## TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of New Durham, in the county of Strafford, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said New Durham, on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the public library, in addition to the amount required by law.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize a discount of two per cent on all property taxes paid on or before July 1, 1934.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$609.00 to secure state aid construction, the state to give \$1,218.00.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00, the state to give \$666.00, for the improvement of road through Second Division, known as King's Highway.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the town gravel bank.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money on the credit of the town to pay its just debts.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer and sell property bought by the town for taxes.

Article 10. To see whether the town will vote to permit the manufacture and sale (locally) of beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages as permitted under this act: Chapter 99, Section 22, Laws of 1933.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to buy a new tractor and plow, and appropriate money for the same.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to pay the sum of \$3.00 per year for each member of the fire company, and the sum of \$ .50 per man accident insurance dues for fifteen members.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to pay the sum of \$ .50 per hour for fighting fires, to members of the fire department.

## Report of the Superintendent of Schools

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To the School Board and Citizens of New Durham:

The following are the school statistics for the school year 1932-1933.

Total registration was 69; 47 boys and 22 girls. Grade I had 11 pupils; Grade II, 16; Grade III, 8; Grade IV, 8; Grade V, 8; Grade VI, 11; Grade VII, 5; Grade VIII, 2. The per cent of attendance was 92. Number of visits by the school board was 7; by the superintendent, 79; by citizens, 41. There were 35 cases of tardiness. Three pupils were neither absent nor tardy during the year. Tuition pupils in high school numbered 16; in elementary schools, 5. The school board held six regular meetings.

The registration for this year is 71 for the New Durham schools. Two of these are from the Alton School District; 17 are registered in high schools as tuition pupils, 3 in elementary schools.

Weather conditions and sickness for the present school year have thus far caused a good amount of hardship as well as poor attendance on the part of the pupils. The depression reflects the unrest of the country, community, homes and individuals in the attitude and conduct of the children. We need to hold our poise and keep our feet on the ground for the sake of our growing children and young people. There needs to be better co-operation than ever between home and school.

### SCHOOL APPROPRIATIONS

State aid equalization for the schools of New Durham has given \$2,000 or more for several years and the school district has maintained its schools on a mini-

imum tax rate. The school board recommends the minimum budget as printed in another place in this report. The board by good planning just about makes ends meet at the close of the year.

I am commending the parents and citizens for their interest in their schools, the teachers and pupils for their loyalty and cooperation and the authorities for funds for milk and hot lunches to satisfy necessities during these days. If the depression teaches us to work more kindly and helpfully together, the lesson may be worth the cost.
