is my most sincere hope that you, too, may see the many great advantages to be gained by transforming this theoretical idea into a practical reality. Your advice, your interest in all civic projects, your harmonious co-operation in all municipal measures will commend my appreciation as well as that of those good citizens who have placed the management of their affairs in our custody.

SCHOOLS

The principal object of all public schools is to develop a class of enlightened citizens whose ideal will be the creation of a community in which the highest degree of efficiency and the greatest respect for all laws are paramount. The very life of our city as well as our nation recognizes this type of education as

one of the chief factors in its rapid progress. It is this kind of education which furthers democratic ideas and gives us a pride in our institutions.

From the reports of our state agent to our supervisor of local education, there is no question as to the efficiency of our school system along these lines. The work of our graduates is a criterion of the achievements of our schools and highly compliments the rewarded efforts of a capable superintendent and a talented teaching staff.

LIBRARY

This department, established to provide education as well as pleasure to the public, continues to hold its important position in the lives of our people. The class of books, selected, caters not only to the reader of light fiction but also to the student, interested in subjects of more weight. The Trustees in charge of this department are to be commended for the excellent condition of our reading rooms.

PLAYGROUNDS

Perhaps nothing can do more to improve the health and life of the younger citizens of our community than a well-supervised playground. It is, indeed, a delightful picture to visit our Noble Playgrounds and note the various activities being conducted simultaneously. Here, groups of children shouting over their games, there, grown-ups seriously engaged in tennis, below, amidst howls of delight, men enjoying that well-known national game, baseball; while under the sheltering groves of pines lounge those too tired from their daily labors to further exert themselves, and satisfied to relax in the most beautiful and most restful spot in our city. It is, indeed, such developments as these that tend to advance our youth along such recreational and cultural lines that only a superior community can result.

It would, perhaps, be of advantage to the children and the adults who are engaged in activities in the Playgrounds to have a field house in which they might change their apparel and in which they might accommodate their rivals in sport who come from other cities. I suggest that the old engine house, now located on the High School grounds be moved to the Noble Playgrounds and fitted up for this purpose.

The Trustees deserve our greatest admiration for the part they have played in developing a higher degree of physical and moral interest in our community.

PUBLIC BUILDINGS

Our public buildings are in very fine condition and will require little financial attention this year. Last year, the Chandler School Building and the Library were greatly improved in their appearance by a thorough renovation of their interiors.

The City Hall has undergone decided improvements both on the outside and the inside and now presents an appearance worthy of the position it holds in the city as the headquarters of our municipal offices. The revenue from this building, \$4,503.00, is the largest in the history of the city. It is desirable that this revenue continue and there is little doubt that it shall, just so long as we render satisfactory surroundings to our tenant.

This coming year I have but one recommendation to offer and that is regarding the Burleigh School building. The interior condition of this building is quite the worse for wear and is badly in need of paint. As this can be neglected no longer, I advise that it be done when the time is most convenient.

WATER WORKS

The work of this department continues to merit our highest praise. As in other years, it has trans-

ferred to the city treasurer a creditable surplus. The head of this department deserves our esteem for the continued efficiency of his organization.

According to reports received from the State Laboratory of Hygiene, the analysis of our city water shows it to meet those requirements necessary that it may be used for drinking and domestic purposes.

Very little expenditures were made on this department last year. This year I would recommend the purchase of a new truck. The old one has seen five years of very hard service and is in such a dilapidated condition that repair is out of the question.

I am still of the same opinion as I was last year concerning the superiority of the electrical system over that of the steam system we now employ. Our finances are such, however, that there seems little possibility of this change being made this year. Feeling assured that electrifying the department would save money for the city, I hope that this project will be kept in mind, and that, at the first available opportunity, it be adopted.

FOREST GLADE CEMETERY

The marked improvements throughout the cemetery, under the direction of a very capable and energetic superintendent, reflects great credit on an able Board of Trustees, to whom is intrusted the care and supervision of this department.

During the year, there has been a continuation of the improvements on the pauper section which was begun two years ago. The results are indeed gratifying both from a point of view of finance, as well as of beauty. It is expected that at the end of this year this humane work will have reached its completion, and our cemetery will be one in which there is no disgracefully-neglected section, holding in irreverence, because

of poverty, those who have passed on to that great unknown.

