Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tilton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, on the eighth day of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for the term of three years, two or more Road Agents, for the year ensuing, two Auditors for the year ensuing, and one Trustee of Trust Funds for term of three years.

2. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates at Large, Alternate Delegates at Large, District Delegates, Alternate District Delegates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice President of the United States.

3. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the School and Parsonage fund interest for the year ensuing.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to appropriate for Memorial Day expenses for the year ensuing.

5. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the highway running westerly from the north bound of the late Chas. E. Lane farm on the Gulf road to a point near the Webber farm at Tilton Highlands.

6. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to petition the Superior Court to make the highway running westerly from Walter Daniell's farm to the Frank-

lin line, subject to gates and bars as described in chapter 79, section 1, of the N. H. Public Laws.

7. To see if the Town will vote to continue the collection of rubbish in the Precinct, raise and appropriate money for same.

8. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to employ a Police for day duty twelve months of the year.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any sum of money for the Laconia Hospital Association.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept State aid for highways, raise and appropriate the amount of money required by law to secure the same, \$2,919.37.

11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to make any change in the location of the "Garden Plot," so called in Veteran Square.

12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for all purposes for the ensuing year.

13. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to the reports of it's officers and agents for the past year.

14. To choose any other officers and agents for the year ensuing.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Of these graduates two entered N. H. State University, one Bay Path Institute, one a special school for study for the work of a dietician, one a hospital for training as a nurse, four are doing additional work at Tilton School, one is attending a high school in Massachusetts, two are doing office work here in Tilton, and one is at home but plans to enter Plymouth Normal School next year.

Again it was a local student who was the highest ranking member of the entire class for the full four-year course, and was the recipient of the Baketel Gold Medal at the commencement exercises. This honor came to Catherine D. Sweatt. Maurice Griffin, Doris M. Hosmer, and Catherine D. Sweatt were elected to membership in Cum Laude Society, an honorary scholarship society.

Teachers

Our teacher replacement this year was five. Miss Alice L. Robertson, Miss Emma Kelley and Miss Margaret Rowden resigned in June that they might establish homes. We regretted the loss of these good teachers. Miss Mabel Connolly resigned that she might continue studying at Plymouth Normal School. Mr. John Conrad did not care to be considered for re-appointment. Miss Eva M. Smith of Lancaster, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School, was chosen to fill the vacancy in the second grade, and Miss Eleanor B. Sweet of Penacook, a graduate of Plymouth

Repairs

The No. Four school building, which was greatly in need of attention, was repainted both inside and out during the summer. The appearance of the school room has been greatly improved. I again recommend that the approach to the toilets in this building be rearranged. The present arrangement is not satisfactory.

The exterior of the Sanborn Road building has also been freshly painted. This building should be reshingled during the summer vacation.

The school room in the Eastman building is being used this year for the over-flow from grades four and five. It is probable that next year it will be necessary to use this for grades five and six. The large enrollment in the lower grades make it imperative that we have another school room available. A new room could be fitted up in the Eastman building at no great expense which could be used for first and second grade children and thus relieve the congestion which we now have in the main building in these two grades. It is not probable that any addition to the teaching force would be necessary.

Our manual training department has always been poorly housed. I would recommend that the garage, which is now used for storage purposes, be fitted out for this work. This change, too, could be made without any large expense and the facilities for carrying on the work in manual training would be very much improved.

I would recommend that the Eastman building be repainted and that a less sombre color be used.

Summer Playground

The summer playground was maintained for nine weeks and was under the supervision of Mr. Eldon Heartz. Mr.

Heartz was assisted by Miss Phyllis Hogquist and Miss Marjorie Davis. Again this proved to be a popular resort for the children during the summer weeks. The cost of maintenance last summer was approximately \$400. The yearly appropriation for this work for the past two years has been \$600. The school board in the special article for summer playground maintenance in the school warrant suggests an appropriation of \$300 for next summer.

School Finances

Expenditures for school purposes, like all other municipal expenditures, are rightfully receiving at this time a careful scrutiny. The following table makes easy a comparison of the budget of this current school year with that proposed by the school board for next year:

The school board has made a very careful study of the budget. It has been found possible to reduce certain items without any likelihood of any impairment of the efficiency of the schools, at least for a year. But other items must necessarily be increased. The recommendation for high school tuition has been increased \$1,000, making it \$14,500. This is approximately what it will cost this current year. As several of the fire insurance policies must be renewed this coming year the amount needed under this item will be \$750 as compared to \$100 this current year. The reduction in the amount proposed for teachers' salaries is somewhat misleading. No reduction in teachers' salaries is contemplated by the school board. Our present teacher schedule calls for an expenditure of approximately \$18,500, the amount proposed for next year.

After making such decreases as seem possible and such increases as seem necessary in the several items, the result is a reduction of but \$300 in the total budget. It is estimated, however, that our income from certain sources will be approximately \$550 greater than for this current year, so that, whereas the assessment required to meet the budget for this current year was \$46,260, the assessment required to meet the proposed budget is \$45,424, a reduction of some over \$800.

That is not the whole story. The total appropriation a year ago for school purposes, including \$3,000 to meet a note given by the school board which covered the expenditures for the grading of the school playground the year previous and an appropriation of \$600 for the maintenance of the summer playground, was \$49,860. If the recommendations of the school board and the suggestion in the matter of the summer playground are approved the total

assessment for school purposes for next year will be \$45,724. This means a drop of \$4,200 in the assessment.

I wish to call attention to the generosity of Mrs. Lillian C. Blanchard. For more than a year she held a note against the school district for \$3,000. When the note was paid she cancelled all interest charges.

Annual School Meeting

The annual school meeting will be held Friday evening, March 18, at 7:30, in the Union School hall. The terms of Mrs. Mabel W. Hill and Mr. Hiram R. Blanchard, as members of the school board, will expire at that time.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation of the co-operation of teachers and school board.
