You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the Fourth day of March, next at 6:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects: (Polls will be open at 10:00 A.M.)

ARTICLE 1. To vote an Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers.

ARTICLE 1A To vote by ballot on amendments to the Zoning Ordinance.

ARTICLE 2. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes

ARTICLE 4. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Support of the Library, \$1,000.00. (Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to make application for Town Road Aid and raise the sum of \$1,370.71 thereby receiving an additional \$9,138.04 from the State for Town Road Construction. (Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$34,500.00 for Winter Maintenance of roads. (Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$44,000.00 for Summer Maintenance of roads. (Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the Provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated or take any other action hereon: Summer Maintenance, extra tar, \$6,500, included in the \$44,000.00 amount in Article 9. (Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,000.00 for the purchase of a new cab and chassis for the Highway Department (Not approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for Street Lighting. (Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,003.00 for the Monadnock Region Association to continue its efforts in areas of solid waste disposal, planning, pesticides, legislation, State Parks, youth work and by other means call attention to the protection of the natural resources of the Town plus its other advantages along with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region. (\$500.00 Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$983.00 in support of the Cheshire Hospital for the year 1975. (Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,047.00 to help support the work of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service. (\$500.00 Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to help support the work of the Monadnock Region Humane Society. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,423.24 as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the South-Western New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. (\$700.00 Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,300 to transport their rubbish to Keene for 6 months starting July 1, 1975. (Submitted without Recommendation of the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to defray the costs of closing the Town Dump, establish a transfer station for collection of solid waste and purchase of such equipment as is necessary to haul solid waste from the transfer station to the regional solid waste disposal facility, and further, to authorize and instruct the Board of Selectmen to take any necessary action relating to the closing of the dump, establishing a transfer station and providing suitable transportation, including the promulgation of rules and regulations to control use of said transfer station. (The Board of Selectmen purposes to expend not more than \$24,000 for this purpose, with \$6,000 coming from current-year appropriations, and the balance through issuance of long

term notes.) (Submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town of Chesterfield will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,757.25 for the establishment of a Chesterfield Visiting Nurse Association. (By petition Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the Provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in the amounts indicated or take any other action hereon: Visiting Nurse Association \$2,500.00. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be utilized by the Town Historical Committee for the Bicentennial Celebration in 1976. (By Petition—Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 24. To decide whether the sum of \$200.00 shall be appropriated for the Monadnock Regional Bicentennial Committee to enable it to act as a regional coordinator for the celebration of the 1976 Bicentennial (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$30,000 to purchase a new fire truck to replace the 1947 Ford truck in the West Chesterfield station. This truck shall meet Class A specifications as listed in Pamphlet #19 of the NFPA with 549 cubic inch V8 engine and a hose reel for large diameter hose, 750 gal. water tank and 750 GPM pump. \$4,000 to be raised this year and the balance to be paid in long term notes of \$2,889.00 per year for 9 years. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,011.02 (the balance of income from Wares Grove) and apply for matching funds. This money to be used for improvements of Wares Grove. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the annual election of Town Constables and authorize the Board to Selectmen to appoint a Chief of Police. This to take effect at the March Town Meeting, 1976. Because of an effort by the Constables for better organization appointing the police of-

ficers will help to maintain a more consistent and efficient mode of operation.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Park and Recreation Commission consisting of five (5) members appointed by the Board of Selectmen. This Commission to be responsible for the operation of Parks and Beaches and any other recreational facility the Town may develop in the future.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept the road from the Tuttle Road to the Delbert and Ruth T. Meyer property. There are two houses built on this road and there are two other lots laid out along this road. (By petition)

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to extend the Zinn Road 150 feet so that the Highway equipment can turn around.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to change the Capital Reserve Fund to a general fund for Highway equipment. As it is now, funds are specified for Loader, Grader, and Truck.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Margaret, Elizabeth and John Nurse, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the care and upkeep of the Nurse Lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Margaret, Elizabeth and John Nurse Trust Fund.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Merrill R. & Linda L. Yeaw the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the Ashworth-Yeaw Lot #76 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Ashworth-Yeaw Trust Fund.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Edward D. Westervelt the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the William Kaiser Lot #98 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Kaiser-Westervelt Trust Fund.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from John C. and Cora C. Provenchia the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the John C. &

Cora C. Provenchia Lot #91 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the John C. and Cora C. Provenchia Trust Fund.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Henry C. and Betsey C. Chickering the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the Chickering-Blanchard Lot #41 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Chickering-Blanchard Trust Fund.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Rosamond D. Bothwell the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the B. and M. Davis Lot #14 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Bothwell-Davis Trust Fund.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from Martha Richter the income from same to be used for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex and to be known as the Fritz and Martha Richter Trust Fund.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Frank Dean to be added to the fund for perpetual care of the Morris Friedsam Cemetery and to be known as the Frank and Jeanette Dean Trust Fund.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Herbert F. Butler Jr. and George Harris to be added to the fund for perpetual care in the Morris Friedsam Cemetery and to be known as the Herbert F. Butler Jr. and George Harris Trust Fund.