It is pleasing to note the increased interest which is being shown in the Perpetual Care Fund with each successive year. Last year there was an increase of \$1,750.00 in this fund. This year, the sum has been increased \$2,400.00. This is, indeed, encouraging, and leads us to hope that some time in the future this Perpetual Care Fund will cover every grave in the grounds.

The cemetery is still without a suitable rest room and office, which makes it inconvenient for both the superintendent and the visitors to the cemetery. Unquestionably, one will have to be supplied sooner or later. The city finances, however, will not permit its construction this year. It seems to me that here is an opportunity for some citizen, imbued with a keen sense of civic duty, to practice some true philanthropy, and erect a memorial. Such a memorial building would most certainly be appreciated by those interested in the cemetery, and would bestow upon the benefactor their everlasting gratitude.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

This department is without doubt, very close to the public, since to it the everyday citizen looks for protection. By night, as well as by day, the members are always at the service of the people. We should be grateful to these men for the excellent work they have done in the past.

Last year it was necessary to replace the tires on the pumper. Otherwise the equipment of the department needs no attention, as it is in very good condition.

The two unforeseen conflagrations which occurred last year, namely, the one at Hanson's corner and Number 2 Mill, illustrate the utter impossibility of

fixing any definite limit to the expenditures of this department. To safeguard the community and the manufacturer against a re-occurrence of the latter catastrophe, a new fire alarm box has been installed in the office of the Dwight Manufacturing Company.

The only expense that need be incurred in this department during the year will be for the purchase of such supplies as are necessary to enable the department to maintain its high degree of efficiency.

HIGHWAYS AND SIDEWALKS

Throughout the year, especially during the winter months, I have received many favorable comments on the work of this department. The success of this department has been highly commendable. The time is not far distant when this department must be granted an additional plow, if it would continue to give satisfaction to the public and meet the increased demand for clean roads. The equipment is in excellent condition and will need few replacements this coming year. For this reason, whenever our finances permit I shall gladly recommend this purchase.

Last year gravelled roads covered with tarvia were built on the following streets: South, Portland, Pine, Union, Mt. Auburn, Tremont, Central, Depot, Highland, Second, Burke, Downs, Lee, Chesley avenue, and Indigo Hill road from the Boston and Maine railroad crossing to the other side of Lee street. Grand and Hamilton streets have been gravelled and I recommend that they be treated with tarvia this year.

With very few exceptions, the sidewalks throughout the city are in very good condition. I believe they should be kept that way and whenever replacements must be made, that cement be used. In the end, this material is far more economic than tar. During the year, a cement sidewalk was laid on the east side of

High street from Pleasant street to Franklin street. This was the only walk laid during the year.

West Green street, nestled in between Pleasant and Franklin streets has, without question, been neglected. The road and the sidewalks are in a deplorable condition and insofar as all of the surrounding streets have been reconditioned, it seems only fair that the requests of the citizens in this section be granted. I therefore recommend that a gravel road covered with tarvia be laid this coming year and that the sidewalks be replaced with cement walks.

I promised to discuss my plans for the relief of a condition prevalent in our midst, that is due to no social or personal delinquency, but rather to industrial changes. Since those who look to us for assistance are of the class of unemployed who under normal conditions would be engaged in some productive capacity, I am satisfied that the remedy for this condition must be discovered and effected by us. It is one of the responsibilities we are obligated to assume by virtue of the public offices we occupy.

No student of economics will question that spending money with care and wisdom so that adequate returns may be obtained for the money spent is a sound rule, for wise spending is an aid to careful saving and proper investment. Again, municipal wealth must be measured by its supply of commodities that may be used to satisfy human wants. Excepting its use in the fine arts, gold has no value other than its value in securing just such commodities.

At this time we have several roads that must be constructed sooner or later. Materials for this work may now be purchased at as reasonable a price as they ever will be. Our citizens are beginning to feel the effects of our industrial depression. Would it not be sound economy to build these much-needed public high-

ways during this period when we can be of some assistance to the individual as well as to the city? Assuredly, every individual, willing to work, should have a right and opportunity to earn a decent living and not be compelled to rely on charity for an existence.

Holding firmly to this belief, I recommend that we issue highway bonds for this public work up to \$60,000.00, which, with the aid of over \$45,000.00 offered by the State and Federal Government as their proportional shares, will give us over \$105,000.00 to utilize for this project.

