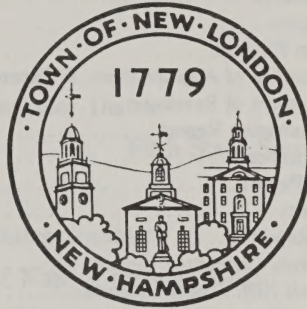

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Growth does not always go hand in hand with good humor, especially not in a town where the last person in often wants to keep the next person out. But New London has kept its sense of humor in spite of its growing pains. We have problems with stump dumps, landfills, transfer stations, recycling, water, sewage, roads, sidewalks and the squadron of lawyers who come with each problem.

But New London is still the most wonderful place to live. We're blessed with physical beauty in the lakes and mountains and clean air to breathe. And we're blessed with the people who make it truly special. Mildred Crockett Tunis is just one of those people but one of the very best.

Last year well over 200 people worked on the town's behalf. Less than 25 were full-time. Over half received no pay at all.

There is no way to estimate the amount of time volunteered by our residents on behalf of their neighbor's good — no way to value their efforts and good will or to count the burned dinners and lost family hours spent trying to keep New London, New Hampshire's nicest town.

It has been a difficult year for those responsible for keeping our town affordable to those who live here. We've had to accept our inherited land fill problems while struggling to cope with the skyrocketing costs of liability insurances. They're dizzying financial burdens.

All of the town's departments, boards and committees have had a rigorous year. The Planning Board, in addition to its regular sessions, has been working on zoning and subdivision changes. And, with its seven able subcommittees, it is revising New London's Master Plan.

The Zoning Board has worked similarly hard to provide an even hand of fairness in reviewing the appeals that came before it.

The Selectmen are particularly thankful to the Business Advisory Committee which has been extremely helpful in the efficient conduct of the town's business.

In a few days we will hold our Town Meeting. Outsiders may view New Hampshire Town Meetings as a hybrid form of democracy and mud wrestling. But we know it as a central part of what makes us special. It's the day that we all become volunteers. It's the day we share our good ideas, intentions and humor with our fellow citizens. And when we have finally hammered the metal of our best ideas, we go home as neighbors and friends bound to the will of our majority.

**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

**TOWN WARRANT**

To the inhabitants of the Town of New London in the county of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

(L.S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next at 10:00 o'clock to act upon the following subjects:

- ARTICLE 1. A. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- B. To vote by ballot on amendments to the New London Zoning Ordinance.
- C. To vote by ballot on changing the term of office of the Town Clerk from one to three years.
- D. To vote by ballot on changing the term of office of the Town Treasurer from one to three years.

Note — By law, the meeting must open before the voting starts. Therefore, the meeting and polls will open at 10 o'clock for the consideration of Article 1, Parts A, B, C and D.

At 12:00 noon the Meeting will recess but the polls will remain open until 6:00 p.m. The meeting will reconvene at the Kearsarge Middle School Auditorium on Wednesday, March 11, 1987 at 7:00 p.m., to act upon Articles 2 through 53.

ARTICLE 2. "To see if the Town will vote to rescind the raising and appropriating the sum of \$242,500, that was granted by secret ballot through the passage of ARTICLE 2 on the Special Town Meeting Warrant June 24, 1986, for the purpose of preparing plans and specifications and constructing a transfer haul facility and recycling facility, such sum included the purchase of original equipment necessary to the operation of such facilities."

ARTICLE 3. "To see if the Town will vote to rescind all authorizations granted under ARTICLE 3 on the Special Town Meeting Warrant June 24, 1986 by secret ballot that: authorized the issuance of serial bonds or notes to fund the appropriations authorized under ARTICLE 2 on the Special Town Meeting Warrant June 24, 1986 and to that end would authorize the raising and appropriation of a sum not to exceed \$242,500, such sum to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes not to exceed \$242,500.00 for a period not to exceed 10 years under



and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (New Hampshire RSA 33:1, etc., as amended); and authorized the Board of Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept, and expend any Federal, State or other available funds toward the project, according to the terms under which they are received, and to borrow in anticipation of the receipt of such aid or the issuance of such notes, bonds or aid as provided by the Municipal Finance Act, as amended; provided that any interest received or available may likewise be applied to the project to the maximum extent permitted by law; and authorized the Board of Selectmen to take all other action as may be necessary to carry out the project in the best interest of the Town of New London.”

ARTICLE 4. “To see if the Town will vote to rescind the raising and appropriating the sum of \$25,000.00 as granted by ARTICLE 4 on the Special Town Meeting Warrant June 24, 1987 for the purpose of contracting the hauling of refuse and rubbish that would otherwise be deposited in the Town Sanitary Landfill to another lawful location upon the completion of the Town’s Transfer Haul Facility, said sum was to include the cost of tipping fees, if any.”

ARTICLE 5. “To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$95,796.00 for the purpose of establishing contracted weekly collection of garbage from residential premises in the Town, and its delivery to and payment of the tipping fee at the waste-to-energy incinerator in Claremont, N.H., pursuant to RSA 31:39I(F) and RSA 31:4, such sum to be raised by assessment of a utility (user) fee upon residences, all in place of and instead of the expenditure of any sum for the construction and operation of a transfer haul facility, and the Board of Selectmen are hereby authorized to create reasonable rules and regulations as granted by the provisions of this ARTICLE.”