ARTICLE 41. To hear reports of Committees and to transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING 1974

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday the fifth day of March, 1974.

The meeting was called to order at ten o'clock in the forenoon. Avis Gauthier took the oath of office as Ballot Instructor and Mildred Gauthier took the oath of office as Assistant Clerk. Later Carl A. Johnson was sworn in as Assistant Moderator.

The Moderator then read the Warrant through Articles 1 and 1A and declared the polls open for balloting for all necessary Town Officers and for Amendments to the Zoning Ordinances and also for Delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

At six-thirty the meeting was again called to order by the Moderator, with Carl A. Johnson and Mildred Gauthier as Assistant Moderator and Assistant Clerk, and the Articles of the Warrant were disposed of as follows:

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Russell Johnson to dispense with reading the Warrant. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by William Mitchell to use the same method of collecting taxes this year as was used last year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Agnes Chickering to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Donald C. Emery as Chairman of the Budget Committee gave its report. He stated that the Budget was to be found on pages 28 and 29 in the Annual Report, that they had had three special meetings as well as the regular ones and that the public meeting had a good attendance. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by George E. Joslin to accept the report as given. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Sue Butterworth to pass over the other Articles

for the time being and go the Article 27. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 27. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Sue Butterworth and supported by H. Claude Mowry that the Selectmen be authorized to appoint a committee to work with the Selectmen to develop plans for Wares Grove and sell the theatre equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Richard Louis to add \$9,000.00 to the \$200.00 under #8 and the \$1,000.00 under #10 for a full time Building Inspector who would also be the Health Inspector. The vote was declared by the Moderator as carried in the Negative and did not pass.

Voted by voice vote and then by a show of hands on motion made by William Vogeley and supported by Myron Ingalls to amend the Article and take #25 of Article 5 and apply it to the \$13,200.00 under Article 8 but would not be so allocated if Article 8 does not pass. The Moderator declared the "No's" had it and the Amendment was lost.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Winston H. Cray that #17 be left open until after a recessed meeting as soon as possible. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Donald C. Emery and supported by William M. Mitchell to pass Article 5 as read except for #17. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the following sums would be raised and appropriated as approved by the Budget Committee:

Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston H. Cray and supported by George E. Joslin to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the Provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in the amounts indicated: Town Officers Expenses, secretarial help \$2,000.00. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Motion made by William Vogeley and supported by Russell Johnson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,200.00 plus \$8,000.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new truck with plow and wing for the Highway Department.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Lawrence Thomas and supported by JoAnn Morse to amend the Article and add for the Selectmen to use their discretion to either buy the equipment as given in this Article or to make any substitution as they see fit. Vote on the Amendment was declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. The Moderator declared the Article as amended to be adopted.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by William M. Mitchell to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for Street Lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Carl Johnson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$937.00 for the Monadnock Region Association to continue its efforts in areas of solid waste disposal, planning, pesticides, legislation, State Parks, youth work and by other means call attention to the protection of the Natural resources of the Town, plus its other advantages, along with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

An Amendment to this Motion was offered by Stephen Herman and supported by Sue Butterworth that the Chesterfield Resident or Residents designated to attend the Monadnock Region Association report at the next Annual Town Meeting on the precise functions of the Monadnock Region Association Services so that the voters can better assess the value of the expenditure to this organization.

A second Amendment was moved by Ronald T. Guyette and supported by JoAnn Morse to raise the sum of \$100.00 instead of the \$937.00 asked for in the Article. Voted by voice vote on this second Amendment. The Moderator declared the vote carried in the negative and did not pass.

Voted by voice vote on the first Amendment. The vote was declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. The Moderator declared the Article as Amended to be adopted.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by William M. Mitchell and supported by Winston H. Cray to raise and appropriate the sum of \$938.00 in support of the Cheshire Hospital for the year 1974. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by William Thompson and supported by Ely Zimmerman to raise and appropriate an amount equal to 50 cents per capita, not to exceed \$909.00 to help support the work of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Philip Palmer and supported by Gail Woodman to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to help support the work of the Monadnock Region Humane Association. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Ronald T. Guyette to make application for Town Road Aid and raise the sum of \$1,353.63

thereby receiving an additional \$9,024.19 from the State for Town Road Construction. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Frederick Melvin and supported by George E. Joslin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for Winter Maintenance of Roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Lawrence Thomas to raise and appropriate the sum of \$41,000.00 for Summer Maintenance of Roads, including the \$8,000.00 for extra tar from Revenue Sharing Funds. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Donald C. Emery and supported by William M. Mitchell to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Leslie C. Berg and supported by Robert T. Mills to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,271.60 as the Town's Share for the studies and operation of the South-Western New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Motion made by Winston H. Cray and supported by Ronald T. Guyette for the Town to erect a Memorial for the Korean and Viet Nam Veterans and appropriate \$2,500.00 toward same. The chairman of the Board of Selectmen, three members of the American Legion and two citizens appointed by the Moderator to select a memorial and have charge of the money for the same.