Using the money appropriated by the State, I would recommend the construction of a gravel and tarvia road similar to the one known as the Rollinsford road, on Green street from Indigo Hill road to the Dover line. Adding to our State aid that of the Federal Government, I would advise the construction of the trunk line extending from Hanson's corner to High street. From our own funds, I would continue the road recently con-entire length of High and Market streets to the Maine bridge. This road could be built either using a rock bottom bituminus macadam or concrete cement, or structured from the Dover line to Pearl street along the from the use of both. If this plan could be carried out, we would have approximately four and one-half miles of new roads which would need practically no attention for many years. I trust that you will give this plan your most earnest deliberation. Careful consideration on your part will, I am sure, lead you to the same conclusions which I have reached.

CONCLUSION

Gentlemen:

You have listened to my reports on the various departments, in which I have endeavored to show their accomplishments during the past year, and the improvements that might be effected during this coming year.

The industrial situation in our city is such that you must realize the impossibility of any increase in either our valuation or our tax rate this year. This means that every department must accept the same appropriation it received last year, and in the case of some, even less. To carry out our plans for this administration, you can readily see that each departmental head will be called upon to exercise the utmost care in the expenditure of the moneys intrusted to him. It shall be our duty, throughout the year, to sanction no expenditures which, in our opinion, would be disapproved of by our citizens, regardless of our sectional, political or personal feelings in the matter. Each department can meet its obligations and keep well within its appropriation if it will but emulate the work of our tax-collector during the past year. I cite this incident merely to point out to you gentlemen that no task is impossible, if the man in charge is willing to unfetter his energies and attain the goal for which he started.

During the past year, the average of uncollected taxes throughout the state was approximately 11%. In our city it was only 2%. Considering municipal conditions, I am satisfied that our collector acquitted himself with great credit and has set an example that it would be well for all departments to follow throughout this next administration.

For our part, I most earnestly urge you to be ever mindful of the fact that we are but agents of the people of this community, attempting, to the best of our knowledge and ability, to execute their wishes faithfully. With the same harmonious atmosphere which prevailed last year, with the same sincere co-operation, I am sure that at the end of this administration we may transmit this city, greater, better, more beautiful, and more serviceable than it was at the beginning of our term of office, and thus merit the approval of our citizens.

RESOLUTIONS

Somersworth, N. H., March 17, 1931.

Resolved: That the Committee on Finance be and hereby are authorized and empowered to borrow, in anticipation of taxes to meet current expenses, in such amounts and at such times as may be deemed advisable, at the lowest rate of interest obtainable; the sum of all amounts so borrowed not to exceed One Hundred Twenty Thousand Dollars, (\$120,000.00), and that the proper officers of the City be authorized to give the City's note, or notes, therefor. All debts incurred under authority of this resolution are hereby expressly made payable from the taxes of the current municipal year.

Passed March 17, 1931.

Somersworth, N. H., April 7, 1931.

Resolved: That by authority vested in this Committee, under a resolution of the City Council, adopted March 17, 1931, authorizing and empowering said committee to borrow in anticipation of taxes, an amount, or amounts, not to exceed One Hundred and Twenty Thousand Dollars, (\$120,000.00), we hereby award One Hundred Thousand Dollars, (\$100,000.00) of this sum to the National Shawmut Bank of Boston, at 2.75% discount, which is the lowest rate obtainable; said loan to be for nine months, and payable at The National Shawmut Bank at Boston, Mass.; said loan to be payable from the taxes of the current municipal year.

During the past year, we have had the pump on our Triple replaced, and have added two new boxes to our fire alarm system; one box, number three, located at Central Park; and the other box, number six, located at the office entrance of the Dwight Manufacturing Company.

One hundred and nine alarms and calls were answered, two of these being calls for help out of the city.

Permits to burn grass, brush, leaves, etc., have been granted, only when conditions to do so have been favorable.

The woodlands have been kept posted with forest fire warnings, and with notices, closing them during dry spells.

The fire extinguishers in the schools and public buildings are tested and kept charged, and in working condition.

Fire drills are held regularly in the schools, and stores and places of business are inspected, in an effort to wipe out fire hazards.

Recommendation

I wish to bring before your honorable body the purchasing of an additional light piece of apparatus for this department. On two occasions, during the past year, we were called upon to render assistance to our neighbors; and on each occasion, it was necessary for us to engage motor aid outside of our department. We would also be greatly handicapped in our own city, with more than one alarm to respond to, under present conditions. The better fire protection a community has the better rate of insurance is secured.

I trust you will give this matter serious consideration.

I thank all who have in any way rendered assistance to this department during the year.

