## TOWN WARRANT.

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### State of New Hampshire.

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plymouth in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plymouth on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate in addition to that required by law for the support and maintenance of the Free Public Library.
4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repair of highways.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate, in addition to that required by an act of legislature approved Feb. 24, 1905, to be used for permanent improvement of its main highways, such improvement to be made under the advice of the State Engineer.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate to pay firemen.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for the decoration of soldiers' graves.
8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money to pay the debts of the town and give notes therefor countersigned by the town treasurer.
9. To see if the town will vote to abandon the services of the permanent or night police.

10. To see if the town will vote to purchase a steam roller, and vote what sum of money shall be raised or appropriated to pay for same.

11. To see what action the town will take in regard to building a fire-proof vault for the reception of town books and valuable papers, and to see what sum of money shall be raised or appropriated to build the same.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate to pay Keniston Band for open air concerts during the summer of 1910.

13. To see what action the town will take in regard to celebrating Old Home Week, and see what sum of money it will vote to raise or appropriate for the same, and to choose any committees needed.

14. To see what action the town will take in regard to furnishing a permanent water supply at Riverside cemetery, and see what sum of money shall be raised or appropriated for said purpose.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate four thousand dollars to build a permanent road from "Rowe's Corner", so-called, to the Fair Grounds.

16. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation for a term of ten years a hotel property to be erected by the Pemigewasset Hotel Company.

17. To see if the town will vote to accept a bequest made in the last will of Francis H. Weeks, of five hundred dollars, the income from the same to be used for the perpetual care of his lot and monument thereon in Riverside cemetery.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

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To the Citizens of Plymouth:

The School Board herewith submits its annual report for the fiscal year ending February 15, 1910.

Since our last report was issued several changes have been made in the teaching body, the courses of study in both rural and high schools have been partially revised in order to keep pace with the demands of present day requirements in education. We are confident that such changes have been, on the whole, productive of better work on the part of teacher and pupil, and it has been the policy of the School Board to secure only those teachers whose training and experience have fitted them to deal with child life.

Our State Superintendent is untiring in his efforts to raise the standard of education in the state: he has personally visited a large per cent of the rural or ungraded schools, and nearly all of the high schools of New Hampshire, and consequently no one is better prepared to speak of educational conditions as they exist.

The State Department has issued circular letters to all Principals of high schools which state that pupils who wish to obtain a secondary education must pass an examination in all subjects required by law to be taught in the ungraded school and that such pupils must attain an average rank of seventy per cent. in all studies. It is needless to say that such requirements have raised the standard of scholarship in the surrounding towns. The graduates of rural schools have found it rather difficult to pass the entrance examination to our high school; however, the examinations of late have shown a decided improvement in character, quality and amount of work accomplished in the grades. In fact the Plymouth High School is doing work equivalent to that of the colleges of a not very remote date; consequently,

in order that the high school pupils can stand the strain of keeping up the quantity as well as quality of work required, they must have better preparation, in the grammar grades, than has been customary in past years.

Skilled supervision is needed in all towns of the state. Under the management of men equipped for their work better courses of study have been prepared, trained teachers have been employed and better results have been obtained on part of all concerned.

In the Treasurer's account, appended to this report, can be found a list of the teachers with their salaries and the sum total of all monies expended for school purposes.

During the past year the privilege of college certification has been granted to our High school: "Hereafter our young people can enter college direct from our own school and without the ordeal of entrance examinations."

The following institutions have stated they will receive our graduates on a certificate signed by the Principal: New Hampshire College of Agriculture and Mechanic Art, Durham, N. H.; Polytechnic Institute at Worcester, Mass.; Simmons College, Boston, Mass.; Bates College, Lewiston, Me.; Middlebury College, Middlebury, Vt.

Also all Colleges and Universities represented by the New England College Entrance Certificate Board: namely, Amherst, Boston University, Bowdoin, Brown, Dartmouth, Mt. Holyoke, Smith, Tufts, University of Maine, University of Vermont, Wellesley, Wesleyan and Williams.

Four members of the last graduating class are attending the State Normal, three have entered college and one, by a competitive examination, has entered the U. S. Revenue Cutter Service.

On the evening of June 15th, nineteen students will graduate from the Senior class in our High School and receive diplomas. Nearly all of these graduates will be prepared to enter professional and technical schools, or college, on a certificate signed by proper authority.

No doubt many parents and citizens have felt that too much work has been required of the boys and girls but this is not the fault of our school: it is the demand of the times and to keep pace with other schools of a similar grade we must meet requirements of the colleges and professional schools and, lastly, our State Department.

Pupils who cannot complete the course of study in four years will be obliged to remain in the secondary school for a period of five or even six years. Students cannot do satisfactory work in their studies unless they give the requisite amount of time to the preparation of daily lessons, both

within and out of school, nor can they receive a certificate admitting them to other educational institutions unless their average yearly rank is *eighty-five per cent.*, or more.

### **LIBRARY.**

During the past three years there have been purchased, at expense of the town, nearly five hundred volumes of reference books of various kinds for the school library: many of the volumes having been placed in school at the suggestion of the State Department and they are indispensable in preparation of daily lessons.

