## **State of New Hampshire**

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Littleton qualified  
to vote in Town Affairs

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in Town Building on the 8th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1 To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, an Auditor, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to Prosecute Violations of the Liquor Law, three Members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library each for the term of three years in the place of Frank M. Richardson, Harold A. Edson, and George A. Veazey term expired, Constable, two Road Agents.

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, for the purchase of text books and supplies for the schools for the laying out and construction and repairing highways and bridges, for the payment of the town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, and for all other town charges.

Article 3. To see what sums of money the town will raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 4. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for highways, in this town under the provisions of an act to provide for

state aid and for the expenditure of other public monies in the permanent improvement of main highways throughout the state approved February 24th, 1905. And any amendment thereto to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed advisable, and to make suitable appropriations under said act or acts.

Article 5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$300.00 for the support of the Military Band.

Article 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$301.44 to cover a balance due Union School district on account for books and supplies of the year 1904.

Article 7. To see if the Town will authorize and instruct the Selectmen to borrow money upon the credit of the Town to be used by the Littleton Water & Light Commissioners for the purpose of making necessary charges and extensions of the water mains and electric wiring to properly accommodate the public, and provide for the payment of any sums advanced by the Town to the Littleton Water & Light Commissioners for the purpose specified from the net earnings of the Water & Light Co.

Article 8. To see if the town will authorize and instruct the selectmen to erect a sidewalk on the second railroad bridge above the railroad station in Littleton to enable the public to commonly reach the shoe shop to be erected on the Redington Meadow, so called, and to raise the money for the same.

Article 9. To see what action the town will take in regard to purchasing steam roller and to raise the money for the same.

Article 10. To see what action the town will take in placing a new roof on Town Building and steel sheathing on the Police Court room, Selectmen's room and

Town Clerk's office and to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars for the same.

Article 11. To see if the town will ratify the lease given to the Cohashauke club by the present board of Selectmen for the term of three years from the 1st day of December 1909.

Article 12. To see what action the town will take on the establishment of a free delivery of mail in the Village District.

Article 13. To see what action the town will take in regard to instructing its Water & Light Commissioners to make a new contract with the New England Telephone Co, or the Coos Telephone Co, or its successors or assigns of either of said companies, upon conditions more favorable to the inhabitants of said town as to the use of the Electric light poles owned by the said town upon the expiration of the contract now existing between the Littleton Water & Light Co. and the New England Telephone Co., said contract being dated Nov. 13, 1909, and expired Nov. 13, 1910.

Article 14. To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen, Water & Light Commissioners, Library Trustees and School committee in placing fire insurance to distribute the insurance placed upon said town public property between the various local insurance agents doing business in Littleton as equally as possible so far as the various agencies are able to care for their proportionate part of said insurance.

Article 15. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 16. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing and to choose or elect any

agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

Article 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

### **Amendment to Town Warrant made February 19, 1910**

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the purpose of re-imbusing the Sears, Roebuck Company on account of money expended by them in installing a boiler and building a boiler house at the Apthorp Shoe Works.

Article 16. To see what action the Town will take towards making necessary repairs on the dam, flume and wheel-pit of the Apthorp Shoe Works, and rebuild- ing or repairing the roof of the building of the same.

Article 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to negotiate with Sears, Roebuck Co., for the transfer of the Apthorp Shoe Works property to Sears Roebuck Company for manufacturing purposes, with full power to execute any and all agreements, leases or deeds necessary to carry out any vote passed relating thereto.

## Chief Engineer's Report

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners of the Littleton Fire District:

Gentlemen: For the year ending January 31, 1910, there have been three bell alarms and seventeen still, causing a damage to property of \$20,045 and a cost to the precinct of \$166. The causes of the alarms have been sixteen chimney fires, one gasoline stove explosion, one grass fire, one from flying match head, and one caused by children playing with fire.

In the performance of their duties this department has laid and used 2,100 feet of hose, four hand chemicals, and one tank from the chemical engine.