General Rules

Firemen as well as citizens should familiarize themselves with the following rules for giving alarms of fire.

1. Never pull a box for a fire seen at a distance.
2. Never pull a box while the alarm bells are ringing, not until a box has completed its four rounds. Two boxes cannot operate together, and neither will work if two are pulled at the same time. Never pull two alarms of two boxes for the same fire.
3. To ring in an alarm, break the glass in the key-box and open the outside door with the key. Pull down the brass crank seen inside, till it stops, then let go. Then let the box alone. The clock will be seen or heard to be running, and the alarm will follow in half a minute or so. Close the door, but do not try to remove the key, as it is locked in track lock and can only be removed by a release key, which is carried by each engineer, who will, as soon as convenient, release and return it. Remember that the firemen will come directly to the box which has been pulled, and be sure that someone stays at the box to direct them to the fire.
4. Never pull an alarm for a fire seen at a distance. Never touch a box except to give an alarm of fire. Give an alarm for no cause other than actual fire. Don't give an alarm for a chimney fire.

The expenditures in maintaining the cemetery grounds the past year show an increase of approximately \$19.55 over the year of 1930, an increase of \$2.78 for labor and \$16.77 for supplies. The amount expended on Perpetual Care lots is \$1,777.49, of which we received from the Trust Fund \$1,635.54, a decrease of \$113.83 from the previous year. The Trust Fund principal was increased by the sum of \$1,200, which includes seven new lots, and an increase on five in-

dividual lots which have not had the necessary amount to insure the proper care.

A plan has been accepted and work started on resurfacing of neglected lots where it has been impossible to locate anyone interested. This work has been started on the front avenue and will continue throughout the cemetery as time and funds will permit. The amount expended on these lots to date amounts to \$265, and a record is kept of the amount expended on each individual lot.

The past year the lots have been given the same amount of care as the previous year, the urns, Perpetual Care markers, and G. A. R. markers have all been repainted, also the main fence. We have had the lowering device replated and purchased a new set of artificial grass for funeral work. A California privet hedge has been set on both sides of the main entrance and shrubbery and climbing vines at three of the well houses.

The following improvements should be made as soon as funds are available. The work on the neglected lots, extension of the water system, resurfacing of both sides of the main entrance, and additional trees and shrubs which would greatly beautify the front of the cemetery, also a suitable rest room and office.

Notices have been forwarded to lot owners in regards to the expenditures on Perpetual Care and neglected lots and the maintenance of the cemetery in general.

I wish to thank the Board of Trustees and all those who have assisted me the past year.

To the Board of Water Commissioners:

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending February 29, 1932.

The buildings and machinery at the pumping station are in good order. The pumps are in good mechanical condition, and minor repairs have been made to the boiler setting as recommended by boiler inspectors who made periodical inspections during the year.

The filter bed was cleaned at various periods to insure the proper filtration and sand was added whenever it was found necessary so to do.

The stand pipe did not develop any serious leaks during the year, but I would recommend that it be brushed, calked, and painted before another year.

There were several minor leaks in the distribution lines and service lines. The service lines were changed before the reconstruction of the roads on High street, West High street, and West Green street.

The hydrants were flushed at various intervals during the summer, especially at the dead ends of the system.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE
SOMERSWORTH PUBLIC SCHOOLS

*To the Honorable Board of Education of the City of
Somersworth:*

This is the fourth report which I have had the honor to make. As usual it is accompanied by the reports of the several high school department heads, the Supervisor of Drawing and the Headmaster. The report of the School Nurse is of more than passing interest because of the good work done in the hearing test. It is to be hoped that all parents receiving notices of defective hearing will have their children examined by a competent specialist. You will note from the report of the nurse that we have had no epidemics of any kind and not a case of diphtheria has been reported among the public school children who took part in the Toxin-Anti-Toxin Clinic of over a year ago. There have been isolated cases of chicken pox and measles. The Free Milk Fund has been replenished by the proceeds of the George Washington Bicentennial entertainment. No one thing that the superintendent has engineered since his coming to you has given him greater satisfaction than that affair. There was splendid cooperation on the part of the teachers, and without a murmur they did the work required in music. We missed music from the High School and this we would have had in abundance if we had had an orchestral leader connected with the schools. The one-act play of the High School was a credit to the authors and actors. There were 125 pupils taking part in the elementary school program and all the other pupils had a share in the making of programs, posters, etc.