A motion was made by Jean Sowers and supported by Edith Darling to amend Article 19 as follows:

Whereas the people of Chesterfield recognize that veterans in the Korean and Viet Nam conflicts gave their lives in a spirit of service and whereas this spirit of service would best be perpetuated by a monument that is a lasting service to the people of Chesterfield,

1. I move that a sum of \$2,500.00 be appropriated for the purpose of creating a memorial park site at Ware's Grove. The Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, three members of

the American Legion and two citizens appointed by the Moderator to have charge of the money for this purpose.

2. And I further move that this committee consider the possibility of changing the name of Wares Grove to a name suitable to honoring the memory of Bill O'Neil and Walker Kaiser. Voted by voice vote on the amendment and the Moderator declared it carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Judith Palmer and supported by H. Claude Mowry to close debate. Vote declared carried in the affirmative.

Motion made by Ronald Guyette and supported by George Joslin to further amend Article 19 to appropriate a further sum of \$2,500.00 to erect a permanent Memorial honoring the Korean and Viet Nam Veterans, a committee consisting of the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, three members of the American Legion and two citizens appointed by the Moderator to select the Memorial and have charge of the money for same.

Vote on motion made by James O'Neil and supported by H. Claude Mowry to limit debate was carried in the affirmative.

A written secret ballot was called for on this amendment. This resumed as follows: "YES" had 127 votes and "NO" had 29 votes. The Moderator declared this Amendment carried in the affirmative and the Article 19 as twice amended to be adopted.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Michael Wiggin and supported by SaraJo Jochums to authorize the Selectmen to establish a nine (9) member committee to study the nursing needs of the Town of Chesterfield. A minimum of two Public Hearings will be held by October 1974 with the findings to be presented to the Selectmen submitted for town approval at the March 1975 Town Meeting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article adopted.

Article 21. Motion made by Ellen Riley and supported by George Joslin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be utilized by the Committee appointed by the Selectmen to study the nursing needs of the Town of Chesterfield for transportation costs, postage and office supplies.

After discussion, voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Agnes B. Chickering to amend this Article and add \$500.00 to the \$100.00 given in

the Article read with a possibility of matching funds from the Federal Government to study and implement the nursing needs in the Town of Chesterfield. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article as amended to be adopted.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Arvid Pearson to pass over this Article to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the continuation of the Open Space Fund. This was not approved by the Budget Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and therefore passed over.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ann Stokes which was supported to authorize the Selectmen to appoint an ad hoc committee of no less than three persons to study the feasibility of incorporating a recycling program into the Town's solid waste disposal plan. Said committee hereinafter to be called the Recycle Feasibility Committee. This Committee shall report its findings to the Selectmen on or before June one 1974. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston H. Cray and supported by George E. Joslin to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend Federal Disaster Assistance Funds whenever they become available and are of assistance to the Town. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Donald C. Emery and supported by Gerald Knickerbocker to have the Advisory Planning Committee serve one more year so that they might be able to complete a Master Plan for the Town of Chesterfield. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Joseph Schor and supported by Robert Callahan that any elected or appointed official of the Town of Chesterfield, or any member of any board or committee of this town, shall disqualify himself from debating or voting on any matter in which he has an interest other than his salary as such official, directly or indirectly, greater than any other citizen of the town. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 28. Motion made by Winston Cray and supported by H. Claude Mowry that the Town vote to join with other communities to use a particular solid waste disposal facility, with each participating community paying their pro-rata share of the costs of establishing such a facility and the operating costs thereof, as permitted under R.S.A. 53-A.

After much discussion voted by voice vote on a motion made by Carl Johnson and supported by Stephen Herman to amend the Article to evaluate the feasibility of joining with other communities for the above purpose. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article as amended adopted.

Article 29. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston H. Cray and supported by Malcolm MacLeod to accept a road known as Pine Tree Circle, off of North Shore Road which provides access to six (6) homes and seven (7) additional individually owned lots in a town approved subdivision. Approximate length of the road is .48 miles. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 30. Motion made by George Joslin and supported by Winston Cray to accept a road known as White Birch Drive, off Pinnacle Springs Road, approved by the Selectmen and Road Agent. Escrow account has been established by Mr. Henry Hellus for his subdivision No. 2. After much discussion voted by voice vote on the motion which was declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative and the road not accepted.

Articles 31 to 43. Motion made and supported to accept all of these Articles dealing with Trust Funds as read. Motion made and supported to amend three of these Articles as follows:

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$25.00 from Dennis E. and Brenda E. Connor to be added to the fund for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex and to be known as the Dennis Connor Trust Fund.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Harry and Audrey Ericson to be added to the fund for perpetual care in the Morris Friedsam Cemetery and known as the Harry and Audrey Ericson Trust Fund.