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend Federal and State Grants which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money provided: (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other Town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expen-

diture of such grants and monies, and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of Town monies, all as provided by RSA 31:95b.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to incur debts from time to time during the 1987 Fiscal Year to an aggregate amount not exceeding the 1986 tax levy, for temporary loans in anticipation of 1987 taxes, and to issue notes of the Town therefore, and to refund same, all as provided in the Municipal Finance Act. The Selectmen and Town Treasurer to be authorized to sell such notes.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town of New London by Tax Collector's Deed, by public auction or advertised sealed bid or in such manner as determined by the Board of Selectmen as justice may require, in accordance with RSA 80:72.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the prepayment of property taxes and to authorize the Tax Collector to accept such prepayment as provided by RSA 80:52a.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,800.00 for the purpose of removing or encapsulating asbestos in the Tracy Memorial Library.

(.03¢ per thousand)

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing radio equipment for the Town ambulance.

(.03¢ per thousand)

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept funds in the amount of \$10,000.00 from Robert H. Scott and Molly MacNaughton for off-site improvements to Whitney Brook Road, such improvements being a condition of subdivision approval granted by the New London Planning Board, such funds to be used for the sole purpose of improving Whitney Brook Road in accordance with Town specifications and standards and such funds may be carried forward from year to year until the improvements required are completed.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen, subject to the approval of the New London Conservation Commission, to sell to the Pelfor Corporation of New London a small parcel of land, 50' x 172' +/-, at the southern end of tax map tract 83-9, which tract is owned by the Town for Conservation Purposes and abuts lands of the New London Outing

Club (83-10) and Knights Hill Park (83-7), in order that two tracts of land owned by Pelfor Corporation (83-8 and 84-42) may be made contiguous, in return for which Pelfor Corporation will grant a perpetual conservation or recreational easement to the Town of New London or its designate, over the parcel to be sold to Pelfor Corporation as well as tract 83-8 (14.3 acres +/-), which tract abuts lands of the Commission, New London Outing Club and of Knights Hill Park.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to rescind its action under Article 29 of the 1970 Annual Town Meeting, such action would subject all individuals on the Town payroll to the deduction of social security from issued payrolls, except police officers, who are excluded from said deductions by law.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will vote to adopt written welfare guidelines as proposed by the Board of Selectmen, as required by Chapter 380 of the Laws of 1985, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to amend such guidelines without further submissions to a Town Meeting. (Copies of the full text of the proposed guidelines are on file with the Town Clerk.)

ARTICLE 44. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint five (5) alternate members of the Zoning Board of Adjustment for terms of three (3) years as provided in RSA 673:6.

ARTICLE 45. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for the purpose of repairing the Fire Department Tank Truck.  
(.22¢ per thousand)

ARTICLE 46. To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to RSA 35, to establish a Capital Reserve Fund of \$150,000.00 for the purpose of Sanitary Landfill and Stump Dump Closures.  
(\$1.61 per thousand)

ARTICLE 47. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for the purchase of land (Tax Map 78, Lot 5) for the purpose of extending Scytheville Park, and to direct that an application be filed for matching Federal Funds and Grants, such appropriation to include the purchase of land and such construction as may be necessary to create a public park.  
(.32¢ per thousand)

ARTICLE 48. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for the purpose of conducting Engineering Studies in preparation for the closure of the Town's Stump Dump.  
(.22¢ per thousand)

ARTICLE 49. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Ordinance: Owner Responsibility for Illegal Parking. No person shall allow, permit, or suffer a vehicle registered in his name to stop, stand or park in violation of any of the ordinances of the Town of New London or laws of the State of New Hampshire controlling the stopping, standing or parking of vehicles and the owner or person in whose name such vehicle is registered shall be held as prima facie responsible for such violation. A person violating this ordinance shall be punished by a fine as prescribed by RSA 31:39 for each offense.

ARTICLE 50. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Ordinance: Ordinance Regulating On-Street Parking on Newport Road: There shall be no On-Street Parking on Newport Road from the Hilltop driveway to Main Street, except for those areas where parking is authorized by the Town of New London and the State of New Hampshire and is properly marked or signed. A person violating the ordinance shall be punished by a fine as prescribed by RSA 31:39 for each offense.

ARTICLE 51. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Ordinance: The operator or owner of a vehicle may, within two (2) working days of the time when a notice of violation of a parking ordinance of the Town of New London was attached to the vehicle, pay to the Police Department the sum indicated on the violation notice as a penalty and in lieu of court proceedings. Failure by the operator or owner to make such payment within two (2) working days may result in the issuance of a summons to the operator or owner to appear in court to answer to charges of violating the ordinance. A person violating any parking ordinance of the Town of New London shall be punished by a fine as prescribed by RSA 31:39 for each offense.

ARTICLE 52. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Ordinance: No operator or owner of a vehicle shall cause or allow it to be parked or left standing upon the travelled portion of any roadway in any district of the Town of New London. Violation of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine as prescribed by RSA 31:39 for each offense.

ARTICLE 53. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Ordinance: Local Regulations Concerning Septic System Approvals

1. All proposals for any form of sewerage disposal (except for Municipal Sewers under the Board of Sewer Commissioners) must have local Health Department approval before submission to the State of New Hampshire for a permit to construct or operate.
2. Building permits for additional bedrooms to homes served by holding tanks will not be allowed.

## AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen  
Town of New London  
New London, New Hampshire

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements of the Town of New London, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1985, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of New London, New Hampshire at December 31, 1985, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund and account group financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents, including the supplemental Schedule of Federal Assistance, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of New London, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined, combining fund and account group financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

## REPORT OF THE TOWN HEALTH OFFICER

The primary activities of your health officer during 1986 were involved with the checking of test pits and subsequent plans for the construction of septic systems and for the establishment of sub-divisions in the town of New London. Because the test pit is the single most important guide in determining the design of septic systems and for determining the suitability of land for sub-division, the Town of New London has, for a number of years, required that the health officer verify the observations of septic system designers and sub-division designers on characteristics of soil structure, depth to bedrock, and depth to seasonal high water table. On-site observations are compared to those reported on septic system and subdivision plans for accuracy before these are approved for submission to the State of New Hampshire, Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission for its review. This health officer oversight provides the town with its only direct assurance that septic system and subdivision plans are based on valid data which helps to protect the town's environment as well as the pocketbooks of individual homeowners and homebuilders. It should be mentioned that the designers and engineer-designers who have been active in New London have been very cooperative in setting up these test pit arrangements which require the presence of the designer, a backhoe and the health officer, all at the same time — not always easy with three busy individuals.

During 1986 a total of 182 test pits were observed at 71 different sites. Of this number 61 sites with 94 test pits were house lots while 10 sites were subdivisions with a total of 88 test pits. This represents a substantial growth potential for a town the size of New London, especially in that these numbers do not reflect housing units, including two condominiums, built or planned, with connection to the sewer system.

Although state regulations allow the replacement of a septic system with one which is exactly the same type and size, the town of New London has protected itself from the rebuilding of sub-standard systems by requiring replacement systems to go through the regular plan and review process. This practice is encouraged and supported by the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission (WSPCC).

Responding to the inquiries of townspeople on the possibility of sewerage around our lakes, conversations were held with WSPCC staff members to determine the present situation on available funding for such projects. Not only is funding presently non-existent for such new projects, but the Commission is now very much opposed to sewerage of lakes as a result of the experience on Winnepesaukee where sewerage has stimulated the construction of an obtrusive number of lakeside condominiums. Environmentally our most threatening problem is still the effects of acid rain on our water bodies. Fortunately both the Lake Sunapee and Pleasant Lake Protective Associations are monitoring these two lakes for these effects, as measured by total alkalinity determinations. If total alkalinity, now measuring 3-4mg/L, approaches zero, the death knell of

our major lakes will have been sounded. It is my hope that, with the continuing paucity of federal and state environmental funding, the protective associations of the Town's lakes and the Town of New London itself will take action to begin to raise funds to forestall the death of our water bodies by the application of an appropriate substance (lime etc.) to raise the pH to a life supporting near neutrality.

On the public health side there is little to report. We have a few dog bites each year, the usual communicable diseases of childhood and some giardiasis. The latter probably will continue at a nominal incidence level until the public water system converts to full treatment, a groundwater source, or superchlorination-dechlorination treatment.

## NEW LONDON CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT

1986 saw the completion of the study of New London's Prime Wetlands by the Conservation Commission. Detailed reports and maps were submitted to the State Wetlands Board, and the State accepted the reports, designating the Philbrick-Cricenti Bog, the Goose Hole Marsh, and the Low Plains Natural Area as Prime Wetlands. Due to a technicality in order for these to appear as such on the Town zoning map, it was necessary to put this to a vote before the Town again.

The Commission also has made an inventory of the open spaces in the Town and studied the attractive features of these and their importance to the character of New London. Property values in New London have soared, and it has become increasingly difficult to protect the views and open space. The Conservation Commission feels that the townspeople must be alerted to this fact and realize that money will have to be spent to protect some of these areas. Once they are developed it is too late.

Due in part to the increase in building, the Conservation Commission has been called upon to investigate many Dredge & Fill applications and make recommendations to the Wetlands Board.

With the help of many faithful volunteers, the Conservation Commission has continued to maintain the approximately 22 miles of trails under its supervision. Spring Nature Walks and Winter Snowshoe/Cross-Country ski hikes continue to be popular. It is always nice to see new faces on these jaunts. Also volunteers are always welcome on Tuesday morning workdays.

## UPPER VALLEY-LAKE SUNAPEE COUNCIL

The Upper Valley-Lake Sunpae Council is a public, nonprofit voluntary association of towns and cities in the Upper Valley and Lake Sunapee areas. Our thirty-one (31) communities are in two states and five counties.

The Council consists of a Board of Directors and a professional staff. Each town or city annually appropriates funds for the Council's operation and sends two representatives to participate on the Board of Directors. The Board elects officers, adopts the annual work program and budget, and develops policies and positions on issues that are important to our communities.

The Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council is the official organization that brings towns and cities within our region together. By bonding together and pooling their resources, local governments have a highly trained, professional staff available to them for a wide variety of services. Areas of expertise include land use planning, master planning, economic and community development, water quality management, transportation, landscape architecture, housing, capital budgeting historic preservation, downtown revitalization, solid waste planning, recreation and fiscal and environmental impact analysis. The Council also serves as a collective voice for these towns and cities in dealings with state and federal governments, thereby protecting and furthering the needs and interests of our communities.

Half of your local dues to the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council supports regional planning and regional programs. Over the past year, the Council:

- prepared the Upper Valley Solid Waste District Management Plan and provided administrative services to the Solid Waste District;
- sponsored and helped organize the Upper Valley Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program and provided assistance to the New London League of Women Voters to help create a similar collection program in the New London area;
- worked with several communities in the Lake Sunapee area to develop a solution to their septic disposal problem;
- maintained our regional data base, including our role as a Regional Data Center for the U.S. Bureau of the Census and updated and published the Economic Profile of the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Region which is the primary source of economic and demographic data for our region;
- provided an Economic Development Agent for Sullivan County to help retain and expand employment opportunities in the area;
- testified on Vermont's 5-year highway plan and New Hampshire's 10-year highway plan;
- sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture Series;

- sponsored two meetings on groundwater protection and distributed model ordinances to each community in the region;
- provided administrative services to the Upper Valley Community Land Trust and worked with the Connecticut River Watershed Council, Hanover Conservation Council and Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests to negotiate voluntary conservation easements and deed restrictions to protect open space and conservation lands;
- continued the regional historic preservation program, including historic surveys, national register nominations and historic preservation plans;
- coordinated efforts to secure state funding for the Upper Valley Transportation Study and the Cheshire Bridge and completed numerous traffic studies for our communities;
- provided technical assistance to Advance Transit and County Coach;
- helped over a dozen communities seek state and federal grant funds by providing technical assistance, data and in most cases, preparing the grant applications;
- conducted a survey of application fees for local land use regulations and distributed the survey results to several communities;
- met on numerous occasions with state department heads and legislators to discuss the needs and interests of our communities; and
- updated and amended the Regional Land Use Plan.