The High School also took part in a one-act play writing contest with thirty other schools of the State.

Two teams of three pupils each, seniors, one team in French and one in Chemistry, took part in the "Battle of Brains" at Plymouth Normal School. The Chemistry team finished fourth with nine schools competing. The French team was in competition with thirteen other schools.

Headmaster Uniack's report should also be read by all parents, whether or not they contemplate further education for their children.

Last year the New Bolenius Course in reading was introduced into one first grade and this year it was introduced into the other. Next year we contemplate an introduction into the second grade. New Arithmetics, "The New Day," published by the Chas. E. Merrill Company, have been introduced into all of the elementary grades. They were selected by a committee of the teachers and superintendent and are giving excellent satisfaction.

Testing procedures this year have been confined to the Otis Intelligence tests in the High School and Grade 8, the O'Rourke Reading Tests and the Lippincott Spelling Tests. As last year, the tests have been followed by remedial work on the part of the teachers and their use justified. Standard graduation examinations have been used in Grade 8. This was done to eliminate as far as possible the subjective phase of examinations in finding out whether or not the pupils had attained a satisfactory mastery of the subjects studied. The examinations proved conclusively that our work is being done well and few schools exceeded the marks made in language usage and grammar. We do not allow these tests to set our standard for graduation but all who passed them were admitted to high school.

Monthly meetings of the teachers have been held and the subjects of the State Elementary Program of Stud-

ies not discussed last year have received attention this year.

Mr. Archie L. Jacques has furnished graham crackers for lunch at practically cost and we have averaged using thirty pounds per week during the winter months. Many pupils have purchased them who did not procure the milk. Our representatives and senators in Congress sent pictures of George Washington to each school and all of them have been framed and at no expense to the City. The Manual Training boys framed a majority of them, using frames furnished from attics and homes by friends of the schools. The Women's Club planted a maple tree on the grounds of the Burleigh School. This was done with appropriate ceremonies on the part of the pupils.

The inserted table of attendance is up to date and will show the distribution of our enrollment. Last fall the entering class in the high school numbered 52 and 41 finished the year. The classes in Algebra and English the first year are now so large that two sections must be made in each subject.

Miss Evelyn Bonett of the eighth grade brought honor on her school and herself by winning the First State Prize by her essay on Wild Flower Conservation. Many of you have had the privilege of reading her essay as published in the Free Press. Miss Bonett was in the Junior High School division and so competed with the regular organized Junior High Schools.

Electric lights were installed in the Burleigh School last summer and have helped wonderfully on dark days. The windows were made tight by the insertion of weather strips but the depression has caused the major part of the repairs contemplated this year to be postponed. The "dirt of depression" must remain with us a while longer.

No changes in the teaching force were made and the machinery of the schools has run smoothly. In

athletics we have not had winning teams, and they were not anticipated. The teams we did have, however, made a creditable showing. The foundation for better teams is being laid.

The superintendent attended the summer school at the University of New Hampshire in 1931 and found it enjoyable as well as profitable. More of our teachers should avail themselves of the opportunity to attend this fine school so near our doors. I recommend that whenever we are again in a financial position to grant increases in salary that it be stipulated that to obtain increases beyond a minimum that summer school be periodically attended.

The depression has not as yet hurt the morale or the efficiency of our schools, but I fear for the future. Ours is a business which must go on. Time lost or subjects curtailed now can never be made up. We must see to it that the present generation receive as good schooling as those of the past ten years.

Charles H. Judd, Dean of the School of Education, University of Chicago, is regarded by many as one of the few great educators of the day. It was he who gave the key note speech at the meeting of the Department of Superintendence of the National Education Association in Washington, D. C., in February, which it was my privilege to attend, and from his speech I quote: "There has been some disposition in times past to think of schools as detached institutions. Leaders in commercial, industrial and political life have seldom considered it to be important for them to spend time and energy in improving schools. School people have too often looked upon business and politics as subjects entirely outside the circle of their interests. The economic crisis has made us all aware in a new and vivid way that schools are a part of the general social order and that the curriculums of schools

and their methods of dealing with pupils are largely determined by living conditions outside the schools.