Article 42. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Louise Marrow to be added to the fund for perpetual care in the Morris Friedsam Cemetery and known as the George and Louise Marrow Trust Fund.

Voted by voice vote on motion made and supported to accept the Amendments to the Articles as given above. The Moderator declared the vote carried in the affirmative and the Articles 31 to 43 adopted as amended. These Articles are as follows:

Article 31. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Frank S. Boyce for perpetual care of Sutton Lots in Spofford Village Cemetery to be known as the Frank S. Boyce Trust Fund with the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission.

Article 32. Voted to accept the sum of \$25.00 from Dennis E. and Brenda E. Connor to be added to the fund for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex and to be known as the Dennis Connor Trust Fund.

Article 33. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Etta S. Mattison for perpetual care of the Ida J. Simonds Lot #39 in the Chesterfield West Cemetery to be known as the Ida J. Simonds Trust Fund with income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association.

Article 34. Voted to accept the sum of \$75.00 from William R. Mondeau to be added to the Fund for perpetual care in the Spofford Village Cemetery Annex and to be known as the William R. and Donna R. Mondeau Trust fund.

Article 35. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Harry and Audrey Ericson to be added to the fund for perpetual care in the Morris Friedsam Cemetery and known as the Harry and Audrey Ericson Trust Fund.

Article 36. Voted to accept the sum of \$50.00 from George Nicols to be added to the Fund for perpetual care in the Morris Friedsam Cemetery.

Article 37. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Wilson Fletcher to be added to the Morris Friedsam Cemetery Fund and to be known as the Wilson and Elsie Fletcher Trust Fund.

Article 38. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Norman E. and Alma S. Moore income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care of the Norman E. and Alma S. Moore Lot #45 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Norman E. and Alma S. Moore Trust Fund.

Article 39. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Richard F. Staples to be added to the Cook Lot #122 in

Chesterfield West Cemetery income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care of said Lot and to be known as the Cook-Staples Trust Fund.

Article 40. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Clifford White and Newton E. Darling to be added to the N. H. Darling, E. W. White Trust Fund. Income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for Perpetual care of lots 277—278 in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 41. Voted to accept the sum of \$50.00 from Raymond Egan, Sr. and Phyllis Egan to be added to the fund for perpetual care of the Spofford Village Cemetery Annex to be known as the Raymond, Sr. and Phyllis Egan Trust Fund.

Article 42. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Louise Marrow to be added to the fund for perpetual care in the Morris Friedsam Cemetery and known as the George and Louise Marrow Trust Fund.

Article 43. Voted to accept the sum of \$50.00 from Phyllis B. Henchey income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission for perpetual care in the Spofford Village Cemetery Annex and to be known as the Stephen and Phyllis Henchey Trust Fund.

Article 44. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Alfred Schiewe and supported by Paul Hubner to accept a resolution for the Town to instruct the Selectmen to restrict any Chesterfield dump or landfill area search to backlands and not consider existing residential areas as possibilities. Resolution carried in the affirmative and was adopted.

Voted by voice vote on a resolution proposed by Ely Zimmerman and supported by Louise Marrow as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED

That the citizens of the Town of Chesterfield, N. H. go on record to encourage the settlement of the accusations be levied against President Nixon and his administration.

That this settlement be undertaken with due process of law according to the Constitutional process known as Impeachment by the U. S. House of Representatives and trial by the U. S. Senate.

Vote declared by the moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Resolution adopted.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Edith Darling and supported by Sue Butterworth to empower the Selectmen to

investigate a larger alternate site for the 1975 town meeting due to overcrowding and fire danger. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Gerald Knickerbocker and supported by Ely Zimmerman that all highway related Articles be included together under Article 5. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Sue Butterworth to recess the meeting to the call of the Selectmen. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

The Moderator declared the Ballot Box closed and a count of Ballots cast under Article 1 resulted as follows:

MAY 9, 1974

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, James E. O'Neil at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon who declared the polls open for voting on changes to the Zoning and Building Ordinances.

At 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon the meeting was called to order by the Moderator. Nina M. Foster and Ann Knickerbocker were sworn in as Assistant Moderator and Clerk respectively.

The Articles of the Warrant were then disposed of as follows:

Article 1. Tom Moore as Chairman of the Committee on Ware's Grove was asked to give a report of that Committee. The report is as follows:

After many hours of study and deliberation we recommend that you operate the beach for the 1974 summer season with only a few changes being made, some are requirements by the State of New Hampshire. It is suggested that no major improvements be made this year:

1. Due to lack of time
2. So that the committee can make a continued study for the next year to determine what the town's needs really are.

The only way we felt this could be operated is by putting bids out for the operation to meet with your approval at the recessed meeting to be held May 9, 1974.

The following requirements are suggested:

1. New toilets to be located in the concession stand bordering Route 9A.
2. Bouys to keep swimmers in and boats out
3. No rafts
4. Two loads of washed sand for beach area
5. To patch outside fence along Route 9A
6. To put up inside fence from bathhouse to the brook along the Finkenstadt property.
7. No season passes
8. Stretcher, blanket and first aid equipment
9. Toilet facilities in back of screen will be closed to the public.

