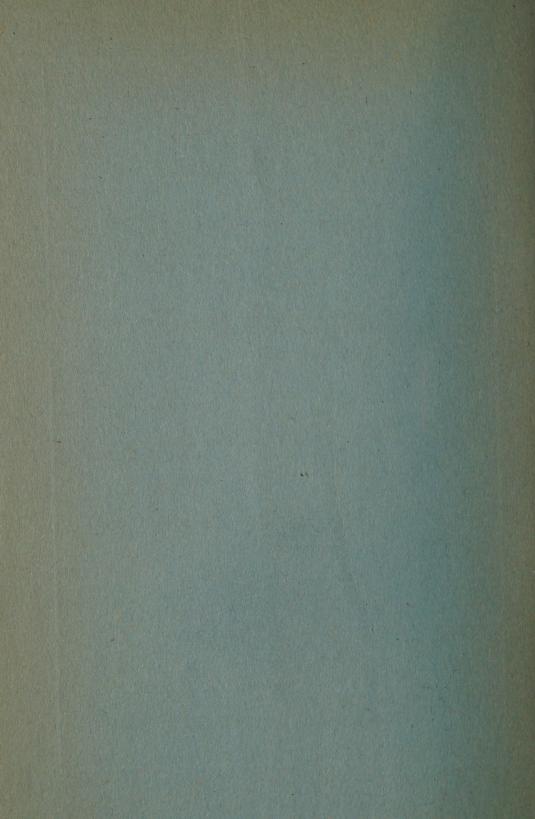

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SELECTMEN'S REPORT

To the Voters and Taxpayers of the Town of Washington:

The Selectmen of Washington submit herewith their report for 1955. We hope you will find it interesting as well as informative. If you have questions or desire more information please feel free to ask the Selectmen.

We feel it is time some mention is made in our Annual Report of the activities of our local organizations as well as of some public spirited individuals, both resident and non-resident.

For several years the Granges have sponsored various projects to benefit their communities. Purling-beck Grange in East Washington, assisted greatly in the restoration of the village pond, the beach and picnic area, redecorating their own hall both inside and out, painting the church sheds, and other minor projects.

Lovell Grange, at the Center, redecorated the room they use in the Town Hall, installed new drapes on the stage, installed a gas range in the town kitchen, a gas floor furnace in the Library, and are now completing redecorating the interior of the Library.

These projects were made possible by sales, suppers, entertainments, etc., sponsored by the Granges who in turn thank all who in any way made them a success. Individuals also have contributed labor and materials to other smaller tasks about the town, to all of whom we say "Thank You" in behalf of the Taxpayers.

The Lovell 4-H Club set up and maintained a picnic area on Route 31 which proved a popular spot as it commanded a beautiful view of the village. The churches, too, have redecorated and painted their buildings thus adding to the attractiveness of the communities.

Camp Morgan, the Swimming Club, Robert Onella and his bulldozer, and others are to be complimented on the improvements at Millen Lake swimming area.

As Selectmen we have tried to carry out the votes of the people. Some tasks are completed while others remain to be done. Our pressing need is Cemeteries. The new land at the Center needs developing while at East Washington we must first acquire land to expand. We need your suggestions and votes on Town Meeting day.

We look forward to seeing you March 13th, and again we thank you ALL for your splendid cooperation.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Washington, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 and accept State Aid of \$2,000.00 for State Aid Construction in said Town.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$471.50 and accept State Aid of \$3,143.34 for Town Road Aid in said Town.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Shedd Free Library for the ensuing year.
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Fire Department for the ensuing year.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept from Walter Maynard the plot of land adjoining the East Washington Cemetery.

- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for developing the new Cemetery lands, or take any action relating thereto.
- 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to convey to Trevor A. Price for the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) any interest the town may have in the A. Marshall Farm, Spaulding Lot, Dickey Land and the Town Farm lot properties because of tax sales in 1916 and 1919 when the Town of Washington obtained tax title to the above properties by reason of tax sales.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for painting the exterior of the Town Hall, or take any action relating thereto.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to build a town garage, or take any action relating thereto.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the Capital Reserve for Town Garage and to borrow a sufficient sum on long term notes to pay the balance.
- 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for band concerts.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be transferred to Capital Reserve for the purchase of Highway Equipment, or take any action relating thereto.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be transferred to Capital Reserve for the construction of a Town Garage, or take any action relating thereto.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be transferred to Capital Reserve for the construction of permanent bridges, or take any action relating thereto.

- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 to purchase an adequate wood burning stove for the Town Hall. (Inserted by Homer B. Chase, February 4, 1956)
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money as a contribution to the Marine Memorial at Hampton Beach.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to deed to A. Harry Davison and Ernest Cram the old gravel pit between the bridges on Route 31.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to allow Lovell Grange to install a floor furnace in the Grange room (so-called) in the Town Hall.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Washington:

It is a pleasure to have the opportunity to present my second annual report for your consideration.

As the one-room schools in New Hampshire continue to diminish in number it is logical for the citizens in this community to ask how long shall we, and how long can we, continue to operate our one-room unit.

Washington should continue to operate their oneroom school as long as there is a desire on the part of the citizenry to do so. It appears to me that the Citizens of Washington take a considerable amount of justifiable pride in their school and as long as that continues there appears to be no reason for discontinuance.

There are three factors which may have some bearing on how long Washington can continue to operate however. They are: increased cost of operation, teacher shortages, and pressure from within and outside the community.

Although costs of operation have increased and seem destined to continue to do so I do not believe them to be out of line with rising costs for other services.

The teacher shortage may be our greatest problem as the years go by. There just aren't enough teachers to meet the requirements. Practically no one is training to accept the responsibilities of a one-room unit and we are very close to the end of our ability to recall exteachers back into the profession.

There has been and will continue to be, pressure from the colleges and professional associations, and gentle nudging from the State Department of Education to eliminate small educational units. Their arguments are sound and logical and there are some citizens in every community who share their feelings. However, there are many who are for the continuance of the small units whose arguments are equally sound and logical. Therefore, it seems logical to conclude that

pressure is not a very great factor in determining whether or not to join the forces of consolidation.

The Washington school has enjoyed a fine year and, has, at this writing, 22 pupils enrolled. As far as can be determined our graduates are doing well in the secondary schools they are attending.

The noon lunch program, which is probably the smallest one in the state continues to be one of the most outstanding ones in the state. Much credit is due to those who cooperate in its operation.

The school plant is in good condition and it is a credit to the community that the Board acts quickly to remedy any maintenance problem.

It has been a pleasure to work with the School Board, the citizens, pupils and teachers of Washington. I am looking forward to continued pleasant relations during the next school year.