“Go, if you will, today with the youth who has completed the curriculum of an elementary or secondary school, or, for that matter, of a college, and see him in the market place or at the door of the shop offering his services. See him ask for a place in the world of productive labor. You know how his application is received. More than five million young people were added to the school population of the United States during the decade from 1920 to 1930. Each decade from 1880 to the present, the population of our high schools has doubled. Since 1900 the population of institutions of higher education has increased fourfold—from 285,000 to more than 1,200,000. This social migration is not due to the caprice of youth. Great fundamental forces have been operating in American society. Those forces originated in an industrial system which has substituted machines for human hands and has become so complex and exacting that it no longer desires the labor of young people.

“I am filled with resentment when I hear the criticisms of those who say that the American schools are failures. They are the smug exploiters of society who have been driving communities to the brink of ruin by their greed and self-seeking. They have refused to adopt new taxing systems. They have refused to study social movements. They have been parsimonious with the schools and they have had the effrontery to pass adverse judgment on the experiments which the schools have been trying.

“Very little imagination is required to frame an accurate picture of what has been happening. A short generation ago the upper grades of the elementary school and the whole high school were attended by limited numbers of pupils, all of whom were seeking

the same kind of education. The majority of the young people of the country were leaving the schools before they reached the seventh grade and were finding their places in industry. The community found it comparatively easy to support schools because the attendance was small, especially at the upper levels.

“Then came the change, not primarily in the schools but primarily in the industrial and social systems. Great numbers of pupils of an entirely new type were sent to school. Teachers were called on to conduct classes made up of young people who had no slightest interest in the traditional subjects.

“Society, be it repeated, made no adequate provision for the reception in the schools of the young people whom it crowded into those institutions. It was the teachers who met the situation, not the industrial system. The high schools of 1890 taught nine subjects whereas the high schools of today include in their programs as many as two hundred and fifty subjects. It is no wonder that some of the new courses are open to criticism. They are emergency measures intended to provide for young people who have been pushed out of industry. Even the elementary grades have been obliged to change the content of their courses in the effort to keep pupils interested and alert. The institutions of higher education have expanded their curriculums to include commerce and forestry, agriculture and engineering, and other lines of information and training wholly absent from their programs of a generation ago.”

I wish that I had room to quote this speech in full, but for economies sake I make my report short. Sufficient to say in closing that while every effort will be made the coming year to reduce still further a minimum budget we shall all strive to maintain standards in order that later those under our charge may not

point at us the finger of scorn "Ye did it not unto the least of one of these little ones."

We acknowledge with gratitude the support of the School Board and the cooperation of the teachers.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

As in the past when it was the purpose of these reports to bring to the attention of the public certain phases of our school work, so this year we would like to enlarge upon the changing status of secondary schools and the liberal view which is taken of their functions both by educators and parents.

Since a school's contacts are as varied, and its problems almost as numerous, as its individual members, it is no longer possible to say definitely that the sole purpose of the school is to prepare its students for college. On the other hand neither can we say that its sole duty is to prepare for a higher type of citizenship or, by vocational training, enable our young people to earn for themselves a better and a more desirable living. Each purpose, considered in itself, is quite commendable, but our schools, like other public enterprises, have sprung from a public demand and, as the nature of these demands change, the schools must change with them.

In recent years these changes consist largely in a drift away from the old concept that high schools were established purely for college preparatory purposes. At present there is a feeling that our schools should now be motivated by a distinct effort which is purposed by a desire to enable our graduates to live life more abundantly and to instil in them a deeper and more lasting knowledge of their duties to society. This trend having over-shadowed, to some extent, our college preparatory work, we find, each succeeding year, that those with a natural aptitude for scholarship coupled with a will to work are the only ones who can,

and should, qualify for entrance to college or university. Success in any school so far as college preparation is concerned pre-supposes a certain amount of native ability, more than average skill in fundamentals and above all else a keen desire to learn. Anyone with less than these three factors is almost certain to meet with disappointment if, at the close of the secondary school career, they should attempt to enter college.

We find it necessary to dwell at some length upon this subject because of the more or less wide-spread opinion among parents that a high school diploma entitles one to matriculate at college. The diploma, most emphatically, does nothing of the sort. It is not, in any sense, a key to a college career. And the explanation reverts to our previous paragraph concerning the new concept of the secondary school. The various committees on entrance requirements are, today, more thoroughly conversant with the problems of high school administrators and, I believe, look upon their problems with a kindly and sympathetic eye; but they do not permit their sympathy to blind them to the fact that long and arduous toil is necessary for college preparation and that native ability plus application as measured by daily ranks is a truer criterion of one's qualifications than any other measure which can be applied. It is true that most colleges supplement the measure of ranks with other tests. Scholastic aptitude tests of various sorts are quite commonly used; so are subject achievements tests. Yet the fact remains that greater weight is given to daily ranks and he or she who falls below a fairly high average is not wanted in our higher institutions of learning. For this reason we insist that the college applicant graduate in the upper half of the class or at least show an average that will approximate eighty.