After much discussion voted by voice vote on motion made by Errol Sowers and supported by Malcolm MacLeod to accept this report except for No. 7, "No Season passes". Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by a standing vote on motion made by H. Claude mowry and supported by Sarah Jo Jochums to amend the Article so that taxpayers of Town be charged one-half the amount of Non-taxpayers. This resulted 24 in favor and 31 opposed. The Moderator declared this Amendment lost.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Errol Sowers and supported by Sue Butterworth to charge \$1.50 for Non-Residents and 50c for children of Non-Residents and for Tax Payers the fee would be 50c for adults and 25c for children. Motion carried in the affirmative.

A motion made by Errol Sowers and supported by Sue Butterworth to charge 25c for Senior Citizens subject to approval by Federal Regulations. Voted by voice vote on this motion. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston H. Cray and supported by George Joslin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,550.00 for Beaches, Parks and playgrounds under Article 5, number 17. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative and did not carry.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Donald Emery and supported by Henry Chickering, Jr. to raise the sum of \$550.00 as given under Article 5, section 17 for Parks, Playgrounds and Town Beach. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Sarah Jo Jochums which was supported to adopt the following resolution:

Whereas Patti Bills on the morning of May 4, 1974 exhibited tremendous courage and quick thinking ability when she led six children in her custody to safety from their burning home and

Whereas she in the past has set an excellent example of the qualities of honesty and responsibility and

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

OCTOBER 4, 1974

Proceedings of the Special Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire called at the Town Hall in the Town of Chesterfield on October 4, 1974 at 7:30 P.M.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator. James E. O'Neil, who read the Warrant for the meeting and then called on Charles Storms who was a member of the Committee appointed to investigate different methods to take the place of our Dump. Charles Storms presented slides on the Nottingham Recycling and Incinerator and then described other methods of disposing of our refuse such as Recycling and Landfills, possibly along with Keene, and the possible use of the Stoddard site. Many questions and much discussion followed. A vote of thanks was given to the three members of this Committee, Charles Storms, Ann Stokes and Stephen Herman for their many hours of research.

The Articles of the Warrant were then disposed of as follows:

Article 1. A motion was made by Ann Stokes and supported by Michael Wiggin that the Town vote to adopt the recycling and incineration concept of solid waste disposal, recycling all possible waste at a center to be built adjacent to the present dump site. This was followed by much discussion and questioning. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Michael Wiggin to limit debate. Voted by voice vote on the motion made by Ann Stokes and supported by Michael Wiggin. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative with only one dissenting vote.

Article 2. Motion made by Ann Stokes and supported by H. Claude Mowry to raise and appropriate the sum of One hundred twenty thousand (120,000.00) dollars to purchase land and construct and equip said recycling incineration center and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to raise the balance by the issuance and sale of bonds or notes in the name and on the credit of the Town, under and in accordance with the Provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33 and any amendments thereto), and to delegate the Board of Selectmen the authority to fix the time and place of payment of the principal and interest of such bonds or notes and to take any action with respect thereto as may be necessary or advisable. After much discussion the vote on the motion was by paper ballot and resulted as follows:

Number of ballots cast 72; a two-thirds vote necessary for choice, 48.

“YES” had 39 votes; “NO” had 33 votes.

The Moderator declared no choice.

Economic conditions did not seem to hurt the building industry in Chesterfield as badly as in other parts of the country, reinforcing the fact that many people find Chesterfield a town they would like to live in. I believe we can expect an even greater increase in population as the economy picks up in the future.

REPORT OF THE RECYCLING COMMITTEE

In anticipation of the end of lawful open burning as of July one, 1975, the Recycling Committee was formed and charged with the task of evaluating the feasibility of recycling in the Town of Chesterfield. Prior to the current recession, research indicated that recycling was both desirable and economically feasible. The recession has drastically altered revenues that can be anticipated from recyclables; at this time recycling would be more costly than shipping all our solid waste to Keene.

On the other hand, taxpayers should take into account factors other than those which are financially expedient at this moment. It seems clear that the future of solid waste disposal lies in recycling. Due to the fast depletion of natural resources and our reluctance as a nation to become dependent on resources from other nations, we must, as good citizens, preserve our precious resources.

There are, in addition, more immediate practical considerations that require the Town's attention. Our committee has been given to understand that the City of Keene feels compelled to preserve the life of its dump. As a result, Keene will in all likelihood institute recycling within the next three years, and Chesterfield will have to comply with regulations Keene sees fit to adopt. As a result, both the cost and the method of solid waste disposal will be fixed by Keene. If, as we expect, recycling is in the offing, taxpayers will have to bear the cost of building a recycling facility at a later date.

Management of the dump is a business, and must be approached in such manner. In the same spirit that we invest in the insulation of our homes to offset the rising costs of heating, this committee feels that investment in recycling facilities is sensible now, in order to save taxpayers the (probable) inflated costs three years from now.