As requested by communities, the Council conducted a large number of impact studies concerning proposed developments, prepared amendments to local subdivision, zoning, site plan review, and earth excavation regulations and provided mapping, drafting and other technical assistance.

The Council also provided a number of direct services to the Town of New London over the past year. For example, the Council continued to assist the Planning Board in the development of a new Town Master Plan, mapped existing land use in the Community, drafted a new soils map for the Town, analyzed the intersection of Knights Hill Road and South Pleasant Street, conducted a traffic impact study of the new elementary school for the Kearsarge Regional School District and provided technical assistance to the Planning Board through the services of a “circuit rider” professional planner who serves as the town’s own planner one day per week.

The Council’s staff of professionals stands ready to assist your community in addressing the planning and growth management issues which you will face during the coming year. We also encourage you to become more familiar and involved with the Council, since we are essentially an arm of local government addressing your needs.

## REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The New London Planning Board held twenty-three (23) regular scheduled meetings in 1986. The Board also held eighteen (18) work sessions to work on the new Master Plan, to prepare amendments to the New London Zoning Ordinances and to review changes to be made to the Land Subdivision Control Regulations.

A professional planner was budgeted in 1985. He has been contracted for with Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council. Ken McWilliams works every Tuesday in New London. He is available for consultation in the afternoon and works with the Planning Board every Tuesday evening.

Action was taken in the following categories:

- 9 Subdivisions
- 11 Site Plan Approvals
- 1 Home Occupation Approval
- 2 Annexations
- 1 Lot Line Adjustment

The New London Planning board expresses appreciation for Bryant E. Hoffman's contributions as Chairman of the Board for the past four years.

## REPORT OF THE ROAD AGENT FOR 1986

To the Honorable members of the Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of New London

The year 1986 has been one of increased productivity in all the areas of concern to the Highway, Landfill and Cemetery Divisions of the Highway Department. The Board of Selectmen established long range goals for the various Divisions by the mid-year that should insure a continued increase in services with little or no increased impact upon the tax rates paid for their support.

### Cemetery Division

This Division made great progress during the year in the areas of continuing and long range maintenance of the Cemetery properties. Two employees were hired for the summer to perform grass cutting and trimming for the cemeteries as well as other publicly-owned and maintained lands. Highway employees supplemented this work force as needed.

During the year this Division embarked on a program to upgrade the appearance and maintenance expended on the monuments and gravestones within the individual cemeteries. At a cost to the taxpayers of about \$200.00 plus budgeted labor, all of the gravestones and monuments in the Elkins and West Part Cemeteries were cleaned and most broken stones repaired. This work represented a savings of \$30,000.00 to the taxpayers over the cost of contracting this function outside to private vendors. 1987 will see the completion of this program with the cleaning of the stones and monuments in the Old Main Street Cemetery and the repair of the remaining broken stones in all cemeteries.

The Division has assumed the task of decorating the graves of veterans with American Flags as this service is no longer performed by outside interests.

1987 planned activities include the completion of gravestone cleaning and repairs, as described above, the construction of roadways in the new section of Old Main Street Cemetery together with the normal maintenance required and the laying of added water lines in Old Main Street.

It should be noted here that two instances of vandalism occurred in 1986. These acts were limited to the toppling of gravestones during the night. It is difficult to envision a more perverted crime on the part of the individuals, young or old.

### **Highway Division**

1986 was an important year for this Division. With goals set by the Board of Selectmen at mid-year, the personnel embarked on the beginnings of a long range program for the Town that will see the upgrading of our roads on a Town-wide basis.

The winter of 1985-1986 was difficult due to the repeated ice storms during the winter and spring and the frequent breakdown of equipment. During points in two ice storms the Town was without working sanders for a day. This was complicated by the breakdown of several trucks during this period. Department personnel, displaying almost super human effort, through long hours managed to repair the necessary equipment and provide the safety services so badly needed.

In April, following action at the Annual Town Meeting, the Department ordered two new truck sanders, a new dump truck and a roadside mowing tractor. I am pleased to report that the truck sanders have been received and are in operation for the 1986-1987 winter season. These sanders are made of stainless steel and should give the Town good service over the 15-year-guarantee period. The new tractor arrived in July and was pressed into service almost at once. Its late arrival meant that not all roadsides could be mowed during 1986. The new dump truck arrived in the fall and unfortunately was destroyed in an accident at the beginning of November. A replacement vehicle should be in operation by the beginning of 1987. This replacement will be paid for with the proceeds from the Town's insurance coverage.

Construction work occupied the Division's time in the warmer months of the year. Over 1,000 feet of sidewalk were reconstructed by complete replacement on Main Street between Seamans Road and North Pleasant Street. This project included the installation of an underground conduit by the Kearsarge Telephone Company thereby avoiding the placing of higher poles along this portion of Main Street. New curb and a five foot clear pavement surface was installed the length of this new sidewalk. The Division also contracted for the shimming and paving of over 900 feet of Old Coach Road, 1,000 feet of County Road from Newport Road to the Hilltop entrance road and all of the 3,200 feet

of South Pleasant Street. The construction of sidewalks and street paving in Elkins is being held until 1987 due to the inability of contractors to perform the work.

