STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Seabrook qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town hall in said Town, on Tuesday the twelfth day of March next, ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To elect a town clerk, one selectman for a term of three years, town treasurer, collector of taxes, three constables, highway agent, three overseers of the poor and all other town officials for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the expense of the general government, for the protection of persons and property, for health and sanitation, for highways and bridges, for the support of the town poor and all other necessary expenditures for the year ensuing.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money on anticipation of taxes, and to renew and refund town notes.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of forty (\$40.00) dollars for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 5. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise to defray the expense of collecting garbage from the residents of Seabrook Beach, the same being left in the hands of the Selectmen.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the protection of property at Seabrook Beach during the winter months, to be left in the hands of the Selectmen.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise in regard to putting in wells at Seabrook Beach for fire protection, to be left in the hands of the Selectmen.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to pay fifty (.50) cents per hour for all Firemen, Police, Highway and Miscellaneous labor.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to elect Selectmen annually for a one year term beginning March 1936.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to pay for the expense of putting the Adams factory in condition for occupancy and appropriate money for same.

Article 12. To see what action the town will take in regard to purchasing a tractor, the price of same not to exceed \$2,500.00.

Article 13. To see what amount of money the town will vote to raise for Town Road Maintenance or State Aid Maintenance.

Article 14. To see if the town will raise a sum for material for any projects which may be allotted to the town.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to regulate the digging of clams within the town limits, to make reasonable rules and regulations restricting the sale and consumption thereof, and to authorize the Selectmen to issue permits in accordance with such regulations.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

Article 17. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

Article 18. To transact all other business that may legally come before said meeting.

7. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
8. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to furnish the transportation for all pupils living one and one-half miles or more from any elementary school to which they shall be assigned by the School Board in the said district.

9. To see what action the School District will take in regard to relieving the crowded condition at the South School.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board of Seabrook:

I herewith submit to you my fifth annual report as superintendent of schools:

By vote of the district meeting of last April the school report of this year is included in the town report. Heretofore, a separate report has been issued which included the statistics and the financial reports of the last completed school year and the school board's budget for the next year. This year's report will include all of these and in addition a statement of receipts and expenditures during the current school year from July 1st, 1934 to January 31, 1935. This will mean a double reporting of the first half of each school year as the report of 1936 will also include the expenditures from July 1st, 1934 to January 31, 1935. I am calling attention to this fact to aid in the interpretation of present and future printed figures.

The results from the federal distribution of milk to children who are underweight proved of such undoubted benefit that, although funds this year are more limited, it was felt the custom should not be discontinued. As a result the government is furnishing one half pint of milk daily to each of one hundred twenty-eight pupils in the Seabrook schools. In this as in other phases of her work your school nurse, Mrs. Lindsey, has done remarkably effective service. Through her efforts federal money was secured for much needed dental work, for eyesight tests and the furnishing of glasses, as well as for several tonsil operations. The importance of these things upon the physical and mental health of the child is not fully realized. Many a pupil is failing in his school subjects and develops an unhealthy view of life itself because of fault in these things. I bespeak from you a careful reading of Mrs. Lindsey's report.

Frequently information is sought by former pupils, or by parents of present pupils, as to the work done in our schools during previous years. The same information is always asked whenever pupils move into another school system. It has sometimes been difficult to obtain the required data. For this reason the seven school boards of this supervisory union have purchased a permanent record system to be kept in the superintendent's office. This will keep, in permanent form, a complete record of the work done by each pupil in these towns during the years he attended our schools. Not only will scholastic attainments be recorded but such information as will help future teachers to understand the pupil, if the latter moves away. Records of health conditions, results of standardized tests, when properly kept, will aid both teacher and pupil to adapt future work to individual needs. We believe this is an important means of guaranteeing to each boy and girl a consistent rate of progress, free from the delays of adjustment which would otherwise occur with each change of teacher.

The progress of your schools and the standing of the pupils is being tested this year, as in years previous, by standardized tests. The ranking of these tests is absolutely mechanical and depends upon no one's individual judgment. As all pupils are rated by a fixed scale the actual achievement of each pupil is accurately measured. We know of no fairer method of grading.

The following statistics are based upon the financial report of the year 1933-1934. The average cost per pupil in the schools of Seabrook was \$38.70. The \$6000 State aid check is used wholly for elementary schools so that the actual cost to the town of Seabrook for their town schools and administration of their schools was \$20.79 per pupil. This is a per pupil decrease of more than \$12.00 in four years. The median per pupil cost for the whole state was \$72.465. The accuracy of the school board's budget is shown by a comparison of their budget and the financial report. The budget asked for \$38.39. The actual expenditures were within thirty-one cents.

In an attempt to economize, the money for text books

has been reduced too greatly. Books are essential to school achievement. The per pupil cost for text books in New Hampshire last year was \$1.44. Seabrook paid but \$.76. I am therefore recommending that a larger amount be allotted to books in the next year's budget. The parents of Seabrook will support this request, I am sure.

Mr. Norman Leavitt has been engaged by the school board to supervise the music of the schools. The children of Seabrook are naturally musical and Mr. Leavitt's work with them is producing worthy results, not only in singing but in the appreciation of good music. The future lives of the pupils will be wonderfully enriched by this instruction.

Our schools are again overcrowded as is shown by the statistical report following. The result will be an increased number of pupils who cannot keep up with the class progress. More and more educational leaders are striving for teaching of the individual as opposed to class teaching. This cannot be done to any great extent when teachers are in charge of forty or more pupils as is the case with two of your teachers in the South School. This school is filled to actual capacity during the current year. It will be impossible to take care of more children under present conditions. Into the first grade room are now crowded forty-three children distributed among grades one, two and three. This situation must be relieved if the children of South Seabrook are to get a good start in their early years. Miss Eaton with an enrollment of thirty-seven and Mrs. Hickman with forty are only slightly better off. To help this condition the school board has placed a special article in the school warrant which would authorize them to remedy the situation in the south part of the town. The extra room should not only benefit the pupils immediately affected but will lessen the crowding throughout the entire system. I feel certain the parents of Seabrook will support their school board in their request for the special room.

A large percentage of our children attend Amesbury High School. The faculty of that school is cooperating with us in every way possible. They discuss with us the work done by the Seabrook pupils. They study the tests taken by

these pupils during their last year in Seabrook and thus are better enabled to place them in their proper classification. They forward to us the attendance report each week so that we may gage their interest in the school. Such co-operation must, of necessity, bring satisfactory results.

I wish to express to you my appreciation of kindly advice and help received from you as a board. My contact with pupils, teachers and citizens has been uniformly pleasant.