In any event, the Town should not be deluded into thinking that shipping all our waste to Keene is a final answer to the problems raised in solid waste disposal in

School District Meeting
Chesterfield Central School
Chesterfield, New Hampshire
March 2, 1974

The Clerk, Suzanne D. Thompson, called the meeting to order at 8:00 p.m. The Clerk then announced that the Moderator, Harry E. Winn had resigned and the meeting was opened for nominations for Moderator Pro Tempore. Henry C. Chickering Jr. moved that the Clerk cast one ballot for H. Claude Mowry for Moderator Pro Tempore. Clara B. Wellington seconded the motion. The motion carried on a voice vote.

H. Claude Mowry took the oath of office from the Clerk. The Clerk then read the Warrant through Article 1. The Moderator declared the polls open for balloting for the necessary school district officers.

Prior to the meeting, the School Board appointed Jean Hubner and Agnes Chickering, Ballot Clerks. They took the oath of office from the Clerk. A count of the ballots showed 605 ballots.

The Moderator appointed Wayne Winn assistant Moderator and Diana Allen assistant Clerk. They took the oath of office from the Moderator.

At 8:00 p.m. the Moderator called the meeting to order for the purpose of acting upon the remainder of the Warrant. Wayne Winn made a motion to dispense of the reading of the Warrant. Seconded by George Joslin and voted in the affirmative.

Henry C. Chickering moved that the Staff of Supervisory Union #29 be privileged to speak. The motion was seconded by Clara Wellington. It carried in the affirmative in a voice vote, John W. Day, Superintendent of Schools introduced Robert Holmes, the new Principal of the Chesterfield School. Mr. Holmes invited parents to visit the school.

The Articles were then disposed of as follows:

ARTICLE 2. Kathy Lucier moved that the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen be accepted as printed in the Annual Report. Seconded by Alfred Schiewe. Carried in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3. James O'Neil moved that the district authorize the School Board to make application for and accept and use in the name of the district such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now, or hereafter, be

forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency. Seconded by Sue Butterworth. Carried in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 4. Clara Wellington made a motion that the (petitioned) Article to see if the District will vote to have a school board consisting of five members to be elected pursuant to RSA 197:15, be passed over, Henry Chickering seconded the motion. it was requested by Robert E. Woodman that the article be discussed. Several people spoke for and against the article. Francis Wissell requested a paper ballot on the motion The results were 58 yes ballots and 43 not ballots. The motion was declared in the affirmative and the article was passed over.

ARTICLE 5. Robert Wormer made a motion to pass over the (petitioned) article to see if the District will vote to elect at the 1974 School District Meeting one school board member for three years, one school board member for two years, one school board member for one year. Merrill Yeaw seconded the motion. A voice vote declared it in the affirmative and the article was passed over.

ARTICLE 6. James O'Neil moved that the district provide indemnification for district employees, school administrators, school board members, district officers or agents, from personal loss or expense including reasonable legal fees, if any, arising out of any claim demand, suit or judgement by reason of negligence of other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to property providing the indemnified persons were at the time of the accident acting within the scope of his or their employment or office, all in accordance with RSA 31:105. Seconded by Grace Kearney. Motion carried in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 7. Jo-Ann Morse moved that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$460,908 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers, and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district. Seconded by Robert Callahan. Carried in the affirmative.

Clara Wellington asked permission for George Cass, Business Manager of the Union to speak. He did so saying that if the projected drop of tuitioned students into Keene doesn't occur, he may have to request additional funds.

ARTICLE 8. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Mrs. Winston Cray read a resolution that the voters of Chesterfield recognize the splendid service that Harry E. Winn has contributed to our Community as Moderator for the District for the past 26 years and asked that the resolution be made a motion as a lasting expression of our high esteem. The motion was seconded by George Joslin and unanimously adopted.

John Day resolved that the School District of Chesterfield recognize with gratitude the devoted service in its behalf of Mrs. Lillian Lane School Board member for about five years, H. Claude Mowry School District Clerk for 21 years. Robert Wormer asked the resolution be made a motion. Seconded by Oscar Ericson. James O'Neil ammended the motion adding the name of John W. Day to the list for his 7 years of loyal service as Chesterfield's school Superintendent. The ammendment was seconded by Warren Allen. The ammended motion was declared unanimously affirmative in a voice vote.

Jennifer Hymes moved that the people of Chesterfield wish to continue quality educational programs for their youngsters, organize and expand to meet requirements and recommendations of the Board of Education of the State of New Hampshire; that, the District endorse the school board's efforts to continually examine the needs, costs, and possible future implementation of a public kindergarten to be integrated into the total Chesterfield School. Seconded by Sara Jo Jochums. Motion made by voice vote in the affirmative.

At 9:05 P.M. the Moderator declared the polls closed.