Drainage work was accomplished on South Pleasant, Old Coach, Bog, Knights Hill, Baker Road, Hillside, Soo Nipi, Farwell, Gay Farm and Bunker Roads that included ditching and culvert replacement. The Division is gradually replacing the older steel culverts with aluminum in order to increase life span and decrease yearly operating costs.

During the Fall the Division started the regravelling of roadways. The onset of winter a month early forced the cancellation of this work until Spring when work will resume on those roadways that have been major trouble spots.

The Division completed a number of additional projects during the year, including a bridge rehabilitation at Goose Hole that included cleaning and surface treatment together with paving the bridge and approach ramps and the installation of State approved guard rails. Major tree takedowns were handled on Wilmot Center Road, Burpee Hill, Bunker Road, South Pleasant Street and at the Pleasant Lake Dam. The better part of two weeks was required to clean up after a spring ice storm that downed many trees and limbs in the higher elevations of the Town. Numerous signs were replaced due to a marked increase in vandalism throughout the Town. The usual street sweeping was completed, a new sander shed was constructed, Bucklin Beach parking lot was shimmed and paved, and an overflow parking area was constructed. The Town Hall grounds were prepared and seeded, and the parking lot behind the new Town Hall addition was paved. Sidewalks were installed around the building. In Elkins a foot bridge was constructed over Chandler Brook in order to increase the safety of fishermen and the many individuals who walk in this area. Many other projects, both large and small, were completed during the progress of this busy year.

### **Landfill Division**

1986 has been a year of great activity for this Division. The engineering study of the Sanitary Landfill is nearly complete as this report is being written. Land has been purchased, engineering work completed and permits applied for in order to construct the Solid Waste Transfer Station on Newport Road as voted at the June Special Town Meeting.

The Town voted funds as part of the 1986 budget to participate in a District wide hazardous waste day. This highly successful program collected over 30 barrels of hazardous chemicals for proper disposal.

Recycling operations continued with difficulty. The Town voted to purchase a used pit baler in order to handle the recycling of newspaper and cardboard in a more efficient and effective manner. The recycling of paper products represents an excellent revenue source to help offset the continued rising costs of solid waste disposal. The installation of our new baler in 1987 will enable the Town to realize this goal. The recycling of metals continued during the year with over 20 tons of material removed from the solid waste stream.

The Division plans to increase the products it can recycle. In addition to paper and cardboard, planning is underway to accept magazines, aluminum, and non-aluminum cans, glass, plastics and batteries to name a few. Acceptance of these new items will be phased in over a period of time.

The Demolition and Stump Dump is nearing the end of its useful life. During 1986 the Division discontinued the acceptance of stumps, logs and rocks due to lack of room. The demolition area continues operations, as does the brush burn pile and metal collection areas. It is expected that the demolition area will be closed during 1987 as this area of the landfill will be full.

The State has ordered the Town to place test wells around this facility in preparation for closure. The Town Meeting will be asked to appropriate funds (\$20,000) for the necessary work required before closure.

In closing, I would like to express my personal appreciation to the many individuals who serve as New London's elected and appointed officials for their assistance during the past year. Thank you to the Citizens of New London for their help, assistance and suggestions. Your help has been invaluable in accomplishing the work of the past year. A very special thank you to the members of the Board of Selectmen and their able staff and co-workers. Nothing could or would have been accomplished without your dedication to the people of New London. Last, but not least, to the individual employees of the Department for their many long hours, both night and day. Your efforts did make the difference in providing those necessary services to the citizens of this community.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NEW LONDON GARDEN CLUB

The club works toward these principles in many ways. The civic beautification committee has continued to maintain thirteen areas in New London and Elkins. Throughout the year members care for patients' plants both in the Clough Extended Care and New London Hospital. In December the club has a greens workshop to make wreaths for the town buildings and churches, as well as Christmas arrangements for shut-ins and each room at Clough Extended Care. Members have won awards in both state and out-of-state flower shows. The club also received first award for “The Yearbook,” “Scrapbook,” and “The Pressbook.”

Programs are held throughout the year that are designed to instruct and inform members about conservation, gardening, landscaping and flower arranging. Some of the meetings are open to the public.

In 1985 the club added the Governor's Lilac Project to their list of town projects, and planted lilac plants at several areas. This year we have continued to maintain the plants which requires many hours of special care.

In July we held our annual “Antique Show and Sale.” The proceeds from the show enable us to give two scholarships to two deserving students in the Department of Plant Sciences and the two-year program in applied sciences at the University of New Hampshire.

There are 125 members in the club and we are a member of the Dartmouth-White Mountain District, New England Region, New Hampshire Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc., and the National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc.

## REPORT OF THE TOWN HISTORY AND ARCHIVES COMMITTEE

During the past year there has been a continuation of routines such as receiving additional historical materials in the form of reports of town organizations, old photographs and clippings relative to activities of various town committees and commissions. These are filed, and in addition, work has proceeded in replacing old file folders and manuscript containers with acid free folders and boxes for long range protection.

We have continued to assist individual citizens and the Town Clerk and Tax Collector in searches for records housed in our present space in the Vault at Tracy Library.

Each year, we receive inquiries by mail and by out of town visitors and assist in their genealogical research on ancestors and identification of homes in town connected with their early native families.

In consultation with Fred Welch, we have outlined plans for the completion and furnishing of assigned space in the new addition to the Town Hall. We anticipate this new facility has adequate space for further carrying out our services to the Town and protecting and preserving these aspects of our Town's heritage.