### **DECORATIONS.**

Something should be done in the way of school decoration: busts of persons prominent in history, bas-reliefs and pictures would add greatly in beautifying class-rooms and halls.

There may be citizens and friends who would be pleased to contribute money or pictures to improve the appearance of the interior of our otherwise well equipped High School building, and such gifts would be most welcome.

### **GROUNDS.**

During the past year extensive improvements have been made on these at a considerable expense: the lot in front of the building, at corner High and Summer streets, has been graded, seeded, and a part of it utilized for tennis courts. The bank from the street to the campus has also been graded and opposite the main walk a broad double flight of cement steps, with iron side railings, has been constructed.

The school is now amply provided with play grounds as it has a basket ball court, three tennis courts, and sufficient room for base ball practice.

We trust that parents and interested citizens will be

present at the annual meeting, that they will have given this report due consideration and be prepared to vote such sums of money as may be required to maintain the present standard of our schools.

#### **FINANCIAL CONDITION OF THE DISTRICT.**

The School Board has paid, out of appropriation and income from other sources, interest on bonds, matured bonds and all running expenses of the schools: in addition to this they have paid \$2,000.00 on old land notes leaving but \$1,500.00 now outstanding on land account.

Parents and citizens are invited to visit each and all departments of our schools, that they may better understand and appreciate the work being done by their children and this is the only way that the tax-payers can determine whether or not their money is being used to the best advantage, as personal visitation will settle many doubts or misunderstandings in the minds of those interested in the training of their boys and girls.

In conclusion we desire to express a word of appreciation to the teachers for their conscientious and earnest efforts to give the pupils their very best and for their co-operation in all that advances the interests of the schools.

We also wish to express our thanks to the citizens of Plymouth for their hearty support in all that pertains to the welfare of our public schools.

## FIRE DISTRICT REPORT.

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A glance at the District report would indicate mismanagement of the Fire Department funds. As you will quickly see that there is a deficit for the year 1909-10, and little explanation will perhaps be in place at this time.

At the beginning of the year there was \$169.99 not used the year before. It was made known at the last meeting that it was necessary to buy at least 500 feet of new hose. If the expense of fires had been no greater than the previous year there would have been ample money to purchase the extra hose.

We have had during the year nine bell alarms and seven still alarms. All the still alarms have been put out with chemicals at a very small expense. The Pemigewasset fire explains the deficit for this year. The cost of firemen, loss of chemicals, repairs on apparatus, and cost of Ashland Department for this fire was \$341.34. The Department was called to one fire out of town which cost the District \$47.85 for which as yet we have not received remuneration.

It is the opinion of the Commissioners that the hose cart for Hose Co. No. 1, is not suitable to cope with fires in Plymouth Fire District, it being much too heavy for the number of firemen that it is possible to get there quickly after an alarm. It is also necessary that at least 500 feet of hose be purchased the coming year, as the old hose is fast going to pieces and much of it is unsafe to use.

The alarm system is in as good condition as it is possible to have it with the four poor boxes now in the system. We would especially recommend that two new fire alarm boxes be installed at once, one near the Normal Hall building and one at Five Points, in place of the unreliable boxes now in use.

# **WATER COMMISSIONERS' REPORT**

**Year Ending January 1, 1910.**

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The system has been permanently improved by the addition of 100 feet of 6-inch iron pipe on Main street, near the Town Hall, 600 feet of iron pipe of the same diameter on High street, west from Main, 250 feet of 4-inch iron pipe on High street extending to Langdon street, and extensions of water mains from High street to connect with the water main on Summer street. These additions have eliminated the dead ends on Summer and Langdon streets, and greatly increased the efficiency of the hydrant service in protecting the valuable school property of the town and state. These extensions will also result in improving the quality of the water in this part of the district.

A new hydrant has been set on the south side of High street, near the dwelling of Mrs. Henry McQuesten, which will be an important factor in the extinguishment of any fire that may occur in the Town Hall, the Draper & Maynard Company's factory, or other adjacent buildings. A building has been erected over this hydrant, and a supply of Standard hose placed therein at the voluntary expense of that Company.

Three hundred feet of 3-4 inch galvanized iron service pipe have been laid down in Wentworth street, six new gates established, a new well excavated near the large reservoir, and 225 feet of 4-inch akron pipe laid under ground from the well towards the reservoir. The wells near the reservoirs, and water conduits leading therefrom, have been repeatedly cleaned, and the system generally is in a satisfactory condition.

Twelve new service connections have been made with the system, and the financial situation of the Department is free from embarrassment. Several analyses of the reservoir water have been made, and in each case it has received

official commendation from the State authorities. Fifteen hundred dollars of the bonded debt have been extinguished, leaving \$29,500.00 still unpaid. The itemized account of the Treasurer, to which the attention of the District is directed, renders further reference to the finances unnecessary.

The same amount, \$1,300.00, heretofore raised annually will be sufficient to meet the needs of the District, and we recommend that this amount be raised for the ensuing year.
