

#### (TOWN WARRANT)

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy, in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Art. 1. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 2. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To choose a selectman for the ensuing three years.
  - Art. 4. To choose all other necessary Town Officers.
- Art. 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- Art. 6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor.
- Art. 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing highways and bridges, and see if the town will vote to apply for State aid and permanent improvement of highways in accordance with an act of the Legislature of 1905.

- Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for State Aid Maintenance.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting.
- Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent upon all taxes paid previous to July 5th of the current year, and instruct the Collector to collect all poll taxes before June 1, 1922.
- Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars to apply to outstanding notes.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Public Library in addition to the amount required by law.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay the interest on the Water Bonds.
- Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the extension and maintenance of the Water System.
- Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be set aside as a sinking fund to pay off the water bonds at maturity.
- Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of employing a district nurse.
- Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day, and choose a Committee to have charge of the same.
- Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to buy a Motor Truck for fire purposes and raise money to pay for the same and choose a Committee for that purpose.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to abolish the Police Court.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money to pay Town Charges.

Art. 21. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors or Committees heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

Art. 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to allow the American Legion the use of the Town Hall, one night a month, free of charge.

#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Troy School Board:

I herewith submit to you my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools, the twenty-second under district supervision.

At the close of the school year in June it was found that none of the high school teachers were to return, and that three out of five of the teachers in the primary building declined re-election. Teachers were scarce and the outlook was not promising, but Troy was extremely fortunate in securing some exceptionally good teachers to fill the vacancies. For principal of the high school Mr. Frank K. Graser, a graduate of Yale, was elected. Although without experience, Mr. Graser has shown himself to be an excellent teacher and a good executive.

Miss Mary D. Sullivan was placed in charge of the eighth grade room and teaches French and English, and Miss Margaret McGregor, who has taught a sixth grade in East Jaffrey for two years with success, was placed in charge of the seventh grade room, teaching subjects in both the seventh and eighth grades, and commercial geography and history and commercial arithmetic in the high school.

All three teachers have proved to be good in discipline and efficient teachers. A spirit of genuine co-operation between principal and assistants has prevailed and the attitude of the pupils has been pleasing.

Miss Olsen, who had given two years of excellent service in the primary building decided to accept a better paying position in New Jersey. For this position Miss Mabel F. Johnson was elected. Miss Johnson is a graduate of Fitchburg Normal School with several years' experience in teaching the intermediate grades. Although new to the charge of a building containing 250 pupils she has handled the position with good judgment and appears to secure the hearty co-operation of the other teachers. Miss Mabel E. Gibson succeeds Miss Yeaton as teacher of grades four and five (b), and with an enrollment of 58 pupils has succeeded in obtaining excellent results.

Miss Velma Blake declined her re-election as teacher of the third grade and Mrs. Bertha H. Howe, who taught the two preceeding years at West Hill was secured. Mrs. Howe has already proved her ability as a teacher in this town. For the West Hill school Miss Catherine Dunn, a graduate of Keene was elected to succeed Mrs. Howe. Some excellent work is being done in this small rural school.

The enrollment in all the village schools shows the need of immediate planning for more room in the near future. Two rooms in the primary buildings have an enrollment of 58, two of 47 and one of 37. All but one of these rooms have more pupils than a single teacher should have if proper attention is given to individual work. Unless pupils are held back in

the second grade the small third grade room will be overerowded. There ought to be two more rooms available and possibly a third. Instead of having only five teachers for 250 pupils in six grades there should be six teachers for the A divisions of each of the six grades, with one or two rooms available for the B divisions.

This has been worked out very satisfactorily in Jaffrey. Three years ago we had over 200 pupils in the first four grades, between 50 and 60 in each room for a single teacher. Two years ago we opened a room for the B divisions of grades one and two, and last year a room for the B divisions of grades three and four. The result has been that the A divisions accomplish much better results and the B divisions receive the individual attention that they need.

I suggest, therefore, that a committee be appointed at the school meeting to look into the situation and report what can be done to provide more room for the first six grades.

There is also need of a larger room in the high school building. The additional room provided two years ago has enabled us to carry on the work in a fairly satisfactory manner, but the present indications are that we shall need more room for the next year. Last September only 20 pupils entered the 7th grade while the enrollment of the 8th grade was 34. It is to be hoped that a good number of the present eighth grade will enter the high school, and from 35 to 39 pupils should come up from the sixth grade.

By widening the present seventh grade room so that two additional rows of seats can be put in we can have a school

room of fair size and of much better proportions than we now have. It does not seem that such an addition need be very expensive and I would suggest that a special appropriation be asked for to do this work.

Two years ago, when the question of teachers' salaries was being considered in many places, Troy took the lead in trying to meet the situation. The school board, instead of trying to get along with paying as little as possible, resolved to secure the best possible teachers, even at a large advance in salary. The citizens of Troy showed their willingness to cooperate, by not only cheerfully raising the amount needed to pay this increase, but also did all in their power to make the teachers feel that they were a part of the community.

One result was that Troy secured the reputation of having good teachers, and being a good town to teach in. This doubtless accounts for the excellent teachers who were available at the opening of the present year, as well as for the excellent positions offered teachers who were leaving at that time. On account of the excellent rating of the teachers now in service Troy was able to secure from the State Board of Education the maximum \$6,000 awarded as state aid.

When we consider that other towns with larger budget estimates were cut to \$4,500 or less, it is plain to see that the far sighted policy of the school board one and two years ago has been a great financial aid to Troy, as well as an aid in securing well trained teachers.

The coming year should be one of progress. The results already attained should encourage us to aim for still better re-

sults. The children of this town are the best asset of Troy. To the development of this asset we should devote every energy.

In closing I wish to thank the citizens, teachers, pupils and members of the school board for the loyal support given me during the past year.