Special plans are underway for a long overdue recognition of New London men and women who have served in the armed forces in World War II and recent wars in Korea and Vietnam.

During the past two years, Margaret Moreland has shared increased responsibility in carrying out our activities. I have felt that the time had come for me to relinquish the responsibility as Archivist. In this connection, I submitted my resignation to Fred Welch and the Selectmen in a letter dated September 1, 1986, to take effect at the end of the year. I suggested that Margaret be officially appointed as Archivist and that Nancy Muller and Town Clerk and Tax Collector, Lois Marshall, be added to the History and Archives Committee as of January 1, 1987.

I have considered it a privilege and pleasure to have served as Archivist and member of the Committee for these years and shall be willing to help in any special ways in the future.

## NEW LONDON RECREATION COMMISSION

1986 brought new levels of achievements and standards for the town's water-front programs. During the year we updated our rescue equipment and lifeguard supplies with the purchase of new first aid kits, fiberglass rescue boards, and a pressure treated lifeguard stand. All of these items are used to increase our staffs' ability to watch over the swimming activities at each beach.

We employed more lifeguards with water safety instructor (WSI) certification than ever before. This enabled us to expand our swimming and teaching programs to include more sessions of fewer swimmers per lessons and a better one-to-one ratio of student to instructor. In spite of a long, damp summer our staff taught 150 swimmers with 110 of them advancing to their next level.

The 1987 season will offer new challenges for our staff as the town population increases. As a commission we have found the input of ideas and time from supporting organizations helpful in making our programs work smoothly. We encourage this to continue.

## SEWER COMMISSION REPORT

### 1986 — A Year of Progress

Both Allis Chalmers pumps at the Georges Mills station were finally declared inadequate by the State of New Hampshire and replaced, along with appropriate piping changes, with two new Fairbanks Morse pumps. Our vibration level has lowered tremendously and we expect a relatively long term of satisfactory service.

Progress is also being made in the Sunapee area to alleviate our odor problem.

An accurate measuring device has been found and recommended by our engineers and installation is expected at the town line during the first half of 1987.

To reduce the infiltration into our system, 1986 saw 200 feet of pipe examined by television and all discovered leaks sealed. Also 14 manholes have been patched, sealed or reset.

Along Lakeside Road, 2,400 feet of gravity main was laid by the developers and accepted by the town.

Our safety factor has been widened by the permanent addition of an emergency pump at South Pleasant Street.

All of the above were supervised by our two employees, John Bickford and Seth Nuttelman, along with their regular schedule of maintenance and inspection.

## ANNUAL REPORT 1986 TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY

Circulation of books, periodicals, pamphlets, records, and cassettes increased from 39,775 items in 1985 to 42,669 items in 1986. New acquisitions numbered 1,505 for books, pamphlets, and large print materials and 220 for non-print items such as records and cassettes for a total of 1,725. The total of registered borrowers reached a new high of 2,145 of which 1,644 are adults and 501 are school-age children, grades K-12. This compares with 1,376 adults and 365 children a year ago. We have had 15 adult programs with a total of 320 in attendance and 116 children's programs attended enthusiastically by 5,143 young people.

Our volunteers continue to support our library and faithfully attend to many functions that the staff might not be able to accomplish otherwise such as: mending books, cleaning records, processing books and periodicals, assisting in programs, among others.

Along with the volunteers, the Friends of Tracy Library provide a backbone of support. Because of the Friends generous financial gift, we were able to purchase the following: special books; a ceiling fan, small chairs and floor-seats, and additional cassettes and books for the children's department; additional adult audio books; and an electronic typewriter and table to be used for cataloging purposes. As in the past the Friends have sponsored special programs for children and adults. Such would not be possible without the Friends of Tracy Library as the budget is not drawn up to include these purchases and services.

In 1985 delivery of library materials to house-bound New London residents through the generosity of the Alma H. Ohler Memorial Fund was instituted and continues to be a valuable service to our community.

Please visit our library. You can be proud of what belongs to all of us.

Over the past eight years, the Kearsarge Valley Community Action Program has been the focal point of social service delivery in this area, providing help when needed to the income eligible and elderly, as well as to the community at large.

As perhaps you are aware, Community Action Program Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc. generates funds through the mobilization of available federal, state and local monies. Support for the local Area Center is derived from a combination of federal appropriations and local tax dollars. This combination allows the Kearsarge Valley Community Action Program to provide a variety of services to the residents of your community, from the development of programs which meet local needs, to outreach, referral and direct assistance.

The attached budget reflects the minimum costs of maintaining and continuing the operations of the Kearsarge Valley Area Center. I respectfully submit that an item be placed in the Town Budget in the amount of \$1,468 for the continuation of services to the residents of New London.

This figure is based on the operating costs of the Area Center, as well as on last year's local community participation level and the services provided to New London in the amount of \$24,491.12. The total dollar amount needed from the local towns to maintain and operate the Area Center is \$21,911.00.

I have also attached a detailed summary which provides a brief description of our programs and the number of New London residents who participated in them.

The staff of the Kearsarge Valley Area Center wish to thank you and the Town of New London for your support in the past. With your continued interest, we will be able to continue to provide needed services to the members of your community.

