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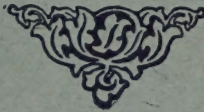

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The Members of the School Board:
Springfield, N. H.

Sometimes the best indication of a healthy state of affairs is that there is very little to report. There is nothing unusual happening in the schools of our district, but there is a very real improvement of the work being done in the schools in several ways. It is a normal healthy growth in excellence and like all actual growth would hardly be observed except by watching it carefully.

Our staff of teachers this year are all either experienced or professionally trained, in some cases both. They feel a very great responsibility for the results of their work and have a serious purpose to make their work this year the best they have ever done. Our ideal of a good school is a working school, a school in which pupils are seen to be at work at all times during school session. Teachers can only direct pupils how to work, pupils themselves must do the real work of digging out their education from the material provided for them to use. No child ever learned anything by looking over his tasks and waiting for his teacher to help him over every step of the way.

We notice in our schools this year that the pupils are getting this idea; the teachers are teaching the pupils how to study,—how to make the most of their time in school, how to memorize, how to use their books to get many ideas from that they will use in after life. Our schools are growing in industry, the group of pupils in them are learning how to work.

The pupils are also learning how to recite. They are being trained how to stand up and make a thorough recitation on topics given to them for study; not only how to study but how to tell intelligently what they have learned.

The teachers are making especial effort to improve the ability of the pupils to speak and write in

the English language. A large amount of written composition work in various ways is being done and also a large amount of practice in oral speaking. We believe that school training should give our pupils ability to write what they think and to tell it with clearness and force.

Miss Hazel M. Little, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School has taken the school at the village and is doing excellent work. Miss Dora Reney is doing similarly excellent work at Sanborn Hill. A list of our teachers follows this report.

The physical conditions of the schoolhouses are improving from year to year. With the installation of modern seats at all schoolhouses and the progressive repairs being made our buildings are assuming rather attractive appearance as well as affording more hygienic conditions for the pupils.

It will come as welcome information to many people that aid from the state to the district has been somewhat increased this year. The burden of modern school support is thus in considerable degree being equalized throughout the state by the granting of considerable state aid to the smaller towns.