It may not be out of place at this point to call attention to the work of the junior colleges which are

rapidly assuming a place of major importance in our educational scheme. While our limited space will not permit us to discuss the reasons for its existence or to trace its history and development it is enough to say that while comparatively new in the east its success during its short existence has been so phenomenal as to presage greater and more abundant opportunities for our young people in the future. In brief these junior colleges offer a two-year course of standard college grade to those who, either because of economic pressure must limit their post-secondary training to a period of short duration, or to those who find it desirable to familiarize themselves with some vocational work such as secretarial training. Yet if the opportunity offers they may, if they so desire, transfer to a standard college and continue their work for a degree.

In connection with this same topic it is perhaps not as generally known as it should be that Keene Normal School is likewise offering similar advantages to both boys and girls. By an agreement made with the trustees of Boston University it is possible for one to transfer from Keene to Boston University at the expiration of the sophomore year if one so wishes. The plan possesses two advantages; the first being that one-half of the four years college training may be obtained at a very moderate cost; the second is that if, at the end of the second year, one finds it financially impossible to continue, a girl will have obtained, even in that short time, a sufficiently sound training in education to be eligible for appointment to the first eight grades in the public schools of New Hampshire.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF DRAWING

*To the Superintendent of Schools and the Members of
the School Committee:*

The art training of the public schools should be practical training; it should aim to cultivate taste and apply that taste to the homes, the dress and the business of those it trains. That is just what we have been trying to do and we start our campaign for its development in the lower grades.

Art is not for "the few." It is for "the many, for the many have to use it." It is not held that the training of the public schools will produce artists, but it is held that it will raise the standards of taste. Thus the art teaching of the public schools has a practical relation to the business interests of every community.

Perhaps nothing is of greater practical value to your child than good taste. The important quality only partly instinctive and its development and guidance have become one of our vital problems.

Poster work has played an important part in our art work this year. Anything which can take an active part in student activities stimulates the pupils to their best efforts. Thus, in poster work the students both in High School and the Chandler School outdid themselves to plan and execute posters which would interest the public in their undertakings and school activities. From this it was but a step to awaken their interest in helping local organizations in their various ventures.

Both the Grammar School and High School made posters for food sales and benefits given by the seniors and Mother's Club, for basketball, football, Boy Scouts Food Sale, and for the milk fund benefit held at the

high school. They made all of the programs used for the play, "When Betsy Ross Made Old Glory." They also studied the different types of lettering in connection with the poster work. In addition they worked on pen and ink drawings and pencil sketching. Helen Collay and Paul Bolduc, both freshmen in high school, framed some of their ink sketches.

In the lower grades the pupils are taught the elementary steps in design. The subjects are necessarily simple but are used to develop the imagination, a feeling for order and spacing, and an eye for the correct color combinations.

As has been our custom an exhibition of the Manual Arts, Domestic Science and Drawing was held June 7 and 8 at the Chandler School. If the parents would come out to see their children's work at times like this, it would add to the interest of all concerned in the work.

May I thank you, Mr. Superintendent and Members of the School Board, for your interest and cooperation in my work.

REPORT OF DOMESTIC ARTS INSTRUCTOR

*To the Superintendent of Schools and the Members of
the School Board:*

I respectfully submit my annual report of the work done in the Domestic Arts Department of the Somersworth Schools.

The seventh grade girls canned fruits and vegetables, made jelly and relishes. They planned, prepared and served to parents and friends six balanced meals, suitable to the average home represented. In sewing, grade seven made underwear, Christmas gifts and cotton school dresses.

The girls of the special grade met with a division of grade seven and carried on the same work.

The eighth grade girls canned fruits and vegetables, made jelly and pickles. They planned, prepared and served six balanced meals to parents and friends. Attention was given to cost of food in season, nutritive values, methods of preparation and attractive service. In sewing, they made underwear, Christmas gifts, kimonos, pajamas and wash dresses.

The High School freshman and sophomore classes have made a study of nutrition; food products; principles of food preparation and preservation; meal planning; preparation and service; the kitchen, store rooms, and dining room. They planned, prepared and served twelve meals to parents and friends.

