



STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. S.] To the inhabitants of the Town of Derry qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town, on the second Tuesday of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.

2. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, for the maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, and building and repairing bridges, and for other necessary charges arising within the town.

4. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the town will vote to accept the bequest of the late Miss Emma L. Taylor, of one thousand dollars to Taylor Library, according to the provisions named in her will, and to take any action necessary thereon.

6. To see if the town will vote to accept the bequest of the late Miss Emma L. Taylor, of one thousand dollars, to aid in erecting a Soldiers' Monument, according to the provisions named in her will, and take any action necessary thereon.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the sum bequeathed by the late Miss Emma L. Taylor, to aid in erecting a monument to the memory of the soldiers from the town of Derry, who gave their lives, and in honor of those who gave their services in the late war.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Upton Post, No. 45, G. A. R., to defray the expenses of Memorial Day, 1888.

9. To see it the town will choose an agent to prosecute every person guilty of a violation of the provisions of Chapter 109 of the General Laws.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, to provide a suitable place for the safe keeping and preservation of the public records, and other documents, where they may be deposited and securely kept.

11. To see if the town will require the proprietors of the Manchester & Lawrence Railroad to secure the crossing of the highway, Broadway, so called, at Derry Depot, by said railroad, by a bridge, pass under said way, or by gates on both sides of said railroad.

12. To see if the town will choose one of more

agents to take charge of the roads and bridges and keep the same in repair.

13. To see if the town will vote to adopt Chapter 92 of the Laws of 1883, allowing the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories in April.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

To the Sclectmen of the Town of Derry.

The local Board of Health appointed by you, submit the following report:

The warm season being well advanced before our appointment, renders this report shorter than it might have been otherwise. At the suggestion of the board, the immediate object occasioning their existence, was satisfactorily disposed of by the parties themselves, without official action.

Four cases of scarlet fever, none of which proved fatal, have been reported, which we have also reported to the State Board of health. In these cases the local board took no action, as all necessary precautions were enjoined by the attending physicians.

A sanitary survey, and the necessary changes in the sewage, and ventilating systems of Pinkerton Academy have been made.

Health regulations have been posted in various parts of the town, and we hope that due regard will be given them by all, toward securing a better sanitary condition, especially in the more thickly settled portions. Very respectfully submitted

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

In compliance with the law, that provides that the school board shall make to the town, and the town district, an annual report, with such suggestions as they may think useful, we respectfully submit the following report and remarks.

It will be seen that the school fund for the year 1887, including the sum of \$400, raised by the district, was about sufficient to afford a total length of term of twenty-six weeks in all the schools.

In schools No. 3, 6 and τ_2 , the total length of term was somewhat less than this, owing to sickness of teachers, or to non-attendance of scholars on account of severe weather, or to other causes beyond our control.

In school No. 11, one week was added to the term, to compensate to some extent, for the disadvantages, under which the teachers and scholars labored for want of sufficient room in the school house.

This large school is greatly in need of additional accommodations, and we renew the suggestion made in the last annual report, that the district should provide in some manner, sufficient accommodations for all the children in that vicinity.

Nearly all the school houses have been repaired to some extent, the grounds in front of No's 7 and 8 have been graded, houses No's 8 and 11 have been re-painted, and houses No. 5 and 12 have been re-shingled.

Of the appropriation of \$200 made last year for general repairs there remains a small balance, and we recommend that the district raise the sum of \$100 for the same purpose, for the ensuing year. - 35

If it is desired to maintain the schools for the same number of weeks as in 1887, it is estimated that the sum of \$400 will be required, in addition to the tax required by law.

As to the general prosperity of the schools we believe that the teachers have been faithful and the scholars industrious, and we trust that substantial progress has been made.

If the foregoing suggestions should be favorably considered by the district, they would of course tend, to some extent, to increase the amount of taxation; but we regard it as our duty to fairly state the needs of the schools, as they appear to us.

To the Town District, and the Town of Derry :

The foregoing certificate of the Auditor, being indefinite in its statement, so far as it relates to vouchers, may occasion some inquiry. The following brief statement of facts, is respectfully submitted :

The system by which our official business has been conducted, was adopted by the school board elected in (886, at the organization of the town district, and was approved by the auditors for the district, elected at that time. Before its adoption it was submitted to legal counsel for examination, who advised that it secured ample and complete protection to the interests of the district. Since that time the Legislature (at the last session) has prescribed a general form of accounts, for all the town districts in the state, with which form our system is in substantial accordance. For every payment made by us we have shown to the Auditor a receipt signed by the party to whom the payment was made, or by his agent or representative, which receipt states the date, the number of order, the amount of payment in figures and in writing, and the purpose for which the payment was made. These receipts are similar in form and manner to those required in 1886, and which were approved by the auditors for that year, and are declared by legal counsel to be full and sufficient vouchers.