Timothy Butterworth made a motion to reconsider Article 7. Seconded by Charles Johnson. The motion was defeated in a voice vote.

Sara Jo Jochums moved that the Moderator appoint a new nine member building committee to study building needs of the school district, four members to be educators. Life of the committee is to be one year and to report at the 1975 School District Meeting. Motion seconded by Charles Johnson. A voice vote proved unsure so the Moderator called for a standing vote. The results were 38 yes and 48 no. The motion was defeated.

The Checklist of voters was used in balloting. A count of Ballots resulted as follows:

Total number of names on the Checklist was 1101. Number of votes cast was 297 with 149 necessary for choice.

For member of the School Board for the ensuing three (3) years: Elizabeth Benjamin had 134 votes and Clara Wellington had 160 votes. There were two votes for Charles Storms. The Moderator declared Clara Wellington Board Member for 3 years and she took the oath of office from the Moderator.

For member of the School Board for the ensuing one year (1): Charles Storms had 90 and Robert Wormer had 196 and 1 for Norman Jelly. The Moderator declared Robert Wormer Board Member for 1 year and he took the oath of office from the Moderator.

For Moderator for the ensuing year: Stephen Herman had 137 and H. Claude Mowry had 152. The Clerk declared H. Claude Mowry Moderator. He took the oath of office from the Clerk.

For Clerk for the ensuing year: Suzanne Thompson had 262, Ruth Morse had 3 write-in votes and there were 6 scattered votes. The Moderator declared Suzanne Thompson elected Clerk. She took the oath of office from the Moderator.

For Treasurer for the ensuing year: Ann R. Bevis had 278 votes. The Moderator declared her elected Treasurer and she took the oath of office from the Clerk.

For Auditors for the ensuing year: Prudence Mitchell had 257 and Ann Knickerbocker had 249. There was one write-in vote for Diana Allen. The Moderator declared Prudence Mitchell and Ann Knickerbocker Auditors for the ensuing year. They took the oath of office from the Moderator.

All of the elected officers signed the perscribed OATH OF OFFICE.

On a motion by Norman Jelly, duly seconded by William Thompson, the meeting adjourned at 10:55 P.M.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

The 1974—1975 year has been a year of transition. We are settled in our new quarters and have moved the affairs of the Union in spite of unforeseen obstacles.

The New England School Development Council has been engaged to study the business and computer aspect of our school operation and has submitted its report. The results of this study are currently being implemented as we progress to improve our management operations in major school areas.

In December the contract for the Cheshire Vocational Center was ratified by all parties concerned. Our high school students and the adults of the community will benefit from the greatly expanded offerings.

The Staff Development Committee developed and received approval of the newly mandated recertification program giving the local school districts the authority for total recertification. Our Staff Development Program will be integrated with district and school goals as a result of the committee's finalized plan. Staff Development is an attempt to provide in-service workshops dealing with subjects such as reading, media, outdoor education, computer, learning stations and career education. The in-service programs are derived from a needs assessment conducted by the Staff Development Committee. All the resources of Supervisory Union 29 serve as the cadre in providing instructors for the course offerings; Keene State College, teachers, administrators, business personnel, etc. All are encouraged to participate in the Staff Development Program of the union.

The addition of music and art instruction in our school is indeed a worthwhile experience. We are making every reasonable effort to comply with State Minimum Standards for Elementary Schools. We have not recommended expanded services due to the economic pressures. We have taken a positive step in meeting the needs of all youngsters in Chesterfield.

Mr. Holmes has been involved on a continuous basis in our leadership workshop sessions designed to provide direction for the Chesterfield School and for other schools as a part of the Supervisory Union 29. Mr. Holmes's input into the leadership workshop process representing Chesterfield has, indeed, been stimulating and productive.

The increased use of the Monadnock Children's Special Services Center is another excellent part of the total school program. The Center has added two school psychologists and

a social worker. These specialists add to their current specialized staff and provide additional services to the children of Chesterfield, helping them to succeed in their school and life endeavors.

As we put materials together for this annual report, we are without the services of our Business Manager. I want to take this opportunity to commend our school board, administrators, and supportive staff at 34 West Street. All have displayed an exemplary "team" spirit.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

January 1975

The 1974-1975 school year opened on September 4, with an enrollment of 293. Currently, the enrollment is 300.

A critical needs assessment of the educational environment indicated areas needing attention. Primarily, the Social Studies courses needed a thorough restructuring and modernization to meet more fully the needs of all students in grades seven and eight. Consultations with the Chairman of the Social Studies Department in Keene were helpful in meeting this problem. We are now implementing a program which duplicates that of the Keene Junior High School, and the Chesterfield courses will now articulate with those at Keene High School. Our courses are partially funded by Title III, ESEA, another first for Chesterfield.

The Science classes needed much more equipment, especially in the metric area, to offer the students a more meaningful individualized experience in scientific methods. Steps have been taken to remedy this situation.

We are handicapped in every phase of school life by lack of space; room for parent and student conferences; art and music; counseling and evaluation; instructional materials.