## NEW LONDON HOSPITAL AUXILIARY ANNUAL REPORT 1986

The New London Hospital Auxiliary continues to serve the Hospital as a community relations agent. Eight monthly meetings, from fall to spring, were held in the First Baptist Church and our annual meeting took place in June at the Lake Sunapee Country Club. Board meetings were held monthly at the Hospital and the President of the Auxiliary serves on the Hospital Board of Trustees. The monthly membership meetings are work sessions and guest speakers present updates on new medical cares and concerns, as well as information on changes within the Hospital's health care programs and services. Through the efforts of approximately 160 volunteers we attempt to support the needs of the Hospital personnel and patients as well as the recipients of the Meals on Wheels program. Mrs. Frances Baynes continues to do a superb job as our volunteer Director of Volunteer Services. Besides coordinating and training she guided twelve enthusiastic volunteers in serving where needed last summer. Within the Hospital our volunteers and volunteers serve as transport aides, deliver mail, maintain the beverage program and TV rentals, assist in the Occupational, Physical, and Recreational Departments, as well as the Day Care Center, laboratory, library and business office. Over 5,000 hours of inservice volunteering has again been recorded; over fifty volunteers, along with the cooperation of the Dietary Department, maintained the Meals on Wheels program; and Mrs. Anne Davis was honored as the "Volunteer of the Year."

Through a variety of fund-raising projects: spring and fall rummage sales, a tennis tournament, Barn Players pillow rentals and Hospital Day activities, we enlist the services of innumerable community volunteers and hopefully expand goodwill beyond the boundaries of the Hospital. With the results of monies raised we were able to present \$21,165 to the Hospital for past commitments, and a \$1,000 check to our scholarship recipient, Christine Manning of Warner, N.H. We presented funds for the purchase of ten infant car seats to the Kearsarge Visiting Nurse Association, and purchased a new TV and VCR for the residents of the Extended Care Facility.

Construction of the Signal Environmental Systems, Inc. waste-to-energy facility is nearing completion. Based on the current schedule, Signal expects to begin accepting waste for test purposes by the end of February, 1987, and to begin commercial operation during May, 1987.

Changes to the facility, because of new State regulations, include dry lime scrubbers and fabric filters to meet new acid gas emission standards and auxiliary burners to control trace organic emissions during start-up. The cost of constructing and operating this new control equipment will add over seven dollars per ton to disposal costs.

The permit application for an ash landfill on land owned by the Sullivan County District in Newport, New Hampshire, was filed with the State in September 1986. It is expected that the permitting process, including any appeals by opponents, should be completed during 1987. Discussions have been held with Browning Ferris Industries to use a newly lined section of the Rockingham, Vermont, landfill in the interim.

A Recycling Project Manager was hired in March, 1986. During May, 1986, household hazardous waste collection days were held in Springfield, Vermont, and Claremont and New London, New Hampshire. Eighty barrels of material were collected from citizens and schools in the two Districts. This fall, the access road to the waste-to-energy facility was paved with glassphalt, using 120 tons of recycled glass collected from the Districts and other recycling facilities.

A report illustrating potential cost savings associated with recycling in each member town was completed, and meetings with interested town officials are on-going. It is hoped that during 1987, citizens and businesses will have the opportunity to recycle glass, metal, newsprint and cardboard at various locations throughout the District.

Removal of trace metals is also a priority for recycling because these metals may cause unacceptable air emissions when burned and increase metal concentrations in leachate from the ash landfill. Signal has provided the Districts with a \$2,500 grant to begin a household battery recycling program. Discussions are being held with battery retailers about providing containers to collect used batteries for recycling or disposal in a proper manner.

This coming year will be a difficult one as the District and Towns switch from the old system to the new one. The District Committee and staff will be working to make the transition as smooth as possible. If anyone has questions or suggestions, they should not hesitate to attend District meetings or contact their District Representative or the Project office.

REPORT TO THE VOTERS - 1986

\* \* \* \* \*

Projects completed in 1986 include an 850-foot extension of the water main on Lakeside Road to complete a loop which improves drinking water service and fire protection to the community. The project to install meters in all commercial establishments was about 50% completed and will be finished in 1987. Progress was also made in the inspection for and installation of backflow safety devices according to N.H. Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission requirements.

Applications were received for twenty-five new residential connections (including apartments) and for twelve commercial connections. Included in the commercial connections were the new school building and the new Cricenti shopping complex.

Representatives of the N.H. Water Resources Board inspected the dams at the reservoirs and Morgan Pond and found them in good condition.

The issue that continues to dominate the Precinct's attention is the improvement of water quality either through gravel-packed wells on Colby Point as recommended by last year's engineering study or by the far more expensive route of a treatment plant for Morgan Pond's water. No changes in N.H. Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission requirements that would make the treatment plant option more acceptable have occurred since our engineering study or seem to be in the offing. Input by the Little Lake Sunapee Protective Association and others has been considered on this point. The engineering firm of D.L. Maher has outlined a program that will complete the testing of Colby Point as to water quality and quantity. Some work was done in 1984, but not enough for a full evaluation of this potential source, therefore, completion of the testing program is a recommendation on the year's warrant.

It has become apparent to the Commissioners that some consideration ought to be given to the possibility of dissolving the Precinct with the condition that it be accepted by the town of New London. The Precinct was formed in 1925 for fire protection that would allow the center of town to develop. Without that protection plus the safe drinking water supply, schools, the hospital, and commercial activity would have been difficult to establish and maintain. With the rapid growth and continuing development pressure, it now seems desirable to have the sewer, water, and highway services under the same management. Savings and efficiencies would be possible in such things as insurance, bookkeeping, and day-to-day operations, and also in the development of long-range plans in accordance with the town's Master Plan. Federal requirements relating to public health concerns are beginning to present financial burdens that may not be possible for only the portion of the town in the Precinct to bear.