The High School junior and senior classes have made a study of home membership and responsibilities; use of leisure time; home care of the helpless; home nursing; emergencies and accidents, feeding the sick and community responsibilities.

In the fall due to illness of the teacher the Domestic Arts work was carried on for a period of five weeks by substitute teachers. During the spring term Miss Sullivan did her cadet work in the Domestic Arts Department of the high school.

The annual exhibition was held June 7th and 8th at the Chandler School. The attendance was gratifying and much favorable comment was heard.

REPORT OF MECHANIC ARTS INSTRUCTOR

*To the Superintendent of Schools and Members of the
School Board:*

Woodworking has been given to the boys of the seventh, eighth and special grades. The enrollment has been the same as in the past few years. The choice of projects is of necessity very much the same from year to year, but the boys are always changing. This means different ideas and different problems, although the projects may be the same as in the past.

It has been my policy to let a boy develop his own ideas within a reasonable limit of guidance after he has reached high school age. The result has been that reference books and lectures have become merely a guide to obtain new ideas and not material to be memorized. Projects are now being selected from standard catalogues and the size and proportions of the project are obtained from a scale drawing of the actual picture as seen in the catalogue.

A new "Belt Sander" has been completed and used to great advantage. This "home made" machine has saved the department two hundred dollars and those building it have had valuable experience. The time taken to sandpaper a large project has been reduced to one-fourth of the former time. This allows more time for each pupil and makes large projects less objectionable.

Several repair and construction jobs have been done throughout the year. These repairs have been divided among the boys and much outside time has been given to this work from boys in my former classes as well as the regular workers in my freshman class.

Automechanics has been given this year to a class of thirteen. Theory of Automobile operation, design and repair as well as "job sheets" covering all the important repairs in automobile operation, have been given during the year. The interest shown by these boys warrants more equipment, and cars that are up to date instead of the old models picked up in discarded garage sites. Approximately twenty-five repair jobs have been done on the cars of teachers and pupils which have resulted in experience for the boys and a saving for the car owners.

The annual exhibition was held in the Chandler Building. An interested group of parents and friends of the schools attended. There is nothing of more value to teachers and pupils than a knowledge of the support of parents and citizens.

I wish to thank all who have taken an interest in our department during the past year.

One of the outstanding events of the year was the testing of the children's hearing by means of a 4 A. Western Electric Audiometer loaned to the schools by the State Department of Education. 1,034 individuals were examined and 71 pupils were found to have defective hearing. Of this number 35 children were found to be deaf or hard of hearing in one or both ears.

A two-fold advantage has resulted from the test: First: The parents have been notified of these findings and advised to consult a physician in regard to the child's hearing. Second: The teachers have been warned of the pupil's defective hearing. Girls and boys who heretofore have been considered dull and inattentive on account of this unknown fact of defective hearing, will be given seats in the front of the room and special attention be given to them. In this way we hope to overcome the handicap that accompanies loss of hearing.

The children's teeth have been carefully examined from time to time and the defects have been reported to the parents who in turn have cooperated by consulting their family dentist at their earliest opportunity. We will endeavor to establish a Dental Clinic this coming year so that those without funds may be able to have their teeth properly cared for.

Milk and graham crackers were distributed daily to the boys and girls in the elementary grades. A substantial sum of money was earned by the sale of tickets at the Washington Bicentennial in June and this money was turned over to the milk fund, in order to purchase milk for those who were unable to pay for it. It is impossible to measure in dollars and cents the untold amount of benefit that is being derived from this daily portion of milk given to the underweight and undernourished children and we will continue the work with renewed vigor during the coming school year.

It is encouraging to note that we have not discovered a single case of diphtheria among the children who took the Toxin-Anti-Toxin in November, 1930. However, two cases of diphtheria were reported, but after a careful check found that both individuals did not take advantage of the Toxin-Anti-Toxin clinic in November.

During the past year quantities of clothing have been donated by the Philanthropic Department of

the Woman's Club and by private families. This clothing was given to the needy children and they were able to attend school regularly and properly clothed.

In conclusion it will be well to review the first part of the report and note the remarkably few cases of contagious diseases that are listed. In spite of the fact that we have had several pupils who have been absent from school due to colds and la grippe, it seems that a splendid record has been established for the past year and that the money set aside for this department has earned good results.

I wish to thank the members of the School Board, Superintendent, Teachers, Parents and Citizens for their hearty cooperation in this necessary work.