This year the school has, for the first time a full-time Resource Teacher working with individual children who have various types of learning disabilities. By learning to overcome their disabilities, these children will be able to learn more efficiently within their regular classrooms.

A new part-time art program for the entire school has been introduced this year. The instruction includes the basics of form, line and color, develops a sense of aesthetics, and offers the children the opportunity to develop their individual creativity.

The music program has been expanded to include instrumental instruction. The success of the program may be judged by the students' enthusiastic participation. A spring concert is being planned in which our students will join those in Keene for a band presentation. The Christmas Program was an outstanding success through the cooperative efforts of the director, the students, the entire faculty, the aides and many mothers.

The Junior Great Books Program has been introduced this year by a teacher and a volunteer mother who have been trained in a special course offered by Union #29. The response has been excellent and at present our school is the only one in the district to offer the program successfully.

COED has offered to the eighth grade a program exploring the world of work which includes an interest survey and a review of the child labor laws. Local people in various vocations have served as guest speakers, including a former Chesterfield student.

Our activity programs this year include a school newspaper, arts and crafts, intellectual games, a model club, engine theory, cheerleading and twirling, and a skills session for the boys in which theories of team play and exercise are combined. Again, the faculty, aides and mothers are commended for their able contributions. Two students are sharing their skills and knowledge of engines mechanics and electronics with other boys in small groups.

The school expresses its appreciation especially to the Parents and Teachers Association for their contribution of time, effort and money to make Chesterfield a better school. They have, among other things, provided; equipment and supplies for the Resource Room; a table for the library; the handsome new trophy display case and Cavaliers sports sign; the girls' softball and hockey equipment; and the boys' baseball uniforms. They have also recently given the school an Audiometer for the nurse's office.

The school is now a member of the Connecticut Valley League, and the boys are participating in soccer, basketball and baseball. The Girls played soccer and field hockey in the fall, and, although they are not yet ready for League competition, they have played outside school in volley ball and basketball. The fourth and fifth grade boys and girls have their own intramural league in street hockey and volley ball, while one room has calisthenics and square dancing for the girls. The faculty, aides, several mothers and staff have given unstintingly of their time and expertise to help the school expand its athletic program. We are now using the Cafeteria, the front playground, and, with the kind permission of the Selectmen, the Town Hall for team sports.

We thank the American Legion for its Christmas gift to the school activities. The money is being used to buy materials

otherwise unavailable to the school.

Much appreciation goes to volunteer mothers who do an excellent job staffing and running our library. The critical need of the library is research material of all kinds to provide the students with the opportunity to do individual, independent studies. A faculty member has given us an encyclopedia and a set of science reference books on the Junior High level. A 1975 World Book Encyclopedia has been placed in the Elementary wing.

Our Hot Lunch staff have provided us with hot and nutritious meals. They worked very efficiently and the kitchen and its operation have passed several State inspections with flying colors.

The loss to the school through the retirement of Mrs. Eleanor Fuller can be tempered only by her promise to do substitute teaching. We wish her well in her retirement.

Mr. Merton Davis, Head Custodian for twelve years, also retired in June. Certainly the building reflects his untiring and proud devotion to his duties over the years, and the men following him have continued to keep the building in fine operating condition.

I thank all members of the entire staff for their excellent cooperation, support and high standards of professionalism. The faculty are now involved in the Union #29 Staff Development Program to increase and strengthen their individual competencies.

I express my sincere appreciation to the people and children of the Chesterfield School District; the individual members of the School Board; Dr. Carmelo Sapone, Superintendent; H. Charles Larracey, Assistant Superintendent; especially to Richard L. Champagne, Assistant Superintendent; and to George Cass, Business Manager.

1973-74

On March 1, 1974 Mary Lou Kelly became the new School Lunch Manager with Carol Riendeau as assistant. Barbara Dascomb substituted when needed and Marilyn Underwood helped to collect lunch money.

On September 4, 1974, the opening day of school, the price of lunch was raised from 45c to 46c due to the increase in the cost of milk. Low fat chocolate milk, along with the regular white milk, was introduced and proved to be a popular item. Applications were available for free and reduced lunch rates. We serve between 145 to 170 lunches a day.

We give monthly menus to each child and menus are sent to the Keene newspaper and radio station.

Government surplus foods were unpredictable and it has been rumored that December's shipment would be the last.

HEALTH REPORT 1973-1974

This school year the only health problem that arose was pediculosis (or head lice). Although this reached nearly epidemic proportions in several nearby towns, due to the cooperation of the parents it was kept under control and eradicated here.

During one week in March, absenteeism rose to 20% because of the flu.

The Dental Health Program was again a success with 77 children participating.

Routine testing for tuberculosis was done to 71 pupils and 38 personnel.

The yearly Public School Vision and Hearing Screening discerned two children with hearing loss, who were referred to specialists.

Physical examinations were given 57 pupils by Dr. Houpis; 19 health problems were found and referred for treatment.