Precinct boundary disputes continue to emerge which, wastefully, involve the Boards of Selectmen from two towns, lawyers, and a great deal of the Commissioners' time and energy. A committee appointed jointly by the Commissioners and the Selectmen of New London will study the entire issue, including the implications for Precinct members in Springfield, for a report in the Fall of 1987.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS  
FOR THE YEARS ENDED ON DECEMBER 31, 1986 AND 1985

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The income accounts of the New London-Springfield Water System Precinct are maintained on a cash basis, recording income as it is collected. The income accounts are converted to an accrual basis at year-end.

Expense accounts record items only when cash is disbursed. The expense accounts are converted to an accrual basis at year-end. The inventory of supplies is priced at cost. Based on a physical inventory taken once a year at year-end, the increase or decrease in the inventory value is charged or credited to supply expense. The policy of the Precinct is to maintain a uniform level of supplies inventory for Precinct use in its operations. In 1986, the Precinct required certain commercial customers to install protective equipment to prevent possible contamination of the water system. As a convenience to these customers, the Precinct purchased supplies of protective equipment for re-sale to customers, to assure the most expeditious installation.

Facilities and equipment are stated at undepreciated cost. Gifts and contributions of water facilities are recorded at fair market value at the time received. Assets disposed of or abandoned are written off at cost against the appropriate asset account, and charged to the General Fund balance or the Contributions in Aid balance, depending on the original source of the assets.

Note 2 - Precinct Tax

The Precinct Tax has no restrictions. However, income from this tax is used primarily to pay principal and interest on outstanding debt and to pay for facilities and equipment. The tax is reported as Other Income to avoid distortion of gain or loss from water operations.

Note 3 - Contributions in Aid

Contributions in Aid for 1986 and 1985 were \$1,920 and \$2,404, respectively, for new connections paid for by owners and contributed to the Precinct.

At the annual Precinct Meeting on March 18, 1986, the voters approved by two-thirds hand vote special articles 5,7, and 8 of the warrant. These articles authorized the Commissioners to issue notes for a total amount of \$91,825.00 to finance the purchase of a new dump truck, the purchase and installation of water meters for commercial customers, and the 850-foot extension of the 8-inch main on Lakeside Road. Proceeding under the authorization of this vote, the Commissioners negotiated the above loan with the New London Trust Company, and proceeded with the implementation of the three special articles. Subsequently, in October, 1986, it was learned that the N.H. Department of Revenue Administration, acting under RSA 33:8, disallowed the three special articles and the long-term note in the Precinct's 1986 budget because a written ballot had not been used to take the vote.

On February 3, 1987, the Precinct renegotiated payments on the long-term note with the New London Trust Company. As a result, payments on principal are expected to be \$51,898.34 in 1987 and \$27,254.71 in 1988.

To the inhabitants of the New London-Springfield Water System Precinct in the towns of New London and Springfield in the counties of Merrimack and Sullivan respectively, qualified to vote in Precinct affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in New London, New Hampshire, on Tuesday, March 17, 1987 at 3:00 P.M. to act on the following subjects:

(Note: By law the meeting must open before voting starts. Therefore, the meeting and the polls will open at 3:00 P.M. At 3:15 P.M. the meeting will recess but the polls will remain open until 8:00 P.M., at which time the meeting will reconvene to act on Articles 1 through 13).

- ARTICLE 1: To choose all necessary officers for the coming year.
- ARTICLE 2: To hear the reports of officers, committees and auditors, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 3: To set the salaries of all officers for the coming year.
- ARTICLE 4: To see if the Precinct will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums to defray precinct charges for the ensuing year:

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Precinct will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$14,000 for the purchase of a new 3/4 ton pick-up truck.

(Explanation: The old truck purchased in 1979 needs replacing).

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Precinct will authorize the Commissioners to sell by sealed bid to the highest bidder the pick-up truck presently owned by the Precinct and to apply the proceeds of such sale to the general fund of the Precinct.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Precinct will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$5,000 for the installation of equipment to control corrosion as required by the New Hampshire Water Supply & Pollution Commission.

(Explanation: The water supplied by the Precinct is presently in violation of corrosion guidelines and must have a PH adjustment).

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Precinct will vote to establish a capital reserve fund as provided in RSA Chapter 35 for the purpose of the construction of a specific capital improvement namely, the extension of an 8" main along the Knights Hill Road which will join dead end lines presently in place.

(Explanation: The estimated cost to extend this line 2,500' is \$172,000. By appropriating a sum of money each year to be paid into this capital reserve fund, the construction can then take place in the near future without the necessity of borrowing any money. The Precinct must first establish the capital reserve fund and then appropriate money into it. Money can be withdrawn from the capital reserve fund only by vote of the Precinct).

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Precinct will appropriate \$50,000 to be paid into the Knights Hill Road Extension Capital Reserve Fund.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Precinct will appropriate a sum not to exceed \$30,000 for the first phase in the installation of domestic water meters.

(Explanation: The estimated cost of installing meters for all domestic connections is \$94,000. It is hoped the project can be completed in three years. Metering domestic water use will discourage waste and insure fairness by allowing charges to be made only for the water actually used).

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Precinct will appropriate a sum not to exceed \$21,000 to complete the exploration and testing for water quantity and quality at Colby Point including drilling test wells and conducting an extended duration pump test.

(Explanation: Completing the evaluation of Colby Point as a source is necessary in order to determine the best alternative in order to improve water quality and satisfy the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act).

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Precinct will vote to change the date of the 1988 annual meeting from the third Tuesday in March to the first Tuesday in March.

(Explanation: If dissolving the Precinct is an issue for consideration at the 1988 annual meeting, the logical sequence would be to ask the voters of the Precinct to make a decision before bringing the matter before the voters at the New London Town meeting).

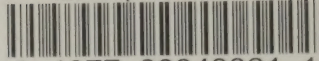
